Support and Second Chances

Groups Bring Men Together to Help One Another Leave Troubled Pasts

round a long table in the basement of an aging building in the District, a group of men comes together every Wednesday seeking recovery and redemption. For most, the weekly reunions, part of a program called Men-in-Motion, mean escaping troubled criminal histories and embracing a future as fathers, sons and friends.

"The main thing is that we give each oth-

er hope," said Karl Andrews, an outreach worker for the National Center for Children and Families, which sponsors the weekly meetings aimed at providing men in wards 7 and 8 with parenting skills.

Men-in-Motion is part of a growing network of groups across the District and Prince George's County that provides parenting support and therapy to men, many of them ex-offenders, through roundtable discussions.
