





Mayor Grauert suggested that the clause in the contract between the Capone Construction Company and the township for the construction of a relief sewer, on page 5, Article 20 be enforced, relative payments and obligations by the contractor for said work, that all bills for material and etc., have been paid. And recommended that the clerk acknowledge receipt of their request and communicate that the same will be enforced. Recommendation was endorsed.

Mr. Schuster asked through the chair if the Collector of Taxes Mr. John Callery, had been notified to be present at the meeting of the township committee this evening. Having been informed that said notice had been served. Mr. Schuster reported the detailed report for the month of Dec. had not been filed by the collector of taxes and that some action should be taken by the township committee to compel the collector to appear when notified.

Matter was discussed as to what power or legal right, or authority the township committee had over the collector of taxes.

Mr. Walscheld, Township Attorney, informed the committee that it had not any supervisory powers over the collector, as his duties were prescribed by statute, but in the event of his failing to perform his duty the committee could be rectified by appealing to the bonding company or bondsmen. The matter was then referred to the finance and audit committee and the Township Attorney.

Mayor Grauert for the Committee of the Whole recommended that 40 badges for each fire company of a different design as of those now in use, to be numbered from 1 to 180, and that the clerk be furnished with the list of the

active firemen who have received or was issued one, and that the clerk keep a record as certified by the different foremen of the fire companies of those receiving a badge; badge to be returned and turned over to the township when a member of any company ceaces to act as an active member or resign as such from any fire company, and recommended that such action be adopted.

On motion of Mr. Schuster the report was received and action endorsed. Mr. Gallagher voting may, on the grounds that at least 30% of the men attending the fires were active waiting list men or associate members, who were wakking unable to join the different fire companies because they had their full quota.

On motion the Township Attorney was directed to get in touch with the State Comptroller at Trenton relative to getting for the Township the Railroad Taxes due and also see if interest could not be collected on the same.

Mr. Schuster called attention by the committee to an old sign on the east side of Park avenue in a dangerous and bad condition and that same ought to be removed. Mr. Vincent stated that same would be taken down or removed within a few days.

Relative request from the Fereration of Improvement Associations of the City of Newark, to attend a conference for the purpose contesting the direct tax imposed by the Edge Road Laws. Committee will not join.

Relative request from the State Board of Taxes and Assessments as to what progress has been made in the preparation of a new set of tax maps. Matter was referred to the Kayor to take same up with the State Board, as per his request.

Mr. Schuster asked what progress was being made as to list filing the report and assessment, of the Commissioners on the Liberty Place improvement, as he believed it was about time same was filed.

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

Your Committee of the Whole to whom was referred the communication from the representative of the law firm of Edwards & Smith addressed to J.Emil Walscheid, Township Attorney in relation to services rendered in the suit for the recovery of taxes from the Pennsylvania Railroad System which had been omitted from assessment and the resolution agreeing to compensation for services rendered in said suit by said firm; having considered the matter do report and recommend;

That the letter addressed to Township Attorney Walscheid be apread in full on the minutes of the board, that said resolution fixing compensation at twenty-five per cent of the amount due the township presented to this committee by said law firm in connection with said letter be adopted by this board, and that said resolution also be apread in full upon the minutes of this board.

On motion the report of the committee of the whole was received and its recommendations adopted.

The following was then ordered spread in full upon the minutes of this board:

My dear Sir:

Relative to the interviews we have had regarding the case of Permaylvania Turnel and Terminal Railroad Co.y State Board of Assessors, et als., I beg to place my ideas in writing. As you know the Railroad Company failed to make return to the State Board of Assessors of its main stem property running zizzz through the municipalities of Weshawken, west Hoboken, etc. for the years 1906, 1907, 1908 and 1909, and thereby escaped proper taxation. In 1910 this fact came to the attention of the County Board of Taxation and a meeting between the Board and representatives of the municipalities; at this meeting this firm (Mr. Edwards appearing) was engaged as Counsel. Application was made to the County Board to tax the properties; they did so and the railroad company appealed to the State Board of Equalization which set aside the tax upon the ground that the property being "Hain Sten" was assessable only by the State Board of Assessors. Insemuch as by the Twelfth Section of the Railroad Tax Act all HEBBERS complaints as to omitted property were required to be made by the third Monday of November in each year, and such time had passed, the situation appeared hopeless. Mr. Edwards, however, drew an act which, although fought bitterly by the Company, became a law. Application was then made by the County Board under this Act (which is known as Chapter 269 of the Laws of 1911) to the State Borad of Assessors and that Board levied a tax; the Railroad Company appealed: The Beard sustained the tax.

The Railroad Company then obtained a writ of certiorari removing the assessment and tax to the Supreme Court for review and Justice Swayze set aside the tax. We, then, on the part of the municipalities, appealed to the Court of Errors and Appeals, which reversed the Supreme Court and affirmed the ter The terms. the tax. The Railroad Company then obtained a writ of error from the United States Supreme Court. The case id there perdiag.

pending. I have retained John R. Hardin, of Rewark, to act with me before the United States Supreme Court.

Our office has carried the matter along during all the proceedings, making all the experts proceedings, paying all expenses, save the fees of the experts. The matter as you will observe has been in the Courts since 1910. The act provides that "the taxes so paid x x shall be used first for the payment of the expenses incurred in proceedings taken to subject out of the expenses incurred. used first for the payment of the expenses incurred in proceedings taken to subject said property to taxation, etc. etc. We now feel that the matter of fixing our fees should be determined. Whereas, submequently under an act of the Legislature known as Chapter 269 of the laws of 1911, an application was rade by the Hudson County Board of Taxation to the State Board of Assessors for the assessment of said property for said omitted years, upon which application said Board after taking testimony and hearing all parties, assessed the portion of the premises situate in this municipality as follows:

same reversed the judgement of the Supreme Court and affire ed the assessment made, and whereas, subsequently said Railroad Company obtained a writ of error from the United States Supreme Court to review the judgement of the New Jersey Court of Errors and Appeals and the New Jersey Supreme Court, which appeal is

now pending, and whereas, in all of the proceedings above referred to and in relation to the legislation and litigation relative to said taxes, the firm of Edwards & Smith appeared for this municipality and desires that provision be now made for payment of services rendered, and is willing that payment be made to them out of the moneys to be paid the municipality upon a final decision in its favor,

Resolved that there be paid to said Edwards & Smith twenty-five percent. (25%) of all moneys eventually received by this municipality from said taxes and assessments as and for compensation for services rendered therein, the same to include all disbursements made by said firm therein, but not to include bills for services of experts.

To the Honorable Hayor and Township Committee of the Township of Weehawken.

I suspended Patrolman Ervin Chamberlain from duty on Aug. 2nd at 2.30 p.m., to await the action of your Hon. Body at its meeting on Aug. 6th. The rement for my setion are as follows: On Thursday morning Aug 3, at 11. 20 patrolman Chamberlain telephoned that there was a man whom he thought was overcome by the heat at the trolley station near the wast the trolley station near the West Shore ferry at the foot of Ciffton road. I telephoned for the ambulance, the man was brought to the North Bussen in hopping a page 100 hospital where the Bostor in charge pronounced the man in good health; then Patrolman Chamberlain brought the man in the ambulance to the police station. The man gave his name as William Major, age 37; no home, and as there was no charge on which to held him he was no the man had gone on which to hold him he was let go. After the man had gone about ten minutes, I wanted something that was in my coat, when I looked for the coat which I left hanging on the partition at the foot of the steps leading up to the desk it had disappared. I called up the Hoboken Police and gave them a coription of the man I had released. peared. I called up the Hobeken Police and gave then a deacription of the man I had released, and I requested telephothey arrest this man if found and notify us. them tell putned to the West Shore Railroad police to have them tell putrelman Chamberlain call up the police station; Captain with
answered the phone and he said that he would send a man down
directly to notify patrolman Chamberlain. This was about 12.
30 Noon, still I did not hear from him.until it was station
ring in at one c'clock. I asked him to come to the station ring in at one c'clock. I neked him to come told him my cont had been taken and that the man whom he had brought in might have it. I asked him which at the man whom he had brought in high have it. I asked him which direction the man had taken, and also ordered him to see also ordered him to go out and try and get him.

Chamberlain told me he would not go out to look for him as he had brought the man in and it was my place to hold him, I then told Chamberlain that this man could not have taken the cost without he, Chamberlain giving it to him so he was leaning against the cost while standing at the desk, and the man whom he brought in stood six feet away. Therefore it was impossible for him to have taken it without he handed the coat to him. There was a watch and chain and other things in the pockets of the coat, and it would be a loss to me; at this time the telephone rang and word came from Lieutenant Thorpey of the Second Preceit, Hoboken that there man at the 14th Street forry arrested the man as he was about to besid the Ferry for New York. I Sent Station House Keeper Weir for the man, I then suspended patrolman Chamberlein for the following reasons: Refusing to go and look for this man when ordered, and also helping this man in getting away with the coat and watch. In reference to the latter charge I do notmean to infer that patrolman Chamberlain in any way thought to profit by the theft I am sure, such a thought never entered his mind but he simply in anger against me for releasing the man.

Mr. Schuster Cheirman of the Police Committee of the Township Committee of the Township of Weshawken, presented the following report and charges, which on motion of Hr. Gallagher was laid over until order of unfinished business. (5)

On Thursday, August 2nd at 2-30 O.P.M., Officer Chamberlain reported to me he had been suspended by the Chief under the following charges:

A man by the name of William Meyer had been overcome by the heat at the West Shore Ferry and he telephoned to the Station House for an ambulance. The man was taken to the North Hudson Hospital and after about 15 minutes was pronounced in condition to be taken away. Officer Chamberlain then took him to the Town Hall and found Chief McGann at the desk. He reported the circumstances of the case and the Chief ask if there was any charge against the man to which Chamberlain replied that there was no charge but he thought that the man should be kept for safe keeping. The man had in his possession two grips and a small bag which Chamberlain put in back of the deak at the Town Hall when he brought Neyer in. When the Chief discharged the man Chamberlain claims that Neyer took the grips himself and went out. When both Neyer and Chamberlain had left the Chief discovered that his cost which had been hanging on the rail was gone together with his watch and chain and other articles which he had in the cost. He thereupon called Chamberlain and accused him of taking the coat and watch and contents and giving it to the prisoner who had been discharged. He also requested him to report at the Station House and then suspended him on charge of stealing his cost and contents. I immediately went to the Town Hall his coat and contents. I immediately went to the Town Hall to investigate and take the matter up with the Chief who insisted that Officer Chamberlain had taken the coat and handed it to the prisoner. I thereupon told the Chief that this was a serious charge and that he should have gotten in touch with me regarding the matter before he suspended the officer and that under the circumstances I would lift the suspension unless the would make a formal pharma on the blotter against less he would make a formal charge on the blotter against Chamberlain. He thereupon said that he would do so and I the suspended Chamberlain to spear before Judge Numan at 9 o'clock on Friday morning when the Chief said he would have a warrant issued for Chamberlain's arrest.

Immediately after the prisoner had left the Station House the Chbot telephoned to the Hoboken authorities and they picked him up in Hoboken and the Chief sent Keeper Weir to Hoboken to bring him back to the Town Hall.

Upon questioning the prisoner he stated that he himself had taken the coat thinking it was his own and that he no intention of deliberately stealing the same. He also stated that when he discovered in Hoboken that he had this coat in that when he discovered in Hoboken that he had this coat in his possession he immediately started to return to the Wee-hawken station when he was picked up by the Hoboke police.

Subsequent to my report of August 2nd 1917, I beg further report that on the morning of August 3rd, 1917, Officer Chamberlain and William Meyer appeared before Recorder Munan to answer to the charge made by Chief McGann, of stealing his coat, watch and chain, etc. and after quite an augument as to the merits of this case Recorder Nunan decided to call upon the Officer who made the arrest of Meyer in Hobeken.

He therefore telephoned the Hobeken Police and the Officer in question was sent to the Weshawken Town Hall. After he had given his story I suggested to the Recorder that William Meyer again be questioned as to the exact location where he was picked up, there being quite some **sim** doubt as to whether he was on his way back from New York or on his way to New York. Chief McGann objected to this procedure and wanted to know whether I was trying to make a liar out of the Hobeken Police Officer and I informed him I was trying to get down to the exact merits of the case in question. He thereupon accused me of being "Counsel for all the crooks that appear in the Town Hall and that I was Counsel for Lieut. Verdon when he was brought up on charges. I thereupon told him I would take those remarks from neither he nor anyone else and suspended him to appear before the Township Committee on Monday evening August 6th, 1917.

Previous to this he had made an effort to make Station House Keeper Weir deliberately lie as to what had take place at the desk on the previous afternoon, in other words, he tried to make Weir say that he (Weir) had told the Chief not to send Chamberlain to Hoboken for the prisoner because if he did he would never get his watch and chain back. This remark Keeper Weir denied having made, whereupon the Chief said "God damm you be a man and not a louse and tell the truth. Keeper Weir again denied having made any such remark

attributed to him,

Under the circumstances and in conjunction with this
report I therefore prefer charges against the Chief of Police
for conduct unbecoming to an officer of the Bepartment and for
disrespect to his Superiors. I further prefer charged against
him of disobelience of the rules and regulations of the Police
Department for the reason he not wearing his uniform while on
duty as preacribed by the Manual.

I might say in conjunction with the latter, that if the Chief had live up to the Rules and Regulations of the Police Department his cost would not have been hanging on the rail as there is a closet provided for the man at the desk for that purpose.

I ask the Honorable Township Committee take up these charges at the earliest possible moment.



The rails and joints are loose in very many places and it is impossible to keep the asphalt pavement firm and solid against the rails that are continually soving under the passing of every car.
