## WOMENS TRACK TEAM BREAKS RECORDS

What do Maria Gordon, Amber Klock, Gloria Bailey, Paula Swinson, Anne Walsh, Camile Moore, Monica Lucy, and Wagner's 2 mile relay consisting of Adrian Hogan, Monica Lucy, Anne Walsh, and Terri Naudzunas all have in common?

All of the them broke school records Friday evening to help lead Wagner on to a 2nd place finish behind Villanova University and defeat Fordham University and Lafayette College.

Maria Gordan, broke 2 records, the shotput when she threw 32'5" and the high jump when she leaped 5'5".

Amber Klock broke the 3 mile record when she ran a sizzling 18 minutes!

Gloria Bailey shocked the field as she finished 2nd in the mile in 5:15.1 for a personal, and Wagner best!

Paula Swinson shined in her speciality as she broke

the 440 record in 63.1 seconds!

Freshman Anne Walsh continued to be a bright spot for Wagner as she broke the record in the 600 yd run with time of 1:34.7.

In the 880, Monica Lucy warmed up her season while running 2:20.2 for a new school record.

In the 300 yard run, Camile Moore didn't break the record, but ran 39.9 to tie the record.

And the two mile relay of Adriane Hogan, Anne Walsh, Monica Lucy and Terri Naudzunas broke the old record with the time of 9:51.2

The Shehawks are looking to break all previous records in the following upcoming meets: Nassau C.C. Invitational on Friday Dec. 10, Princeton Development meet Sunday Dec. 12, and the Fordham Invitational on Friday Dec. 17. Good Luck and Go Get 'em Shehawks!

## Chase Donates To Wagner

Wagner College has received a \$25,000 gift from the Chase Manhattan Bank, N.A.

Frank Scaturro, vice president of the New York bank, presented a check for the first half of the gift to Wagner President Sam H. Frank at a recent gathering at the Staten Island campus. The second \$12,500 will be presented to the College in 1983, when Wagner will celebrate its Centennial. Also on hand for the presentation were Dr. Norbert Leeseberg, Wagner's vice president for administration, and James Tiernan, vice president of Chase Manhattan.

The gift is unrestricted and may be used for campus renovation projects, scholarships or general operating expenses.

"The Chase Manhattan Bank has long served the Staten Island Community as an integral part of its economic and business mainstream," notes Patrick

O'Hagan, Wagner's Director of Development. "This gift demonstrates a further commitment to this community by supporting the major independent educational resource of Staten Island, Wagner College."

As one of the largest corporate contributors to Wagner College, Chase Manhattan's grant is part of the Bank's overall Aid-to-Education Program, which this year totaled close to \$2 million.

Chase Manhattan currently leads the major New York banks in philanthropic contributions. Reflecting 2% of Chase's after-tax earnings, the bank will contribute almost \$9 million in eight major categories in 1982, including culture, youth employment, public policy research, and education. According to latest figures, Chase's level of commitment ranks the bank with the top 60 foundations in the country.

Ed Enshwiller's latest multi-channel video and sound work, PASSES (1982), will be presented from December 23 through January 16 in the New American Filmmakers Series at the Whitney Museum of American Art. The five short 4-channel video pieces with stereo soundtracks that comprise PASSES will be shown every half hour from 12:00 to 6:00; Tuesdays until 8:00. Ed Enshwiller will give a gallery talk Thursday, December 23 at 2:00.

PASSES was produced at the California Institute of

the Arts where Enshwiller teaches and is developing a new center for video art activity. Among his well-known works, Relativity (1966), Image Flesh and Voices (1969), Scape-mates (1972), and Crossings and Meetings (1974) are major achievements of independent film and video art. He has created a number of multi-monitor installation, including Slivers (1977) at The Kitchen and has had other important exhibitions in New York at The Museum of Modern Art and The Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum.

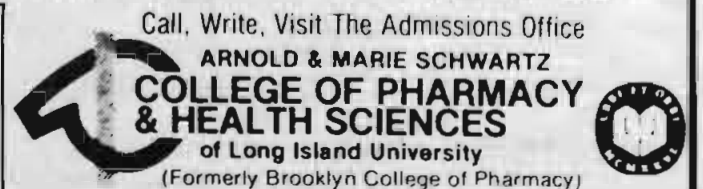

# Theatre

## Laurence Olivier Honored

Laurence Olivier, whose status as this century's greatest and most innovative actor is virtually unchallenged, will be honored at the annual Spring Gala of the Film Society of Lincoln Center on April 25 at Avery Fisher Hall. When he was knighted by King George VI in 1947, he became the youngest actor ever to receive such an honor. In 1970, when Queen Elizabeth II made him a peer of the realm, he became the first actor in history to attain that distinction. As actor, director, producer, Lord Olivier, Sir Laurence, or simply "Larry," as he is called by his peers, has been a substantial, significant force in both theatre and film in an exhilarating career that spans some fifty years.

Laurence Olivier was born in Dorking, England in 1907, the son of a clergyman. He attended St. Edward's Oxford, a public school, and made his stage debut at the age of fifteen, playing Katherina in a boys' performance of "The Taming of the Shrew." He studied acting at the Central School of Speech Training and Dramatic Art in London under Elsie Fogerty. He joined the Birmingham Repertory (1926-28), made his first appearance on Broadway in 1929, and made his film

debut in 1930. His early stage career was fraught with failure and disappointment. A string of seemingly jinxed vehicles was broken in 1930, however, when Noel Coward cast him opposite Gertrude Lawrence and himself in "Private Lives," which created a sensation, first in London and later in New York.

Despite Greta Garbo's refusal to accept him as her leading man in "Queen Christina," within just a few years, through a succession of Shakespearian roles on stage and several romantic portrayals in Hollywood films, including such classics as William Wyler's "Wuthering Heights," Alfred Hitchcock's "Rebecca," and Alexander Korda's "That Hamilton Woman," Olivier emerged as one of the most exciting and versatile actors in the English-speaking world, the movie equivalent of a matinee idol.

During World War II, Olivier served with the Fleet Air Arm of the Royal Navy and made a number of propaganda films. After his discharge in 1944, he was appointed co-director (with Ralph Richardson) of the Old Vic Theatre, which he helped restore to its pre-war glory. In 1946, he directed his first film, "Henry V," which was an

enormous critical success and won him a special Academy Award for his triple triumph as director, producer, and star of the film. His second film, "Hamlet," won the Best Picture and Best Actor awards, as well as a number of other Oscars. Since then, he has received nine Academy Award nominations, plus a special Oscar for "a lifetime of contribution to the art of film."

In the next two decades. He directed two more films. Shakespeare's "Richard III" and "The Prince and the Showgirl," in which he co-starred with Marilyn Monroe. Another stage role that he transferred to the screen was that of Archie Rice in Tony Richardson's presentation of John Osborne's "The Entertainer."

In 1963, he became the director of England's National Theatre Company, and for the next ten years divided his time between administrative, directing, and acting chores. Some of his outstanding performances of that decade are starring roles in "Three Sisters," "Othello," "The Master Builder," "The Dance of Death," "The Merchant of Venice," and "Long Day's Journey Into Night."

Among Lord Olivier's other notable screen appearance are "Fire Over England," "Divorce of Lady X," "Pride and Prejudice," "The 49th Parallel," "Carrie," "The Beggar's Opera," "The Devil's Disciple," "Spartacus," "The Power and the Glory," "Term of Trial," "Uncle Vanya," "Othello," "Oh! What A Lovely War," "Three

Sisters," "Nicholas and Alexandra," "Sleuth," "The Seven-Percent Solution," "Marathon Man," "The Boys From Brazil," "A Little Romance," and "Clash of the Titans."

For his television work, he has received Emmys for "The Moon and Sixpence," "Long Day's Journey Into Night," "Love Among The Ruins," and "Brideshead Revisited."

Recently, Lord Olivier completed the starring role in a Granada British Television production of "King Lear," to be aired next year on both sides of the Atlantic, with an outstanding cast that includes Diana Rigg, Dorothy Tutin, John Hurt, and Colin Blakely. In addition, Olivier's autobiography, "Confessions of an Actor," already printed in Britain, will be published in the U.S. by Simon and Schuster in December.

Divorced from actress Jill Esmond and the late Vivien Leigh, with whom he was teamed in some memorable stage productions, including Shaw's "Caesar and Cleopatra" and Shakespeare's "Antony and Cleopatra," Lord Olivier has been married since 1961 to actress Joan Plowright. They have three children: Richard, Tamsin, and Julie Kate. Olivier has another son, Tarquin, from his first marriage.

Previous film society Gala honorees have included such eminent artists as Charles Chaplin, Fred Astaire, Alfred Hitchcock, Joanne Woodward and Paul Newman, George Cukor, Bob Hope by Woody Allen, John Huston, and Billy Wilder.

## Hockey Team Wins 4 - 2

Though the Wagner College Ice hockey team has not been getting much recognition, they still skate away at a record setting pace to a record setting season. Sunday nights 4-2 win over St. Joseph's College of Pennsylvania boosted Wagner's record to 11 wins and 1 loss. As if the win loss columns are not impressive enough, the seahawks are undefeated in the Metropolitan Collegiate Hockey Conference with a mark of 5 wins and 0 losses and have a lock on first place. Another impressive note is that the Seahawks have just broken a team record for consecutive wins at 10—the old record being 9. December 1st's 7-2 victory over Queens College was also a milestone for Head Coach Tim Cullen, it marked his 100th victory as Head Coach of a collegiate Hockey team. Before Sunday

nights game Wagner's Seahawks went upstate to play in a Sienna tournament which included 4 teams Wagner College, Sienna College, University of Rhode Island, and Stony Brook College—the outcome? Wagner impressively won the tournament with aggressive offense, smart defense and outstanding goaltending and brought back a nice big trophy a some more confidence. Wagner closes out its first half of its season against a tough Southern Connecticut team on Sunday Dec. 12. Action in season so far is 11-1 overall record. 5-0 undefeated in Metropolitan Collegiate Hockey Conference, broke the old record for consecutive wins with its 10th win on Sunday, head coach Tim Cullen's 100th win as a head coach of a collegiate hockey team and Wagner won the Sienna tournament.



## B-ball Splits Two Games

After winning their opening game, the men's basketball team split two games last week, losing to heavily favored Iona 75-69, then beating the College of Staten Island 50-42, making their record 2-1.

As mentioned last week, the Iona game was a major test for Wagner, and although they lost, the fact that they were within six points of a team which finished last year with a 25-6 record gives Coach Neil Kennett a reason to be satisfied with his team's ability, at least for now. In the Iona game, key performances were put in by forwards Art Redmond (19 points, 11 rebounds) and Mike Nelson (16 points, 8 rebounds). Center Larry Clark grabbed 10 rebounds while senior Arvie Powell came off the bench and scored 12 points from the point guard position.

However, it may have been the Iona Contest which caused the Seahawks to let down against CSI, a Division III team. The eight point margin was deceptive of how close the game really was. With two minutes remaining Wagner was leading by a mere point and the Dolphins had control over the tempo of the game. But Wagner pulled through with smart play and when the 6'6" Redmond slammed home an offensive rebound with 30 seconds remaining, to give the Hawks a six point advantage, the game was decided. For the night, Redmond scored ten points, but it was Nelson who led the scoring with 17. Both players hauled in eight rebounds, Bob Mahala and Tom Hogan added eight points each.

The next home game is on the 18th when Manhattan College makes a trip to Sutter Gymnasium. Starting time is 8:00 PM.

## Wrestling

Wally Torrens captured the 142 pound title in the prestigious Rutgers, Camden invitational tournament last Saturday. along with his victory, Torrens also won the outstanding wrestler award. This accomplishment was the first of its kind won by any Wagner wrestler.

Freshmen, Patrick Tatcher competing in his first collegiate wrestling tournament placed first in the 118 pound category. He came back from a three point deficit to tie the match and push it into overtime. During the overtime period Tatcher dominated his opponent and emerged a winner.

Heavyweight, Dominic Saageer provided the final points for his team by pinning his last opponent and placing third. Because of his last victory Saageer was awarded a trophy.

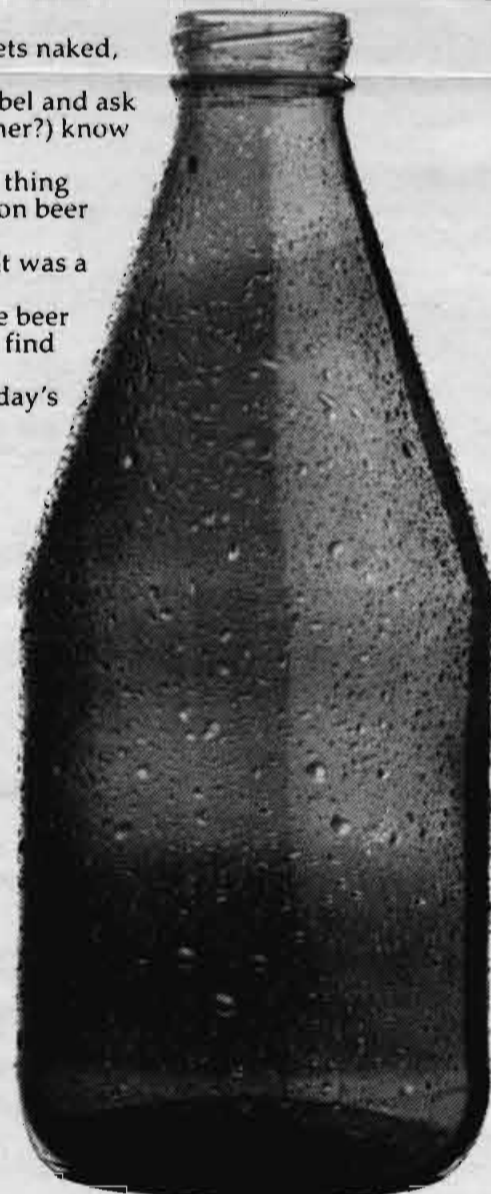
