REFLECTIONS FROM THE PEW BY DAN SITZMAN June 7

When I was in kindergarten, I made a new friend. Dusty lived about two blocks from my

house. One day when I was at his house, I thought it was funny to play with words. Unfortunately, the words I strung together to describe Dusty led soon to a phone conversation between our mothers, a lost friendship, and a new understanding that we don't joke about the color of one's skin. I did not know.

Four decades later, I was working late and entered the main office of school. An alumnus was in the office, waiting as his mother was meeting with a teacher of his younger brother. Now seven years removed from our frequent conversations in the hallway, the former student had been recently interviewed on TV about his most recent successes. I commented that I was proud how poised and articulate he sounded on camera. He thanked me, but the conversation ended at that. A year later, I read an essay about how words like I had said to him, as an African-American, imply that because I thought that he "sounded white" that he was successful. I did not know.

Last week, as my family sat on the shore of Lake Pontchartrain, looking out over the vast estuary and the long causeway that disappears over the horizon, I thought of the scene early in the 1960 book *Black Like Me*, where the white author, medically treated to have dark skin, rides a bus on that same causeway to experience life in the segregated south. How would the people he encountered respond to him today? I would I respond to him?

I do not know what it is to live with skin of a different color, or as a different gender, or sexual orientation, or worshiping God as a non-Christian, or having been born in another country, or of a different economic status, or in a different age, or if I had chosen another profession. But from my current situation, I know that there are things that I can learn, based on my experiences, by being curious, and from my faith.

This Sunday, we hear the conclusion of Paul's Second Epistle to the Corinthians. In the verse just prior to this Sunday's passage, Paul writes of "the authority the Lord gave me for building you up, not for tearing you down." Then, as we hear on Sunday, he concludes by saying, "Put things in order, listen to my appeal, agree with one another, live in peace; and the God of love and peace will be with you. Greet one another with a holy kiss."

Just as Jesus and the apostles demonstrated through their words and actions, there is no need to dominate and intimidate or to assume we know what is best for others. Let us use our faith and skills to listen and to better understand what each of us does not know.


Let there be peace, and let it begin with me through my words and actions.
