## Distribution Requirements Passed

In a vote on April 10 of faculty members and administrators, the revised curriculum requirements were passed. They will become effective in September of 1985.

The new proposal, created by the Academic Development Committee, was passed by a vote of 29 in favor to 24 against.

The Academic Development Committee constructed the new proposal over a three year period. Dr. Lynes was the chairperson for this committee for two and three-quarter years. Dr. Gaffney took over the Chairmanship of the committee two months ago.

The proposal was presented to the faculty by individual faculty members who had specialized in understanding and developing the separate parts of the

proposal. Dr. Rappaport spoke on the nine areas of distribution requirements; Dr. Lynes spoke on the system of crossovers; Dr. Scholz discussed the proposed IDS changes; and Dr. Volland discussed the new "Tier" system.

The nine areas of distribution requirements were divided as follows:

- 1.) The study of Physical Science--4 credits including a laboratory.
- 2.) The study of Life Science--4 credits including a laboratory.
- 3.) The study of Mathematics and Computers--3 credits.
- 4.) The study of Human Behavior--6 credits.
- 5.) The study of Human History -- 3 credits
- 6.) The study of Literature--3 credits.
- 7.) The study of Philosophy and Religion--3 credits.
- 8.) The study of Foreign

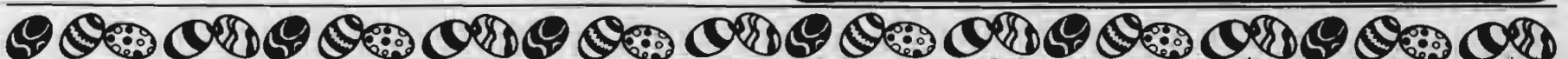

## Tom Parks Leaves 'em Laughing

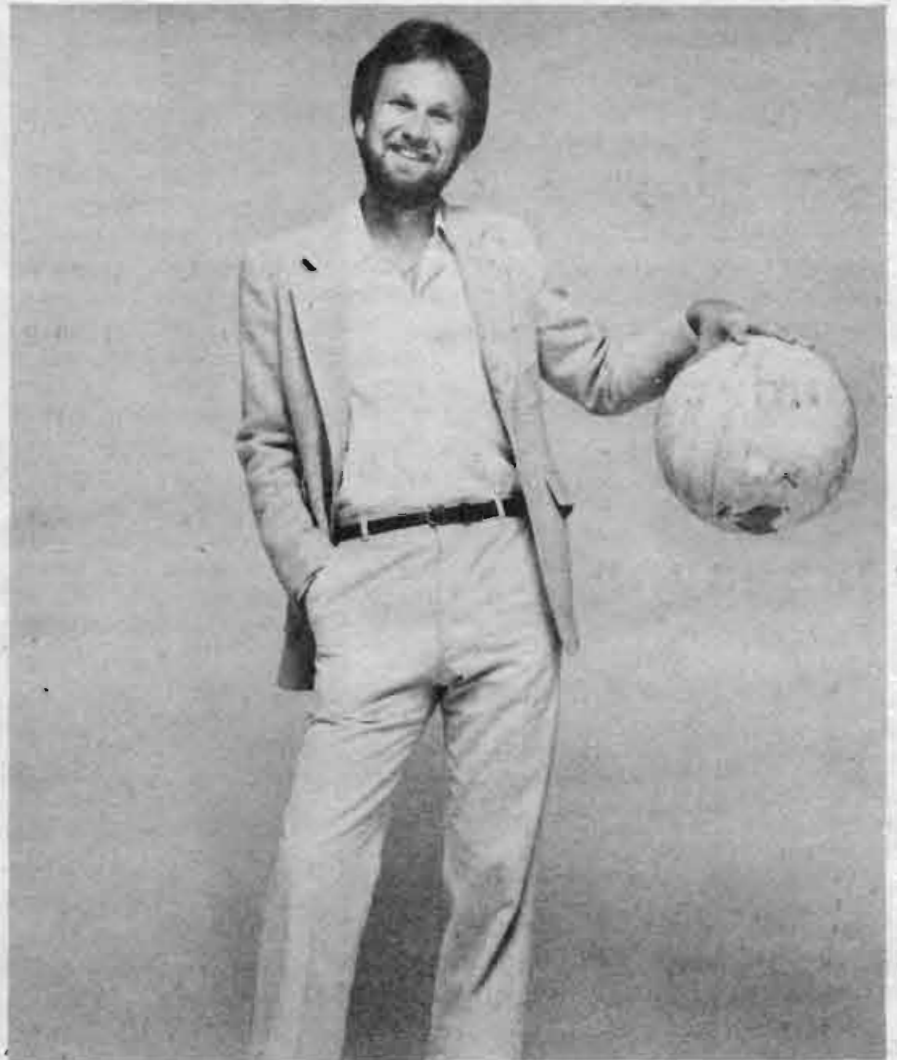
The Student Activities Board scored one of its greatest triumphs of the spring semester, as comedian Tom Parks entertained a standing-room-only crowd last Monday at the Hawk's Nest.

The main reason for the large turnout was the impromptu performance given by Parks at dinner, which included juggling and improvisation. For the show, Parks relied mostly on his set routine. His witty, sometimes vulgar humor had the crowd rolling on the floor. One example-Parks recited a piece on soaps (These are the Days of our Lives...we must follow the Guiding Light... and go to Another World, Dallas) Afterwards, he said, "I know what some of you are thinking. Where's General Hospital (whine). What about Luke? (more whines). I live 11 blocks from Tony Geary. Tony Geary THIS! (grabs his...uh... well...below the belt). At

the end of the performance, he gave Joe McCormack a chance to learn the art of stand-up comedy the hard way, from experience. When asked if he did this to teach people how hard his job is, Parks said, "Actually, it's only the second time I've ever done it. New York is the home of comedians. You can get people to tell jokes on the street."

Tom Parks did not intend to become a comic. After graduating from college, he recalls going to a comedy club. "I thought it looked like fun. Later, I decided that it might be a better way of making a living." Now 34, Parks has made the college circuit for eight years, covering 500 schools in 46 states. His current tour has lasted six weeks, and the comic plans to return home to Los Angeles next week. Parks wanted to emphasize that he was impressed with the large turnout.

SAB President Debbie Wedinger also was happy



with the turnout and wanted to remind the student body about the John Valby show on Monday. The Valby show has consistently been a favorite among Wagner students.

Culture--3 credits.  
9.) The study of Human Aesthetic Creativity--3 credits.

Each student will be expected to fulfill all the requirements with the exception of Areas 1 and 2, in which case the student may choose either one or the other, but not both.

In addition, there will be cross-over courses in which a single course may apply to more than one area. For example, Sociology 304--Sociology of Religion--may apply to both areas 4 and 7. However, if a student takes this course, it will only fulfill the requirement of one area.

The IDS Program has also undergone major changes. Incoming freshman will be expected to take The City in their fall semester, and Shaping of the Modern Mind in their spring semester.

After freshman year, students will have to take two IDS courses. However the two they choose will be subject to the following guidelines: they must take either The Meaning of Work or Self and Society in the fall of their sophomore year, and they must take either Science, Technology, and Human Values or Apollo, Dionysus, and Contemporary Humanity in the spring of

their sophomore year. All four IDS courses must be completed by the summer of a student's sophomore year (in case of failure in a course).

Also proposed and accepted was the initiation of a Two-Tiered System. Through this system, students will be required to choose distribution requirements according to their class status. In other words, certain courses may be taken by freshman and sophomore students (Tier 1) to fulfill distribution requirements, while certain courses may be taken by junior and senior students (Tier 2) to fulfill the distribution requirements. The major change is that some courses which were previously subjected to prerequisites will no longer be subjected to these introductory courses, depending upon the status of the student wishing to enroll in such a class.

Hopefully, with the passing of the revised curriculum requirements, students will be able to choose from a variety of courses not previously open to them, thus increasing knowledge and encouraging interest in a variety of disciplines.

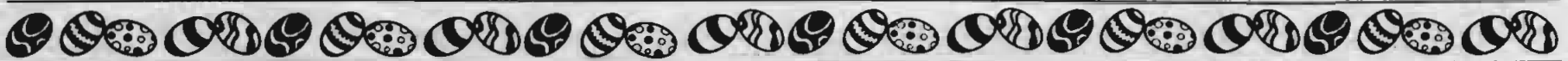

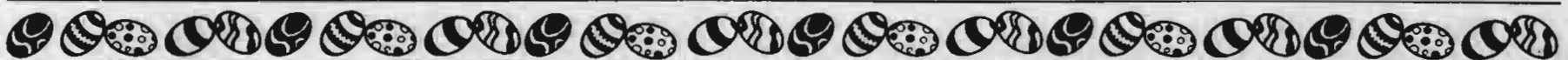

"West Side Story", the Theatre Department's most prestigious offering of the year, will run Wednesday through Saturday, April

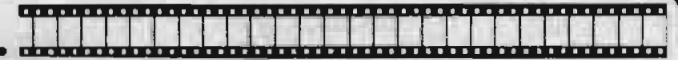
25-28, May 2-5, and May 9-12.

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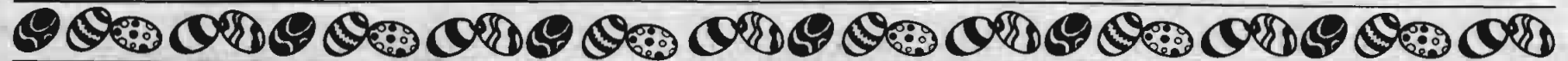

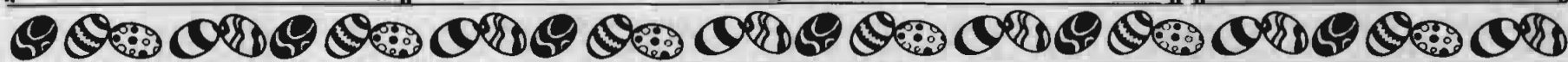

# Campus Profile:

## KAIROS HOUSE: KEEPING THE FAITH

On this campus there sits a small grey building that students pass by every day. Quiet and unassuming, it all too easily blends in with the Kallista, Security, and Admissions buildings. If not for the pealing of its bells - albeit recorded - each hour, its presence might go unnoticed. Kairos House/ Knubel Chapel is more than just the place which reminds students that they are late for class, or that the professor is running overtime. It is the base station for a wide range of religious activities for Wagner students.

Kairos House and the Knubel Chapel have come a long way since the early years of Wagner College and they have served a variety of worthwhile functions.

The chapel was named after Frederick R. Knubel who was a Lutheran Church leader in New York and New England. In the chapel there are ten plaques made of inlaid wood which stand for the ten stations of the cross. They were made by Dr. Leeseberg in memory of his daughter Diane.

The chimes were installed in 1980 in dedication to Marie Erkman who was a member of the Wagner College Guild.

Kairos House was originally used as a faculty house. At one time it was used to house the President of Wagner and from 1972 until 1975 it served as the home of Lyle Guttu who was the Chaplain at that time. In 1975, Dr. Arne Unhjim, a philosophy professor, be-

came Chaplain and suggested that Kairos become a religious center. Since that time Kairos has been an important meeting place for various religious groups on campus. These groups include the Lutheran Students Association, Wagner Christian Fellowship and the Newman Club.

Mass is held daily at noon, Saturday at 8:00 pm and Sunday at 11 am. Lutheran services are held every Sunday night at 8:00 pm.

The Newman Club is readily identifiable as a Catholic organization, but its president, Kathleen Menichella, is quick to point out, "Newman is not so much a club as a ministry, whose members serve the campus collectively and on an individual basis."

Led by Father McCann, Newman is comprised of 100 members from the Wagner, St. John's, and CSI campuses, as well as young professionals from Staten Island. Although this year the proportion of Wagner students predominates, Kathleen notes that this in no way represents the number of Catholics enrolled at Wagner.

"Close to 80% of Wagner students are Catholic, but many either don't realize Newman is here or they're not interested.

Kathleen feels that students' past experiences are a strong factor in their

ambivalence toward college religious activities.

"A lot of these students have gone through eight years of Catholic school, plus, in some cases, four years of Catholic high school. By the time they come here, they've had religion up to their eyeballs, basically because its been pounded into them the wrong way-- the "fire and bremstone approach." "That's not us, but students often associate that type of conservatism with our group, so they hesitate to get involved."

Among the ways students are invited to become involved are by attending the Saturday evening mass and movie, the Wednesday evening dinner and discussion group and the Sunday 11 AM mass in Union 108. As proof that Newman is sensitive to the lifestyles of students, Kathleen pointed out that starting next fall mass will be held at 1:15 in order to accomodate a wider range of students, including late-risers.

Kathleen's decision to attend Wagner had a great deal to do with her desire to join a Catholic organization at college as well as the fact that she enjoyed meeting with Newman Club members as a prospective student.

"Newman has made me so happy. I see the other members regularly and I couldn't have enough of them. I am proud to be president of this organization and I hope I can present to other students the same image, which attracted me to this

organization in the first place."

While Kathleen is satisfied with the internal strength of the Newman Club, she, along with other members, expressed concern over both the group's "low profile" in the Wagner community and what she perceives as the school's vague policy toward religious activities.

It bothers her that Newman seems to be left off mailing lists, since this prevents its members from participating in campus events. For example, during the recent Honors Day, Activities Fair for high school students, two Newman members were able to speak for the club only because they happened to be there representing other organizations. What she finds equally disturbing is the uncertain status of the Spiritual Interests Committee, at which the Newman Club is unrepresented and which also appears to be on the verge of being quietly absorbed into another committee.

"This school is really putting religion on a back burner--and that's putting it nicely," she concluded.

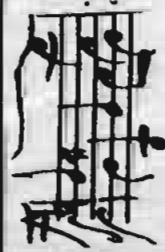

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## TRACK TEAMS FORESEE FAST START

If speed kills, then there will be large numbers of corpses coming from Wagner track runners this spring.

Men's coach, George Kochman, in his third season, is working with a small contingent. However, the confidence that he has in these runners is shown in the schedule. Included on the agenda are trips to Virginia, Maryland, and the Penn Relays.

The Seahawks' strength comes from their middle distance runners. Leading the way are Jorge Hernandez and Yves Douyon. Hernandez is highly competitive at any distance between 800 and 5000 meters. Douyon's specialities are the 800 and 1500. Both should contribute heavily this season. When Sal Anzalone and Brian Bellamy are added, the foursome make a two-mile relay team capable of qualifying for the IC4A's. Troy Jamison will add the 400 speed necessary for a solid distance medley. During the winter, the Shehawks showed versatility by placing strongly in the

throwing, jumping, and running events. Key figures this season include Maria Gordon, Amber Klock, Gloria Bailey, Monica Lucy, and freshman Jane Decker. Like the men's team, it is known that other members of the team are capable of stealing the spotlight.

Both teams are expected to have successful seasons, however track coaches know to "expect the unexpected". If the athletes stay healthy, and continue to progress, they will rack the numbers necessary for a successful season.

On a more recent note, the men's track team has performed well in its more recent meets.

At the Colonial Relays in Williamsburg, Virginia, the squad broke two school records. In the distance medley, Yves Douyon (3:07-1200 m), Troy Jamison (49.9 for 400 meters), Sal Anzalone (2:00.3 - 800 m), and Jorge Hernandez (4:14.4 - 1600 m) combined for a 10:11.7 time, breaking one record. The other record came in the 6400 meter (4 mile) relay as Yves Douyon (4:24.6), Jorge Hernandez (4:17.8), Sal Anzalone (4:30.7), and freshman John Preyer (4:35.3) combined for a tenth place, 17:48.4 effort.

The other school record topped this spring occurred at the Temple Relays when Hernandez broke the 5000 meter record with a time of 15:02.6. On that same day, the mile relay placed fifth with a time of 3:28.1, while Skip Kincaid clocked a 1:58.1 in the 800 and a 15:49 in the 5000.
