

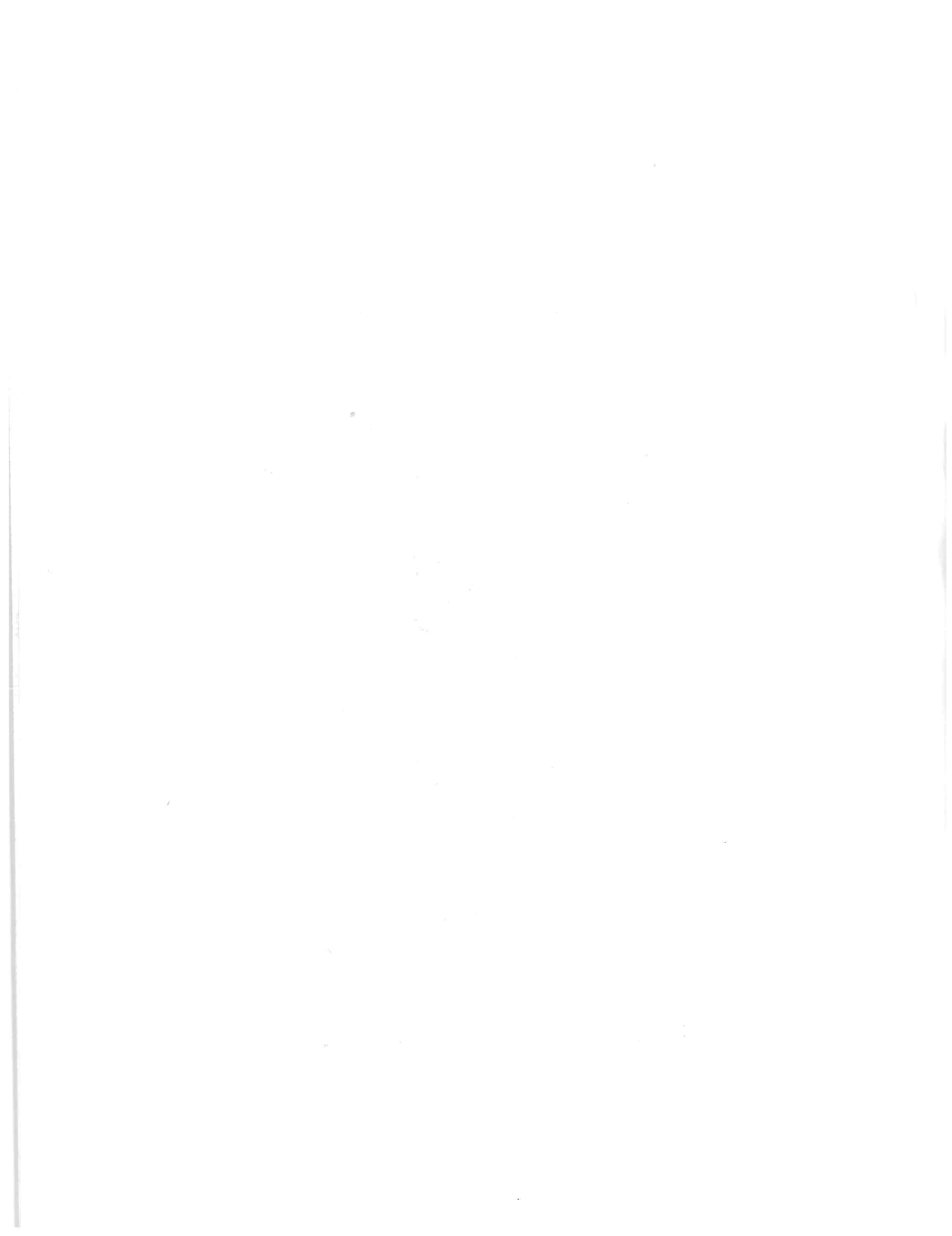

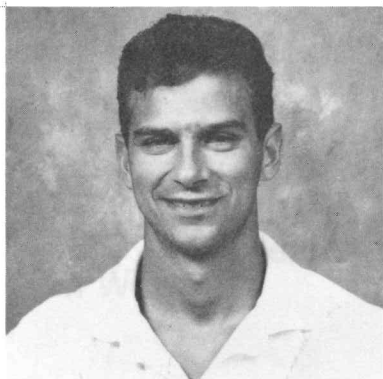
The Logo:



The logo is composed of three central aspects which serve to tie the competitive spirit and chiropractic philosophy together as a driving force for the promotion of our profession. These three things are a Torch, a Raphael (the symbol of the chiropractic profession) and an Atlas-Dens complex.

Most centrally located is the Torch. The Torch is a source of natural light that acts as a guide for participants to endure competition in the face of adversity. Chiropractically the Torch symbolizes our natural way of healing and acts as a guide to continue this approach in the maintenance of health. The Atlas-Dens complex is seen around the periphery and represents unity and cooperation. This unity and cooperation are the pillars upon which chiropractic is built and serve to cultivate a professional sentiment among schools, students, and chiropractors which makes for a united profession. Finally the Raphael which is the symbol of the chiropractic profession is located amidst the flames. Its head is depicted in the dens, the base is made up of the Torch, and the wings serve to bind the structure as one. 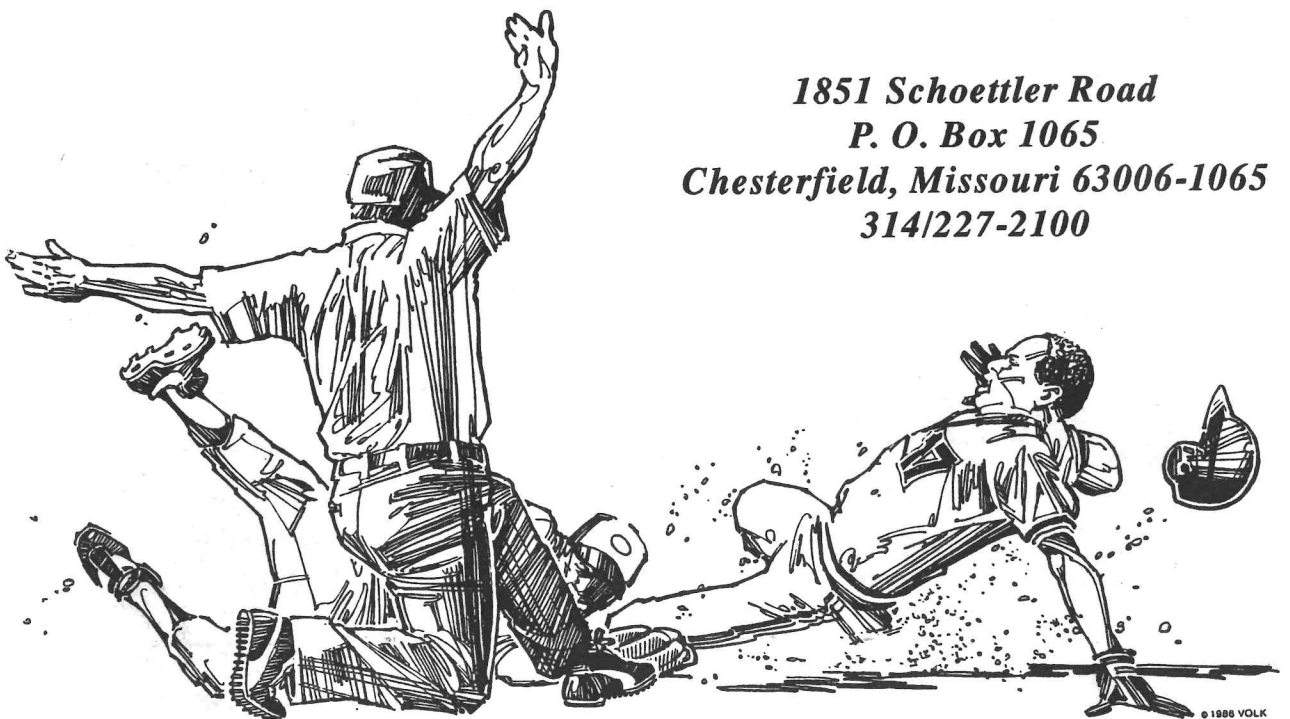

Logan College of Chiropractic

Chesterfield, Missouri

Logan College of Chiropractic enrolled its first class September 1, 1935. Founded by Dr. Hugh B. Logan, the college was to provide the profession with a self-supporting, nonprofit institution offering a four year chiropractic educational program. Today, this academic program has been developed into five academic years with a minimum prerequisite of two years in an accredited college or university.

The 103 acre park-like campus contains well equipped, newly renovated classrooms, a computerized learning resources center, a spacious health center where student interns treat outpatients, and administrative offices. An adjacent 33,000 square foot building houses the Science, Research and Ergonomics Center. In addition to the on-campus health center, Logan College also operates three satellite clinics in the metro St. Louis area providing student interns with a wealth of diagnostic and treatment experiences.

As the 1991/92 academic year began, Logan College had 670 students enrolled representing 42 states and four foreign countries.

Logan College seeks to give each student an expert knowledge of body mechanics. The Logan System of Body Mechanics is emphasized and it provides a basis for coordinating various adjusting procedures. In addition to basic science, chiropractic science, and clinical science courses, the curriculum includes courses in research methodology culminating in a research project.

Now, more than 50 years after its inception, Logan College of Chiropractic continues to offer excellence in chiropractic education and to produce graduates known for their clinical skills.

Logan College offers the degrees of Bachelor of Science in Human Biology and Doctor of Chiropractic.

Logan College initially received specialized accreditation by the Council on Chiropractic Education in 1978 and most recently received renewal in 1991. Logan is also accredited by the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

Logan College is located at 1851 Schoettler Road, P.O. Box 1065, Chesterfield, Missouri 63006-1065.

Life College

Life College, founded in 1974 by its president, Dr. Sid E. Williams, is the world's largest chiropractic school. Life's students within its chiropractic program come from all 50 states and 23 other countries. Total enrollment at the college is 2220 (as of the fall quarter, 1991). The college employs over 140 faculty. The economic impact of the college on the surrounding community is approximately 90 million dollars per year.

Life College is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of the Council on Chiropractic Education and by the Commission on Colleges and Schools of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

In its Doctor of Chiropractic (D.C.) and Bachelor of Science in Nutrition for the chiropractic sciences degrees and chiropractic technician (C.T.) program, Life stresses academic excellence and the founding tenets of chiropractic.

Spinal adjusting is the primary emphasis in the curriculum of the School of Chiropractic. Students learn eight of the most important adjusting techniques and practice them through seven quarters of clinical experience in Life's public clinics on the Marietta campus and in downtown Atlanta.

The college's academic programs have recently been expanded to include a complete four year undergraduate curriculum including a prechiropractic

program within the School of Undergraduate Studies. The prechiropractic program includes all required biology, physics and organic and inorganic chemistry courses. Life College also offers a Bachelor of Business Administration degree (B.B.A.). Life is designing several other concentrations for its bachelor's degree program in addition to the Nutrition and Business majors. These include such areas as child care, environmental science and international studies.

A Masters of Science in Sports Health Science degree (M.S. SHS) as a post doctoral specialist degree for chiropractors is offered. There are plans to offer other postgraduate degrees for chiropractors who wish to specialize in areas such as diagnostic imaging, neurology and orthopedics.

Life has recently completed a \$16 million building program which has reshaped the 85 acre heavily wooded campus located north of Atlanta. Included in this expansion project was a massive renovation project to include a new Science and Technique Center and the Nell K. Williams Learning Resource Center. A 38,500 square-foot activities/athletics building and a 450 foot-long sky bridge has also recently been completed.

Student enrollment currently stands at 1,752 with students coming to the college from all 50 states and 20 foreign countries.

Donald P. Kern, D.C., a 1958 Palmer graduate, has served as President of Palmer College of Chiropractic since 1988.

Palmer College of Chiropractic is part of the Palmer Chiropractic University system which also includes Palmer College of Chiropractic West, Sunnyvale, California. The university, established in 1991, is headed by Chancellor Michael Crawford. The Palmer Chiropractic University Board of Trustees is currently chaired by Vickie Palmer, the fourth generation of the Palmer family to lead the college.

Parker College of Chiropractic

Even though Parker College of Chiropractic is the nation's newest chiropractic college, founded September, 1982, it is already about the third largest chiropractic institution in the world in enrollment with over 800 students and 200 administrators, faculty and staff.

The college is accredited with both the Commission on Accreditation of the Council on Chiropractic Education and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, which are the U.S. Department of Education's specialized and regional accreditation bodies, respectively. Parker College was also granted authority by the Texas College and University System to offer the B.S. degree in anatomy concurrent with the Doctorate for qualified candidates.

Parker College consists of three campuses: ALPHA, BETA and OMEGA. The original ALPHA campus still houses one of two public clinics, the Assembly Hall for all-school assemblies, Student-Doctor Lounge, and the Research and Rehabilitation Department. The OMEGA campus is a 64-acre site adjacent to Loop 12 freeway circling Dallas, where the University of Parker is being considered for the next century. But the main campus today, BETA (Best Educational Thrust Anywhere), where all classes are conducted, is beautiful and well equipped. Inside its six city blocks are four spacious, new, contemporary buildings with reflective mirrored windows, majestically surrounded by elegant landscaping, hundreds of mature trees, and over two dozen lush waterfalls and fountains. Enclosed within a decorative iron fence, the campus pays particular attention to safety, providing special lighting and 24-hour security.

The outstanding facilities on campus include state-of-the-art immersion tanks for dissection labs; spacious amphitheater classrooms that overlook the verdant campus; a beautifully appointed library with full audiovisual capabilities; new, modern equipment for chiropractic technique labs; a newly expanded student clinic; and a convenient cafeteria that opens onto a relaxing inner courtyard with gushing waterfalls. Of

special interest to prospective students is the abundance of patients for interns available throughout the four million people in the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex. Additional plans are underway for completion of a regulation gymnasium on campus that converts to a full capacity auditorium.

The college now has over 500 graduates, and has students, applicants and alumni in every state, throughout Canada and 22 countries overseas. Since the college grew during 1989, 1990 and 1991 by 32 per cent, 35 per cent and 38 per cent respectively, the Board of Trustees has now limited its growth based on its present available space to 20 per cent for 1992, 15 per cent for 1993 and 10 per cent for 1994. This is to make certain that the quality of education remains high.

Parker College is fortunate to have as its administrators and faculty, graduates of 11 different accredited chiropractic colleges, thus preventing "inbreeding" of its own graduates in its educational programs, and simultaneously providing a wide range of talents, expertise and teaching experience with a diversified technique and chiropractic science curriculum.

The college was founded and is named after a well respected leader, education, speaker and visionary in the profession, Dr. James W. Parker, who takes an active role as president. Parker College students have the added advantage of exposure to his four decades of teaching the principles of education, life and success in practice.

Located in the internationally famous Metroplex of Dallas/Fort Worth, the campus is convenient to all main thoroughfares of the city, near the most desirable suburban living and shopping areas, and easily accessible to any city in the world, thus attracting a multi-cultural student body.

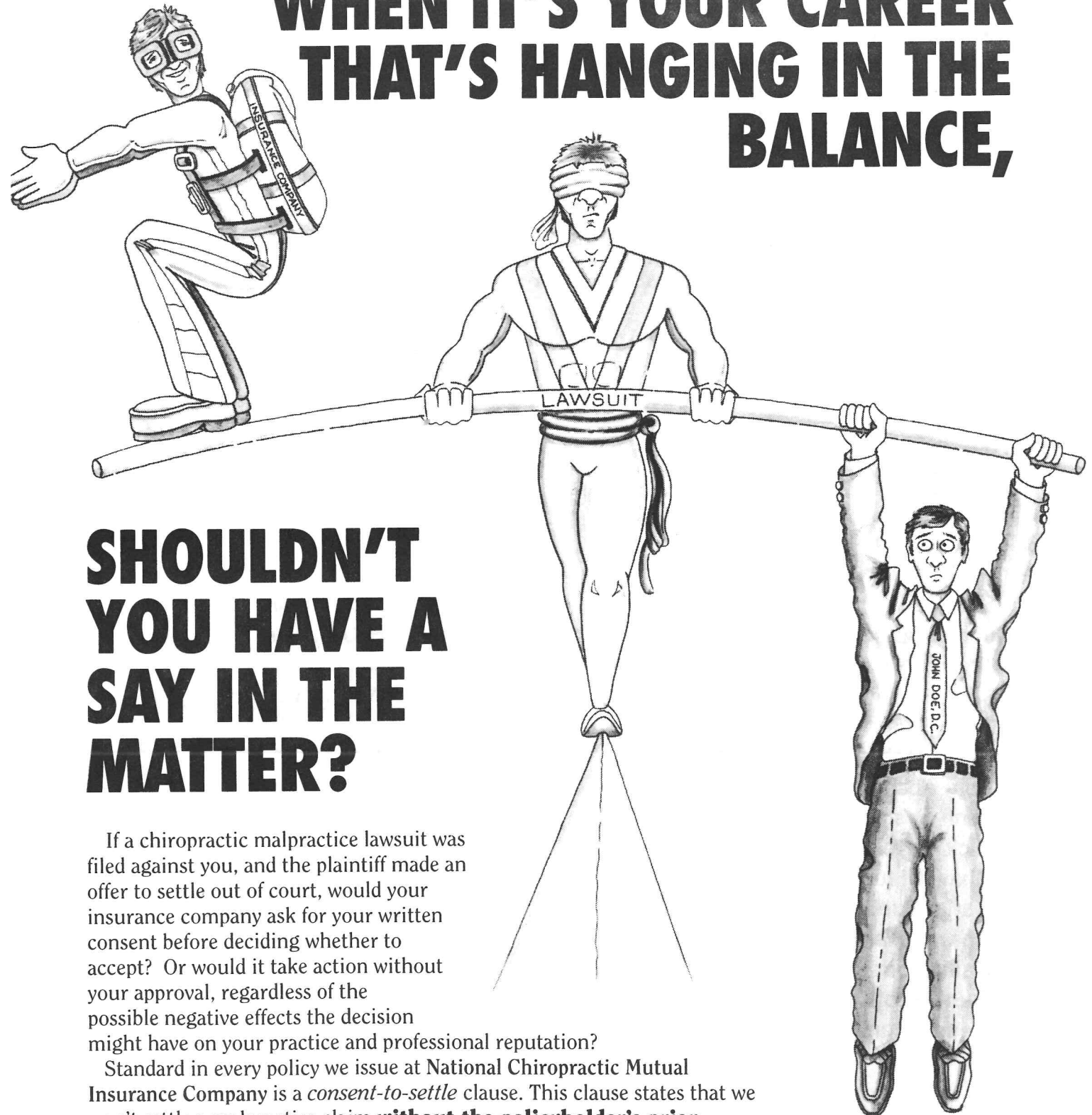

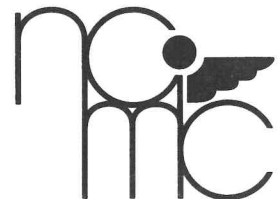

Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College

Toronto, Ontario, Canada

The Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College is Canada's only chiropractic educational institution. It was on September 18, 1945, the 50th anniversary of Canadian-born founder of chiropractic Daniel D. Palmer's first chiropractic adjustment, that Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College opened its doors to its first class of students. The term Memorial was incorporated into the name as a tribute to Daniel D. Palmer. Chartered as a nonprofit organization under the Companies Act of the Province of Ontario, Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College is owned by the profession.

Situated at 1900 Bayview Avenue, near the heart of downtown Toronto, Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College has an enrollment of approximately 600 students with faculty and staff totalling 200. The C.C. Clemmer Health Sciences Library is an integral division of the college with 400 current journal titles, 13,000 books, 5,500 bound periodicals, and over 6,000 multimedia items in the health sciences with special emphasis in the areas of chiropractic, orthopaedics, nutrition, neurology, sports

injuries, anatomy and radiology. It is also linked by three database systems to more than 300 databases in the art, health and social sciences.

The library also houses the Chiropractic Research Abstract Collection, an extensive collection of authoritative published work on chiropractic.

Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College operates three teaching clinics (one on campus and two off campus) which provides essential health care to over 400 patients per day.

Although Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College's research facilities are modest, they are supplemented by the use of outside facilities in collaborative research. At present, this research is pursued at the universities of Toronto, Calgary, Waterloo, Saskatchewan, British Columbia and associated teaching hospitals.

Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College is located at 2900 Bayview Avenue, Toronto, Ontario M4G 3E6, Canada.

The National College of Chiropractic, located in suburban Lombard, Illinois, is dedicated to providing quality chiropractic education, patient service and relevant research. A five academic-year, not-for-profit, professional college with an enrollment of approximately 785, the National College of Chiropractic is approved as a degree-granting institution for both the doctor of chiropractic and bachelor of science degrees. In addition to the preparation of doctors for the general practice of chiropractic, the college functions as an upper division postsecondary institution offering residencies and continuing education programs, and houses a research division for investigations and studies in the biological and clinical sciences.

The institution was founded in 1906 in Davenport, Iowa, as the National School of Chiropractic. In 1908, the school was moved to Chicago, where it was chartered and incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois. In 1920, the name was legally changed to the National College of Chiropractic and it settled in a five-story stone and brick building at 20 North Ashland, its home for the next 43 years.

Today, the National College of Chiropractic is situated on a 30-acre site, 25 miles west of Chicago. Since 1963, when the college moved to the Lombard campus, eight buildings have been constructed, including four

dormitories, a student center and auditorium, and the 56,000 square-foot patient facility, the National College Chiropractic Center. The college, in addition to the National College Chiropractic Center, operates four other clinics: the on-campus Student Clinic, the National College Chiropractic Clinic - Chicago, and two clinics in cooperation with the Salvation Army - Chicago. A sixth clinic is scheduled to open in 1992 in the city of Aurora, Illinois. Students are required to serve an internship during their last phase of study at National, and these multiple clinics provide a unique opportunity for practice experience in a variety of settings.

The National College of Chiropractic believes that its purpose is best achieved through competent instruction, sound scholarship, comprehensive clinical experience and related activities designed to prepare individuals for the civic, social, cultural and political aspects of community life and leadership.

The National College of Chiropractic is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of the Council on Chiropractic Education; by registration by the State Education Department of the State of New York; and by the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

National College is located at 200 E. Roosevelt Road, Lombard, Illinois 60148.

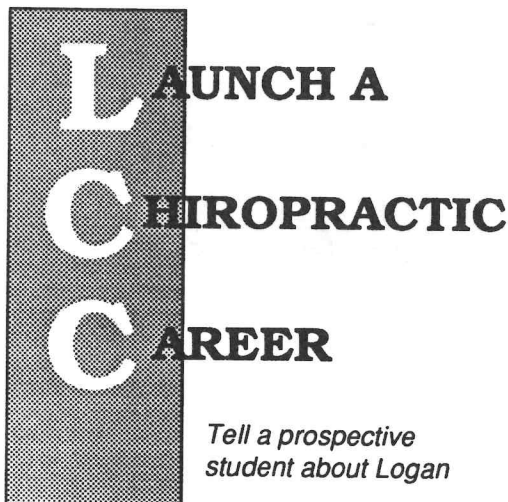

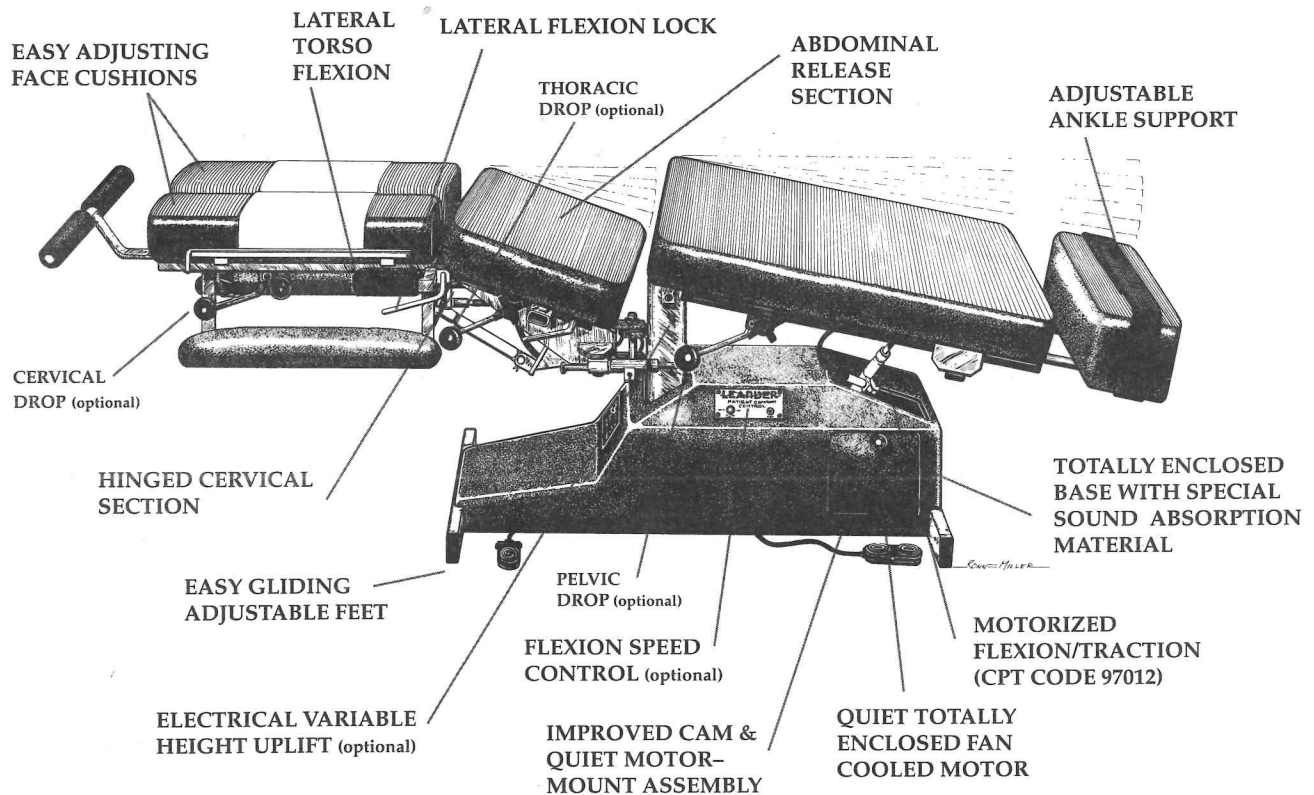
