Step 1: Catch the shuttle

The ferry shuttle is free! It departs from the gazebo by Parker Hall and then picks up at the gazebo by the Union guard booth and near the Grymes Hill apartments. Shuttles on the hour stop at St. John's University next door before heading to the ferry terminal.

Staten Island Buses

<u>S66</u>

The S66 bus can take you to Port Richmond or to the ferry terminal. It runs Mondays through Fridays and can be caught right on Howard Avenue.

The S53 bus travels to both
Port Richmond and to
Brooklyn, and can be
caught on the bottom of the
hill on Clove Road. It runs
Monday through Sunday.



Step 2: Board the Ferry

The Staten Island Ferry is a passenger vessel that connects the St. George section of Staten Island to the southern tip of Manhattan, near Battery Park. The ride takes approximatley 25 minutes each way and is completely free. While waiting for the ferry to arrive, there are food and convience stores in the terminal.

Here are a few tips to keep in mind:

- The ferry runs 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
- The Staten Island ferry transports over 60,000 people Monday- Friday.
- A typical weekday involves the use of five boats, which make 109 daily trips.
- The ferry is the only non-vehicular mode of transportation from Staten Island to Manhattan.
- The schedule changes on holidays, so be sure to check it before you leave.

- The ferry takes about a half an hour, so try to bring a book, your homework or an iPod.
- Snacks and beverages can be purchased on all Ferry rides, but bring **cash**. Many stores in the ferry terminal do not take credit or debit cards.
- There are 9 ferries in the SI Ferry fleet, including three of the newest ferries built to hold 4,440 passangers at a time.

Don't forget!

If you plan on taking the subway once you get to Manhattan, your going to need a MetroCard.

In addition to adding your new student ID to your wallet, a MetroCard is another essential for life in NYC. For those that come from far away lands, or are simply New York newbies, a MetroCard is needed to ride the subway and the bus as well. For your first time venturing into the city and taking the subway, you will find the MetroCard machines in the subway station. The machines are simple to use and will ask if you want to refill an existing card or obtain a new card. Every swipe you make, both into the city and back to the ferry station, will cost \$2.75 each. When you have less than that on your card, you will not get through the turnstiles. Never duck under or jump over; it's a felony. The subway stations have smaller swipe machines to check your balance. If you feel too rushed with the machines down in the subway stations, MetroCard machines can also be found at the ferry terminals. With all the trips to be made in the Big Apple, you will catch on quickly and enjoy the city like a local in no time.

Step 3: Take the Subway

The journey does not end after the ferry ride. You can get to anywhere in New York City by taking a subway or bus.

Hopstop, NYCMate and NYC Bus & Subway Maps are three apps that can be downloaded to your smartphone. These free apps give you step by step directions on how to use public transportation.

It tells you what subway, bus or train to take.
Additionally, it explains transfers and which exit out of the subway terminals to use.

If your running low on pocket change, you can get walking directions and choose weather you want the quickest or cheapest rout




