Sewing a straight seam and baking a cherry pie are not the only accomplishments of our homemaking students. The girls, in addition to learning to cook and sew, also receive instruction in home management and child care. The students must learn to prepare and serve meals and must satisfactorily complete blouses, skirts, and dresses in order to pass home economics. They also are required to select and make a home project.

Family relations includes the study of home and family living. Marrying successfully and happily, establishing a good home and rearing normal, well-adjusted children are the goals of this popular course.

Who provides much of the food for the tables of America? Not enough people consider the farmers and the jobs that they do in supplying food. Vocational Agriculture is offered for those boys interested in farming and ranching, and demonstrations are carried out on the eight-acre school farm.
Nederland has a three-year course in vocational agriculture. Instruction includes Future Farmers of America, soil and water conservation, caring for livestock and poultry, processing and marketing farm meats and eggs and farm shop engineering.
