
PARK HEROES

JOHN MUIR

At the end of the nineteenth century, he envisioned preserving wild western lands before settlement and industry could spoil them. His poetic words spread the idea of nature appreciation:

"Nature is ever at work building and pulling down, creating and destroying, keeping everything whirling and flowing, allowing no rest but in rhythmical motion, chasing everything in endless song out of one beautiful form into another."

Mission: Preserve America's grand landscapes.





MARJORY STONEMAN DOUGLAS

In her 1947 bestseller Everglades: River of Grass, she brought awareness to the importance of Florida's Everglades as an environmental resource. When South Florida developers wanted to drain the swamps and pave over the cypress trees, Douglas rallied for the area to be established as a national park.

Mission: Spread the word of the Everglades.


TODAY'S RANGERS

alive!






MISSION: PROTECTION

PRESERVATION IN PARKS


EVERGLADES NATIONAL PARK

This park protects the southern 20% of Florida's original everglades and is the largest wilderness of any kind east of the Mississippi River. An average of one million people visit the park each year. Most national parks preserve unique geographic features but Everglades National Park was the first created to protect the fragile wetland ecosystem.



SEA TURTLES

Florida's three species of sea turtle-Leatherback, Green, and Loggerhead-are classified as vulnerable and/or
endangered due in part to predators,
commercial fishing nets, and
ingestion of plastics. Conservation
projects include sea turtle hospitals,
as well as the use of citizen scientists
to scan beaches for nests and block
them off from harm.





AMERICAN BISON

Some 30 million bison once roamed the continent. In the late 1800s, they were almost entirely eliminated due to over hunting. People like William Temple Hornaday and Theodore Roosevelt joined together to stop the destruction of the American Bison. Today the last free-roaming specimens are found in Yellowstone.



MARSICAN BROWN BEARS

Internationally, the preservation of species is an important issue addressed by national parks of other nations. In Italy's National Park of Abruzzo healthy populations of the Marsican brown bear are an example of how international preservation works through parternships with organizations like the World Wildlife Fund (WWF).




MISSION: TOURISM

"Everybody needs beauty as well as bread, places to play in and pray in, where nature may heal and give strength to body and soul." -John Muir


















OUR CHALLENGES

Nature Lovers on Hand for Conflict

John Muir Will Be Among Those Opposing Hetch-Hetchy Water Plan.

WASHINGTON, June 24 .- "Nature lovers" began to arrive here today to take part in the hearing which begins before the Public Lands Committee tomorrow on the Hetch-Hetchy water bills. All of them will oppose the bill on the grounds that the Hetch-Hetchy reservoir will destroy the natural beauty of the valley.


John Muir, chief of the "nature lovers," telegraphed Chairman Ferris of the committee that he would be on hand. Secretary of the Interior Lane is expected to be the first witness before the commission tomorrow and he will probably make a favorable recommendation on the bill.
