
















Putts & Ruts


This winter contained a semester full of must-see nights, which

I'll always remember where I was when I found out.

I was at the library, and needed to take a break from my homework. I let my fingers slide across the screen as I unlocked my phone and looked down at the brightly colored apps. I tapped the Facebook app, and what I saw made my heart drop right through my chest. I stuffed my books into my bag and hurried out the door. My head was now light and uncomprehending. It couldn't be true. It couldn't be true. I thought that maybe if I thought it over and over, I could make myself believe it.
