

Fourteen into Nine: the Dilemma Is Not Unique

Today more than 1400 students study in a building designed for 900.

Blacksburg High School's dilemma is not unique. Numerous schools across the country face overcrowding and the need for expanded facilities. The present Blacksburg High School building opened for classes in 1952. Its planners were farsighted and predicted that it would not long be adequate. Many county residents were not. Early bond issues for construction of a new school were proposed and defeated.










Eighty percent of the students at BHS are bused from a radius of 25 miles.





Dreams of Tomorrow Are Interrupted



BHS students, like others across the nation, wore P.O.W. bracelets, and waited for the day when the man, whose name they wore, would return home.

Nineteen years ago, B.H.S. students experienced the same transition that 1973 students will encounter next year. Those students and faculty members moved from the old Blacksburg High building, which had been constructed in 1909 and was located on Draper Road, to the present school facility.

On a cool day in January, students and teachers alike, loaded with books, boxes and other paraphernalia excitedly made trip after trip between the old and new buildings. Only heavy equipment, such as desks, were moved on trucks.

The new high school offered more math, science and music courses, along with new Industrial Arts, D.E. and I.C.T. programs. However, as with most things there were drawbacks. The school had no cafeteria, no P.A. system, and no cold water fountains. Only a minimum amount of heat was provided. A constantly improved academic program, has seen the growth of the faculty from 25 in 1954 to 73 in 1973.

Beyond the boundaries of Blacksburg, in 1954, the first atomic submarine, the **Nautilus** had just been launched. The world was relatively quiet. Today, the U.S.A. is just beginning to see the start of peace once again. A ceasefire in Viet Nam went into effect on January 27, 1973. On February 12, millions of Americans wept with joy as they witnessed the arrival of the first P.O.W.'s at Clark Air Force Base in the Phillipines.



Guidance Counselors Monitor Progress

The guidance department offered advice and consultation to students during the year. Counselors' tasks included administering tests, reviewing permanent records and four-year plans, and preparing class schedules for the upcoming year.

Pamphlets and bulletins were available for students interested in colleges and additional information was provided on vocational studies opportunities.

Movies, Audi-Visuals Enhance English Classes

The general aims of the English department this year were to help students strengthen their personal writing abilities, learn to interpret literature and improve their grammar. These objectives were carried out by emphasizing themes, term papers, speeches and textbook material. Students however, were not restricted to the mere use of textbooks in the classrooms. Audio-visual equipment often provided the diversity that was needed in the classroom to keep students interested. Along with the regular activities of the department, movies such as Mary, Queen of Scots were seen to bring a cultural atmosphere to the classes. Teachers in this department also sponsor the Cue & Curtain, Forensics and Thespian Clubs.





"Mathemagic" was the theme of the 1972-73 mathematics program at Blacksburg High School. In addition to regular studies through the math 8, algebra, geometry, trigonometry, and advanced math sequence, students pursued such fascinating topics as: psychosychers (super hard problems given to students as bonus work); computer science, which utilizes a mini-computer on loan from the V.P.I. & S.U. chemistry department; complicated calculations whose solutions are facilitated by the use of two new electronic calculators; and games such as the sophisticated Pitfall, Yuke and Jeopardy.





Auxiliary Services Support Activities

Eighty-percent of the students at Blacksburg High School rode school buses from a radius of 25 miles. Despite the potential problems of a transportation system so far-reaching, schedules were arranged to provide maximum efficiency and comfort for all passengers. Mr. Bob Price was BHS coordinator.

The PTSA explored the school lunch program in depth this year. In response to some student criticism federal Class A lunch standards were detailed with their stringent vitamin and mineral requirements. A student committee planned menus during National School Lunch Week. The hot lunch provides one-third of minimum daily nutritional needs.

Custodial service maintained buildings and grounds clean and ready for school activities. Duties were performed seven days a week around the clock.

Interdisciplinary Studies Feature Press, Stage, Terminal

With the ever-increasing emphasis upon interdisciplinary studies, the academic program at Blacksburg High School has enriched its offerings with instruction in journalism, computer science, drama and pre-vocational skills. Journalism was taught as a part of the publications classes for the newspaper, **Tattle Tale**, and yearbook, **Pow Wow**. Computer science spiced business math and algebra classes with a terminal on loan from V.P.I. & S.U. and students were given an opportunity to join Saturday classes in the subject at Tech. Juniors and seniors attended several classical and contemporary films at local theaters to help develop discriminating taste in drama viewing. Eighth- and ninth-grade boys and girls combined science and mathematics principles with activities in the shop and kitchen to improve both. Faculty members participated in many workshops to augment their preparations for these courses.

We came into the halls of BHS with a feeling of astonishment and now are leaving with a feeling of accomplishment.




School Groups Provide Cultural Entertainment at 1972 Spring Festival

An active participant in the Western Area Conference of NHS, the BHS chapter entered two members in the national scholarship program.











Warrior Band Rates Superior With Field Show



















The Indoor Track Team Has It's First





Depth, versatility and dedication were the keys to the team's success, with people doubling and tripling in events and practicing long hours in the school's halls and auditorium.











The cheerleaders planned each pep rally held during the year. The squads also performed a Pompom routine during basketball game half-times.


