
Spirit rocks the dome



Voss crowned Queen 1993







Fireignites excitment




Bulldogs burn the Reservation



For the first time in five years, the Indians were the underdogs, and first year head coach Larry Neumann would take his dogs to the Reservation and hopefully break the five year losing streak started in 1988 by the Indians at Bulldog Stadium.

The first quarter was scoreless and looked to be a very close game. With 8:05 left in the second quarter, Nederland answered first when junior quarterback Bryan Spell handed the ball over to senior tailback Ryan Menchaca who then trampled his way to the endzone to start the scoring attack. Just as the Bulldog fans sat back down, junior linebacker Chris Cadena intercepted a pass and ran in for another touchdown. Before halftime, the high powered Nederland offense would answer again when Brian Spell, the leading passer in district 24-4A, connected to senior receiver Greg Fleming. By halftime, the score was 20-0, and many of the Indian fans were leaving town.

The dogs scored the last touchdown during the third quarter to make the final score of 28-14. The final seconds were counted down by the Bulldog fans who went wild when the score board ran out of time. All of the players met in the middle of the field to celebrate their win. The varsity Bulldogs would eventually earn the title of 24-4A bidistrict champs and would advance to the 4A playoffs to once again face the Silsbee Tigers.
















Salutatorian Haley Nguyen began her speech in her native tounge, fighting off tears as she spoke. There were many wipings of eyes by the graduates.


Although the Freshman girls had a very small team of only seven players, they played very well. "As a team they worked hard and never gave up in some very close games" said Coach Oliver.
















The Nederland Bulldog varsity baseball team made it to the playoffs with pitching and defense.



"I had been working for four years to get where I am now. I'm excited, it'll be a tough tournament," Vernon said. There will be eight competitors form all over Texas in the state tournament.















The Gothic decoration satisfied the sponsor.


I want to thank everybody that helped with prom. We had fun and everything turned out beautiful," Vicky Hartt, the student council sponsor, said.
















Kerr's Commentary Exciting yearbook edition
