



Valentine's History

Valentine's day remains, as ever, a day to express love. It started in an unromantic way, with the early martyrologies. History mentions at least saints named Valentine associated with February 14 (claims as to the number who existed run as high as 7 or 8). One of them is described as a priest of Rome and another a bishop of Innow Terin. Both teramna. men suffered martyrdom in the second half of third century and were buried in the the Framinian way which was later called the gate of St. Valentine.

No one actually knows why lovers exchange their sent imental greetings this particular day. One theory is based on the belief that the birds began to mate on February 14: "For this was Seynt Valentyne's Day when every foul cometh ther to choose his mate," Chaucer, Parliament of Fouls 1.309.

Another theory is, the church used the day of

Saint Valentyn's martyrdom in an attempt to Christianize the old Roman Lupercalia, a pagan festival held around the middle of the February. Part of the ceremony consisted of putting girl's names in a box and letting boys draw them. This supposedly paired off couples for a whole year -until the next dupercalia.

On this day people of all ages send Valentines, serious and comic, to their own true loves, but also to family members and friends.

Valentines are usually in the shape of hearts, cupids, bows and arrows. They may be in the form of confectionaries. cards or gifts.

IF YOU DARE TO THINK

Once again I look at my calendar and somehow I'm surprised to discover that February, Black History Month, has found itself before us once again. I must admit that this brings about conflicting emotions: feelings of anger, sadness, glory, and pride. Understandably, I am ecstatic and full of dignity that my ancestors are being paid tribute to during this month. On the other hand, I am disheartened and full of rage because we are still living in a racist society that merely allows traces of history to be revealed, and only for one month out of the year.

Anyone who protests that my claims are unjust is naive, unrealistic, or both. We cannot change things by not facing up to the truth,

or by denying what was, and what is. Instead of focusing all of our attention on the magnitude of the Black Man's history, why don't we also spend some time focusing on reality and attempting to change life to the way we profess it to be?

During the past twelve months, several events have been covered in the news pertaining to Black America. One of the most recent of these events was the 1983 Miss America Pageant in which Vanessa Williams (better known as the first Black woman to be crowned Miss America), received the prestigious title. situation has both negative positive implications and realities. First, one reminded that black women were not allowed to enter the pageant unti some 33 years ago, which is an embarrassment to our demo-

This is the tragic story of Dorothy Stratten. "Star 80" does not deny this, but rather it stresses the reasons for the tragedy. One of the reasons is Dorothy's husband, Michael, played by Eric Robers (who should earn an Oscar nomination for his performance). Mr. Roberts portrays a hustler, or as one of the Playboy employees calls him, a pimp. He promotes porno shows as he dreams about driving all the way to the top. He happens upon Dorothy Stratten in a Dairy Queen and he uses her as his vehicle to the fast

However, Michael does not belong to the plush Hollywood lifestyle. Dorothy slips away from him as he slowly slips away from himself. He feels thwarted since he is the one who 'discovered' Their. her.

marriage begins to fall apart and Michael moves closer to psychosis.

Any film based on fact usually has trouble mounting suspense because the audience knows the ending. Director Bob Fosse has rectified this problem by cross-cutting to the movies' violent ending throughout the course of the film. Instead of wondering where the story is heading, the viewer is shown repeatedly how it will end. We are then able to pick out the subtle ironies of the story.

A strong emotional bond is created between the characters and the audience. The viewer begins to identify with Robert's character, a man who always wanted the Big Time, but wasn't ready for it.

"Star 80" is a film about values. It appeals strongly to anyone who has had aspirations of wanting

The American black man has always been patriotic to America, SO why is his loyalty or patriotism being questioned? Is this an implication that America has yet to see the Black individual as an American, a human being who is equal and capable of doing the job as any same white person?

that if Rev. Jackson won, he would do a commendable job. But he is only one individual just like George Washington, Richard Nixon, and John F. Kennedy. And of those menlike all tioned he is human; he is at an American; and he least deserves the opportunity to strive for his goals just like they did, even though his are precedented in our history.




In terms of attaining his goals for Wagner, Mr. Palmer says, "there is no magic formula. We need a quality program to attract students in addition to sound financial planning."

Baseball 84'-Hawks In Homerun Heaven

If you happen to wander past the gym early one weekday morning and you can't quite figure out what sounds could possibly liken to the crash of thunder that you hear - take a peek inside. Since January 24th, the Wagner College baseball team has been practicing daily in an effort to get an early jump on the season that lies ahead.

All members of the squad have contracted cases of justifiable optimism. They all appear as anxious as sweating powderkegs basting in the sun. Led by first-year head coach Tim Capstraw, the Wagner Seahawks are looking forward to nothing less than the ECAC playoffs.

The offensive prowess of the Seahawks is the reason for this sudden February elation. The Hawks are loaded with power. Their lineup, to put it mildly, is an arsenal. The Seahawks are able to look for the consistent longball from no less than five players. From the left side (taking

advantage of the 285 foot right field fence) are last season's homerun leaders - Joe Murphy (led team with 9 HR's), and rightfielder Paul Spinosa (second on team with 8 HR's and team leader in RBI's). Impact from the right side of the plate will be provided by John Von Ahnen, DH Dean D'Agostino, and returning senior Gene Rosario.

Spinosa reflected on this year's team in contrast to problems that plagued the Seahawks in the past. "This team is balanced throughout the lineup. It used to be that opposing teams would come in here and always throw lefties. Now they don't know what to throw."

Although most team members share the early optimism, Seahawk John Fidanza cites that "we'll be playing 40 games in 44 days. It's not going to be that easy."

Coach Capstraw, who took a losing spring 1983 squad and turned them into a very respectable 12-9, has taken precautions, guarding against the long overhaul that faces his team. The Seahawks will head to Florida on March 15th. Instead of participating in the usual tournament ritual, the Hawks will be reminded of the essentials that a winning ball club must possess.

The only spot that is open on the team is in left field. The competition is between Rosario, freshman Matty Dowen (a pitcher who is trying out left for the first time), and freshman Frank Conte.

Bob Marranaro Fidanza form Wagner's keystone. Fidanza, a returning senior, hit an impressive .357 in the fall season. Marranaro, best known for his exceptional fielding talents, is the returning shortstop. He hit an even .300 in the fall. This keystone is also the Wagner table setters. At the end of the season they will easily be neck to neck in runs scored.

Capstraw holds an excellent rapport with his players. In fact, not so

long ago, he was one of them. Spinosa feels that "it's Capstraw's one-to-one relationship with his players that makes him a good coach. He's able to motivate us so that we enjoy playing under him."

It is a baseball adage that the team will go only as far as its pitching will take it. The Seahawks wish to put that to rest. As far as Spinosa is concerned, the record will ride on the bats of the hitters. Fidanza is quick to add that the Seahawks "will go as far as our hitting takes us."

However, the starting pitching rotation does not appear at all bad. Dave Ahearn will anchor the staff, followed by Murphy, John Vento, and Ron Haden. If the pitching holds the game close, the Hawks will connect with the long ball.

The playoffs are a very realistic goal. As Spinosa points out, "anything less will be disappointing. We're all looking forward to a great year."

Sageer, the big man on the team, had three wins, including two pins (one in 16 seconds) to take an overall second place. He improved his overall record to an incredible 18-2-1.




