#### PRESS RELEASE TAKE A COURSE IN SAFER SEX

OXAIDS have published a safer sex leaflet-poster for students at Oxford Polytechnic and University. The leaflet, *Take a Course in Safer Sex*, outlines safer sexual choices to avoid unplanned pregnancy, cervical cancer and sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV, the virus that can lead to AIDS. The leaflet will be distributed to all students during October.

The material is specifically targeted at students, not the general public and was prepared in consultation with a range of student representatives. The leaflet was piloted to a group of over 200 local students to assess need and knowledge and what styles and language would prove most effective in changing behaviour. For many students, going to college is also about confronting sexual choices and a 1987 survey found that 60% of Oxford students had their first sexual experience at college. According to a recent report, the poor take up of safer sexual practices among students makes them more at risk from HIV than prostitutes.

This leaflet shifts the focus onto non-penetrative sexual activities, broadening what is meant by safer sex. Safer sex is usually linked to condoms and used properly condoms can significantly reduce the risk of HIV infection. However, even protected intercourse is not the safest form of sex. The leaflet does not isolate HIV but instead looks at healthy safe sex more generally.

The leaflet aims to cover all areas of sexuality with a focus on sexual activity rather than sexual preference. The information and the suggestions are applicable to anyone, regardless of their sexuality.

Every effort has been made to ensure the language used is straight forward and accurate. HIV is transmitted sexually and it is vital to be explicit and clear about sex. The leaflet provides facts and options for students but does not presume that they are sexually active. It stresses the importance of listening and talking to each other about sex.

Anna Eden, OXAIDS' first Care and Training Facilitator, and Roger Mortlock, Development Worker, took up their new posts just over a month ago.




Anna has come to OXAIDS from Bristol where she was a free-lance trainer in the HIV/AIDS field and a very active volunteer for the Aled Richards Trust.
