Ferry terminal construction forces Wagner to move shuttle drop-off location

Be prepared!

You may want to consider getting ready to run when the ferry docks in the St. George terminal, as it will take you a few extra minutes to make it to the shuttle back to campus this semester.

As part of the Staten Island Ferry Terminal rehabilitation project which began last November, the Wagner shuttle drop off and pick up location at the terminal has been moved until further notice.

The north ramp, which shuttles had been using to pick up students at the bottom of the Grand Staircase, has been torn down by construction crews. The new pick up and drop off location is at an MTA bus stop on Richmond Terrace across from Borough Hall.

Director of Public Safety Anthony Martinesi said he does not know how long the shuttle change will be in effect but assures students the change was not Wagner's choice. "The ferry terminal management controls the area assigned for drop off and pick up, Wagner does not."

When asked about the distance of the new location in relation to the terminal Martinesi said, "The van

schedule in place compliments the ferry schedule. I cannot guarantee a student, just like any other transportation service, will make perfect connections."

Senior Matt DeZarlo who is a frequent shuttle rider sees the change as an added stress on students. "If the ferry is late you are screwed. The shuttle won't wait. Then I think to myself, great I'm not going to get back for another hour. It would be

better off if the shuttle was more flexible in their schedule to accommodate students."

DeZarlo thinks Wagner needs to make more of an effort to be flexible with students and the ferry schedule. "It's a solid five minute walk now getting to the shuttle after the ferry. There needs to be better communication. They need a way for the drivers to know if the ferry is running late or backed up. The ferry does have a

schedule but it is almost always wrong. There are always delays."

Martinesi explained that Wagner does have a system in place students can use to help when they are on a delayed ferry. "When students call ahead about a late ferry arrival a radio transmission is given to the driver to wait if he is not filled to capacity."

Senior Katie Welch, a full time intern at Radio City Music Hall, takes the shuttle everyday to get to her in-

ternship. She feels the new location is inconvenient but doesn't believe it's Wagner's fault or that students should be blame the school. "It's not like they chose to change the location. They are doing construction so there is nowhere else for the shuttle to go. It just stinks for everyone now...there is nothing we can do about it."

In regards to the new pick up and drop off spot, Welch, a native Staten Islander, doesn't think it is in the best area. "I can see why people would be uncomfortable," she says.

The added distance between the terminal and the pickup location of the shuttle is another one of Welch's concerns. "It's a little bit hard now that it's parked far because it still leaves at the same time. You have that extra part to walk or run to make it before the shuttle leaves."

Vice President of SGA Ashley Korbey recently spoke with a shuttle driver about the change and explained they are aware of the new burden it causes on students. She said it is important for students to understand "this could be a change that is in effect until next year" because of all the construction that is taking place, and that Wagner is willing to work with the students to make sure their commute is as smooth as possible.

"It is a free service so there is not much you can do. You just want it to work," DeZarlo adds.

Hawk's Nest evacuated after freak gas leak

A loud crash, a big flame and the powerful hiss of gas leaking rapidly inside of the Hawk's Nest led to a swift evacuation last Saturday evening.

An unknown refrigerator malfunction led to the leak of Freon gas in the Starbucks area of the eatery; but luckily, there were only a few students in the Hawk's Nest at the time and no one was injured in any way.

Once the issue was identified as a gas leak, Food Services Manager Tony, made sure everyone evacuated the space and immediately notified public safety about the incident. He then got in touch with Assistant Director of Dining Services Jason Seavey, who notified the Senior Director Robert Soltmann. "I was very impressed with Tony," said Soltmann, "Everyone did exactly what

they were supposed to do."

No food was contaminated by the gas, but the Hawk's Nest was closed for the rest of the night. Once the space was aerated and inspected, it was able to reopen at the normal time on Sunday morning. The fire department was not involved.

The refrigerator company came to campus on Wednesday to investigate the cause of the leak, but the evaluation was inconclusive. "We were unable to confirm the cause today, the vendor took the unit apart, looked at the damaged parts and confirmed where the flame originated," said Soltmann in an email. The dining services team is still unsure what caused the leak, but suspects an electrical malfunction.

"It was shocking and everyone seemed a little frazzled at first, but they moved us out of there pretty quickly," said Brandi Adduce, a senior who grabbed her dinner to-go just before the incident.

Summer program in Peru offers learning ... and surfing

The opportunity to travel to Peru this summer isn't only for those interested in anthropology. You can learn to surf too, while experiencing another culture.

Alicia Boswell, a doctoral student at the University of California, San Diego, and friend of Dr. Celeste Gagnon, professor of anthropology, is working on a project in Callambay, Peru, and is looking for student volunteers to help with her research.

Student volunteers will teach health and English classes at the local school, work on archeological digs, build latrines for families and conduct public health surveys in homes in the area

Students do not have to be anthropology majors to take part in the fiveweek experience. The time spent abroad in Peru can count toward the mandatory 100 hours for an internship.

"[The program] has potential to bring together students with a lot of different interests," says Dr. Gagnon.

Students begin their experience in Trujllo and continue to Callambay. On the weekends, time will be spent in Huanchaco visiting ancient archaeological sites — and surfing.

The program begins July 6 and runs through Aug. 10. The estimated cost of the trip is \$2,120 which covers lodging, three meals per day for six days a week, fees for sights and

museums, and instruction.

The cost of airfare, Sunday meals, laundry, passport fees, transportation to Huanchaco and personal expenses are not coyered.

Interested students must be over 18 and do not need to be fluent in Spanish. There are no prerequisites.

"It will be a great opportunity," says Dr. Gagnon.

Seniors Rose Tobiassen and Violeta Capric spent this past summer in Peru examining skeletal remains with Gagnon during the week and spent time surfing on weekends.

According to Tobiassen, the experience is not what anyone would ex-



IT blog offers advice, news, feedback

Wagner's Information Technology (IT) department has a new blog, established in early January. The blog promises to supply updated information regarding IT. and to occasionally highlight student questions regarding popular on-campus concerns. The blog is updated regularly by Associate Provost Dilawar Grewal.

Several entries have been posted to the blog already, all of which provide detailed information for students and staff about service changes on campus. Entries include a notification about a training session for Wagner's newly implemented phone system, and a detailed explanation of the plan for acquiring new printers throughout Wagner's library and computer labs.

Another blog post details Grewal's plan of action for the IT department. One of his objectives, as stated in the Jan. 19 post, is for the "services to be consistent, predictable, and above reproach. Whenever there is a cause for reproach, I want everybody to know exactly the process to escalate the issue in order to generate a chance at redress for each step of escalation."

Also included in the post are a list of the steps Grewal and the department plan to take in order to increase both employee and student satisfaction with IT's performance. Eight

steps are outfined, including "establish[ing] communication touch points where both IT and IT service users can contribute ideas to better the system performance, as well as user and service provider satisfaction."

Grewal encourages students to contact him with problems or questions, and the most recent post from Jan. 20 addresses a common frustration among the student body.

A student identified as MG is quoted on the blog asking about the slow speed of wireless on campus. especially in residence halls. Grewal provides a detailed answer and explanation of the issue, which is that as more and more students connect to the wireless Access Point in a particular location, the speed gets slower and slower because everybody is sharing the same bandwidth and getting a smaller and smaller slice of it." Although Grewal's answer is not a solution to the problem, it is a concise explanation of the issue so the studen body has a source of open communication about their problems.

Program spotlights sex-trade horrors

It is not every day you hear a nun talking about sex.

It happened last Saturday, Jan. 28, when the Staten Island branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) hosted a meeting on campus featuring Sister Rosemary Sullivan.

She spoke to AAUW members and Wagner students about the harsh realities of the human sex trade, trafficking and slavery.

Sister Sullivan informed attendees that, contrary to popular belief, human slavery is still in existence all across the world, including here in the United States. She continued to explain the various types of human trafficking and slavery that occur: domestic jobs, various forms of labor (such as in sweat shops), and prosti-

According to current statistics, 98 percent of children and young adults involved in sex trafficking and prostitution are female, while only 2 percent are male. However, many estimate that these numbers are slowly beginning to change.

Males who are trafficked usually face harsher labor than females, such as working in mines. Those who

work in the mines never see daylight, since they enter the mines early in the morning and do not come back up until late at night, causing many health problems.

Five Wagner students were in attendance at the event, representing a current special topics honors class, the History of International Human Rights, taught by Professor Abena

"I found the event to be quite interesting. In our world today, we know that slavery was abolished, but human trafficking is a modern-day form of slavery that we must not ignore. A frightening aspect of the reality-check that I received on Saturday was the fact that there are numerous forms of trafficking that are currently rampant in certain parts of America," said junior Bareah Alam.

The presentation concluded with ways anyone can help stop human trafficking. Spreading the word and sharing knowledge is the quickest and easiest way. Sister Sullivan offered attendees postcards, encouraging them to mail a message to the governor of Indianapolis, the location of the upcoming Super Bowl, since female sex trafficking is in high numbers during large male-dominated sports events. Publishing: A new chapter

Over the past few years, e-books have unfortunately begun to take a toll on book publishing, changing the beloved industry indefinitely.

The technology takeover is nothing new. We are glued to our iPhones, laptops, TVs; and more recently, contraptions known as ebooks have seemingly taken over the world. As a book lover and an intern for Abrams Books, I am adamant about my disdain for ebooks and their havoc on the print publishing industry.

Digital technologies such as the Kindle, the iPad and the Nook have greatly changed the publishing industry; they allow readers with a credit card and a computer to buy and download books while barely moving a muscle. E-books are not new, yet their popularity is quickly deteriorating the publishing industry.

In 2007, Amazon introduced the Kindle book reader. Since its release, it has outsold hardcover books, and Amazon CEO Jeff Bezos has predicted that Kindles will surpass the sell of paperback books this year. With the Kindle boom, a massive transformation is taking place in the long-standing publishing industry, which has been operating for over 500 years.

Companies such as Borders have already lost the battle against the metamorphosis in the industry - Barnes and Noble paid \$13.9 million for Borders' brand name, website, and customer loyalty list. The customer list consists of millions of names, email addresses, home addresses, phone numbers and purchase information.

William Lynch, Barnes and Noble's CEO, wrote, "We are readers like you, and hope that through our stores, Nook devices, and our bn.com online bookstore we can win your trust and provide you with a place to read and shop" in an email to over 40 million Borders customers.

Unfortunately, just three months after buying Borders, Barnes and Noble is standing on shaky ground.

In the first issue of Publishers Weekly this year, co-editorial director, Jim Milliot wrote an article entitled "Barnes & Noble May Spin Off Nook Business." In his article, Milliot states that Barnes and Noble is not only looking to sell Sterling Publishing, but also wants to put Nook into its own company.

In response to this rumor, Lynch said, "in order to capitalize on the rapid growth of the Nook digital business and its favorable leadership position in the expanding market for digital content, the Company has decided to pursue strategic exploratory work to separate the Nook business."

For 2012, the Nook business is anticipated to generate approximately \$1.5 billion. If Nook becomes a separate company, it will be comprised of four categories: devices, digital content (including e-books, textbooks, etc.), accessories, and warranties and extended service plans.

Although the Nook business has been doing well, the high investment for development has cut into the company's profits, as did the Nook Touch, which did not accumulate as high profits as was expected. As a result of this, B&N's carnings for the year dropped from \$210-\$250 million to \$150-\$180 million. This drop led the bookseller to seek out partners to help lead to an expansion of the Nook business.

Digital publishing has taken the world by storm. People cannot get their hands on devices such as Nooks, Kindles and iPads fast enough. The drive for more readily available technology is not by any means slowing down.

Even I am guilty of wanting more high-tech devices - I am enamored by my iPhone. However, I think we need to stop for a moment and consider what this technology is doing to the publishing industry.

For me, there is nothing comparable to holding a book in my hands, or running my fingers along the text or tucking my nose into its pages to smell the scent of paper, ink and age.

The fight against rising textbook prices

As you check your bank account and realize you cannot put gas into your car or buy groceries, remember that a new semester has begun. Every student suffers from the ever rising costs of textbooks. Just last year, the College Board reported that students spend an average of \$1,000 on books and supplies.

When thinking about a college education, students are never truly warned about the extra thousand dollars needed each year. Many students take out loans or work multiple jobs to reach the total tuition on their college bill, but that bill fails to calculate the fact that your books may end up needing their own loan.

I knew that a college education would cost me an unfathomable amount. As a result, I applied for numerous scholarships. I was so thankful and relieved to have so much of my tuition taken care of without having loans big enough to buy me a house. I failed to remember that text-books were still awaiting my Visa.

According to a survey by the U.S. Public Interest Research Group,

seven out of 10 college students stated that they chose not to buy a textbook because of its cost. It seems that the publishers' need to make a profit is compromising the students' education.

Additionally, statistics show that over the last four years there has been a 22 percent price increase in text-books, which, based on the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, is more than four times the rate of inflation. I know that there are bigger problems with today's economy and its rising prices, yet it would not hurt to start somewhere small.

Although I am thankful that the internet offers numerous textbooks at significantly lower costs, I believe schools should offer those same low prices and include those books in tuition. If students knew they would receive the best price and it was calculated into their tuition, not only would there be considerably less stress at the beginning of each semester, but students would have the option to have books covered by scholarships or loans, rather than from their pockets. It would also guarantee the right books are waiting for you when you return to school.

However, I am well aware this may never happen. In the meantime,

I will give my support to a group called the Textbook Rebels. They are an organization petitioning to have the publishing companies cease the unnecessary production of pricey new editions. The group is also striving for schools to adopt open textbooks online for access to all students. In my opinion, if they reach all their goals, the value of education could be restored, and not have such a high price.

Wagner attempts to help their students by offering a 10 percent discount on textbooks if theirr tuition is paid. Unfortunately, this semester, the book store was not provided with the list of students. As a result, students are required to go the business office for help. While I appreciate this thoughtful discount, I believe as students we deserve more. Not to mention, not everyone is capable of paying their tuition in full at the start of every semester.

Whether a new book or used book. a rental or an e-book, prices remain high and remain on the rise. As students there is only so much we can do. 'Pray the gay away'

With the legalization of gay marriage across the U.S., the Grand Old Party (GOP) candidates don't stand a chance.

A few weeks ago, GOP primary candidate Rick Santorum was asked by a New Hampshire college student to explain why he objected to allowing two men the same marriage rights as a heterosexual couple. "Well, what about three men?" Santorum retorted. The crowd—mostly young and largely conservative—replied with vicious booing.

Unfortunately for young conservatives. Santorum's social views are painfully ubiquitous in the GOP. Rick Perry has been an openly enthusiastic supporter of "pray the gay away" camps in his home state of Texas and has aired notorious TV ads pointing the repeal of Don't Ask Don't Tell as a sign of American cultural decay.

Much to the chagrin of satirists like Jon Stewart, Newt Gingrich and his wife/former mistress strongly support the sanctity of "traditional marriage"—the right has finally realized that it's easier to be in favor of "traditional marriage" than to be opposed to equal rights.

Mitt Romney too has taken up the

rhetoric of "tradition." Romney, the tentative favorite to win the nomination, who courted the votes of gays while running for governor of Massachusetts in an aggressive flip, has flopped back to the small-towny discomfort with LGBTQ rights currently in vogue for Republicans.

However, despite spouting the party dogma, Romney has managed to hang on the reluctant endorsements of conservative LGBTQ groups like the GOProud and the Log Cabin Republicans.

At best, libertarian Ron Paul, the patron saint of cigarette smoking young men in esoteric T-shirts, insists that states should be allowed to decide on marriage-equality policies for themselves—hardy a hopeful prospect for the southern LGBTQ community. The folksy bigotry of the mainstream Republican Party plays well in the primaries, where the home-schooling Christian right and the Tea Party have a disproportionate leverage.

However, if the culture wars are pushed into the spotlight on the national stage, as I believe Obama hopes they will be, conservative prudishness about the civil liberties of gay Americans may calcify the disillusioned left, and away frighten the a socially moderate center.

Young Republicans are faced with a choice: compromise on social issues as well as risk massive cuts to student lending programs, or vote for the Democrat.

Romney, assuming he gets the nomination, will carry a good chunk of them away from Obama—who is frustratingly vague about his own position on gay rights. I think many will stay with the Democrats, especially if Obama finally takes a concrete position in favor of marriage equality. He supported gay marriage while in Illinois, but has been weakly feigning ambivalence ever since.

The Republicans cannot win a national election with only their base. Ultimately, the GOP risks alienating a sizable youth vote which is convincingly up-for-grabs.

Inevitably, it will depend on the course of the national conversation. If the economy shows convincing signs of improvement, conservative ammunition against the president will be largely depleted and the right may have to lean on its cultural agenda to garner the support of its lower-class white base. If the likes of Santorum are made publicly accountable for comparing homosexuality to bestiality and pedophilia it will have seriously repercussions on Election Day. One can only hope...



Death toll hits 17 in cruise ship disaster off Italy coast

Italian divers have found the body of a woman in the wreck of the cruise ship Costa Concordia, bringing the number of deaths to 13.

Rescue workers are still looking for 20 people who are believed to be missing.

The cruise ship sank on Jan. 13, after hitting rocks near the island of Giglio, off the coast of Tuscany.

Only 8 of the 13 bodies discovered have been identified.

4 victims were French, 1 Italian, 1 Hungarian, 1 Hispanic, and 1 German.

There were known to be 4,200 passengers on board the cruise ship at the time of danger.

The captain, Francesco Schettino, is being detained under house arrest while his actions are being investigated.

He is accused of multiple manslaughter, causing a shipwreck, and abandoning ship before all passengers were evacuated. He denies

these allegations.

Prosecutors say the 57 year-old was sailing too close to the island of Giglio on an unauthorized course in order to perform a "salute" – a greeting to islanders.

The Italian media has received a new recording in which Capt. Schettino appears to say he will be the last to leave the ship.

In a previously released tape, an official is heard repeatedly ordering him back on board.

The deputy mayor of Giglio, Mario Pellegrini, has claimed that while on board he never saw the captain of the ship helping remove passengers

At 9:30 pm on Jan. 13, the cruise ship hit a patch of rocks off the coast of Giglio. An hour later, confused passengers were given the abandon

As passengers began to go ashore, some called the police telling them that there was a problem with the ship

As Coast Guard responded to the calls, the crew told them the ship was experiencing a blackout and that they

were checking conditions on board.

Most passengers were rescued by lifeboats, but as the ship started to tilt the Coast Guard started removing passengers by helicopter.

At this point, the captain evacuated on a lifeboat, before all of the passengers had been rescued.

The captain later told officials that the rocks were not marked on maps. nor detected by navigational systems.

He admitted "making a navigational error", and told officials that he "ordered a turn too late".

Coast Guard and Navy divers have been exploring submerged areas of the vessel using explosives as an effort to find victims unaccounted for.

Emergency officials said they would not end the search until the whole ship had been examined.

More than 600 members of the Italian emergency services are working on the search operation.

BBC correspondents say they are under time pressure, amid fears the ship could slip off a ledge into deeper water with a risk of fuel tanks being reptured.

GOP debates continue; Romney recieves criticism

As we near closer to the 2012 presidential election, we are left with only four Republican candidates in the race.

So far this year, Rick Santorum has won the lowa primary with 24.6 percent of votes with Mitt Romney in a very close second.

Romney won the New Hampshire primary with 39.3 percent of votes, with Newt Gingrich winning the South Carolina primary with 40.4 percent of votes.

Most recently, Romney won the Florida primary with 46.4 percent of votes. Gingrich came in second. Santorum in third, and Ron Paul in last place. Paul is the only candidate who hasn't won a primary.

The only candidate who hasn't won a primary yet is Ron Paul.

When Rick Perry dropped out of the race, he decided to endorse Paul, but has only helped raise his votes about 4 percent.

In the most recent Florida debate, it became a two-man battle between Mitt Romney and Newt Gingrich. Rick Santorum, who is strapped for funds, said he couldn't keep up with the other two in Florida, and took a short break from campaigning.

Interestingly, Romney's opponents have tried to keep focus on Romney's tax returns, which showed that he made \$21.6 million in 2010. It also showed a 13.9 percent tax rate on Romney's income. Romney also received criticism regarding the fact

that more than half of his income is from capital gains and dividends, which are taxed less than ordinary income.

Romney donated \$7 million to charity in the past two years, including \$4.1 million to the Mormon Church

Romney and his wife, Ann, released the tax returns to prove they have satisfied their obligations as tax payers. Ben Ginsberg, Romney's campaign attorney, said, "Governor Romney has paid 100 percent of what he owes."

However, Romney's tax returns are not the only criticism he is receiving. On Jan. 29, Newt Gingrich accused the former Massachusetts governor of running a dishonest campaign.

He believes that Romney is covering up some "liberal stances" that he took while governor.

These accusations came just before the Florida primary, in which both are front-runners.

In particular, Gingrich stated that Romney's claim that he had never voted for a Democrat when a Republican was on the ballot, is false. To Gingrich, a question of honesty raises questions about Romney's ability to become president.

This kind of back and forth campaign rhetoric is making Republicans nervous that fighting within the party will only aid President Obama in his chance of re-election.

The Maine and Nevada Caucuses take place tomorrow, followed by the Colorado and Minnesota Caucuses on Feb. 7.

As London readies for the Summer Olympics, concerns are raised about public transportation

Ringing in the New Year has a different meaning for people all around the world. For some, it meant the eneroaching possibility of the end of the world, for others, a new beginning.

For London's Olympic organizing committee, it meant hosting the Summer Olympics was finally here.

With less than 200 days to go, London is the first city to host the Olympic Games for the third time, after previous hosting the games in 1908 and in 1948.

London was officially awarded the hosting job at the International Olympic Committee vote in Singapore, where it defeated Paris in July f 2005.

The city has spent the last seven years preparing for this world class event. Most of the sites have been built and are ready for 10,000 athletes from more than 200 countries to come together for 16 days of competition in 26 sports and 300 medal events.

The goal of organizers in hosting this urban spectacle specifically is to provide transportation to sporting events around the city via public transportation, or by walking and cycling.

In order to achieve this goal, a free "Games Traveleard" will be provided to ticket holders for the day of their event. The traveleard will allow access to the Tube, buses, London Overground, National Rail Services,

and Docklands Light Railway, on the London transport network.

Specific cycling routes have also been cleared and mapped for the event.

London has experienced quite a few challenges during these past few years of preparation. Homegrown bombers killed 52 people in the city's public underground and bus network-the day after London was awarded the games.

Several instances of terrorist bombings have since occurred in public places throughout London, like air ports and train stations. Upon its nomination, London, along with the rest of the world was also in a much better economic circumstance.

Costs associated with the transportation improvements necessary to

accommodate the influx of athletes and tourists, along with the budget needed for the construction of sporting facilities has strained the city financially, drawing criticism from local Londoners, who worry that the increase of people the games are sure to bring will strain the already bustling transportation network.

In addition to the regular crop of tourists, and West End Theater audiences the city already draws during the summer months, this summer is sure to test the limits of the city's transportation system.

What can we expect? Tickets have already gone on sale, and are selling fast. There are a number of events that are free of charge, and promise to be captivating provided that you get there early enough to secure a

good spot.

These events include the men's and women's marathon, 20 km racewalk, triathlon, cycling road race, individual road cycling time trials, and the men's 50km race walk.

The London cultural festival also promises to host world class artists, performers and orchestra's from around the world.

Not traveling to London this summer? For viewers with 3D television sets, Panasonic and NBC have announced that they will be broadcasting the games in 3D.

The games have done much to improve the transportation infrastructure of London. These technological advancements will undoubtedly stay with London for years to come.

While most people were relaxing and enjoying their care-free winter break, the baseball team received word of a serious issue that would change the game of Wagner baseball.


With the spring season soon approaching, Head Coach Joe Litterio has chosen to leave the team.

Return to his alma mater

Litterio has coached the baseball team at Wagner for over 12 years.

He received an offer to work as an assistant baseball coach at Rutgers

University and took the job.

"It's a unique opportunity for me," Litterio comments.

Litterio graduated from Rutgers in 1994 and played under Fred Hill, who is now the head baseball coach at Rutgers. The two will now be colleagues.

Although Litterio will not get a head coaching position equivalent to his current Wagner post, he is not concerned.

"I get a chance to learn more from a future Hall of Fame coach," he states.

Leaving his mark

Litterio has impacted the program tremendously since he arrived at Wagner in 2000. He was only in his first year of coaching when he took the team to its first ever NEC Championship.

He has directed eight players to the Major Leagues, including current Red Sox pitcher, 2009 American League Rookie of the Year and MLB All-Star, Andrew Bailey.

Starting in 2004 Litterio led the Seahawks to six out of seven playoffs. Within that seven-year streak, Litterio led the Green and White to its first NEC Regular Season Championship in 2009.

During that season the program record of 31 wins was achieved. It was also in 2009 that he earned NEC Coach of the Year.

Athletic Director Walt Hameline comments, "Wagner serves as almost a stepping stone for young coaches. He put himself in a great position."

Litterio holds 240 wins, marking the most wins in Wagner history.

"We were lucky to have him for as long as we did" states Hameline, "Joe did a great job and was successful."

Litterio explains, "The kids understand that this is something that happens within college sports."

"We are happy for him and will miss him," claims Hameline.

Next up to bat

The athletic department has gone through several resumes and contacted multiple eligible replacements. On Wed, Feb. 3, they announced that Jim Carone, who previously served as the pitching coach at Villanova, will be the new baseball head coach.



They received the top three spots while Kalibat earned a time of 1:43.05 earning her first place. Sweeney and Sides continued to rack up the points for the remainder of the meet awarding a gold medal to Sweeney in the 100-yard backstroke, followed by Sides who finished third with a time of 1:02.75.

Freshman Lynn Tay won a time of 25.42 in the 50-yard freestyle and following close behind was Sarah Menendez who placed third with a time of 25.56. Sophomore Meredith Ketchmark reserved her own first place position in the 100-yard freestyle with a 54.05, Menendez kept up her second place streak cutting a close time of 54.37. Sweeney was once again victorious receiving a first place spot in the 200-yard backstroke followed up by Kalibat's second place earning.

Contributing points to Wagner's score were members of the diving team. Freshman Mallory Lee scored

Cooney and Kalibat held onto second and third place spots in the 500 freestyle, Ketchmark and Gibbons did the same in the 100 butterfly. With two events remaining the score was tied 138 each.

Thomas did her best to keep Wagner afloat winning second place in the 200 yard individual medley relay but URI's 400 yard freestyle relay team received another Wagner Pool record ultimately ending in their victory.

Senior Captain Breanne Sweeney said, "This past weekend was huge

for our program. We raced against a team that is in a very competitive conference and has double the amount of girls as us. We knew we had a solid shot at winning, but the stakes were even higher because of our coaches history with URI. 
