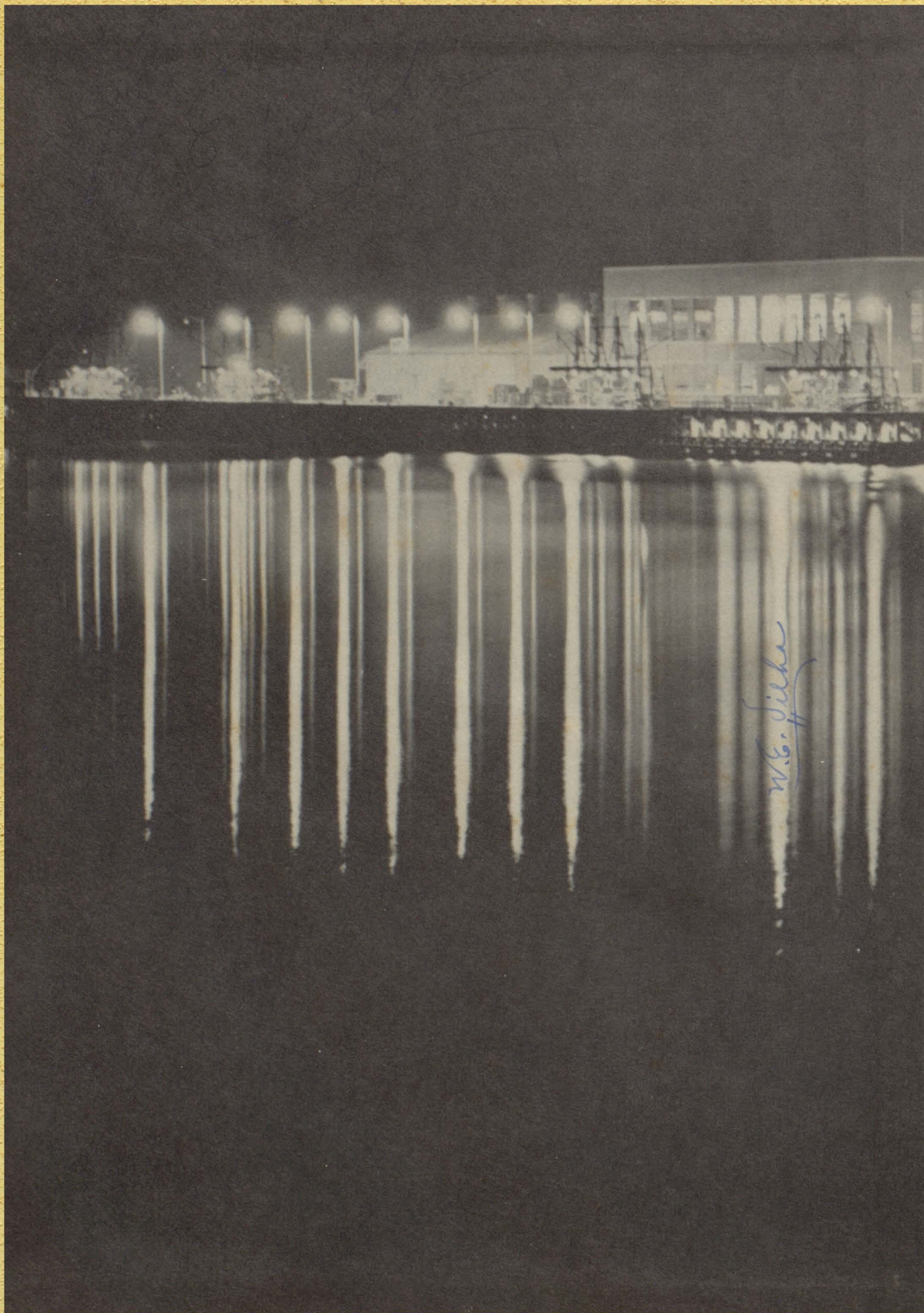

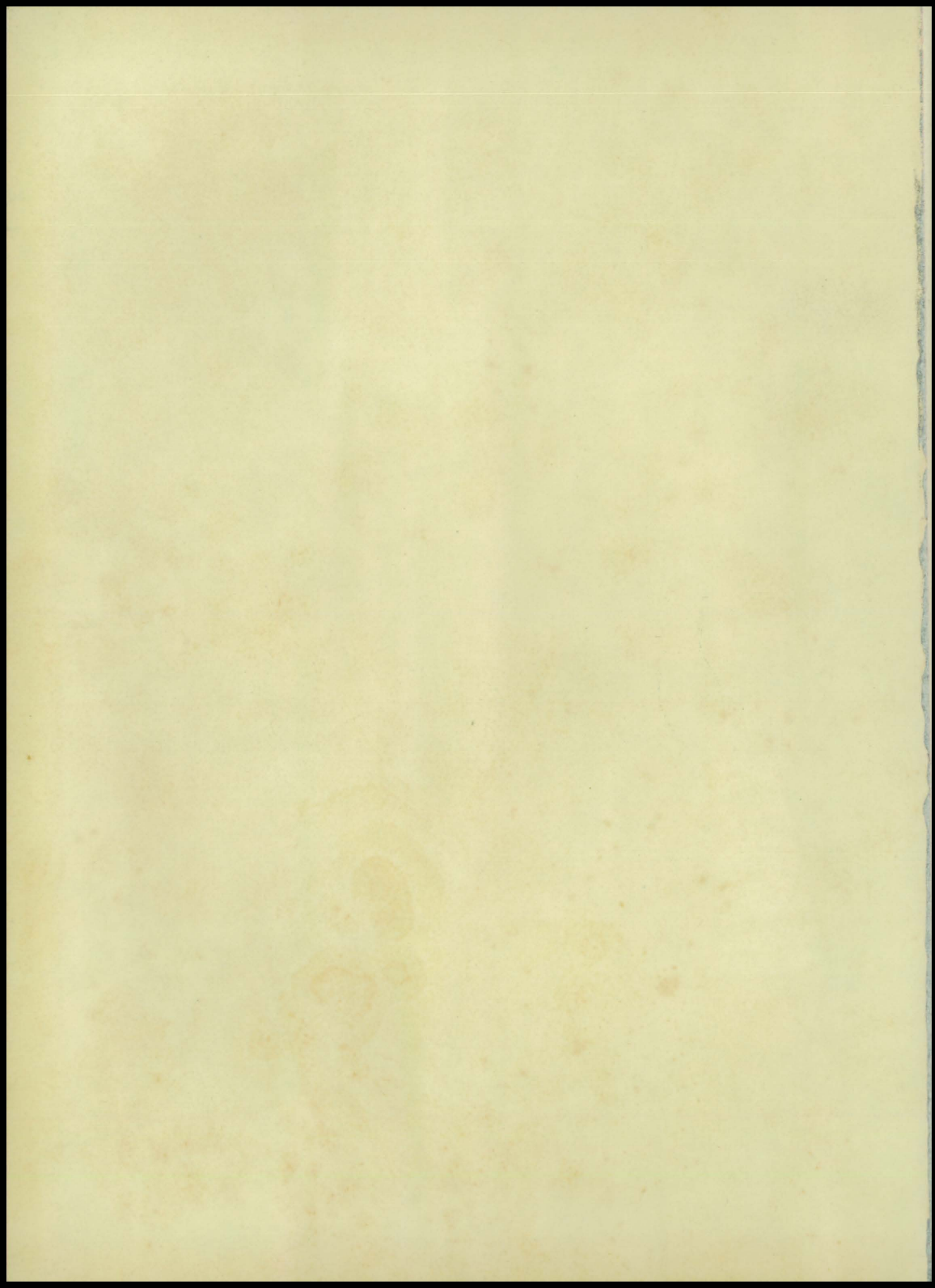

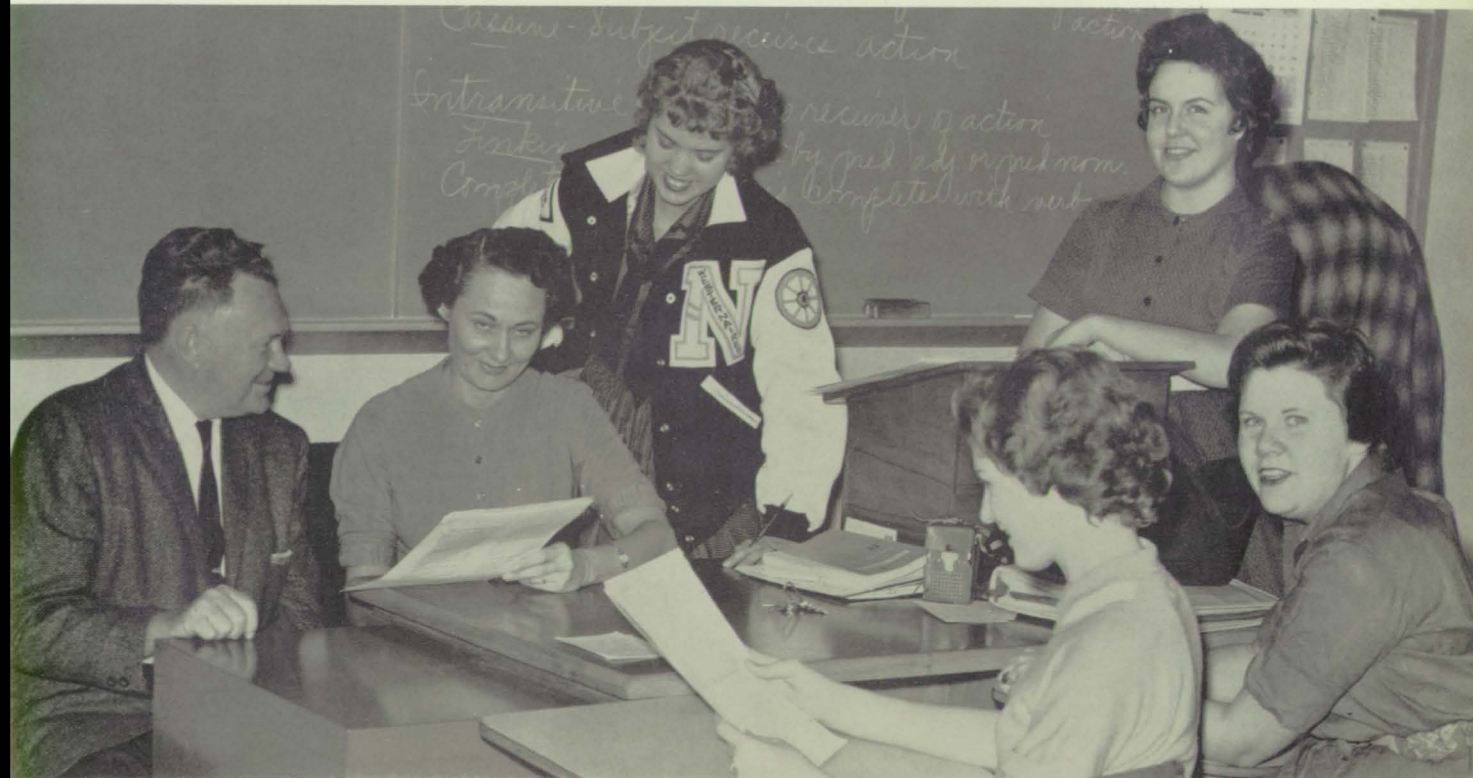

Realizing that communicating effectively with one's fellow men could solve many of the problems in this turbulent world, the English department begins the sophomore year with an intensive study of word usage, parts of speech, sentence structure, *Silas Marner*, and *Julius Caesar*.

English III goes deeper into the technicalities of grammar and composition and introduces the Americans Cooper, Harte, Poe, and Emerson.

English IV is devoted to a final review of grammatical principles and research themes. Immortal works like *The Canterbury Tales*, *Macbeth*, and *Paradise Lost* are analyzed and explained.

Business English trains graduates to take their places in the business world as typists, file clerks, secretaries, or executives.

Journalism students learn the technique of good news writing and put these to practical use in publishing the school newspaper, *The Bulldog Beat*.

Business mathematics solves the mysteries of per cents or the problems that arise in everyday business life.

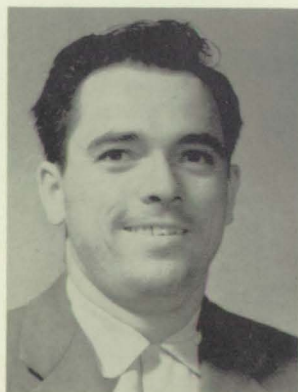
Algebra I and II cover the uses of formulas, signed numbers, and exponents.

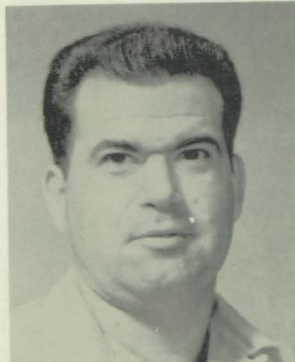

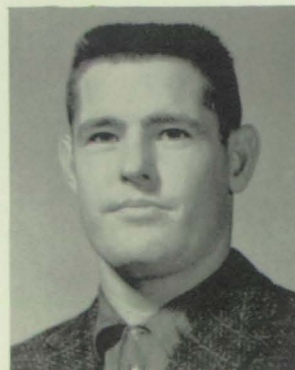

Sewing a straight seam and baking a cherry pie are not the only accomplishments of our homemaking students. The girls, in addition to learning to cook and sew, also receive instruction in home management and child care. The students must learn to prepare and serve meals and must satisfactorily complete blouses, skirts, and dresses in order to pass home economics. They also are required to select and make a home project.

Family relations includes the study of home and family living. Marrying successfully and happily, establishing a good home and rearing normal, well-adjusted children are the goals of this popular course.

Who provides much of the food for the tables of America? Not enough people consider the farmers and the jobs that they do in supplying food. Vocational Agriculture is offered for those boys interested in farming and ranching, and demonstrations are carried out on the eight-acre school farm.

Nederland has a three-year course in vocational agriculture. Instruction includes Future Farmers of America, soil and water conservation, caring for livestock and poultry, processing and marketing farm meats and eggs and farm shop engineering.

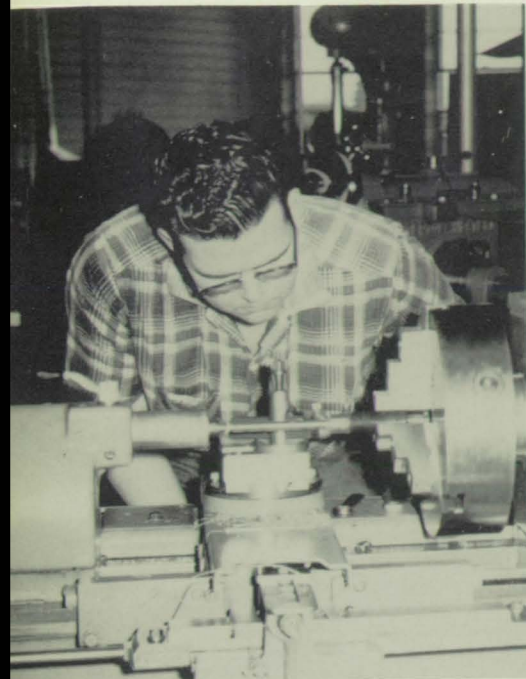

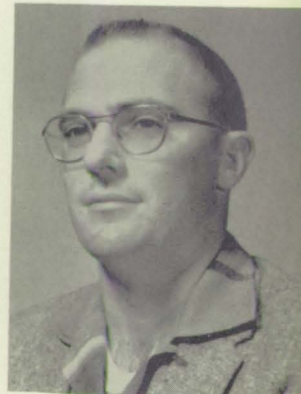

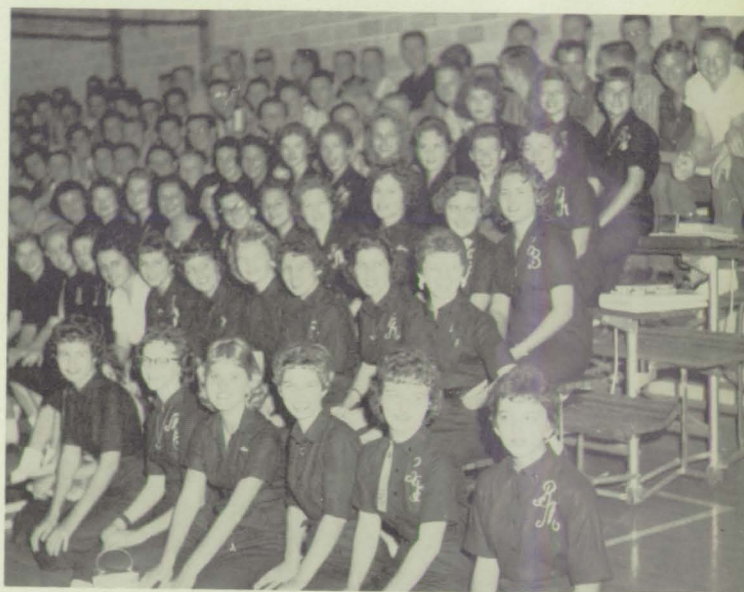

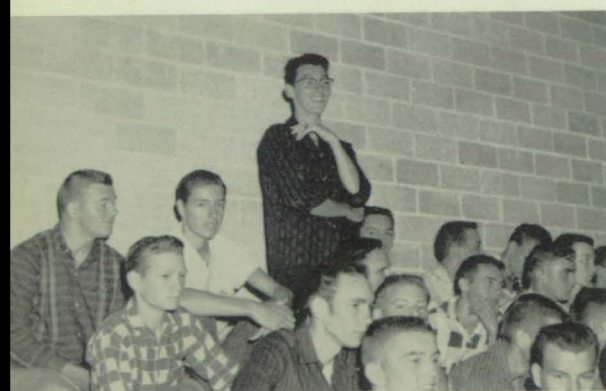

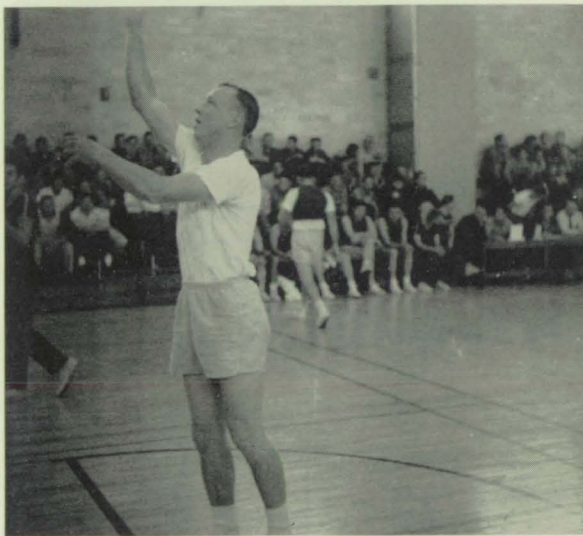

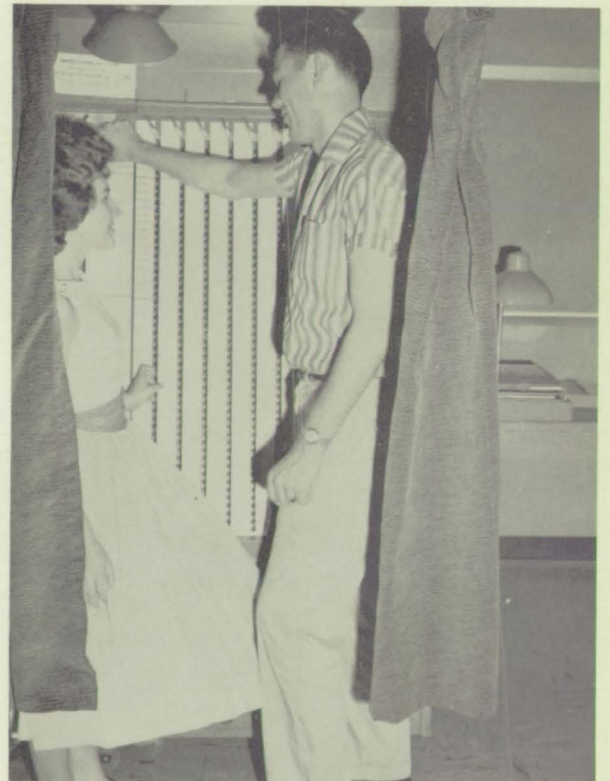

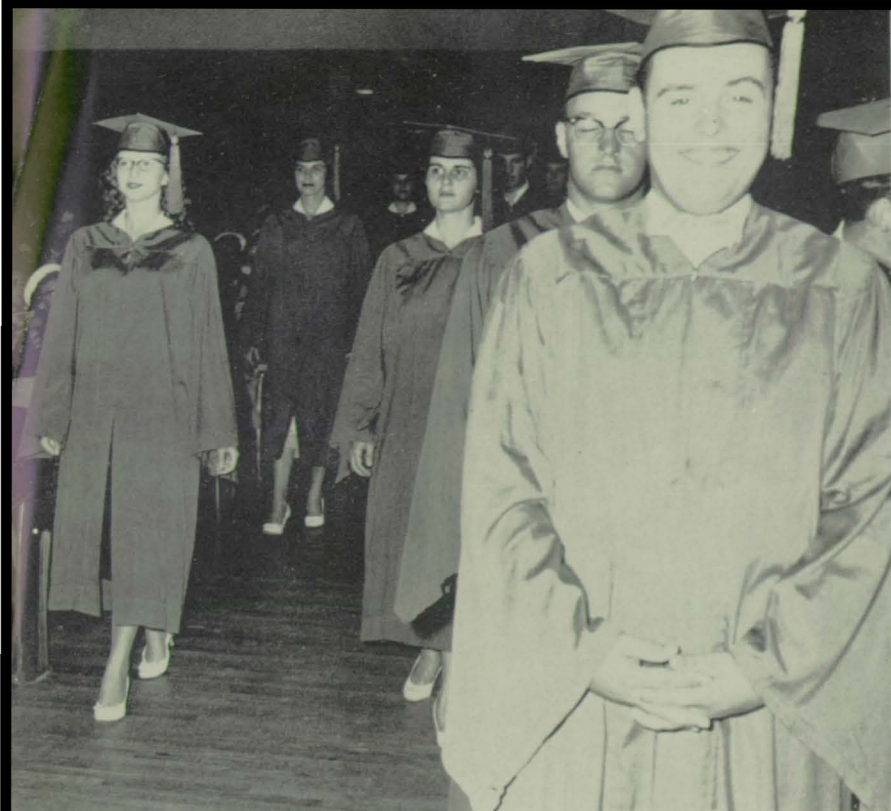

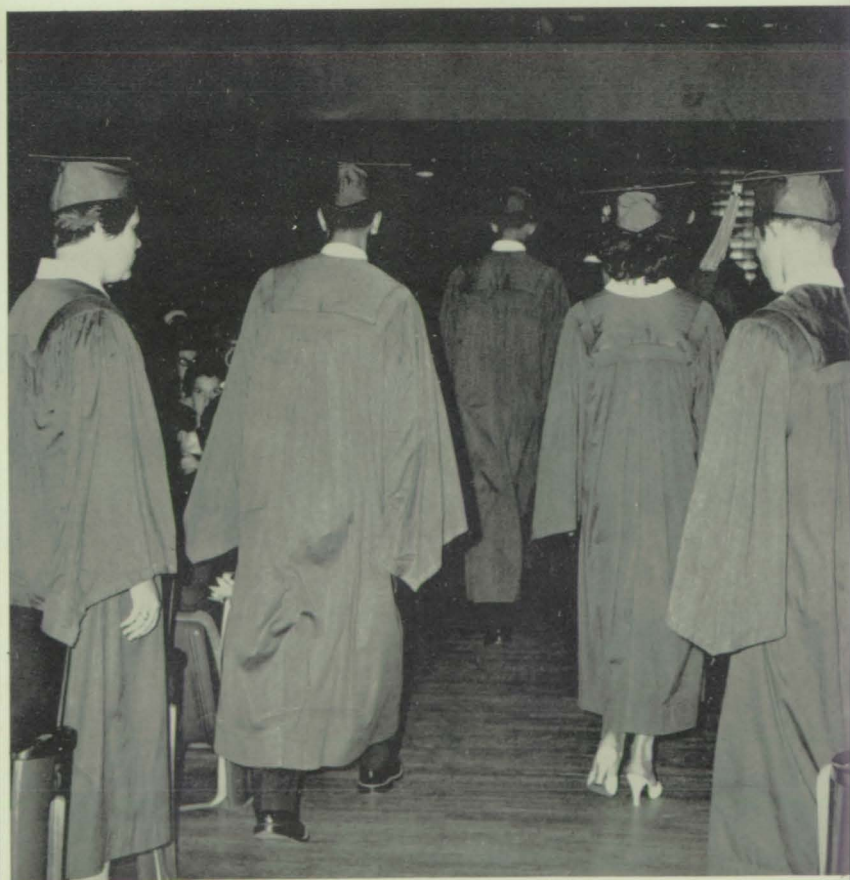

In the late spring the staff of this year were complimented with two dinners, one in Beaumont and the other given by a staff member.

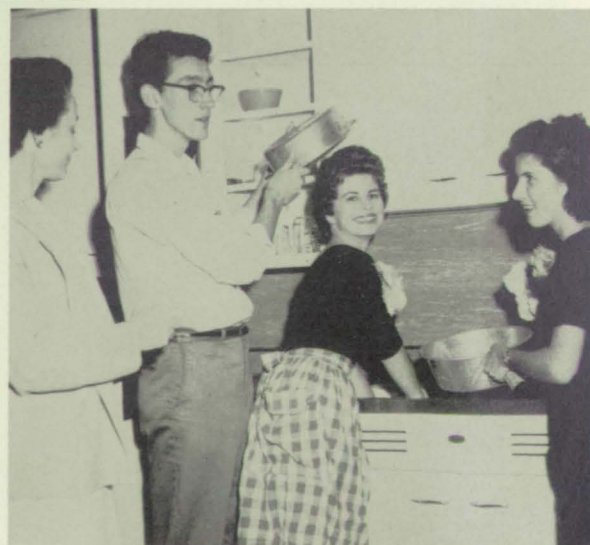

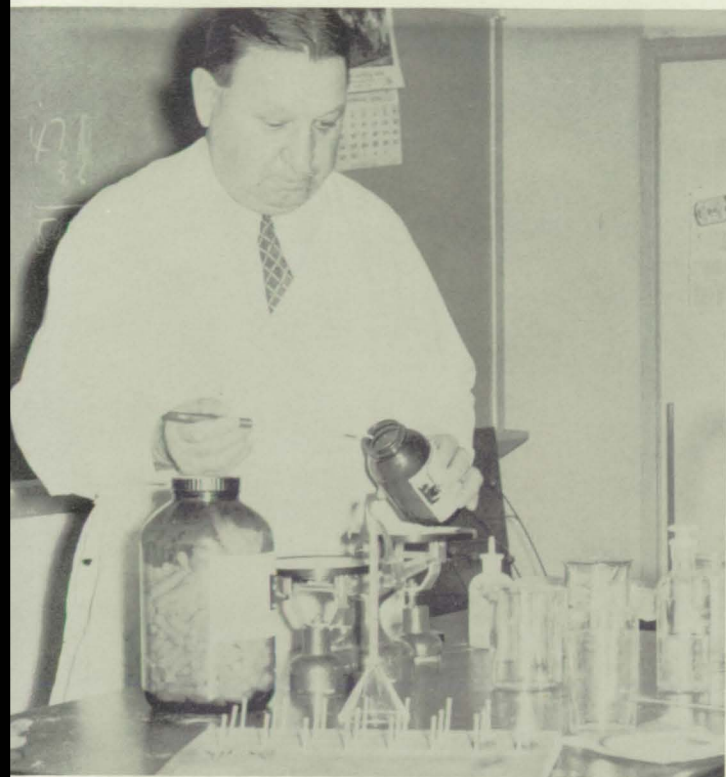

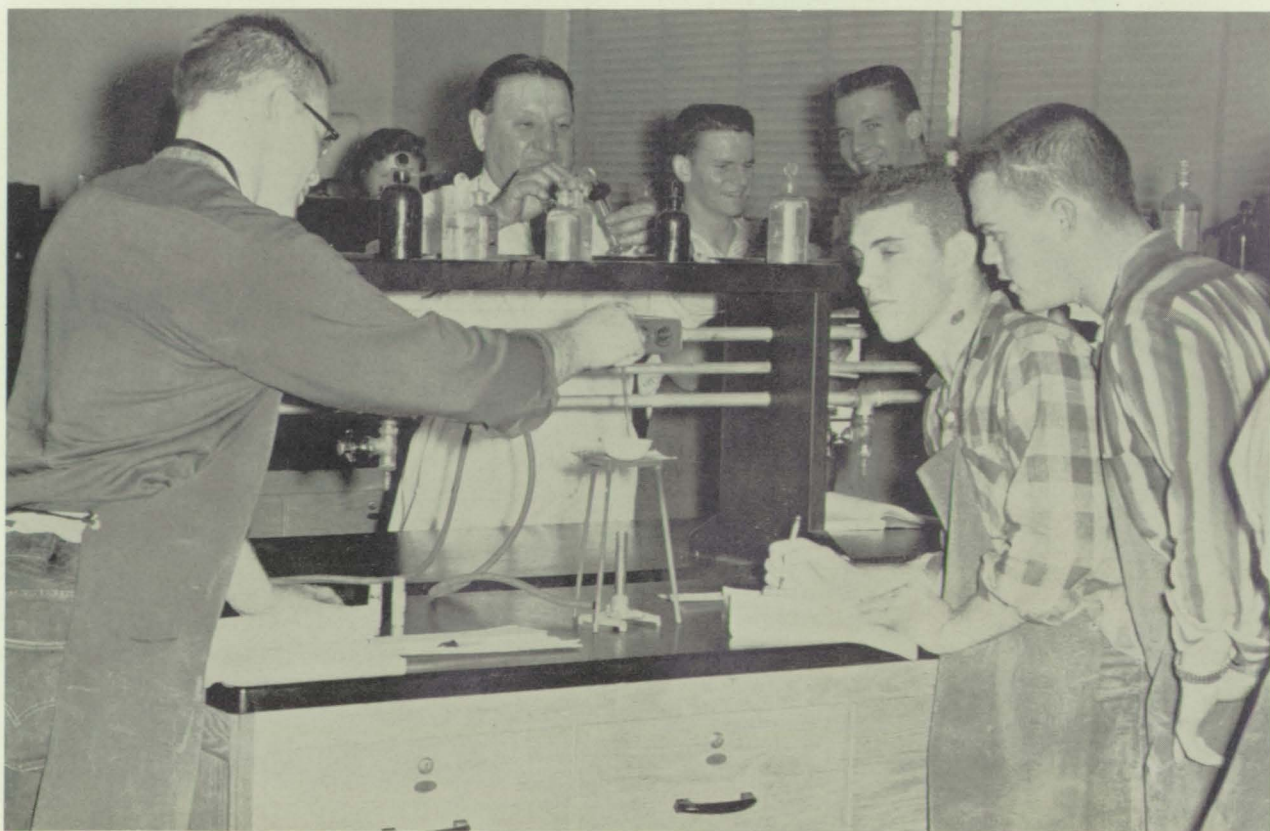

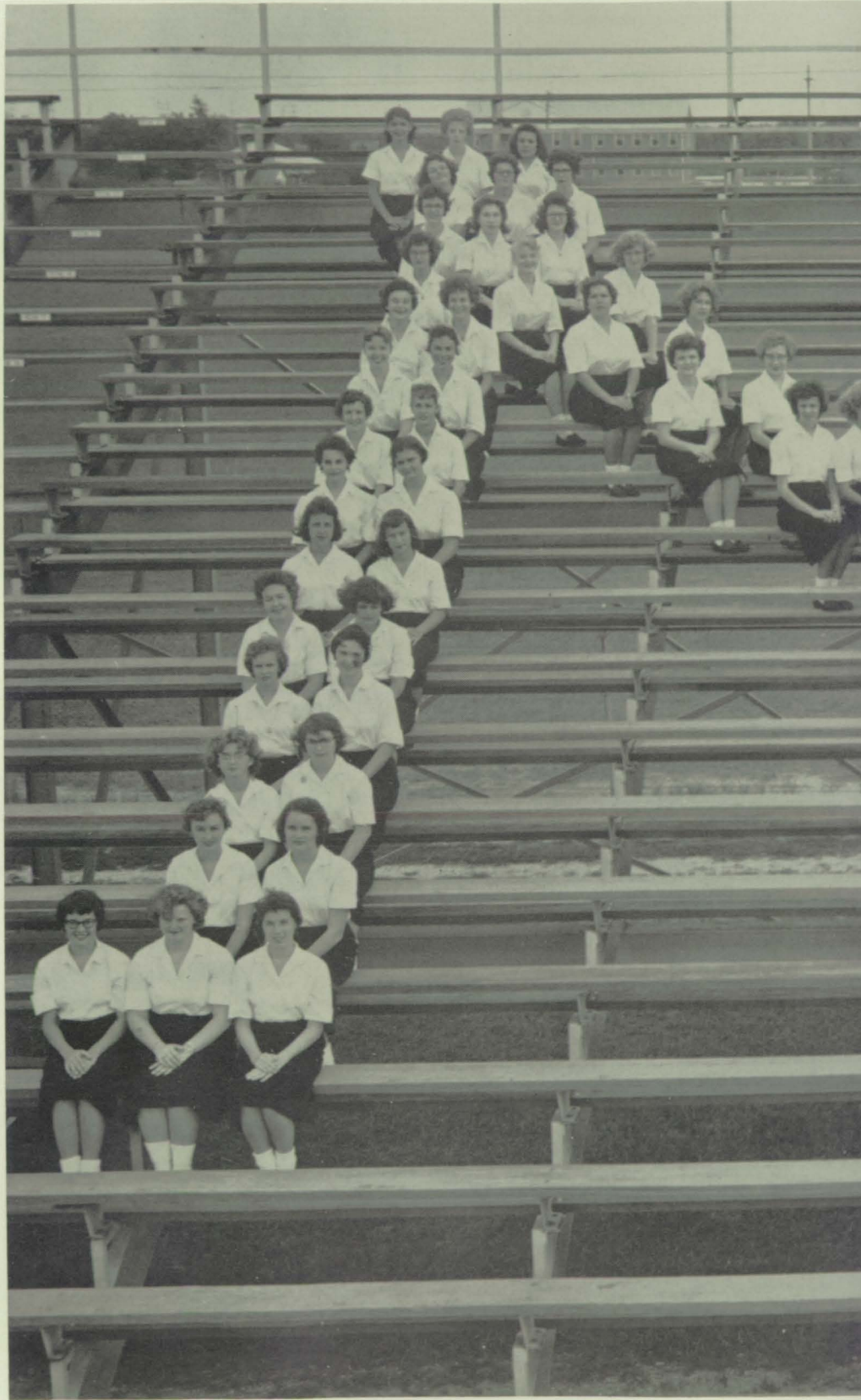

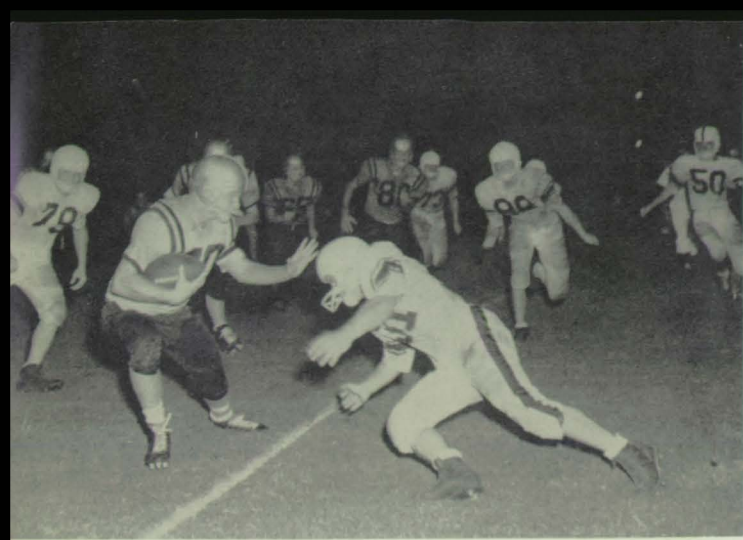

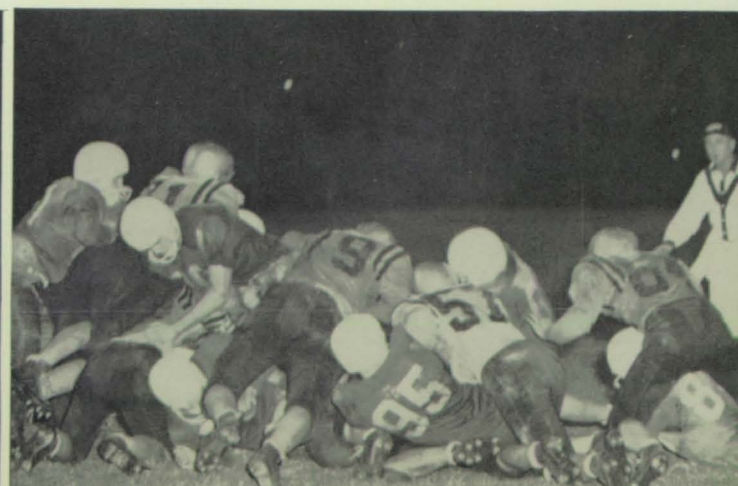
The Purples pounced in four of Nederland's seven fumbles and intercepted three of nine attempted passes for an admirable night's work.

Melder ran back the following kickoff but fumbled at the 45-yard line on the tackle, and Alvin recovered.

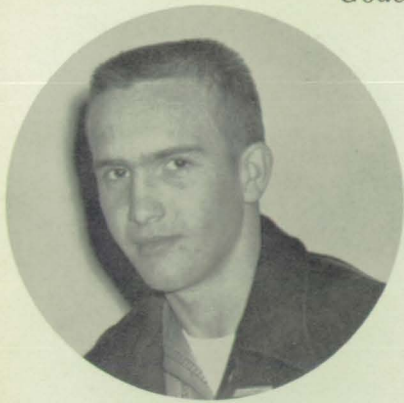

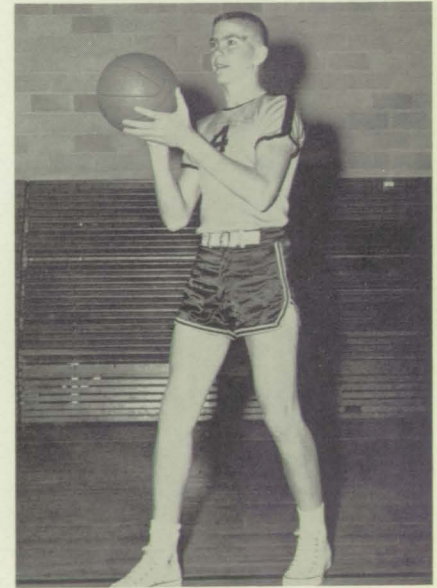

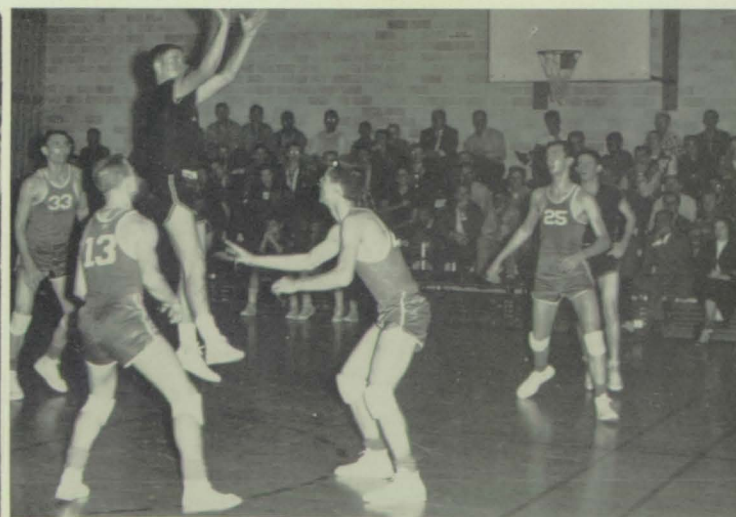

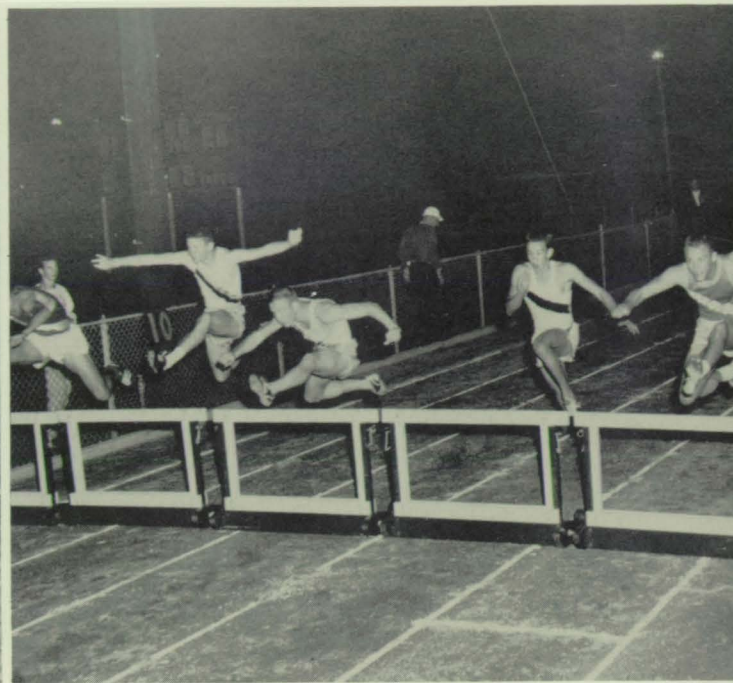

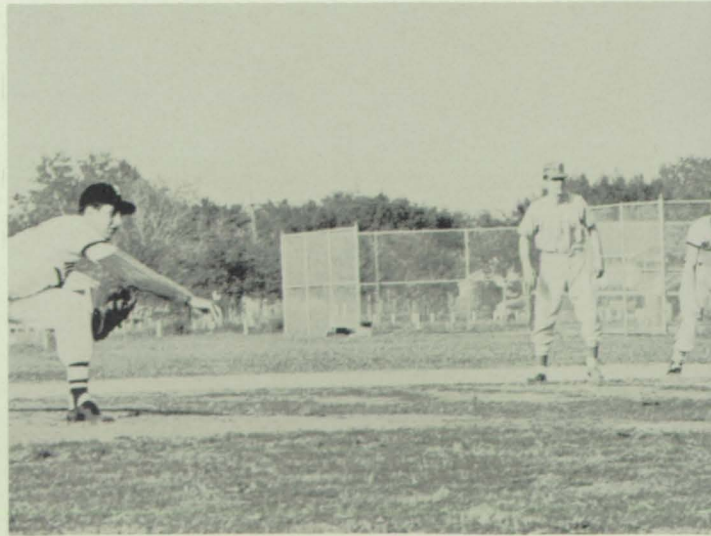
