COURSE REQUIREMENTS

1. Journal

The journal is NOT a notebook. In it you will record your personal reactions to each of the speakers or programs. I won't read your journals, but I will collect them and check to see that there is an entry for each presentation.

FORMAT: Each journal page will be on typing-size paper, on blanks supplied by me. Journal is to be kept in a manilla folder so that individual pages can be worked on separately. Each speaker will be given a separate page.

2. Data Book

The data book is a small pocket-size, or pocketbook size, notebook that you can carry with you easily (and all the time). You are expected to jot down facts you feel are important and that you might want to use in conversation. Every fact must be identified as to source in your book. If it's from a text, name the text with the page number. If it's from a TV news report, record the program, the date, the network, etc. There is so much inaccurate 'data' that circulates, we must be prepared to identify the source of all of our information.

The data book is <u>personal</u>. Don't record facts just to create bulk. Use it only for facts significant to you. B250 Calendar page 5
