Boston Chapel started as a Sunday afternoon Sunday School for Dover Street children. The man who ran the Dover Street Rescue Mission asked the E.N.C. group that ministered at the Mission to start the SS since there were so many children in the area. From the Sunday School grew Boston Chapel. Jerry Huff '56 was the first pastor. Sam Henck '57 drove the carryall.

As a student at Eastern Nazarene Academy I went in on Sunday afternoons, probably from 1952 or 1953 - 1956. The two little girls I brought each week lived several blocks from the Mission. The children I remember by name were a girl named Dallas, Phyllis, Philip and Pauline who were siblings and the Blakeleys.

I remember helping to clean up the first building they rented for services, down the street from the Mission.

Probably in the early 1970's Ann Kimmel, who was either Dean of Women at E.N.C. or Assistant Dean of Women, became involved with Boston Chapel. Margaret (Fuzzy) Goodnow Howard
