Green Hills Library Grows and Grows

A rich storehouse of education is available upon application of a library card to any person living within the district of the Green Hills Pub-lic Library, 10703 S, Roberts rd., Palos Hills. which has been serving the communities of Hickory Hills and Palos Hills since 1963.

The idea for a library began through the concerted efforts of residents of both communities. Voters of both communities approved tax support for the library. Much volunteer effort be-fore and after the establishment of the district

brought the library to a reality Oct. 11, 1963. The first librarians were Mrs. Lila Ellison Warren and Mrs. Robert Babcock, standing, who with the assistance of William McKillop, professional librarian, spent many hours processing, cataloging, and organizing a smooth running public library lending system.

From a small beginning of 2,500 volumes, including 1,500 on loan from the state of Illinois,

800 through a local book drive, and encyclopedias and other gift books through donations, and a circulation of 13,190 in its first year of operation, the library has now grown to a total of 6,000 volumes and a curculation of 18,915 during 1966. There are 1,301 junior cards and 1,033 adult cards, for a total of 2,384 borrowers' cards issued to date.

For the first years, the library was located

in the south end of the Stramaglia building. In three short years, the library outgrew its facilities. Since October, 1966, it has been located in roomier, lighter quarters, with windows three sides, at the north end of the building at 10708 S. Roberts rd. Residents are delighted to see the size and capacity of the present quarters with its shining new desk and additional shelving to accommodate the growing collection of books for all ages.

The library board of trustees, including Ben Warren, president; Herman Conrady, treasurer; Mrs. Grace Kordisch, secretary; Mrs. Pat Ackerson, Mrs. Betty Charles, and Donald Henderson, serve without compensation, and serve staggered six-year terms on formulating policy, and budgeter research.

ing policy and budget to cover all phases of li-brary operation and growth.

A small group of efficient, helpful, and courteous librarians, whose only aim is to please and help the public, dispatch the books. They are Mrs. Robert Babcock, head librarian, Mrs. Don Patterson, Mrs. Kenneth Vrtis, and Mrs. Maurice Taylor, seated, and junior staffer, April Filis. The librarians attend and share up-to-date information gained by attendance at the workshops of the South Suburban Librarians. Recently the board passed a resolution to join the Suburban Library System which should result in the steady improvement of services and resources by the library.
