## NOT SIGNED YET.

PROBABLY WILL HAVE THE PRESIDENT'S SIGNATURE AT FIVE O'CLOCK.

Spain will be notified promptly—Troops on the Move—The Sixth Cavalry Goes South.

The President will sign resolution at once and notify Spain to evacuate Cuba. Troops on march.

A cabinet meeting was called for this evening at which the President is expected to sign the resolutions and Spain will be immediately notified.

The War Department is notified that all troops are practically on the move or will be presently. The 6th Cavalry went South today from Fort Monroe, Va.

## THEY COME TO TERMS.

The Senate and House Agree—The Senate's Resolutions Adopted With a Part of the First Stricken Out—It Means War All the Same.

The agony of suspense is now, we think, practically over. The Senate and House came to terms Monday night between 1 and 2 o'clock. We gave the Senate resolutions Monday and the final agreement reached is only the change of the latter part of the first resolution.

The resolution is as follows:

"First, That the people of the island of Cuba are, and of right ought to be, free and independent and that the government of the United States hereby recognizes the republic of Cuba as the true and lawful government of that island."

Strike out all after the word independent and you have the joint action in the Monday's issue of THE STANDARD.

The House desired very much to strike out the words "are, and" making it read, "That the people of the island of Cuba of right ought to be free and independent, but the Senate would not accede to it. It will be noted that as it stands Congress did not recognize the republic of Cuba as the true and lawful government of the island.

In all the forms of speech from the President's message to the joint action of the two Houses it means for Spain to get out and quit her so-called dominion, her oppression and her extermination right at our door. That deliberation and wise caution should go with haste is gratifying and we now have only action before us. The measures will be duly signed before this is read in type we hope. Spain will be duly notified as an ultimatum. How long time will be allowed her remains to be determined by the President, but it will be but short.

## A CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS.

Bill to be Introduced Today Authorizing the President to Issue a Call for 60,000 or 70,000 Men—State Militia Technicality Avoided—A Second Call for 100,000 May Be Issued.

Washington, April 18.—Representative Hull, of Iowa, chairman of the House committee on military affairs, will tomorrow introduce an administration bill, authorizing the President to issue a call for volunteers to the number of 60,000 or 70,000 men. It will be considered at once by the committee, its passage expedited as rapidly as possible and will take effect immediately upon the President's approval. Its terms will authorize the President to call on the various States for quotas in making up the aggregate. By reading in this way, instead of specifically looking to calling out the various State militia, will avoid several embarrassing technicalities, the main one being the constitutional inhibition on sending State militia out of the country, while volunteers so called for can be ordered anywhere.

It is likely that if the situation develops into such grave proportions as is now expected, a second call for 100,000 volunteers will be issued by the President. The necessity for this immense number, however, is not clear to the military authorities at this time. The draft of the present war measure has just been granted by the War Department officials and the leading members of the military committee have already conferred with the War Department authorities on the necessities on this line, the latter having announced that a maximum of 80,000 volunteers would be sufficient at this time.

## New York Safe From Attack.

The Scientific American contains a cut and description of the defenses of Sandy Hook commanding the lower entrance to New York City.

There are 16 mortar guns that throw projectiles of 1,000 pounds each, including 100 pounds of high explosives.

These have a maximum range of five miles. Besides these there are 12 inch rifle guns with a range of 10 miles, and rapid fire guns, ditches, &c., for assaults.

These mortar batteries are down behind concrete walls of great strength and the men who work them do not see the enemy, or even the bay, but take their bearings by a quart, and the position of the enemy is made known by telegraph from observers some distance away. It would be next to impossible for an enemy to reach the defense, while its projectiles would be next to resistless.
