## "Nominal" Support,

Our, very independent Union cotemporary on the bill finds fault with as because we did not hoist the name of Mr. McLane at the head of our columns in the daily as well as weekly TRIBUNE, and infers from this that the TRIBURE is not quite so decidedly Union as it should be, and that we intend to render the Union candidate for Conneilman only a "nominal" support. The weekly issue of the TRIBUNE is a compilation of all its daily issues, and therefore the political principles of each must necessarily be identical. Moreover, it is not usual to hout the names of candidates in daily papers. This may be news to those whose knowledge in the publishing business is derived chiefly from Webfoot and Washington Territory, and we furnish the information to the concern on the hill free of charge.
