After two years' attendance at the University of Minnesota, he completed his graduation work at Fargo College which awarded him bacelected as Rhodes Scholar from North Dakots and studied in St. John's College, Oxford from 1920 to 1922, taking his B. These girls are doing good work. Their programs are fun, they are interesting, they are good for us and good for Wagner. Let's go!


Somebidy has suggested that an organization for Wagner men be in-
