## WAGNER TO UNDERGO CHANGES

Wagner's leaders are in the process of making a "Plan to Plan". Although Wagner has routinely reviewed its programs, policies, and future goals in intervals of two to four years, administrators say they are planning to make a more vigorous, long range plan to change Wagner.

To keep up with the inexhaustible needs of today's world, Wagner is opting for a new image. Perhaps the school is just following a new trend again but this time the trend is in higher education. The direction is progressing towards a better Wagner which will be known not only locally but regionally.

The "Plan to Plan" began last summer and is about

mid-way through a six phase research scheme that will hopefully be finished by this May. Although it may take 2-5 years to put the plan into effect, the direction should be set for at least a decade and the effects may not be realized for a long time.

The hope for real change is generated by the use of a more systematic approach to the goal. Secondly, task forces, made up of faculty, administrators, alumnus, and members of the Board of Education, met last week to develop approximately five models of different styles of college systems as well as combination systems that might be beneficial and adaptable to Wagner's future image.

These budding task forces consist of the Planning Leader Group (PLG) and the Planning Advisory Group (PAG). The PLG members consist of Pres. Frank, Vice Pres. Dr. Haaland, Dr. DiRuzza, and Mr. Palmer. The PAG is headed by Dr. Leeseburg and consist of several department heads and faculty members. They have been meeting regularly to review the internal and external information that's been gathered.

Some examples of internal research would include what Wagner students major in, where they come from, who are our faculty members, and what is the quality of our Freshmen classes. External research includes decreases in

population, inflation, curriculum, and objective view points of Wagner's current image.

Today's Wagner breeds well-rounded individuals. Although changes have been made regularly in the past, requirements haven't changed dramatically and have never been stringent. To the contrary, our curriculum has been becoming more adoptive to student needs and wants while simultaneously trying to gear them for the realities of the external community. Note for instance, that although Wagner is a liberal arts college with professional and some graduate programs, most Wagner students major in Eco/Bus with Nursing running a strong second. This is

due to the fact, obviously, that these majors are what students are most interested in and what the students want, they get. Two new majors, Physician Assistant and Gerontology, have just recently been accepted to Wagner's programs. Wagner has also started new trends by reconstructing traditional majors. For example, English now emphasizes the writing and communicating aspects of the subject rather than just the study of classical literature.

Two years ago, six IDS courses were required compared to the four classes required today. We even get to choose some of the IDS courses we want to take. In the near future, Wagner will also be changing its registration procedures to avoid the usual chaos. To create more alternative futures, all programs will be reviewed. This enables Wagner to prepare for

the future by creating a new master plan and perhaps to turn our college into a trend setter instead of a trend follower.

How do you take limited facilities, experience and resources and create a new and improved Wagner? Suggestions include: a co-operative program where every undergraduate student will be required to obtain formal work experience in their prospective fields. Perhaps Wagner will strengthen the popularity of its music, arts and theatre divisions to the way is use to be or become a more selective liberal arts college. Which ever model is decided to mold the new Wagner image, there will be a clearer sense of long-term direction which has been missing here on campus.

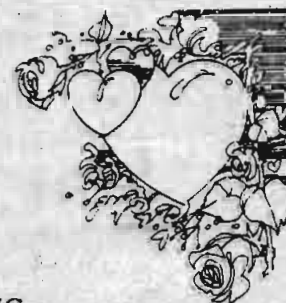

# THE BEAK SPEAKS: BREGENZ



This week the Beak speaks out for a fantastic program that often goes unnoticed here at Wagner College in the United States. I'm talking about the Wagner College Overseas Study Program—BREGENZ.

Let me give you a brief background about the program itself. Bregenz is located in Austria on Lake Constance on the borders of Germany and Switzerland. The town itself is very small; about 3 miles in diameter and all houses are within 15 minutes of the school.

Now a little about the head of the program, Dr. James Mittlestadt. Too much goes unsaid about this man both in

the United States and in Europe. In Bregenz DOC coordinates everything with a very supportive staff behind him. Many people don't realize that a major part of Wagner's ELS program, which brings in a lot of funds to the college, comes directly through the intense efforts of Dr. Mittlestadt both in Asia, and while school is in session in Austria. All semester he must work to get foreign students into the United States, which is not an easy task. He must do all this while maintaining a good repore with both students and faculty.

Though funding for proper advertising of the Bregenz program in the United States

is very low, the Beak hopes this article will serve as an extra means of promotion for this fantastic program. Financially, one summers work can pay for spending money to Bregenz for a semester. Tuition is the same as at Wagner in the U.S. Bregenz can be a one or two semester experience of a lifetime.

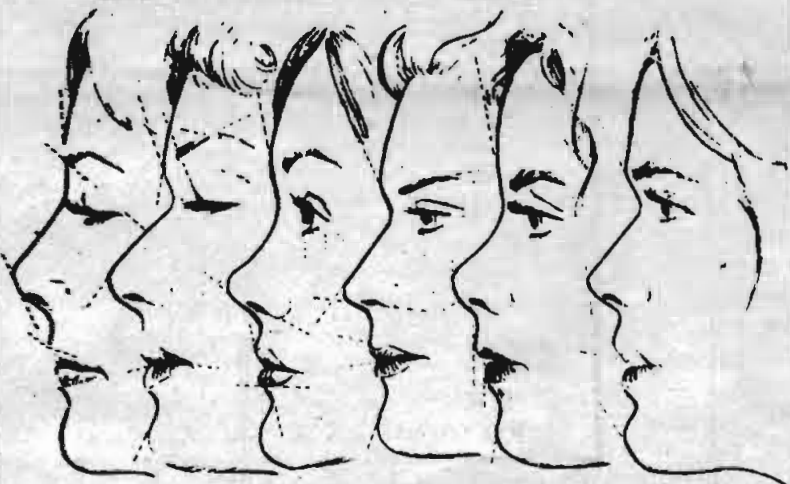
Socially, Every person that you meet in Bregenz you become close to. These people are the ones who share in all the experiences that Europe offers to you. Where else can you experience all this and get Wagner College credit for it?

Academically, Bregenz has achieved a one on one medium between faculty and students,

and also maintained the excellence of Wagner College academia.

Traveling in Europe is a major part of the Bregenz experience. It is possible in one semester to see 7 countries and over 40 cities. ## Boies Creative Writing Award

Undergraduate playwrights, poets and fiction writers will be glad to hear that the Boies Creative Writing Award is at stake once again. The annual award will be given along with a substantial sum of cash to the Wagner College undergraduate student who submits the best work of poetry, fiction, or drama. The Boies Creative Writing Award was established by the family and friends to perpetuate the memory of the late Dr. Jack Boies, a distinguished member of the Wagner College English Department for many years.

Students who wish to take part in the competition should submit their best work in the areas of poetry, fiction or drama by 3:30 pm, Friday March 20, 1987.

The works must be typed

manuscripts and adhere to the following specifications. Poems should be no longer than 15 pages (long poems 6-15 pages or a group of poems with one poem per page with no more than 15 pages). Works of fictions should be between 15-25 pages. A short story or two very brief short stories will be accepted. As will a portion of a larger prose fiction work. Dramatic works should be no longer than 30 pages. A one act play or one act from a larger play is acceptable. All portions of longer works in the categories of drama and fiction should be accompanied by a synopsis of the larger work.

All entries must be the original work of the entrant who must be currently enrolled as a Wagner College Undergraduate. It is important

to know that the members of the Department of Languages and Literature will read the entries "blind" without knowing who wrote them. It is crucial that the entrants name appear only on the cover page which will be removed before the manuscript is read. The members of the department will select what they believe to be the three best entries which will be submitted to an outside reader selected by the family and friends of the late Dr. Boies for the final judgement.

The eventual winner shall receive a cash prize and have his or her name inscribed upon a plaque that is to be displayed in Main Hall. Questions can be answered by any member of the Languages and Literature Department located on the third floor of Parker Hall.

## Expressionism At Wagner

### KADE GALLERY

Wagner's Kade Gallery will exhibit Nikolai Von Kreitor's expressionistic oil paintings during February.

Von Kreitor, who was born in the Soviet Union, received a master's degree from the Art Academy (Poland) and his master's and Ph.D. degrees in sociology from the University of Stockholm/University of Lund (Sweden). Although he teaches sociology at the University of Stockholm, he is on leave through 1987. He has been living in Manhattan and Staten Island —off and on— since 1982. While in New

York, he has continued to paint, and has participated in numerous group and one-man exhibitions. For two consecutive years, 1985 and 1986, his oils were showcased in the Annual Artist Federation Juried Exhibition at Snug Harbor.

The Kade exhibit will feature 18 oil paintings. Von Kreitor's expressionistic paintings adhere architectonically to Russian churches. He presents his emotional reaction to the subject. His bold colors and emphatic lines evoke an intense response from the viewer. Each painting captures

the artist's subjective feeling toward objective reality and the world of the imagination.

In addition to this exhibition, his paintings will be part of group shows in Manhattan. The Morin Miller Gallery at 119 West 57th Street, will exhibit his work beginning January 31, and on February 3 the Sixth Sense Gallery in the East Village will also display his work. He will have a one-man show at Tradition 3,000 on East 10th Street in Manhattan.

The February show at the Kade Gallery opens with a reception from 1 to 3 pm. on Wednesday, February 4. The

show closes on Saturday, February 28. The Gallery, located in the Union Building on the Grymes Hill Campus, is open from Tuesday through Saturday from 11 am. to 4 pm.

The two front men then appeared with me in late November at the Hawk's nest in SAB's first presentation of "College Cafe", an informal, relaxed opportunity for evening people to drink by candlelight and listen to whoever wanted to play onstage master-minded by Paul Ianelli. The three of us played acoustic Led Zeppelin, Beatles, Grateful Dead, and Neil Young while the audience imbibed, talked, and listened to us.

Their next appearance was a few weeks later on December 12th at the Hawks Nest again for the second College Cafe. The two played acoustic Pink Floyd originals, and Neil Young, playing individually and simultaneously.

In the spring, the band once again went electric and returned victoriously to the third and final College Cafe. This time it was in the Gatehouse Lounge. They opened

with The Police, played four originals, and closed with Pink Floyd. After playing a Grateful Dead song with a few others and I, they spontaneously ripped into a crunching set of Pink Floyd and Led Zeppelin closing the whole show down.

After playing a few lounge parties for Doug's fraternity, Phi Mu Alpha, as Bardic Voice, they appeared for the last time that year at the Gatehouse Lounge again. By this time they had changed their name to Heritage (for reasons I won't go into here) as an electric band with drums, and Bardic Voice if the two guitar players would appear as a duo.

The following fall, the trio regrouped to put on an AMAZING Hawk's Nest party for Phi Mu Alpha. The crazed audience HOWLED as the trio, in their usual line-up of Bolivar playing the bass, Principato on the guitar, and Manashowitz on the skins delivered The Who, Jimi Hendrix, Pink Floyd, Black Sabbath, originals, And Led Zeppelin in MADDENING waves of energy that had an astonishing effect on the mesmerized audience.

## Caffeine problems

As the new semester begins we all return to our daily routine of classes, friends, homework and eighteen hour days. As one of everybody's New Year's resolutions we begin to reconsider our study habits. By now, you're heard all about the perils of reaching for a sugar-saturated, caffeine crammed, fat filled snack for quick energy or a concentration boost. In considering these so-called "bad snacks", one must remember that the effects of many quick energy snacks are short and habit forming, actually leaving you feeling more tired when they wear off.

Caffeine is a stimulant found in the leaves, fruits, seeds and barks of various plants. It acts directly on the cells of your brain and spinal cord which increases your blood pressure and heart rate as well as making blood vessels constrict. Caffeine temporarily gives you a clearer and more rapid flow of thoughts and relieves drowsiness. However, too much of this drug can leave you irritable and jittery making

work that requires a steady hand more difficult. Caffeine is found in coffee, tea, and colas in smaller quantities.

You may think that you need a morning donut or late-afternoon chocolate bar to get through the day but sweets are only uplifting for a short period of time. They raise your blood-sugar level which gives you a big rush of energy that lasts fifteen to twenty minutes. If you want to try a snack that will provide a long-term lift, try a piece of fruit which contains natural sugars.

Energy seekers sometimes turn to alcohol for a late-afternoon or happy-hour pick up. A beer or any alcoholic beverage might make you feel awake yet it actually depresses your central nervous system. The more you drink, the more relaxed or tired you will begin to feel.

Remember; caffeine, sweets and alcohol are all stimulants which are not a very healthy alternative to sleep. A proper diet and regular exercise will be a good substitute for artificial stimulants.

## Career Services and You

### DRUG TESTING

Nearly 30 percent of employers of new college graduates now screen job applicants for drug use, and another 20 percent plan to begin the practice within the next two years, according to a new study by the College Placement Council, Inc.

Of the 497 national employers surveyed, 140 (28.2 percent) said drug screening, usually including urinalysis, was required of prospective employees. Almost all employers with screening programs tested for both marijuana (97.9 percent) and hard drugs (98.6 percent).

Employers ranked safety as the top reason for establishing drug screening programs, selecting it nearly four times more often than security, which ranked second. In aerospace (8.6 percent); and petroleum and allied products (7.9 percent).

Employers that did not expect to begin drug or alcohol screening in the near future most often cited philosophical reasons, followed by legal, ethical, cost, and union considerations.

The survey was distributed to nearly 1,200 employer members of the College Placement Council to

descending order of importance, other reasons included quality/reliability of products; quality of service; increased productivity; control of medical costs; and law, government, or noncompany regulations.

The majority of employers that required drug screening (70.7 percent) said they notified college applicants in advance that screening was required. Thirty-six percent said they notified applicants during the initial interview and 20 percent during secondary or follow-up interviews.

Of the 140 employers that reported screening programs, the highest percentages were in the following industries: utilities (37.1 percent); chemicals, drugs, and allied products (9.3 percent); determine current drug screening practices.

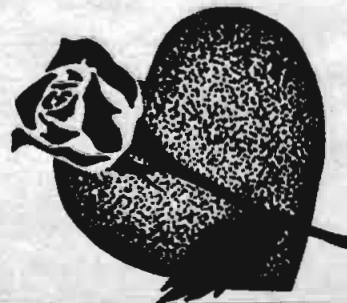

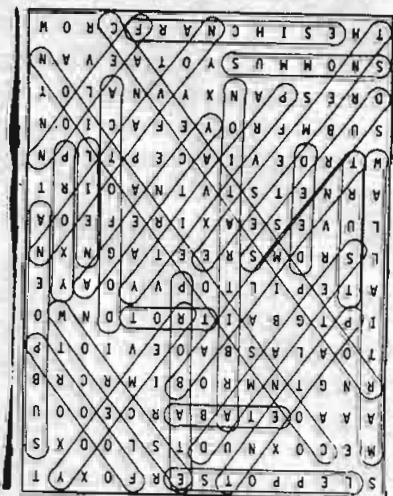
