It is in that paper then that we can get an insight into the purposes of the man who declared, in his inaugural, "that in future ij he would be governed by circumstances," and in that paper we find the following : ¢ "But, nevertheless, we mean to conquer 3 them, (the South.) - not merely to defeat, but Ą to conquer, to stratuare them-and we shall į do this the more mercifully, the more speedily we do it. But when the rebellious traitors are overwhelmed in the field, and scattered like ŕ leaves before an angry wind, it must not be to return to peaceful and contented homes. They must find poverty at their fire-sides, and see Ì privation in the anxious eyes at mothers and the rags of children. It is little enough the staves will do when masters are at the wars, ř and to be idle and wasteful is the least harm -. ful thing in which they are likely to engage themselves." And again :-"Whatever may be said by the cages enc-mics of republican institutions at the present day, one thing at least is certain, and that is that history will record that the great Southern rebellion in this country was not a result of either the principles or the practice of democracy, but of that which is most hostile to democracy, which is in fact the utter negation of everything democratic, namely Slavery." These two little paragraphs unmask the real purposes of Republicanism. Conquer, subjugate ten, twelve, fourteen or fifteen States of the Union, and do it speedily, effectually and most barbarously. Then slavery, the great cause of these troubles, and the darling object of Republicanism, can be easily managed. Does the loyal and Union-loving people of Washington Territory subscribe to such doctrines? We think not, as the coming election will prove.
