

GRANT AND COLFAX ELECTED BY NEGRO VOTES.—By examination of the table of returns of the late elections, taken in connection with well-known facts concerning the relative negro vote in a few of the Northern and most of the late "rebel" States, it is now ascertained beyond a doubt that the Jacobin candidates were elevated to office against the wishes of a decided majority of the white voters of the country. If we take into calculation the white men denied a ballot by the disfranchisement of the States of Virginia, Mississippi and Texas, and those denied suffrage by congressional and legislative proscription, the radical ticket was successful against a majority of more than one million of white men. Excluding those white men in the South disfranchised as above, and deducting the nigger vote of the North, we still find the black republican usurpers in a popular minority of between three and four hundred thousand.
