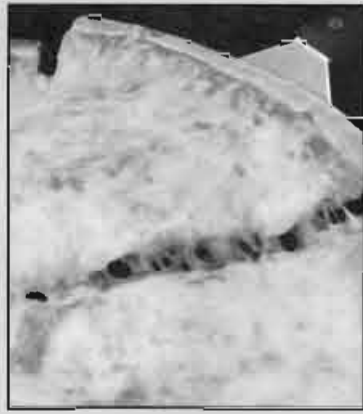

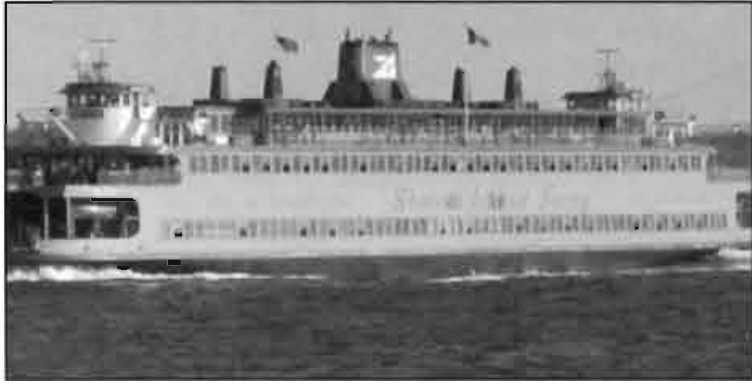

## Navigating Staten Island



### All about the ferry

The Staten Island Ferry is a passenger vessel that connects the St. George section of Staten Island to the southern tip of Manhattan, near Battery Park. The ride takes approximately 25 minutes each way and is completely free.

- Buy your **Metrocard** in the St. George Ferry Terminal. A single subway ride is now **\$2.25**. You can get bonuses for buying bulk rides at one time.
- Parking at the ferry is \$6, **carpool** if you can.
- Snacks and beverages can be purchased on all Ferry rides.
- Hold onto empty Metrocard, you can refill them at the machine.
- Bring **cash**. Many stores in the ferry terminal do not take credit or debit cards. You will be in a rush to make your purchase before the ferry starts to board.
- You have 2 hours to make a free transfer between trains and/or buses.
- Bring small bills to buy Metrocards, the MTA machines dispense all change in coin form, meaning you'll fill your pocket with dollar coins instead of bills.

### Popular Staten Island bus routes

*These bus routes all begin at the St. George Ferry Terminal, except for the S79. When you enter the terminal, look at each bus ramp (A-D), the signs will tell you which buses are available at which ramp.*

- S78 Hylan Blvd.** Along Hylan Boulevard, you will find many of Staten Island's restaurants and essential stores such as CVS, grocery stores and shopping plazas.
- S79 Verrazano-Narrows Bridge/ Hylan Blvd.** The route begins at 86th Street/4th Avenue in Brooklyn and follows Hylan Boulevard, ending at the Staten Island Mall. Coming from the ferry, take the S78 and transfer at a stop along Hylan Boulevard.
- S51 Bay St./ Fr. Capodanno Blvd.** Bay St. is home to many of the Island's hot spots. Take the bus to Father Capodanno Boulevard to the South Beach Boardwalk or Midland Beach.
- S44 Richmond Ave** This bus ends at the Staten Island Mall.
- S62 Victory Blvd** Along Victory Boulevard are more restaurants and bars, as well as grocery and convenience stores.

### Staten Island Railway

Another convenient option is to take the Staten Island Train from the ferry to various destinations on the island.

Some stops are located at transfer points to local buses.

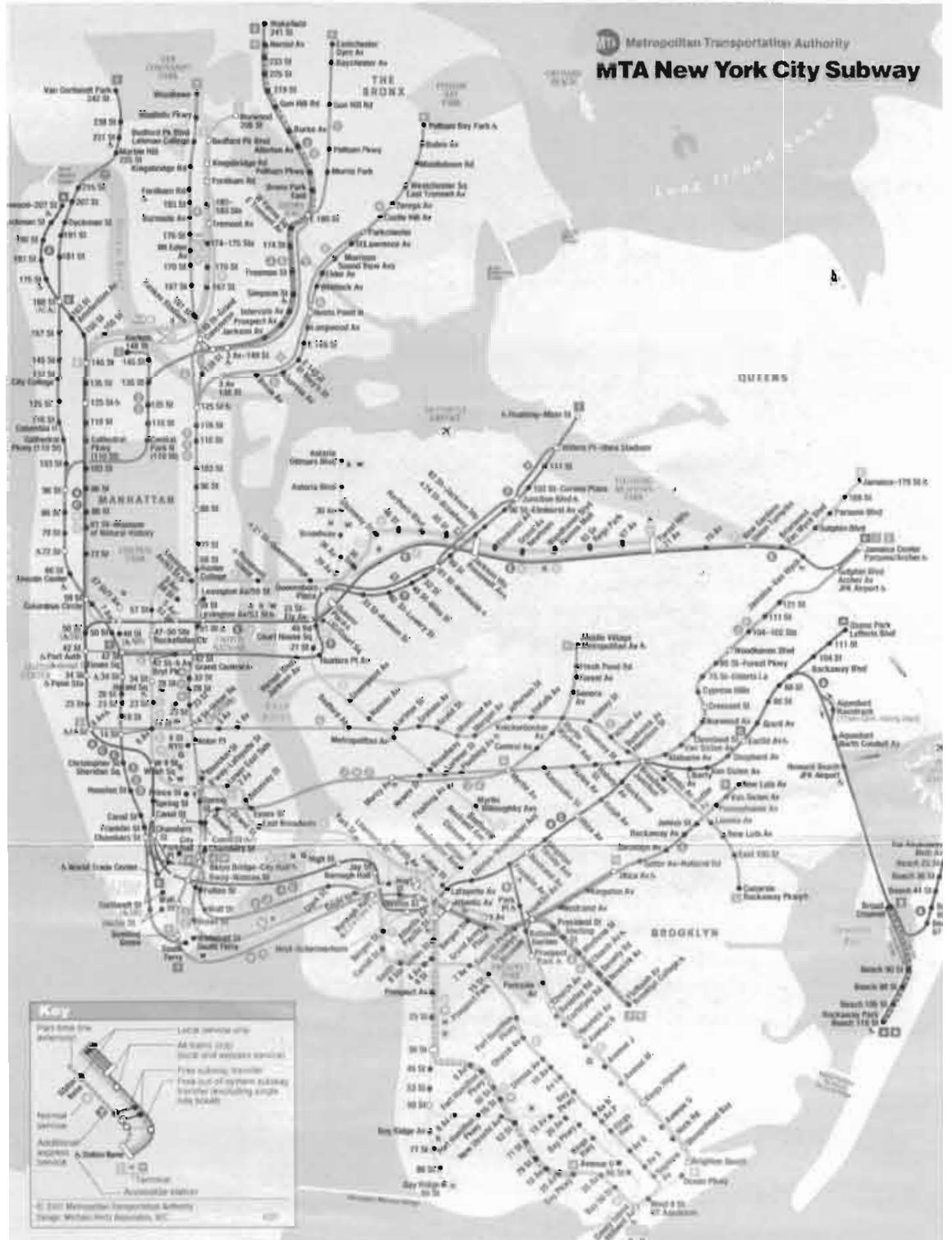

# NYC subways

Here are the five most accessible subways near the Staten Island Ferry. They were recently ranked by Straphangers Campaign. For the detailed results visit <http://www.straphangers.org/>.



**1**

**Broadway-7 Avenue Local**

Voted the best subway in New York, the No. 1 train is conveniently located just outside South Ferry terminal. The new station opened last winter, and you no longer have to board in only the first five cars on your return trip. It stops at major transfer points including Times Square.

**R**

**Queens Boulevard / Broadway / 4 Avenue Local**

Ranked 15th out of New York's 22 subway lines, the R train is located just across from the Ferry terminal in the same station as the 1. The line has a reputation of being unreliable and scarcely arriving. Good option when the No. 1 train isn't running though.

**Lexington Avenue Express**

Ranked 8 out of the city's 22 lines, the No. 4 train is accessible by walking uptown a few blocks from the ferry station to Bowling Green. Those looking to travel to Yankee Stadium in the Bronx should take this line.

**5**

**Lexington Avenue Express**

Tied with the No. 4 train for 8th place, the No. 5 train is also accessible from the Bowling Green station. It is a good option if you are looking to get to Union Square, Grand Central Station or Harlem.

The classic design of the New York City Subway system has been praised worldwide.

## Air travel, airport pickup

From Wagner, you can get to three different airports in a reasonable amount of time. Here are the three options for those without a car:



### Newark International Airport

While Newark International Airport is the closest in proximity to Wagner (only a 20 minute drive on the New Jersey Turnpike), the taxi ride is an expensive one. While prices vary for each car service, you can expect to be hit with a bill around \$60... plus tolls.



### John F. Kennedy Airport

JFK Airport is New York City's most famous airport. The airport is accessible by subway, however, you'll have to pay an extra \$5 for the AirTrain to reach the airport from the Howard Beach subway station. The station is located on the A line, but make sure the window of the A Train says "Far Rockaway."



### La Guardia Airport

LaGuardia airport's reputation may not be as esteemed as it's crosstown adversary, but sometimes plane tickets flying in or out of LaGuardia will be cheaper than tickets for flights through JFK. To reach LaGuardia using mass transit, take a train to a transfer location to board the M60 bus.
