

Brad M. Hayes, D.C. is a postgraduate faculty member at New

York College of Chiropractic. In private practice in Tulsa, Okla. since 1979, Dr. Hayes has extensive experience as an insurance claims review consultant. He is a frequent lec-



turer on claims review, industrial relations, and personal and workplace injuries.

The author of several insurance manuals, Dr. Hayes writes a monthly column on insurance for the Chiropractic Journal.

Dr. Hayes is a past president of the Chiropractic Association of Oklahoma, and was twice selected as "Chiropractor of the Year" by the Association. He also is a past president of the Oklahoma Chiropractic Research Association, the Oklahoma Chiropractic-Insurance Joint Advisory Committee, and the Congress of Chiropractic State Associations. Dr. Hayes is a graduate of Palmer College of Chiropractic.

Ralph Barrale, D.C. is an associate professor of Chiropractic

Science at Logan College. He has taught body mechanics, basic correlation, case management, and Diversified technique. In private practice in Florissant, Mo. since grad-



uating from Logan in 1969, Dr. Barrale also serves on Logan's

postgraduate faculty.

Dr. Barrale has lectured extensively in Missouri and in several other states, on such topics as segmental adjusting, cervical adjusting, Logan Basic technique, and lumbar disc syndrome. He is one of three Logan faculty members conducting research on the Chiropractic Palpation Pad®, a modification of the patented Sensor Pad®. The pads enhance the sense of touch, and the Chiropractic Palpation Pad has shown promise in increasing palpation sensitivity.

Jerry Carpenter, D.C. is an instructor of Chiropractic Science

at Logan College, where he teaches Activator Methods. He also is an independent contractor with Activator Methods, Inc. of Phoenix, Ariz. in the teaching of



Activator Methods to practicing doctors. Dr. Carpenter has an Advanced Proficiency rating in Activator Methods, the highest rating possible.

Dr. Carpenter graduated from Logan College in 1983, and has practiced in Ballwin, Mo. since 1984.

Vinod K. Anand. Ph.D. is a professor of Basic Science at

Logan College. He teaches microbiology, immunology, and public health, and serves as Chairperson of Logan's Basic Science Division. Dr. Anand



completed much of his education in his

native India. He received a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Delhi, a Master of Science degree from the Birla Institute of Technology in Pilani, and a Ph.D. from the University of Punjab in Chandigarh. He later pursued postgraduate work in microbiology and microbial genetics at New York University.

Dr. Anand has presented research papers at several national and international meetings. In 1984, he visited the Soviet Union as a delegate of the American Public Health Association, assigned to study the Soviet health care system and compare it with the American health care system.

David Freyman, J.D., is a partner in the St. Louis law firm

of Newman, Goldfarb, Freyman, and Stevens, P.C., which specializes in general business law, civil trial practice, estate planning, probate, and personal injury and



workers' compensation claims.

Freyman received his bachelor's degree and his law degree from the University of Missouri-Columbia. He is a member of the Real Property, Probate, and Trust Section of the American Bar Association.

Ralph Filson, D.C. is an associate professor of Chiropractic

Science at Logan College, where he teaches Diversified technique.

He is a member of the College's postgraduate faculty, and recently taught a



postgraduate seminar on specific segmental adjusting.

A 1969 Logan graduate, Dr. Filson practices in Creve Coeur, Mo. He is a Board member and past president of the Logan Alumni Association. He received the Outstanding Presidential Service Award from the Association in 1990.

Dr. Filson was the team physician for the 1980 St. Louis Olympic Weightlifting Trial, and he has extensive experience as a weightlifting coach.

Dr. Filson is working with Drs. Robert Diamond and Ralph Barrale of the Logan faculty, researching the Chiropractic Palpation Pad (see biography of Dr. Barrale).

Robert Diamond, D.C. is an associate professor of Chiroprac-

tic Science at Logan College, where he teaches Diversified technique. A 1971 Logan College graduate, Dr. Diamondhas pursued extensive postdoctoral



education in physical therapy, motion palpation, and extremity adjusting. He has practiced in St. Charles, Mo. since 1973, and also serves on Logan's postgraduate faculty.

Dr. Diamond is a faculty member of the Motion Palpation Institute of Huntington Beach, Cal., and has lectured on Medicare procedures for the ACA. He is one of three Logan faculty members conducting research on the Chiropractic Palpation Pad, described above in the biography of Dr. Ralph Barrale.

Arlan Fuhr, D.C. is president and co-founder of Activator

Methods, Inc., and president of the National Institute of Chiropractic Research, both of Phoenix, Ariz. A 1961 Logan graduate, Dr. Fuhr practiced in Minnesota until



1988, when he began practicing in Phoenix.

An instructor in Activator Methods at seminars throughout the U.S., Dr. Fuhr serves on the editorial boards of Chiropractic Technique and Back Letter for Chiropractors. He has coauthored many research studies on various aspects of chiropractic care. His studies have been published in the Journal of Manipulative and Physiological Therapeutics and in other publications.

Dr. Fuhr is a postgraduate faculty member of Logan College, and a former member of the Logan Board of Trustees. He currently serves on the Advisory Council to the Board. He also is a former Logan Alumni Association Board member.

Daniel Murphy, D.C., F.A.C.O. has practiced for 13 years in

Pleasanton, Cal. A Magna Cum Laude graduate of Western States Chiropractic College (1978), Dr. Murphy is a faculty member at Life Chiropractic College West.



He has extensive postgraduate teaching experience, lecturing on such topics as spinal trauma and athletic injuries for five chiropractic colleges, including Logan College. The International Chiropractors Association selected him

as "Postgraduate Educator of the Year" for 1987 and 1991.

Dr. Murphy is the author of a chapter: "Posture, Tissues, Neurology, and Health", in *Spinal Manipulation*, published by Chiropractic Biophysics, Inc. in 1989. He also writes a monthly column in the *Journal of Clinical Chiropractic*.

Roy Hillgartner, D.C. is an instructor of Chiropractic Science

at Logan College. He has taught a number of courses, including spinal anatomy (orthopedy); X-ray technique; office procedures, and Basic, Diversified, and



Thompson techniques. A 1969 Logan graduate, Dr. Hillgartner is the director of the Ballwin Chiropractic Centre, Ballwin, Mo. He also serves on Logan's postgraduate faculty.

Dr. Hillgartner formerly served on the Missouri State Board of Chiropractic Examiners, and received an award for outstanding service to the Board of Examiners. He is a member of the American Chiropractic Association Council on Roentgenology.

Alan Pressman, D.C. has practiced in New York City for 29

years. He has served as Chairperson of the New York Chiropractic College Department of Nutrition since 1978. A 1963 graduate of the Chiropractic Institute of New



York, Dr. Pressman has achieved Diplomate status with the Amer-

ican Chiropractic Board of Nutrition.

Dr. Pressman is a past president, vice president, and director of the American Chiropractic Association Council on Nutrition. The author of numerous journal articles, and Mediators of the Mind, he also co-authored Clinical Assessment of Nutritional Status and The Chiropractic Procedural Manual. The first two textbooks were published by Management Publishers, and the third by the Chiropractic Publishing Company.

Dr. Pressman serves on the New York Ballet Theatre Advisory Board, and has served as a guest instructor on health and nutrition for the Dance Division of the Juilliard School in New York City.

Robert B. Hardcastle is president of Delta Investment Ser-

vices, Inc. of Chesterfield, Mo. He hosts a financial program for WRTH Radio of St. Louis, and his "Money Talk" radio program also is nationally syndicated.



Hardcastle also is vice-president for sales of Universal Petroleum, Inc. of North Brook, Ill., and president of Professional Sports Insurers of Clayton, Mo. The latter company coordinates insurance investments for professional athletes.

Hardcastle received a bachelor's and a master's degree from Southern Illinois University-Carbondale. An All American baseball player in college, Hardcastle went on to play professionally with the Baltimore Orioles. He later became a leading salesman with the Fidelity Union Life Insurance Company of Dallas, Tex.

Norman Kettner, D.C., DACBR, is an associate professor of Clin-

ical Science and Chairperson of the Logan Radiology Department. He serves on the College's postgraduate faculty, and also is the current president of the American Chiro-



practic College of Radiology. A 1980 Logan graduate (Cum Laude), Dr. Kettner completed a residency in radiology in the Logan College Health Centers.

Dr. Kettner has authored numerous analytical articles, case studies, and case management guides, which have been published in such journals as D.C. Tracts, Applied Diagnostic Imaging, the ACA Journal of Chiropractic, and Chiropractic Sports Medicine.

He also served as Logan College's representative at the Conference for the Establishment of Guidelines for Chiropractic Quality Assurance and Standards of Practice, held in January in San Francisco, Cal.

James Lehman, D.C. practices in Albuquerque, N.M. Dr. Leh-

man graduated from Logan College in 1972, and was the recipient of the Hugh B. Logan Memorial Award for Academic and Clinical Excellence.



He serves on Logan's postgraduate faculty, and serves as a Board member of the Logan Alumni Association. He has volunteered his services to the College many times, as an Alumni Day speaker on practice management.

As the founder of The Lehman Company, a practice enhance-

ment consulting firm, Dr. Lehman lectures throughout the U.S. He is a past president of the New Mexico Chiropractic Association, and was selected as the Association's "Chiropractor of the Year" in 1978.

A participating healthcare provider since 1982 in the Lovelace Health Plan, Dr. Lehman became the chairman of the New Mexico HMO's new chiropractic services department in 1991.

Alumna Inducted into North Carolina Republican Hall of Fame

Dr. Faye Eagles '53 of Rocky Mount, N.C. was inducted into the North Carolina Republican Hall of Fame on November 16, 1991. Her induction took place during a GOP awards dinner held in the state's Research Triangle Clinical Park, located in the Raleigh-Durham area.

North Carolina Lt. Gov. Jim Gardner presented Dr. Eagles with the induction award, and gave a detailed account of her efforts on behalf of the Republican Party. He credited Dr. Eagles with helping the Party become a competitive force in North Carolina politics.

Dr. Eagles has been a well-known Republican Party loyalist in North Carolina since the late '50's, and has worked in all of the state's GOP campaigns since 1964. She has been a Republican National Convention delegate, and has been Republican Chairperson for the 2nd Congressional District in North Carolina since 1985.

A firm advocate of political activity to benefit her profession, Dr. Eagles has secured several health-related governmental appointments.

She became a delegate to the White House Conference on Aging in 1971, appointed by President Nixon. In 1973, she was appointed by Governor Jim Holshouser to a three-year term on the North Carolina Commission for Health Services, and to a two-year term on an ad hoc committee to study midwifery in the state. No chiropractor before or since that time has served on the state's Commission for Health Services.

Governor Jim Martin appointed Dr. Eagles to North Carolina's Task Force on Domestic Violence in 1985. The following year, she was appointed to the first of two three-year terms on the North Carolina Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

In 1991, Lt. Gov. Gardner appointed Dr. Eagles to an ad hoc committee to study the feasibility of a chiropractic college within North Carolina's state university system.

Dr. Eagles was the first woman to be president of the North Carolina Chiropractic Association, and the first woman to become the American Chiropractic Association "Chiropractor of the Year" (in 1979).

"Since then, my career has been chiropractic and politics, politics and chiropractic," she says. "I wouldn't have it any other way!"

Marge Cune Retires



Marge Cune, Logan College's Director of Personnel and a member of the College staff since 1974, retired at the end of February. She

had headed the College's personnel department since it was first established as a separate department, handling the interviewing, selection, and hiring of all non-academic staff. She also supervised all College employee records and administered retirement plans, group health insurance, etc.

"I'll miss the people at Logan very much," commented Cune. "I like people, and the interaction with many people that my job provided gave me great pleasure."

Cune plans to travel extensively with her husband, who retired five years ago after working for 33 years as an engineer at McDonnell Douglas Corporation. The Cunes plan to begin their travels with an Alaskan tour and land cruise in June.

A former Board member and secretary of the Logan Alumni Association, Dr. Eagles received the Association's highest award, the Heritage Award in 1987.

Dr. Eagles' political interest extends back to her student days at Logan. In 1952, she attended a rally for then-presidential candidate Dwight Eisenhower at Kiel Auditorium in St. Louis. For the first few years after graduating from Logan, she focused on establishing her practice in Rocky Mount, and then plunged into politics. "Since then, my career has been chiropractic and politics, politics and chiropractic," she says. "I wouldn't have it any other way!"

Trustees, Alumni Board Members Focus on Mutual Interests

A joint brainstorming session of the Board of Trustees and the Logan Alumni Association Board of Directors was held in conjunction with the February 15 Board meetings. Ideas and issues of concern to both Boards were addressed during small group discussions. Each group included members of both Boards. Among the issues considered by the group members were the following:

• The need to establish a written institutional policy on the recruitment of minority students. The College has recently expanded its outreach to prospective minority students by networking with minority educational organizations and by making recruitment presentations at historically black colleges and universities. The group which reviewed this issue recommended that the institutional policy on minority recruitment be included in the College's fiveyear plan.

• The possibility of establishing a fitness and rehabilitation center on campus that would be open to the public, as well as to Logan students, faculty, staff, and alumni. Dr. John Danchik of the Board of Trustees agreed to conduct an initial investigation into the financial feasibility of such a facility.

The Board of Trustees conducted its regular business activities after the joint brainstorming session. In addition to holding reelections, the Board reviewed College divisional and investment reports, and made plans to reconvene on June 10, 1992.

Six College Trustees Re-Elected

Gerald Kari, D.C., of Forest Lake. Minn., Gretchen Schreffler, D.C., of Iowa City, Ia., Missouri State Senator Thomas McCarthy, III of Chesterfield, and Robert Stearley of St. Louis have been re-elected to threeyear terms on the Logan College Board of Trustees. Larry Steele, D.C., of Bloomington, Ind. was re-elected to a one-year term as the Alumni Representative to the Board, and Howard Chapel, D.C. of Chesterfield was re-elected to a one-year term as the Logan faculty's representative to the Board. The elections took place during the Board's February 15 meeting, under the leadership of Ronald Harris, D.C., F.I.C.C., Chairperson of the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Kari has served on the Board since 1989. He previously served on the Board from 1973 to 1974, and from 1981 to 1987. During the February Board meeting, Dr. Kari also was elected to a second one-year term as Vice Chairperson of the Board.

Dr. Schreffler has served on the Board since 1989, and also was a Trustee from 1978 to 1987. Senator McCarthy has served on the Logan Board of Trustees since 1988. Mr. Stearley, who has served on the Board since 1989, retired in 1988 as Vice President/General Manager of the Consumer Packaging Division of Jefferson Smurfit Corporation of St. Louis.

Dr. Steele has been the Alumni Representative to the Board since 1989. Dr. Chapel, a 1984 Logan graduate, became the Logan faculty representative to the Board in 1991. The Logan faculty traditionally has selected a Logan graduate from the field as its representative to the Board of Trustees.

In addition to conducting elections, the Trustees joined the Logan Alumni Association Board, which also met on February 15, for a joint session. Members of the two Boards discussed possible ways of combining their efforts on various projects to benefit the College.



Dr. Eaton Joins Faculty

Faculty Workshop Features Instructional Specialists

The trimester had an informative beginning in January for full-time Logan faculty members, who attended instructional workshops the day before classes began. The workshops were conducted by John Littlefield, Ph.D. and John Kleffner, Ed.D., both of the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio.

Dr. Littlefield is Director of Instructional Development at the Center, where he helps 850 full-time faculty members improve methods of teaching and student evaluation. Dr. Kleffner is an instructional development specialist who directs a semester-long teaching skills course at the Center, and coordinates the Center's workshops.

Faculty members of the Logan Health Centers attended Dr. Littlefield's workshop, "Evaluating Performance in Clinical Settings." The workshop focused on methods of overcoming clinical performance evaluation problems, and strengthening the quality of clinical performance evaluations. The classroom faculty attended Dr. Kleffner's seminar, "Effective Teaching and Learning." This program focused on applying learning principles to classroom instruction, and on the characteristics of successful teachers.

Dr. William Ramsey, Vice President for Academic Affairs, said that although faculty workshops are held

at the beginning of each trimester, recent workshops have focused on the College's curriculum change process. "Drs. Kleffner and Little-field were the first outside speakers to conduct faculty workshops here in a year. They were very well-received, and we hope to bring them back in the future."

Dr. Ramsey added, "I attended Dr. Kleffner's presentation. He focused on how people really learn in the classroom, and what makes learning possible. Rather than simply reviewing dry theories, he discussed real classroom situations, and provided practical information on how to be an effective facilitator of learning."

Dr. John Kiernan, Director of the College's Dellwood Health Center, felt that Dr. Littlefield's presentation also had strong practical applications. "The program really helped strengthen my insight into the evaluation of clinical performance. Dr. Littlefield stressed quick identification of interns who may need assistance in certain areas. He also emphasized the importance of using as much objective, quantifiable data as possible in evaluating clinical performance. He explained the rating system used in evaluations at the Texas Health Science Center, His information was useful as we updated and expanded our own clinical evaluation form, after Dr. Littlefield's presentation.'

College Leaders Attend CCE Meeting


Logan's three top administrators traveled to Phoenix at the end of January to attend the annual meeting of the Council on Chiropractic Education. 

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College Efforts Provide Holiday Gifts for Homeless

Logan students, faculty, and staff were involved again this year in a holiday season fund-raising drive to provide Christmas gifts of warm clothing to the homeless in St. Louis. Local businesses and students at nearby Parkway West High School in St. Louis County also contributed to this year's effort, which provided gifts for more than 200 people. Each gift box contained a flannel shirt, Tshirt, hat, pair of gloves, and two pairs of socks. The drive was once again coordinated by Dr. Kathleen Naughton, Assistant Director of Clinical Services, with the assistance of Doug Stirrat, Director of Institutional Development, and Health Center secretary Elaine Kumm.

The gifts were distributed on Christmas Day at the Harbor Light Center of the Salvation Army in downtown St. Louis. Logan Health Center faculty and interns staff the Harbor Light Health Center, where free health care is provided to the homeless.

This year's fund-raising events included a bowl-a-thon, a faculty/staff bake sale, and raffles featuring free typing services by the Health

Center secretaries and items from the Logan Bookstore. The bowl-athon was coordinated by members of the Logan College chapter of Chi Rho Sigma. Chi Rho Sigma President Scott Scudder, then Trimester 8, chaired the event, which attracted about 45 participants.

The Health Centers also provide health care to the homeless at the Shamrock Center in downtown St. Louis. The Center is affiliated with Catholic Charities of St. Louis. College Switchboard Operator Betty Maness coordinated a holiday toy and clothing drive for the Shamrock Center. The drive generated three truckloads of toys and clothing, which were taken to the Center before Christmas for distribution to homeless women and children.

So many items were donated that a fourth truckload was taken to the Salvation Army after Christmas.

"Many of the toys were absolutely beautiful," said Maness. Additionally, she coordinates an ongoing clothing drive for the New Life Evangelistic Center, which also helps the homeless in St. Louis.

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
1993 WCCS Conference to be Held at Logan

Karen Wilkinson

Javelin thrower Karen Wilkinson, Trimester 2, is an Olympic hopeful. Her goal is to compete in the '96 Olympics, after competing in the '93 World Student Games, and the '94 Commonwealth Games. She is from Victoria, British Columbia. Now 20 years old, she has focused her athletic talent on the javelin throw for six years, competing throughout Canada and the U.S.

After attending the University of Texas at San Antonio for one year, Wilkinson placed first in her sport in the 1990 Canadian Junior Championships. She transferred to Central Michigan University, and qualified for the 1991 National Collegiate Athletic Association Championships, held in Eugene, Ore. In the qualifying rounds, she threw a personal best of 52.58 m. During the final competition, she placed eighth in the U.S., earning All-American and Academic All-American honors.

Wilkinson now is the fourth-ranked woman in her sport (at the senior competition level) in Canada, and first in British Columbia. Recently released Commonwealth Games rankings listed Wilkinson as 19th in senior javelin rankings in the British Commonwealth countries. Her achievements were reported in the December issue of the *ICA Review*, in a feature entitled "Future DC's Going for the Gold and Spreading the Chiropractic Message Along the Way."



Luke MacKinnon

Luke MacKinnon, Trimester 4, graduated from the University of Windsor, Ontario in 1990, with a degree in human kinetics. A member of the University's track and field team, he was ranked during his senior season as one of Canada's top ten collegiate runners in the 1500-meter event. He raced throughout the U.S. and Canada, Barbados, and Cuba.

A native of Orangeville, Ont., MacKinnon became interested in chiropractic as a result of his athletic activity. "I ran more than 80 miles per week while training in college," he says. "With the amount of stress I put on my body each week, I found chiropractic care very beneficial. As a result, my coach at the university became interested in bringing in a chiropractor to work with the team during training."

MacKinnon continues to compete in occasional 10-K runs. "I've had to avoid the intensive training schedule I followed in the past, because of the time demands of chiropractic school," he says. "I am trying to keep my racing edge, however, and may return to more serious competition after I graduate."



Paul Dorosheff

Paul Dorosheff, Trimester 5, is pictured completing the 110-mile El Tour de Tucson perimeter ride, November 17, 1990. He participated in the same event in November 1991. During the past fifteen

months, Dorosheff has completed a total of eight triathlons, four biathlons, and numerous 10-K runs and cycling criterions. He set a course record for his age group (45-49) on Sept. 15, 1991, at the Reach for the Beach Triathlon at Missouri's Lake of the Ozarks. Dorosheff has a master's degree in cell biology, and worked as a researcher at the University of Arizona Medical School in Tucson before he enrolled at Logan.

Brian Ashton

E. Brian Ashton, Trimester 5, is a 2nd degree black belt in Tae Kwon-Do. Now a martial arts instructor, Ashton is a former East Coast Conference Grand Champion in Tae Kwon-Do. He is a native of Washington, D.C., where he was employed as a physical therapist prior to enrolling at Logan. He says, "As a physical therapist and a chiropractic student, I have an understanding of the biomechanics of Tae Kwon-Do, which many martial arts instructors lack. This knowledge is very



useful in helping my students develop strong fighting techniques."

Ashton also is challenging himself athletically in a new way: he is training to participate in his first body-building competition this spring.



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



Sports Clubs to Play in First "Chiropractic Games" at Logan

The College's volleyball, hockey, and soccer clubs are continuing their strong performances of last year. Logan athletes also are looking forward to competing in the first "Chiropractic Games" for chiropractic colleges, scheduled for October 8-10 of this year at Logan.

The Logan College chapter of Delta Sigma Chi is sponsoring the Chiropractic Games. The event will include competition in soccer, basketball, volleyball, hockey, and golf. The coordinators of the event are Karm Virk, Trimester 7, and Rick Smolen, Trimester 8.

Virk says that there are twelve other chiropractic college chapters of Delta Sigma Chi. Members of the Logan chapter anticipate that the Chiropractic Games will become an annual event, moving from college to college under the fraternity's sponsorship.

Last year, the Volleyball Club sponsored chiropractic college tournaments on campus on Memorial Day and in September. The Memorial Day tournament will be held this year. However, team captain Karm Virk says the Club may forgo the September tournament due to participating in the Chiropractic Games.

The Volleyball Club is playing weekly games in a league in North St. Louis County, although Club members are hoping to switch to a

new league of local college teams. Virk expects the team to place first in its present league. "We're ready for a stronger level of competition, which is one reason we hope to join the collegiate league," he says. "Also, of course, competing against other colleges is fun."

Eight men play in the North County league games. A coed team, which competes in chiropractic college tournaments visited Toronto in February to play in a tournament sponsored by Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College. "We performed well in Toronto, but we played the strongest team in the first round of the finals, and lost," says Virk.

The Logan Hockey Club is continuing to build a solid track record, and is helping to build awareness of Logan among students at undergraduate colleges and universities. As we went to press, the Club was halfway through its season, with a 4-4-1 record. Captain Don Bernard, Trimester 5, said: "We've been playing well lately. The level of competition is close, but we feel we have a chance of winning our league title. Our biggest challenges this year have been raising funds to pay for practice time at the ice rink, and replacing players who graduated. Unlike most of our competitors, we have been playing with two lines, rather than three.'

The Club's league includes teams from the University of Missouri's St. Louis and Columbia campuses, Washington University in St. Louis, and St. Louis Community College-Meramec. The Club had planned to play in a National College of Chiropractic hockey tournament last fall, which was cancelled.

The Soccer Club has been playing every trimester, against recreational and local collegiate teams, in a league in the St. Louis suburb of Brentwood. Team captain Brian Gualano, Trimester 8, says that the Club is ranked in about the middle of its league. "We're holding our own now, and we're looking forward to the stability we'll have during the next few months." The Club has four Trimester 8 students, and seven players in lower trimesters.

The Logan Club placed first in a Palmer College soccer tournament held last year.

Many Logan students also compete in intramural sports, such as basketball and volleyball. Intramurals are coordinated by Vickie Goldapske, Trimester 8, who also coordinates each trimester's Field Day. The Fall '91 Field Day attracted nearly 400 participants. The activities included touch football, volleyball, basketball shooting, and a three-mile campus walk.
