















Building For Town




"We appreciate the money because it helps us buy the



The opportunities, as well as the colors, were plentiful. Seniors participated in a volleyball tournament, numerous games and contests, and could even perform a talent onstage.








Both groups attended summer camp at the school, learning four field routines and two track routines for the upcoming school year.





"I think the red, white and blue theme was a great way to end this school year because of what happened on September 11th," Stefanie Page, sophomore, said.








HOSA sponsored events that took place on campus. HOSA sponsored the two annual blood drives that allowed students 17 years of age or older to give blood.













Always coming up with new ideas, the staff always experienced new things. They made shows to entertain the school, created highlight videos, and sold copies to the fans all over.


They participated in the pumpkin carving contest and had a pie-eating contest. They also did many interesting things such as the documentary over the "ghost" in the library.


