

Schrenker: Business Education.

Weatherholt: When you were attending the College for Women, what was it like, attending an all-girls school? Were there certain rules you had to follow? Were there rules involving boys?

Schrenker: There were some extreme rules. [laughs] I jotted some of those down; would you like to talk about that now or should we save all these things until later?

Weatherholt: Okay, yeah! Go ahead, yeah — talk about them now.

Schrenker: Okay, well, you could not wear shorts on campus unless you had your raincoat on. Even living in Reynolds, when we went down the hill to the PE class and you had on your athletic uniform or your shorts, you had to put on a raincoat! You couldn't appear on the campus in shorts. And no long pants. Girls did not wear long pants then. We had fire drills and I remember where we lived in Reynolds — it was on the back side, it was the fourth floor — and we would have a fire drill in the middle of the night. We went down four flights of stairs, but we had to put on our raincoats over our night clothes.

Weatherholt: Was that all you wanted to share about that? Okay, what do you remember about your professors or different classes that you took?

Schrenker: Coming from a small high school, even though it was considered a good high school, it was just so different to meet girls from Jacksonville, Tampa, Miami, and the places where, I guess, you would have to admit they had better schools. So, you were really competing with a different type of student than you were used to. But the classes were still small.

Weatherholt: What building did you have classes in?

Schrenker: Well, what building was Dr. Eyman in? The Education classes were in that building.

Sister: I tried to think last night and I couldn't remember.

Schrenker: As you leave Westcott, it was the first building to the north. And I remember Dr. Richards and his little attic room with Physical Science. There was a building up there in that corner, too. And the gym. But, when the boys came, because my major was Business Education and I took a lot of business classes, they were out at Dale Mabry, where the men were. And the school furnished a bus, and we often rode the bus out to Dale Mabry to our business classes out there. Did you [go to] Mabry?

Sister: No classes out there. All mine were on campus.
