Hilltoppers In Brilliant Victory Over Panzer; Defensive Line Shines

Last Saturday on the Grymes Hill gridiron, the Wagner Eleven successfully pried the lid off the 1947 football season with a clear-cut 12-7 win over a visiting Panzer grid squad.

The Wagner gridgers scored the first time they gained possession of the ball. Working out of a modified "A" formation, introduced at Wagner by Coach Jim Lee Howell, the Green and White ground out 82 yards in a sustained drive.

The Hilltoppers took over the ball on their own 18 yard line, and sparked by the running of Tony Grecca and Lou Gianvito, reeled off four first downs in a row. With the ball resting on the Panzer eight yard line, Grecca broke loose off tackle and went over standing up to score the first touchdown of the 1947 grid season. Mike Chiaperino's attempted placement was partially blocked and hit the left upright, failing to clear the crossbar.

The candy-striped eleven from Jersey fought right back with the first of their two determined drives. A ground-eating running attack plus a well-thrown aerial brought the Panzer eleven into Wagner territory just ten yards away from paydirt. On the first series of play in the second quarter, Panzer fumbled, and Gerry MacDonald broke the back of the Panther's scoring threat by recovering the loose pigskin on the ten yard line.

Wagner broke into the scoring column for the second time, late in the first half. After Lou Gianvito ran a Panzer punt back 21 yards to the midfield stripe, Wagner took to the air lanes, and Gianvito to Grosz pass was good for ten yards. Teddy Doerzbacher then carried off tackle to the Panzer 27

Eight "Honorary Fellows" To Guide Wagner Students

Eight Honorary Fellows were announced today by Dr. Walter C. Langsam, President of Wagner College. "An Honorary Fellow" explained Dr. Langsam, "is one who has been selected by the college as a leader in his profession or vocation. These men will serve for a one year period as advisors to students interested in the field represented by the Honorary Fellow. Beside the students, where it is feasible, certain eligible students will also be given the opportunity of entering the employ of an interested firm in order that the student may determine for himself whether or not he is desirous of pursuing this as his life's work. This period of a year's internship, on the part of the student, would be highly beneficial in aiding him to find himself early in life."

In interviewing those selected to the office of Honorary Fellow, it was revealed that there is a real desire on the part of these men to train and hold outstanding students for employment on Staten Island, thus benefiting both Wagner College students and the Staten Island business community.

Those selected to the office of Honorary Fellow include: Dan Harper, 190 Crowl Avenue, Managing Editor of the Staten Island

Drs. Gordiejew And Brown Join Wagner Faculty

Dr. Wladimir Gordiejew, new professor of Chemistry at Wagner, has been traveling west for the last twenty five years. Starting in 1922, Dr. Gordiejew made his way through the entirety of Europe, teaching, editing, and living through a war in the interim.

In 1922, Dr. Gordiejew graduated from the University of Leipzig with a B.S. in Chemistry. He received his M.A. and Ph. D. from the University of Warsaw.

At the close of the war he was made a UNRRA legal officer for displaced Poles in the U. S. zone of Germany.

Prior to his appointment to the faculty at Wagner he worked in the Ledrele Laboratories in Pearl River, N. Y.

Dr. Kenneth E. Brown, newly appointed Chairman of Mathematics, received his Ph. D. from Columbia in 1943. He is a veteran of three years service in the United States Navy. Prior to coming to Wagner he served on the Mathematics Department at East Carolina Teachers College.

Plan Expansion of Religious Activities

To make a survey of the religious representation in Wagner College the Student Christian Association, during Registration Week, distributed questionnaires among both the old and the new students.

The statistics made available by this poll are aimed at facilitating the expansion of religious activities on the campus.

A tabulation of the 560 questionnaires groupings to be 208 Lutherans; 151 Roman Catholics, 28 Methodists; 36 Hebrews; 31 Episcopalians, 17 Presbyterians and other minor groups.

Wagner Officially Welcomes 225 Frosh in Orientation Week Program

Welcome to Wagner was the theme of the four day Orientation period for two hundred and fifty incoming students held September 18-21. A vital part in the training of all Wagner students, the scheduled events are designed to familiarize the new student with college life by providing a bridge between high school, and in many cases service in the armed forces, and college.

Chairman of Traditions, George Tamke, and forty counselors were on hand to greet the new students Thursday morning. The remainder of the day was of multi-purpose design, and included talks on "College Guidance", "Curriculum", and the Library.

Mr. Tamke and his administrative

board instituted a unique and highly successful system of lectures the following day. Specific phases of the student life at Wagner were covered in talks by the administrative board to the incoming students who were in groups of not more than thirty five. Student Government, Traditions, Fraternities, Honor Code, Living With Others, and Extra-curricular Activities were the phases covered.

The official welcoming speech was delivered by Dr. Langsam, who explained the need for individual development and the accent on individuals at Wagner.

Visitors Feature Fast Backfield Heavy Line; Green Minus Gianvito

Seeking their second consecutive win of the current season the Wagner football eleven will take the field against an invading Hamilton College team from Clinton, New York. For the Continentals this will be their initial appearance "on the Hill" since football first appeared here.

The Yellow and Blue will bring Staten Island a line that averages 185 pounds and a backfield that dips below the 160 pound marker. Such a combination may well indicate a fast-charging and bone-crushing line, along with a speedy and shifty backfield. At the helm of the Hamilton squad for the second season is earl "Bud" Svendsen who played center at the University of Minnesota and later for the Green Bay Packers professional football team. Last year because of a late start the Continentals played only four games in which they came out on top twice. They will open the current season here at Wagner.

In it's opening game of the year last week the Green and White eleven showed the good advantage offensively both on the ground and via the aerial route. In Tony Crecca and Lou Gianvito, Coach Jim Lee Howell has a fine pair of quick line plungers who are even more difficult to bring down once passed the scrimmage line. The line also is to be credited for the quick openings through which the backs were able to slip for much yardage. When forced to take to the air the Green Wave demonstrated a fine aerial attack with one touchdown scored via the passing method and the other being set up along the aerial route. Both Gerry McDonald and Ted Doersbacher starred on the receiving end while Matt Scaffa did the flipping.

Defensively the Hilltoppers played

excellently against any ground assaults but their aerial defense left something to be desired. Both centers, Donald Hanssen and Fred Scholz backed up the line faultlessly while "Whitey" Drown and Gerry McDonald played well at the end position. Game time is 2:30.

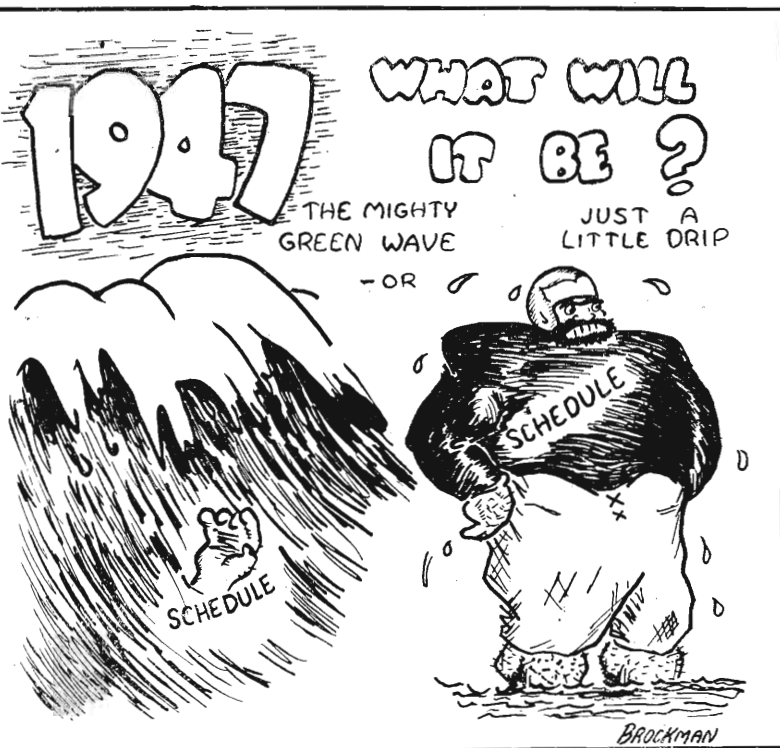
Cheerleaders Call For Male Voices

Jim Lee Howell Leads Wagner 11; Lunday Assistant

Whatever the result of the 1947 grid campaign no one will dispute the fact that the future of the Wagner eleven is in experienced hands, the latter being Jim Lee Howell, Ken Lunday and John "Bunny" Barbes.

At the helm will be Jim Lee Howell veteran end for the New York Giants football team, who came to the Hill last May. Before coming to the Giants in 1937 Howell was a three letter man at the University of Arkansas where he starred in football, basketball and baseball. Soon after receiving his Bachelor's degree, Howell served one year in the Arkansas State Senate.

In 1937 he joined the N. Y. Giants playing regularly until 1942 when he left to serve in the U. S. Marines. He rejoined the Giants in 1946.

Ken Lunday got to be a sidekick of Jim Lee back at the University of Arkansas where he played center for two years. In 1937 he signed with the New York Giants along with Howell. He remained with that team until 1941 when he entered the U. S. Army Air Corps and was commissioned an engineering officer. He was discharged in 1945 and rejoined the Giants.

Also assisting Howell is Bunny Barbes who came to Wagner last year as an instructor in Physical Education. Barbes attended Wagner from 1935-37 and was a lineman on the grid squad.

Although not an official member of the staff Jerry Niles, newest passing sensation of the Giants, has also been on the field at various times to aid the Green and White passing attack.


Available courses and regulations for admission to the Extension have been printed in pamphlets which are available at the Registrar's Office.
