

Minnesota Governor To Receive Honorary Degree At Commencement This Afternoon

College Presents 2 Civic Awards

Islanders to Get DCA's At 64th Commencement

This afternoon at three o'clock two Staten Islanders will receive the Distinguished Citizenship Awards at the 64th Annual Commencement Exercises of Wagner. Dr. Walter C. Langsam, president, will present the Awards.

Miss Ellen M. Horrmann and Mr. Art O. Hedquist were chosen by the college authorities to be the recipients because of their outstanding contributions to the civic interests of Staten Island.

Miss Horrmann, coming from one of the Island's oldest families (1372), has served on the S. I. Community Chest for the past ten years, and on the Island Red Cross Chapter for the same length of time.

The war years kept Miss Morrmann busy with many activities in Red Cross and other volunteer activities.

Receives Citation

She received a citation for "distinguished civilian service" as a result of her work with the Red Cross Production Corp. This group, of which Miss Horrmann was Chairman, consisted of about 2000 workers. As Chairman of the Prisoner of War Food Packing Center from September, 1944 until May, 1945, Miss Horrmann aided in putting out a total of over 2,000,000 food packages.

In her work for the Red Cross Camp & Hospital Committee, it has been estimated that she has donated about 7000 volunteer hours during the war.

At the present time, she is still actively connected with Island Red Cross work and serves as President of the Staten Island Service League.

Art O. Hedquist

The second Staten Islander to be is printed below. given the Civic Award is Art O. Hedquist, executive Secretary of the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce. He has held this position for the past twenty years.

A former professor at his Alma Mater, the University of Wisconsin, and past Commander of the Tappen American Legion Post, Mr. Hedquist has been elected to the "25-year" Club of the National Association of Commercial Secretaries.

Mr. Hedquist, who served in World War I and World War II, is at present a member of the Board of Governors of Northeastern Institute, Yale University.

The Honorable Luther Wallace Youngdahl, governor of Minnesota, will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws this afternoon at the 64th annual Wagner College Commencement.

During the same ceremonies, Dr. George Aus, professor of systematic theology and parish education at Luther Seminary, St. Paul, will receive the degree of Doctor of Divinity. Dr. Aus is an alumnus of Wagner, class of 1925.

The 53-year old Governor, rising above the humble circumstances of his childhood, attained political success by way of the Minnesota judiciary. His deep interest in youth and welfare problems and in education has led to the passage of much forward-looking legislation by the Minnesota legislature.

Dr. George Aus completed his graduate work at NYU where he received his M.A. and Ph. D. degrees. He studied at Biblical Seminary, General Theological Seminary, and Luther Seminary, graduating from the latter institution in 1934. Dr. Aus was senior pastor from 1937-1939 at Trinity Lutheran Church, Brooklyn, from whence he was called to his present post at Luther Seminary.

Hello and Goodbye


To all the prodigals of the College, to all our alumni-a hearty, sincere hello. We are glad to have you back, as glad as you must be to be here for a day of memories.

Van Name of the American Museum of Natural History. In 1934, she established the Hawk Mountain Sanctuary near Pottsville, Pa. It now ranks among the foremost of progressive conservation efforts. Mrs. Edge is also active in forest and natural park protection.
