'You are the people I believe in' says Ali Stroker

New York City singer and actress Ali Stroker made a special visit to share what it is like as the first wheel-chair user Broadway actress. Some may know her from the reality series "The Glee Project" and as Betty on the wildly popular TV show, "Glee,"which finished its run in spring 2015. Stroker's most recent achievement is her portrayal of the character Anna in Deaf West's production of "Spring Awakening."

She entered Spiro 2 on Feb.10 with a Dunkin Donuts iced coffee, a detail that any college student can relate to, but her bubbly and bright personality seemed to dispute the idea that she would even require caffeine. Ali Stroker became paralyzed from the chest down after a car accident at the age of two, but this does not define her. "My chair is part of who I am," she stated, validating its importance as her "secret weapon."

After taking part in a backyard production of "Annie," she knew that she wanted to be an entertainer. The particularly difficult part of her dream was dancing because there were a lot of things she could not do, but she wanted to dance. It was devastating to watch; she "wanted it now." So she decided that she would have to translate herself, just like words. Stroker

would watch and then transform the choreography into something that she could accomplish.

As she rolled back and forth at the front of the room, her stage presence was strong and commanding of everyone's attention. She continued to speak about her journey, revealing that she applied and was accepted for early decision at NYU.

Her dreams were being realized, but there was some opposition from administration on her ability to keep up in dance classes. Stroker would not let someone else's opinion limit her

Her theatrical self-awareness is part of her appeal, and the audience was laughing with her as she recounted different reactions. Throughout the presentation, Stroker reacted to the audience's interest by constantly taking moments to say things like "you are the people I believe in," and "this feels like a room of people who want to see change."

She also recounted her struggle to get auditions in Los Angeles when she moved out there in hopes of being on "Glee." She knew that the series was showcasing all different types of people, but it bothered her that the actor in the wheelchair was not actually a wheelchair user.

So she returned to New York where her "home team" resides, praising the power of support from family, friends and mentors. When

she thought that her dream of being on "Glee" was over, she received a call for an audition to be on "The Glee Project". Thousands auditioned and Stroker was one of 14 contestants selected to compete.

As the second runner up, Stroker credits "The Glee Project" for her reoccurring role on "Glee." This opportunity boosted her fan base, allowing her to market her talent, and it ultimately led to "the most exciting thing that's ever happened," to her: "Spring Awakening." When the Deaf West production was announced for Broadway, Stroker was notified by email in South Africa where she was doing art outreach work.

"I sobbed," she said. She was finally a Broadway actress, and the first in history to be a wheelchair user.

Stoker realized that she could be a voice for her community. She had never seen anyone in wheelchairs on

television or in plays as a child, and with Deaf West's production of "Spring Awakening" and other roles, she hopes to change that. "It is our right to have access, however there is still a lot of work to be done." She took some questions from the audience as well as sharing her talent by singing a song for the audience.

"My limitations are my opportunities," said Stroker. To her, disability is the "strongest reflection of ability."

Commencement speakers: Trump to HONY

celebrity and it was very exciting to have him here."



He had bought her a 15-carat emerald cut House of Graf diamond ring, costing \$3 million. Unfortunately, the future Mrs. Trump did not come to the ceremony, so Wagner students never saw her with or without her ring.

However, Donald Trump was a hit at the commencement ceremony. "I'm a star and there's nothing like it," Trump said, "It beats real estate all the time.'

And he certainly received the star treatment. Students and audience members snapped pictures in Trump's direction and asked him to autograph baseball caps, books and graduation programs.

SGA update: Housing debate settled

From follow-ups to new focuses for the spring, the SGA Town Hall meeting on Feb. 9 covered a range of topics aimed at improving Wagner's experience for students, faculty and staff.

The first order of business was thanking the staff who stayed on campus during Winter Storm Jonas. This group included the dining staff, maintenance workers, power crew and Public Safety.

Residency Requirement

After hearing voiced concerns and opinions from students about Wagner's four year, on-campus housing requirement, the staff came to a compromise. The housing requirement has been changed to three years, allowing senior students to move off campus in their fourth year at Wag-

Laundry Service

A frequently heard complaint at previous board meetings, Wagner has made headway in further developing the laundry systems. The machines will soon allow students to use a credit card swipe instead of quarters. This should take place in a couple of weeks once the college has the wires to implement the system.

Meal Plan Flexibility

Another popular topic during Town Hall meetings, the dining staff is looking to align staffing in their service locations with student class

schedules. The hope is to decrease wait times for food during "rush

Front Desk Attendants

With help from the finance office and improved scheduling, it was stated at the meeting that Wagner now has the capacity to cover all front desk shifts with attendants. In addition, training will be taking place to improve communication with the desk attendants. Maintenance and security have been completing extra rounds to help enforce the college's security measures.

Sprung Floors

This is an issue that was brought to the attention of the staff last semester. Some of the dance floors, namely the aerobics studio, are not sprung to satisfaction. Sprung floors will decrease impact on the athletes and performers using those floors. President Guarasci and VP of Administration Joseph Romano both stressed that the floor in the Main Hall basement is

Students looking for more opportunities to advertise on campus will soon find additional boards for advertisements to be posted on. The priority will be to add the boards in the residence halls and in union. Wagner is currently pricing this.

Emergency Response System

Complaints of the communication

about shuttle services during a recent snow event surfaced during the meeting. Lee Manchester was confident that this will not occur again in future incidents.

Shuttle Service

Inability to predict traffic and shuttle routes during rush hour prompted the conversation of reevaluating hours and times for shuttle services. Public safety supervisor Monica Wohltjen addressed this, noting that the best way to handle this situation is for students to call ahead and request a shuttle to stay behind if the ferry is running late. There are plans to follow this up to see if the shuttles are running correctly based on their guidelines.

Diversity

A core value of Wagner, diversity, was addressed in the meeting by Dean Curtis Wright and VP Ruta Shah-Gordon. They introduced the Declaration of Change, which is a proposition of changes to Wagner's campus to "improve diversity and inclusion relevant to race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, religion, nationality, and ability." Dean Curtis also has plans to take the campus climate surveys recently filled out by students through Wagner's email and, from them, build focus groups and a strategic plan for diversity on campus.



Greek islanders nominated for prize

For months now, over 900,000 Syrian refugees have sought out the safe haven of Greek islands off the coast of the Aegean Sea. On these islands, refugees are welcomed by volunteers who have flocked from all over the world to provide food, shelter, comfort and care for those who are continuing on to other European countries for further asylum.

These efforts on the frontline have not gone unnoticed by the public as now three individuals, who will simply be a representation of the larger group, are nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize. Susan Sarandon, 85-year-old Emilia Kamvisi, and fisherman Stratis Valamios are the three nominees who will be representing the Greek Islands for their sacrificial work.

This nomination is supported by Greece's national government as well as academics from the universities of Oxford, Princeton, Harvard, Cornell and Copenhagen, who drafted the submission in favor of awarding this prize to the Islanders. Right now, Greece is one of the only countries who are not denying refugees and are continuing to open their homes and hearts to those in need.

A global emergency

The Zika virus is an illness with usually mild symptoms including fever, rash, joint pain, and conjunctivitis. Though deaths of those infected with the disease are very rare, there have been connections to those who had been infected with the Zika virus having children with birth defects—specifically microcephaly, which results in an underdeveloped brain. Even though death is a rare outcome for those infected, there is strong suspicion that it is the culprit.

There have also been connections between the Zika virus and a serious neurological condition that can lead to paralysis, known as Guillain-Barre Syndrome.

The virus is spread through mosquito bites. This particular kind of mosquito is very active during the daytime, breeds near stagnant water, and lays eggs that take months to dry out.

Currently there is no vaccine for the Zika virus and more than 20 countries are reporting cases. According to CDC officials, it was sexually transmitted in Texas on Tuesday, February 2. There has also been reported cases in Broward County, Florida.

It can also be transmitted through labor, blood transfusion, and laboratory exposure. The CDC requests \$1.8 billion to fight the Zika virus, and has named Zika a global health emergency.


Apple struggles in more than one product

For the first time since 2003, Apple is predicting a decrease in net revenue for their next fiscal quarter. The company reports that revenue will drop from a high of \$75.9 billion last quarter to roughly \$53 billion. For a short time in the first week of February, Alphabet, Google's parent company, moved ahead of Apple as the most valuable company in the world.

The slowdown in sales is said to be a result of decreased demand, as the widespread adoption of smartphones reaches the limits of its growth. Other factors include lower than expected performance of iPhones in the Chinese market, competition from other tech companies and an economic recession that has hit hard in various countries around the world. iPhones are not Apple's only struggling product. iPad and Mac sales came up 2 million units below projections.

As a result of the revenue predictions, Apple shares dropped by more than five percent to \$94.66 in January.

United States troops stand alongside ukrainian troops during training taking place in Eastern Europe.


U.S. troops in Ukraine

American and Lithuanian troops are training Ukrainian soldiers at a remote training center near Yavoriv. This is part of a 55-day course in preparation for oncoming conflicts with Russia.

The live-fire drills are meant to simulate actual action that might be seen in battle. According to American military leaders, the Ukrainian soldiers are improving quickly. Russia is unhappy about the coalition and accuses American troops of arming the Ukraine's soldiers. The U.S. government claims they only supply protection and medical equipment meant to be used inside the Ukrainian border.

The Joint Multi National Training Group Ukraine, consisting of the US, Canada, and Lithuania, expects to prepare the Ukraine until they can run the training facility independently.

El Chapo on the run

Last July, the drug Iord El Chapo, otherwise known as Joaquin Guzman, made headlines when he escaped Altiplano Federal Prison through a secret channel of tunnels. Even Mexico's most secure prison could not contain the cartel head, who evaded authorities for months. In January, it was revealed that actor and activist Sean Penn, with the help of Mexican actress Kate del Castillo, had set up an interview with El Chapo last October, before he was apprehended by authorities in a raid that took place on Friday, Jan. 8. The interview, which Penn deemed unsuccessful, led to questioning whether or not the criminal was easy to access, scrutinizing the effectiveness of the Mexican authorities. It remains to be seen whether or not El Chapo will attempt another escape, since security has been boosted at Altiplano Federal Prison.

China's slowdown

China's economy is growing at its slowest pace since May 1990. In December and January, their foreign exchange reserves dropped a total of \$197.4 billion, according to central bank data.

Right now, China is in the midst of weakening the value of their currency, the yuan. They have cut interest rates six times and mandatory level of bank reserves five times. This is meant to help stimulate their economy while making their exports cheaper and more enticing to foreign customers.

But the depreciation is causing problems among the world markets. In the first week of 2016, global stocks were down six percent. Economists are worried that trading partners of China will be forced to weaken their currency as well.

China's head policymakers have promised to play less of a role in controlling the value of their currency. Although outflows are high and reserves are low at the moment, it could simply be a result of the Chinese government allowing markets to decide the value of the yuan.

The past year has been significant for women in Hollywood, specifically in regards to equal pay. Many actresses have come forward in hopes of bringing awareness to the wage gap that is prevalent in the film industry.

At last year's Oscars, Patricia Arquette, who won Best Supporting Actress for her role in a film titled "Boyhood", used her speech to speak out on the issue. Arquette concluded her list of thanks with this closing

statement: "To every woman who gave birth, to every taxpayer and citizen of this nation, we have fought for everybody else's equal rights. It's our time to have wage equality once and for all and equal rights for women in the United States of America."

As she spoke, cheers of solidarity and gestures of agreement washed across the audience, even meriting a fist pump from Meryl Streep. The validity of Arquette's sentiments were confirmed by the reaction of the crowd, and sparked a dialogue encouraging actresses and actors to speak openly on the issue.

In October of 2015, Jennifer Lawrence issued an open essay to the

film industry through Lena Dunham's newsletter "Lenny". This letter continues to build on the same ideas presented in Arquette's speech.

In the essay, titled "Why do I Make Less Than My Male Co-Stars?" Lawrence wrote; "All I hear and see all day are men speaking their opinions, and I give mine in the same exact manner, and you would have thought I had said something offensive."

She claims that her unequal pay has been a result of her inability to speak up for herself without seeming like a "spoiled brat". The wage gap became apparent to her after the infamous Sony hack at the end of 2014.

After her letter was posted, Bradley Cooper, one of Lawrence's consistent co-stars, responded to her words. Becoming aware of the wage gap made Cooper believe that actors should be fighting for their co-stars' pay, making sure females are paid equally to their male counterparts.

Comedian Amy Schumer, who has also tackled gender equality in sketches on her show, "Inside Amy Schumer", defends the need for equal pay in the industry.

In 2014, Emma Watson helped launch the "He for She" campaign with the United Nations. This campaign calls for the support of men in the feminist movement – what Wat-

son called a "formal invitation" in her speech – so that we may work together to create a world where every person has equal opportunity regardless of gender.

These public examples of activism for wage equality are important, not just for the film industry, but also for other areas of occupation. If this issue is discussed enough publically and improved upon, it will bring forth the same goals for those outside of Hollywood

From lack of diversity to wage inequality, the dialogue that is created from these issues in Hollywood can be called upon in all aspects of our society.

Advocates hopeful for college student MTA discount

New York Daily News shared news in January that advocates are calling for a 30% discount on monthly MetroCards for college students

An unlimited thirty day MetroCard costs about \$1,400 dollars a year, and \$116.50 a month. Students in kindergarten through 12th grade are granted discounts, but as of yet, college students are not. In the recent months, there has been a lot of talk around advocating for a MetroCard discount for college students as well.

Senator Charles Schumer (yes, he's related to Amy) proposed a bill in Oct. 2015 called the University Transit Rider Innovation Program, or UTRIP. This program would give college students at least a 25 percent discount on MetroCards. This discount would decrease the cost of an unlimited thirty day MetroCard from \$116.50 to \$87.38. In Schumer's proposed plan, the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) would reward the MTA with the money for these discounts. Depending on how responsive the MTA is to Schumer's plan, the discount could be even more than

Schumer said about the proposal, "The point of this legislation is to give college students some relief – because so many are working so hard to pay tuition and are also taking on large amounts of debt to get by – while at the same time working to ensure cash-strapped transit agencies like the MTA don't have to shoulder the burden."

Other advocates in the fight for MTA student discounts is Collegiate Congress, an organization of student association presidents. Collegiate Congress is asking the MTA for a 30 percent discount on MetroCards, to which representatives responded that fare policy would be considered during the conversations about fare hikes in 2017.

While the MTA has stated that in order to consider giving college students a discount, they would need to be assured that they would be paid back. That is exactly what Schumer's UTRIP bill is proposing. According to Schumer's office, the MTA would be offered the following incentives for participating in the program: "The UTRIP program is designed to help 2-year college students, 4-year college students and graduate students access educational programs and facilities by providing the support needed to transit agencies to off-set

the additional costs of providing discounted student fares. In order for transit agencies to be eligible for the funding they must provide a discounted fare of at least 25% to two and four-year college and graduate students. Transit agencies can then use UTRIP funds to help offset revenue losses incurred by providing the discounts."




Different ways to style your dorm


When various students were asked what emojis confused them, there were a few emojis that seemed to be baffling to many.

Let's start with the facts: Deadpool is not a superhero

Yes, Deadpool hails from a Marvel comic series, he has incredible powers, he has a cool suit, and he sometimes falls on the "good" side of the whole superhero/villain conflict, but he's not a superhero. He's a mercenary, a loudmouth with absurd regeneration and a talent with swords, guns and things that go "boom." He is crass, incredibly violent, and above all, incredibly entertaining, which is what makes his first headlining gig in Hollywood so much fun.

For those unaware, Deadpool is a mercenary from the Marvel comics universe, oftentimes seen alongside the X-Men. This film takes place within that series. After being diagnosed with cancer, Wade Wilson takes a risk and effectively becomes a lab rat in hopes of being cured. The experiment proves successful, in that he acquires regenerative abilities which, simultaneously, fight the growing cancer. The bad news is that his physical appearance is utterly tarnished, leaving him looking, as one character puts it "like a scrotum with

teeth." The main drive, for Wilson and for the film, is revenge upon the person who did this to him and reuniting with the woman he loves.

The film is far more clever than the outline above suggests, but it really isn't in the plot of the film that "Deadpool" shines. The plot itself is rather plain, but it can be argued that the purpose of the "origin story" isn't so much to invest the audience in the plot as it is to get them interested in the character. To that end, "Deadpool" is fantastic, treating its plot as nothing more than a means to show why Deadpool is a character worth following.

From the very opening credits, we get a good sense of both the character's and film's sense of humor, listing the director as "An Overpaid Tool," star Ryan Reynolds as "God's Perfect Idiot," and the writers as "The Real Heroes Here." The film carries its sense of humor on its sleeve, poking fun at anything and everything that's relevant, from star Reynolds' career (Paraphrasing: "Do you think he got by on his talent?!") to superhero films both specific (Namely 2011's disastrous "Green Lantern," also starring Reynolds) and as a genre, to digs at cliche (One character

literally suggests that Wilson talk to a suspicious character because "it might move the plot along.") Deadpool himself breaks the fourth wall to address the audience directly multiple times, another element of his character lifted directly out of the comics. It's really in the quips and humorous asides that the film works best, elevating the film from being just another origin story to being incredibly self-aware and owning its source material. Deadpool has never been a "family friendly" character, and the film doesn't shy away from this like many fans had feared it would. Instead, it's a proper adaptation, featuring all the hallmarks of a funny, bloody, sometimes tasteless, and always clever character, taking its R-rating (rare for a "superhero" film) and pushing it to the limit.

While yes, the plot itself isn't anything revelatory, the film manages to sell its title character with incredible ease, making for an incredibly smart, fun, and frantic movie that knows what it is and never tries to be anything else. There's no other character quite like Deadpool, and so there's no other film quite like this one, either.

While Walter White is a name that will forever be ingrained in pop culture as the ultimate anti-hero, he would not have been as successful or memorable without his cohorts. Saul Goodman, played by Bob Odenkirk in "Breaking Bad", was the "criminal" lawyer that aided Heisenberg's crimes, providing legal advice and receiving pay for it. Last February, about a year and a half after "Breaking Bad" ended, Saul received his own spin-off, aptly titled "Better Call Saul". The pilot episode picked up where the other show left off. For any "Breaking Bad" fans, one could say that Saul had predicted his future, but the episode quickly changes setting, rewinding to 2002, a solid six years before Walter White's story picks up.

At this point in time, Saul was known as Jimmy McGill, a struggling lawyer whose office is located in the back of a nail salon. Jimmy is trying to find his way in the legal world, while also looking after his older brother Chuck, who is struggling health wise. The setup of the series is intriguing in its own right, but there are plenty of "Breaking Bad" veterans making appearances as well,

such as fan favorite and "Better Call Saul" series regular Mike Ehrmantraut, played by Jonathan Banks. The second season, which premiered Monday, Feb. 15 at 10 p.m. on AMC only strengthens the foundation from which it was built.

Similar to the pilot, the first episode of the new season starts in the present day and rewinds back to where the finale of the first season left off. At this point, Jimmy has been trying to do everything right, but he is finding that doing the right thing doesn't always pay off. In mid-life crisis fashion, Jimmy McGill finds himself floating in pool, spending his days tanning and contemplating his next move. At the end of the episode he makes a decision that is sure to explain how he became the Saul Goodman we came to know on "Breaking Bad". If you haven't started "Better Call Saul", the first season was just added to Netflix for your binging pleasure. If you have no idea who Saul Goodman is, "Breaking Bad" is available in its entirety on Netflix also. For those who are caught up and need a reminder, "Better Call Saul" airs Mondays at 10 p.m. on AMC.


