The APO service fraternity promoted awareness of animal issues and raised money for two organizations during four fun-filled days called Animal Week.

The week kicked off Monday, September 13th, with a tye-dye event, where participants turned their lackluster white t-shirts, and even a few pairs of socks, into wearable works of art while getting to know some members of Alpha Phi Omega.

On Tuesday, animal lovers gathered in Gatehouse Lounge for an An-

imal Game Night. Participants formed into three teams to play "Leopardy," which had animal trivia questions about land, air, marine, and even mythical animals. Questions ranged from simple to challenging, with Leopardy players laughing contagiously and impatiently shouting out answers whenever they had the chance. The game show gave students a chance to learn interesting animal facts while eating candy rewards.

Wednesday turned to serious matters when speakers came to discuss animal issues, such as abuse in

# Foundation: 10 suites still empty

After years of planning and anticipation, Foundation Hall has finally been opened. Although many of its earlier problems, such as inconsistent heating and unavailable cable, have been worked out, students are still debating the success of the new senior residence hall.

Evidence of dissatisfaction with Foundation can be seen in the housing selection process. As of right now, there is available space in Foundation. Ten suites were forgone last spring in favor of housing assign-

ments in older buildings. Chris Diggs, resident director of Foundation Hall stated in an e-mail, "Students with junior and senior status were eligible to move into Foundation through the housing lottery. Through the lottery process, those suites were not filled because not all eligible students chose to live in Foundation." Additionally, Diggs states that Foundation is "an exceptional living facility with three quiet study rooms, eight glass-enclosed common rooms, two laundry facilion each floor, floor to ceiling windows in students' bed-

rooms, private bathrooms for each

suite, and a cafe on the first floor."

Foundation Hall is the first new residence hall to be constructed on Wagner College's 105-acre campus in over 40 years. In spite of the excitement that preceded the opening of this brand new living space as an advantage for upper classmen, there is some disappointment about some of the features of the building. Many students believe only one elevator for all four floors of 192 residents moving swiftly in and out of the residence hall to be insufficient. Additionally, unlike Harborview, Towers and Guild, where residents are able to open the windows anywhere from

# Dorm buildings prove to be bed bug free

Bed bugs seem to be everywhere. Manhattan College's dorms had them. NYU dorms had them. Fordham's dorms had them. Wagner College's dorms might have them too, and if you eavesdrop on the person sitting at the table next to you in the Hawk's Nest, you might hear that D tower has them, or the 12<sup>th</sup> floor of Harbor View Hall has them as well.

Most of the rumors circulating the campus seem to be a side effect of the current bed bug epidemic that is pervading the tri-state area, specifically New York City. Web MD defines bedbugs as tiny nocturnal insects, characterized by their affinity to hide in small crevices (i.e. beds, trash, wood and floors), and feed on the blood of animals and humans. According to Web MD, "bed bugs are more of a nuisance than a health hazard, and there is little evidence to suggest that they are carriers of human disease."

Assistant Director of Residential Education Matt Hollingshead states

that there have been a handful of cases when bed bugs have been suspected at Wagner, but there have been no confirmed cases.

The College is attempting to avoid the invasive procedures of eradicating pests by making concerted efforts to prevent an infestation in the future, and is prepared to treat the dorms, should one occur. Among these efforts, Hollingshead cites weekly exterminator checkups and a thorough inspection of the dorms by a K9 unit. The dog has so far inspected all of Parker Towers, Guild Hall, and has commenced inspection of Harbor View Hall, starting on the 14th floor and working his way down. So far, the K9 unit has not found any evidence of bed bugs. Due to the dog's busy schedule, the completion date for the K9 inspections is indeterminate, but he will visit every room on campus in the near future. "We see the dog as a proactive measure," says Hollingshead.

He explains that Parker Towers and Harbor View Hall are the dorm buildings most at risk for a bed bug infestation, due to the age of the buildings, and the larger number of

students housed there.

Foundation Hall, though not immune, is least likely to suffer from the bugs; the furniture and the mattresses are new and pest-resistant. The new vinyl-covered mattresses featured in Foundation Hall will eventually replace every mattress on campus, including the older, powder blue ones that are more susceptible to pests.

According to Hollingshead, there are approximately 350-400 non-resistant mattresses still in use across campus.

Though it is undoubtedly the col-

lege's duty to take these preventative measures against bed bugs and other possible outbreaks, the students have an obligation to preempt the bed bug epidemic. Hollingshead states that "often, infestations come as a result of irresponsibility."

To avoid bed bugs, The New York City Housing Authority warns citygoers to keep bags off of the floors of subway cars, and other public spaces, to wash clothing, bedding, and other personal items after returning from a

College dormitories are not the only buildings known harbor bed bugs. Many places in the city, such as movie theaters and clothing stores, are susceptible to the epidemic, and

Yahoo! News cites several highprofile Manhattan institutions that have been suspected, or confirmed to have bed bugs. Among the places listed are the Empire State Building, The New York Public Library, Times Square's AMC theatre, the Nike flagship store, and several Victoria's Secret, Abercrombie and Fitch and Hollister retail locations.

about 3 inches to all the way, the windows in Foundation cannot be opened at all. Upperclassmen assert that this is probably the biggest issue with the building.

When Res. Ed. was asked if the issue of the permanently sealed windows would be solved in the future, Diggs replied, "One of the considerations taken into account during the design process was reducing the impact of building a residence hall in close proximity to the residential area of Campus Road and beyond. Of particular concern was an increased noise level. As a result, the building has a glass facade on all sides, instead of traditional windows. There is a central air system in the building that circulates air conditioning or heat, depending on the season, so as to maintain fresh air throughout the building." Students argue that constantly having the air conditioning on not only creates health problems for residents, but also wastes energy.

Another major problem students are facing is scanning their ID cards. There are only two separate scanning machines and the first one has been out of service since before general move in day and has yet to be fixed.

Many seniors are living in Foundation because they feel that despite its issues, Foundation is, in fact, brand new and still trumps the other residence halls. In addition, there are seniors who are quite satisfied with Foundation Hall. Senior Stephanie Buscema states, "Only living in Harborview and Guild during my time at Wagner I can say I enjoyed the advantages that both buildings had to offer. But Foundation has combined those advantages into one, making my living situation at Wagner a very comfortable and enjoyable one." Although Buscema enjoys the advantages of the new building, she feels strongly that it would be nice to have an accessible stove in the building for the students to use.

"Since the building was opened in January 2010, we have addressed the initial concerns and construction updates have been completed," says Diggs, "We are now in the phase of enhancing the programmatic offerings for students living in the building and transforming it into a holistic living environment as students prepare for life after Wagner."

# Professor Profile

# Astronomy professor gives his take on the universe

Dr. Otto Raths, who is most well known as one of Wagner's Astronomy professors, sits excitedly at the end of the small brown table in the "coffee room" that is Megerle 418. He appears composed and relaxed, but it is clear that he is anxious to share a wonderful secret about himself. Make no mistake, there is no arrogance in his disposition. It is more as though he is ready to accept the great opportunity of being asked freely and openly about how he thinks the world goes 'round.

#### Lessons beyond physics

Although he does teach some astronomy courses at Wagner, he also teaches many of the physics and math classes. Most students will attest to his eccentricities in the classroom, like switching off the topic of Galileo Galilei for just a moment to present his students with a discussion of whether or not every person in the class might choose to die for their ideas when threatened by the Inquisition, or to recant and forgo all that they know is true.

Maybe some students fail to find these digressions enlightening, but if that is true, Dr. Raths probably does not care. When asked what he hopes students will take away from his classes, he says, "I hope that they see life or ideas in perhaps a bit of a different way ... I hope they see beauty in ideas." It seems as though Dr. Raths is just as concerned with equipping his students to succeed in life as he is with equipping them to succeed in his classes. In fact, it may be safe to say that he favors and emphasizes the former.

#### **Dedication to all students**

In his description of his teaching style, Raths asserts that the way in which he chooses to teach an upper level math class versus a group of intelligent, eager, but not math-oriented astronomy students, is obviously quite different. However, he stresses that he is ultimately dedicated to the student. "The course supposedly serves someone," he says, "The student- the ultimate customer- really determines how you do the course."

In addition, he claims that his favorite aspect of his job as a professor is the process of working with students. "I'm probably egotistical enough to think that what we doworking with young people - ... is very important. I enjoy working with students, and I can say every year I've been here there's a certain idyllic quality to the students... students in general ... want to do good in this world."

Most people who have a strong sense of self-awareness, and an individualistic sense of wisdom, like Dr. Raths, often draw their inspiration from a special person or experience in their past. Dr. Raths cannot seem to name just one. "I owe everything to many people ... there are too many to mention... many people have helped me through my life," he states, as if recalling the exact nature of how those people affected him.

In speaking about which classes are his favorite, Dr. Raths is quite unbiased. He says he appreciates both the excitement of quantum mechanics and the awe with which someone sees the ideas behind basic physics. He also finds it rewarding to interact with astronomy students because they do not normally find themselves in the science department. In fact, he describes the best question he has ever received while describing some of the workings of the universe to an astronomy class, "but why is there a universe". [It's] a profound question I don not know the answer to," he says.

#### Valuable advice

And he offers nostalgic words of wisdom that make it seem as though he wishes he could have known himself when he was 'our age', "I am convinced for young people there is no one path... In fact I disagree very strongly with anyone who says 'if you don't do 'this' you'll never amount to anything... that's hogwash...There is always a new day... no matter what happens to you, no matter how disappointing something is, the next day you look out the window and you'll see the sun rise again... and you can start all over again. You have the power to be anything you want." He says his motivation to give advice comes from the assumption that he has had enough life experience - that he has "been around so long"- that he "happen[s] to think [he] might be able to give some". He considers his most valuable piece of advice to be this: "Believe in yourself, always believe in yourself. That is all you have. Ya know, you have people who love you, but they cannot do it for you. Ya gotta believe in yourself."

#### 45 years and counting

Dr. Raths completed his PhD while doing commercial industry work in radar development. He worked on many projects including the Apollo Program. Describing his 7-year experience in the commercial technological field, Raths says, "I loved it... at times there was tremendous pressure ... but there's something about working in a true team effort in a group of people that is rather wonderful. At times you almost get [in] fists fights and other times you have great laughs."

His career at Wagner began somewhat by accident. In fact, Dr. Raths gives the impression that it would have been easy at the time of his college graduation to find any number of jobs. As he advanced his career in the commercial side of engineering, taking higher managerial positions, Dr. Raths found that "management [was] important but I [did not] wanna do it". He felt that it was time for a change.

Raths had a friend at Wagner, Harvey Logan, who told him that they needed teachers. In 1964, he got an interview where, "I think they discovered I was breathing," and was hired. According to Raths, the offer Wagner made him was for a considerably lower paycheck than what he had been making in commercial work. "I was, single, I had no responsibilities, see, and I said it is a different track," he says, "sometimes you just have to change, and I took it and... I've never, ever been sorry." This certainly seems to be so. Despite an absence from 1968-71, in which he finished a PhD, Dr. Raths has been at Wagner ever since.

#### A match made at Wagner

Dr. Raths is married to another one of Wagner's own: Professor Linda Raths. In fact, the two met when Mrs. Raths was a student here at Wagner. Dr. Raths says the first time they met, he saw her standing in the rain and offered to give her a ride home. They subsequently dated for a year and a half and married in 1973. His daughter Barbara, 36, attended Bates College in Lewiston, Maine, and is now deputy treasurer of the State of Maine. His son, Joe, 31, attended Wagner, where he majored in business, and according to Raths, was an outstanding hockey goalie. He now trades options at the New York Financial Center in Manhattan.

#### His own collegiate journey

Originally from Long Island City, Queens, Dr. Raths is a graduate of the Steven's Institute of Technology in Hoboken New Jersey. Dr. Raths majored in electrical engineering as an undergrad but then "saw the light and converted to physics" for his Masters and PhD. While in college he "played a little baseball". In fact he even had a tryout with the Brooklyn Dodgers. Not a man of abnormally large stature, Dr. Raths said it went pretty well until he realized that "they do not want pitchers who are smurfs [laughs]".

#### "When you walk, you think"

In his spare time he enjoys walking and hiking because, he says, "when you walk, you think." He also finds the study of markets very interesting. He takes his coffee with no sugar, and his favorite planet is an obvious one: "Earth! [laughs] it is the only one we have, ultimately!"

today's society. Many students and staff members, whether alone, with friends, or with their classmates. learned about the relationship between animal abuse and domestic violence. Speakers included Elaine Wolfe and Susan Urban (consultants for Alliance for Safety of Animals and People), Claire McCue (forensic social worker with Staten Island Legal services), Kala Ganesh (executive director of Connect), Robin Sturtz (veterinarian and head of vet tech at La Guardia), and Kristin Mitchell (ADA from Staten Island). They learned that one can prevent domestic violence through identifying animal abuse, and that animal abuse can be an alternative to physically abusing a person. Additionally, reallife animal abuse stories were shared, including photographs and documentaries, to show how severe animal abuse can be.

Students also signed up to become more involved in helping animals by volunteering at an animal shelter on Staten Island. You, too, can become involved by visiting the Alliance for Safety of Animals and People (ASAP) website, www.connectnyc.org, and clicking on Animal Abuse and DV, under Programs.

Animal Week ended with a bang on Thursday, with an Animal Party in

the Coffeehouse. Many people dressed up in correspondence with the theme. A herd of zebras were spotted, as well as a group of cheetah girls. A few party-goers also used Zoo Pals plates to create animal masks for themselves. There was a lot of food, dancing, and fun had by those who attended. Additionally, a \$3 admission fee benefitted Heifer Project International and World Wildlife Fund (WWF).

Throughout the week, APO members set up tables in the Union to collect donations, and held a bake sale in Harborview. An approximate total of \$150 was collected throughout Animal Week. Half of the donations will benefit Heifer Project International, and half will benefit endangered Amur Leopards through the World Wildlife Fund.

WWF tries to save endangered species and conserve wildlife world-wide. Heifer is a less known organization whose mission is to work with communities to end poverty and hunger, as well as care for the earth. One way Heifer does this is by giving families a source of food, and teaching them how to maintain this resource. To understand Heifer, one must consider this: "If you give a man a fish, he'll eat for a day; but, if you teach a man to fish, he'll eat forever."

# It's a lot to live up to

The media is unavoidable.

Every day we are bombarded with images, announcements, voices, and advertisements telling us what to think and how to feel, telling us what we should want, what we should like and what we need to change. It doesn't matter if you read *Elle* or *Entertainment Weekly*, or if you watch the *Food Network* or *Family Gup*. The media is unavoidable, from billboard advertisements and billionaire sponsors to those really annoying pop up ads that make us waste time online and prevent us from researching and reading.

Whether we want them to or not the people behind these ads are affecting us and the way we see reality. The advertisements that we look at and the people in them are not real. They are warped images of reality; they are the reality that companies want us to see. Waist lines shrink, thighs disappear, tattoos and scars and dimples and imperfections of any kind simply fade away. Hair gets shinier and women shed pounds and years off their lives like layers of clothing. None of it is real. But when you are staring at these picture perfect images all day every day, it is hard to remember that.

Jezebel wants to remind us. The popular lifestyle blog makes it a habit of posting what they like to call "photoshops of horror." They place an untouched image next to a retouched image and let readers draw their own conclusions. Reader responses range from the horrified to the humorous and everyone gets their daily dose of reality. Last month, that daily dose of reality

included pictures of Jennifer Aniston from a 2006 issue of Australia's *Madison* magazine. Next to the picture of a freckle faced Aniston was the retouched version, with no freckles. It was a much more flattering photo, but it was not real. The next day *Jezebel* dedicated another post to Aniston's images, but this one was followed by a thread of e-mails between Management + Artists + Organization, the company that held the copyright for the images, and *Jezebel*.

The former demanded that Jezehel take down the images, as well as their comment about the images being retouched, claiming that unless Jezehel could provide evidence that the images were retouched they could not legally make such a statement. They took down the images, leaving only one thumbnail to compare to the magazine cover, stating that "a small image falls under fair use since the existence of these images is indeed news." Since then Jezebel dedicated one more post to the Jennifer Aniston pictures, explaining to readers why they are fighting this and why women need to see these images. I think this excerpt sums it up best.



"Every day, a young woman somewhere sees one of these overly polished pictures for the first time...and has no idea that they're not real....What the girl does know is that the pictures show What Is Beautiful. She thinks they are reality....So we'll do that, and we'll

do it over and over again just to make sure that *everyone* knows what's up."

Personally, I think it is worth the fight. I think it is important for women to see photos of real women in order to understand that celebrities do not wake up with faces full of makeup and flawless skin. I think it is important for people to understand that women are different and unique and that every type of women can be beautiful. It is important that we not only understand this, but that we see it. I agree with Jezebel's decision.

What I do not agree with are the readers' comments. Women have claimed that the original photo of Aniston is the manipulated one. They claim that "just because a photo is retouched that doesn't mean it isn't an accurate portrayal of reality," that Aniston looks more like the retouched version in real life and that the original photo is badly shot. They make excuses and justify and agree with exactly what Jezebel is fighting against. If a picture captures a moment then that is the reality of the moment, and any airbrushing or retouching is not. The problem with retouching images is that it causes women to believe that there is something wrong with their bodies. They measure themselves against retouched images and unreachable standards. And that is what Jezebel is fighting against.

Magazine, movies, books, and television of any kind provide us with a reprieve from reality, a chance to focus on something otherwise unexplored or unattainable. But while we should all enjoy these reprieves, we should not forget that this is all they are, we should not forget that they are not reality, that they are not standards to measure ourselves and our lives against.

# A rescue mission

People's books speak of their character. To buy a book and keep it on your shelf, to adopt it and make it a part of your home is an enormous commitment. An individual's personal library represents what he or she considers invaluable.

I work in the Horrmann Library and last week I was given the task of sorting through the hundreds of books donated for the annual book sale. The instructions were simple: Take the newer looking, nicer books and put them on the cart; throw out the old ones that are unlikely to sell. The job was not as simple as I had originally thought.

I could see little pieces of people's lives lining the shelves of donations. Here a battered Nabokov novel, there a treatise on Martin Luther and on the shelf below, a whole row of books on music theory. I tried to imagine the previous owner of these well-worn tomes and wondered why there were being given up.

Lots of the donations were, to be fair, absolute trash, but surprisingly many seemed to hold real substantial meaning. So it was up to me to sort out the sellable and the unsellable. I admit I deviated from my instructions more than once to rescue a book that was far past its prime. A dingy volume entitled The Greatest Story Ever Told was too hard to resist, as was The Jews of the World, which featured the most charming illustration of a Jewish merchant introducing European nobles to Indian spices and Chinese silk, and of course that Nabokov.

My favorite discovery by far was a shelf devoted solely to the collected writings of Marx and Engels. Had the owner been an amateur Marxist scholar, a soviet spy, an aspiring social reformer? Had he or she become disillusioned with communism, converted to capitalism, or simply died? How was it that a person's entire life of social and political philosophy could end up abandoned on the modest shelves of Horrmann Library? These books hold a narrative beyond what is printed on their pages.

I fell into a pattern of really

shameless sentimentality. I wanted these tired, discarded books to be endowed with a second life, new meanings for new people. I did attempt to uphold some degree of pragmatism with my selections. Anything that stood out as an essential work in the canon of western literature, anything with sex in the title, and anything that was newer or at least passable found its way onto the cart with the excuse of being marketable. Anything else that appealed to my wistful romanticism was covertly slipped in among the others.

People's relationships with books are changing. The ironically named Kindle and other electronic readers are making books simultaneously more accessible and more disposable. The idea of physical books seems more and more old fashioned as time goes on and as young people seem less interested in reading. For me, one of the great pleasures of a book was always scrawling notes in the margins of the pages and marking particularly interesting or moving passages. Electronic readers do not allow for that kind of intense relationship that one can only have with a physical book.

I like books. I like the idea of books. I like having a shelf in my room overflowing with novels, poems, histories, characters, and entire worlds of thought all hand selected by me. Though I know that possessing a book is not as important in today's culture as it once was, I hope that it works out for those books that I rescued.

# United Nations under fire for delaying relief to DR Congo rape victims

Atul Khare, the United Nation Assistant Secretary-General for Peace-keeping released a recent report about the horrific string of events occurring in the Democratic Republic of

More than 500 reported rape incidents occurred since July, and all the victims were women and children.

The first rapes that were publicly reported on Aug. 22, however the U.N. first learned about the attacks on July 30.

The U.N. informed relief agencies working in the DR Congo (DRC) that rebels took control of villages and committed one instance of rape.

Khare went to the affected region to find out why peacekeepers in the area were not aware of the rapes sooner, and why there was such a delay to send aid to victims.

The U.N. reported that Congolese and Rwandan rebels raped about 242 people in villages in North Kivu between Jul. 30 and Aug. 3.

Shortly after this report came to light, 260 rapes confirmed rapes occurred in the Uvira region of Kivu. Rwandan Hutu Forces of the Liberation of Rwanda (FDLR) rebel chiefs are one of the groups responsible for systematically organizing the rapes.

Khare is calling for "targeted sanctions on the leaders of the FDLR, both within and outside the country, if a chain of command is proven.."

He also suggests more random night patrols of the villages and communities, as well as the possibility of installing a high frequency radio in some areas.

International leaders need to put pressure on the individuals committing the crimes and bring them to justice.

"... We have a responsibility to the victims to make their lives better but also we owe them the responsibility of making the Democratic Republic of the Congo better," Khare stated.

U.N. special representative for sexual violence in conflict, Margot Wallstrom, said, "The women of eastern DRC deserve better...For them, there is no safe place."

Rape has become a weapon used by rebel leaders during wartime in the DRC.

In the past, rape was the main weapon against enemies, and the DR Congo has a "shocking reputation" for sexual violence.

According to the UN Organization Stabilization Mission, attackers block roads, and prevent anyone in the village from contacting any outside people for help.

Additionally, homes are often looted and burned.

"The sad reality is that incidents of

rape have become so commonplace that they do not trigger our most urgent interventions," Wallstrom said.

Besides being blamed for their lack of knowledge of the rapes, the U.N. has also been blamed for their lack of response.

The reality is that these incidents are happening right under their supervision of surrounding villages.

Leaders and news reporters are looking for the U.N. to take some of the responsibility for failing to prevent this situation, and to commit to working harder to prevent more rapes from occurring in the DR Congo in the future.

Rebel leaders present during the attacks on villages should be the first to be brought to justice, according to Wallstrom.

"Our policies of 'zero tolerance' cannot be backed by a reality of 'zero consequences,'" she said.

Lamert Mende, a government spokesman, called on the U.N. to rely on the national army, and to use it against the militia.

He believes that the protection of civilians in the villages lies in the national army and the police, which need to be available to protect those being attacked against the rebel armies.

The UN has reported a total of 8,300 rapes in DR Congo since 2009, and many attacks are unreported.

# South African researchers develop tea bag water purifier

South African researchers have developed a tea bag that can purify water in early September.

Nano-structured fibers cover the carbon filled tea bag.

The reason carbon is added to the tea bag is due to its ability to remove any chemicals from the water, including chlorine.

Due to the complete elimination of chlorine form the water, researchers claim that the water.

The designer for this filter is Dr. Eugene Cloete who is a South African researcher from Stellenbosch University.

The filter is relatively cheap and only costs half of a cent per use.

After Cloete developed the idea, the filter was tested and it killed all of the bacteria that contaminated the dirty water.

In terms of the global influence of this new invention, Cloete and his research team aim to give the percentage of the world that does not have clean drinking water an opportunity to purify their own.

The World Health Organization claims that although the number of countries that have drinking water

available is increasing, millions of people in Sub-Saharan Africa do not have this resource.

"We have had many, many inquiries from aid organizations and from philanthropists who are quite prepared to sponsor these people that need them most," Cloete commented.

Although the better tasting water is still a new technology, Cloete plans on giving 1.2 billion people around the world access to drinkable water.

# Gender-gap between men and women in workplace begins to slowly decline

Times have changed—that is for sure. In the 18th century, females were not even allowed to work outside the house, but today, women working in big cities are actually making more money than men.

According to Time magazine, salaries of women who work in a mctropolis are, on average, 8% (in New York 17%) higher than those of men.

Even though this might sound like good news to at least to one half of the general American population, there is a definite downside.

James Chung of Research Advisors, a New York firm that studies the changes in the consumer market, compiled these numbers after spending a year studying data from the Census Bureau's American Community Survey.

These figures only apply to unmarried, childless women under the age of 30.

However, these factors do not seem to be the cause of the lower income, but rather a reflection of the way career-oriented women think.

Wagner College senior Stephanic Buscema, for example, stated, "I don't feel that this has delayed my family planning by any means. I would not settle down and have a family until I feel that I have a stable job and am financially stable."

She added, "My personality has always been to work, work, work. Although there is a subtle competitive atmosphere in the business world, I mostly just focus on myself and do my best, knowing I worked to the best of my ability."

Stephanie, who is currently apply-

ing to graduate school, also said that she is "not too concerned about making less money as [she] pass [es] the age of 30", because she thinks that her education will enable her to get a job "where [her] salary will only increase."

Additionally, Stephanie argues along the same lines as Chung, who stated that education is a huge factor in the wage-gap.

In fact, one-third more Caucasian women and twice as many Black and Hispanic women graduate from college or get a higher degree than their male peers.

Since there is a notable decline in manufacturing locations and the knowledge-based economy is constantly growing, a college education is gaining more and more impor-

This development, as well as an increase in the minority population, is the chief cause of females earning higher salaries in major cities.


However, there are exceptions in metropolises because many maledominated industries such as software development rely heavily on

In those cities, women who are either unmarried, childless, or college educated still make less money than

For the past five years, market research analysts noticed that the salary of American women is only 80% of the salary of male counterparts.

However, analysts believe that by encouraging men to go to college and allowing women to take on jobs that were formally considered to be confined to males, it might be possible to create a job market in which gender related wage-gaps are a thing of the

# Supreme Court justices select clerks with similar party affiliations

Party polarization is no stranger to the government scene in the United

Party affiliation has been a determining factor is several presidential elections, and is the key to control of the House of Representatives.

But while political parties have been known to polarize the executive and legislative branches of government for the past 200 years, party affiliation has not been known to affect the judicial branch, until recently.

The current trend, which has been on the rise since the 1980s, is for Supreme Court Justices to grant the prestigious position of clerk to lawyers who have previously served as a clerk for a judge who shares the same political ideology of the justice.

In other words, conservative justices are choosing lawyers who have clerked for judges appointed by a Republican president, and liberal justices are choosing to appoint lawyers who have clerked for judges appointed by a Democratic president.

David J. Garrow, a Cambridge historian, notes that the court is mimicking the political branches of gov-

Garrow observed this trend from recent studies compiled by the De-Paul Law Review in 2008.

He compares clerks to the members of the House of Representatives, and asserts, "Each side is putting forward only ideological purists."

The studies showed that justices who were working with a Democratic clerk were more likely to vote liberally on issues.

The same was true for Republican clerks who worked for justices; they were more likely to make conservative decisions.

Records found that in the past, justices appointed both Democratic and Republican clerks independently of their own ideological viewpoints much more frequently than present day justices.

Many Americans do not realize the significance of this trend mainly because they are unsure of the responsibilities of a clerk.

The job of a clerk is to work closely with the justice in their chamber, recommend cases for the court to hear, prepare the justice for oral arguments, and draft the justice's opinions and dissents.

Party affiliation is therefore an important factor in the work of justices and their clerks.

After all, if a justice is working with a clerk who shares his or her ideological stance, then they are less likely to consider the other side of an issue when drafting an opinion, and more likely to motion to hear cases that are closely linked to and more likely to perpetuate their own ideological views.

The issue of clerk polarization has many Americans considering their own stance on the issue.

Many believe that justices should be working with clerks of different ideological viewpoints to ensure that, at the very least, a justice will take into account the opinion of someone who is not "on their side" ideologically.

This would allow the judge to formulate a well-rounded and fair opinion or dissent, which is the goal of the Supreme Court.

Some believe that justices should not consider common political ideologies when making clerk appoint-

Justice Antonin Scalia is a conservative, and when he served on the Supreme Court in 1986, he was sure to appoint a "token liberal" clerk so that he would always hear the other side of an argument when forming his own opinion on issues.

However, not all justices believe that this theory truly works, as it

Justice Clarence Thomas says that he looks to hire clerks who share his ideological views.

He thinks if he does not hire clerks with the same views it will pose as a

He states, "It's like trying to train a pig. It wastes your time, and it aggravates the pig."

The Dance Theatre Workshop (DTW) on West 19 Street in Manhattan has a mission: to identify, present, and support independent contemporary artists and companies to advance dance in New York City and world-

From September 8 to 11, this is just what they did when the innovative space hosted the Dance NOW Festival: Twenty Ten. By telling audience members to "Find a new artistic crush," the festival showcased choreographers who were given seven minutes to present their artistic vision. Audience members then voted on which artist best conveyed their personal statement. The winner was

awarded a week long residency at Kirkland Farm, and a \$1,000 stipend.

The show was just under two hours. Choreographers had to keep their dances at seven minutes or under, so there was no time to grow bored.

The show began with Malcom Low's "Dreamscape" number, characterized by minimal music and lots of lyrical movement. "Nobody's Darling," a pas de deux (a two person dance that usually features a male and a female dancer), had no music at all, but the dancers made the audience crack up with wry facial expressions, that created a very light and playful

A crowd favorite was "On the Map", a silly journey with three lost senior citizens, who eventually ended up skating around the stage on top of maps. Meanwhile, "Salaryman" was an intense look at the frenzied life of a working man, and "Can't Let Go," featured a tiny, adorable yet androgynous woman bouncing to the beat of a country song for seven minutes, never once completely facing the audience. One viewer commented, "That one definitely had something to tell me... I'm just not sure what it was!"

Another favorite was a dance choreographed by Paul Sigh, titled "Gasp." It began with characters performing a Sims-like procession of anties gasp, evil laugh, chuckle, and eventually evolved into a spoken word dance with spontaneous bursts of music, including Lady Gaga's ubiquitous "Bad Romance." With an exuberant and talented east of four, and witty dialogue, "Gasp" was the performance that stole the show.




after Dylan witnesses a murder in his own workplace and happens upon a large sum of money

In a pre-game interview with a Cornell defensive back, he explained that, "Our coach always schedules the first game as the easiest." Cornell might have been surprised to see the new state-of-the art scoreboard flash a 41-7 Scahawk victory. (Defensive back wishes to be unnamed.)

#### Setting the mood

Opening for the Scahawks was the new Wagner College Marching Band. The procession lasted roughly 15 minutes of intense drumming and "dancing" by the band. The band even led as a cheer section for the Scahawks, chanting "Let's Go Wagner!" The mood was set for the team to come running out of the locker room ready and fired up to beat Cornell. It was a sublime, almost fall afternoon, in which the new scoreboard, donated by former offensive lineman Marc Lebovitz, made its game day debut. Despite the lighting stricken board the night before it still looked absolutely first class.

The stands were filled with a good amount of rowdy Cornell fans dressed in bright red. The overall atmosphere included perfect fall game day weather backed with a full house of Seahawk fans.

The captains for Wagner are seniors #35 linebacker Keith Davis and #71 offensive linemen Zach Johnson. Sophomore David Lopez on the kickoff for 64 yards. Wagner football demonstrates the new 3-4 defensive formation that was introduced in spring training.

#### An early lead

In the first quarter on the clock for 9:17 Greg François snatches an interception at Wagner's 42. This quickly turns the first quarter into a scoring opportunity. Minutes later QB Nick Doscher scores on a 1 yard run. Lopez's kick attempt is good making it 7-0 Wagner over Cornell.

In the second quarter Wagner starts with the ball and Jeremy Martinez rushes for 11 yards for a first down. Wagner continues to drive the ball down the gridiron looking to cover large amounts of yards. They indeed accomplished this with a Doscher TD pass to Tyrone Collins for 41 yards. Lopez's kick attempt good making it 14-0 Seahawks over the Big Red.

Wagner's defense is hard to beat in the second quarter as Cornell is left with no choice but to punt. The Seahawks advance to a 20-0 lead over the Big Red. The touchdown was made possible off of Doscher's pass to Collins for 11 yards. Lopez's kick attempt was blocked by Cornell.

The rest of the quarter was back and forth drives of which a forced fumble by Jamiel Sims was of the highlights. After the first half Wagner had a 266-46 margin, averaging 7.4 yards per play over Cornell's sad 2.0 yards per play. Doscher had 139 yards and two touchdowns with Collins as the receiver. Senior Jeremy Martinez had 71 yards in the first half coming close to a second time career 100 yard performance.

#### Movie-like entertainment

At halftime the 1960 undefeated football team made an appearance. The Wagner football team went 9-0 making school history. Along with their appearance was the new Wagner College Marching Band, more specifically titled James Smooth Music and Leadership Institute All Star Marching Band. The band performed songs such as "Beautiful Monster" by Ne-Yo and "Nothing On You" by B.O.B. The performance maybe considered out of line or maybe even purely entertaining depending on how you viewed it. It more than slightly resembled the movie Drumline, in which the conductor told a story through the formation, music and dancing. The new band certainly added to the already upbeat and positive energy surrounding Grymes Hill.

# A stellar second half

In the second half Wagner had a outrageous touchdown play completed by senior Justin Matthews. 11:40 on the clock and Doscher threw a pass for 88 yards. Lopez's kick attempt was good making it 27-0 Wagner. After getting the ball back Martinez rushes a total 43 yards before scoring a touchdown on a 10 yard run. 34-0 following Lopez's successful kick attempt. Shortly after Stefen Gage intercepts Jeff Matthews's pass at the Cornell 20. Stefen returns the interception for a Wagner touchdown. Kick attempt good leaving Wagner 41-0. Many wonder if Wagner can hold the Big Red to a shutout.

However, in the final quarter Cornell manages to get on the board, making the final 41-7 Wagner victory. Sophomore Torian Phillips had 114 of his game high 133 yards in the second half. Martinez finished with 117 yards for a second time career 100 yard performance. There was a total of 552 yards of offense (8.9 yards per play) compared to Cornell's 242 yards (4.4 yards per play). Captain Keith Davis had a team-best eight tackles. Gage and Francois each had an interception.

Coach Hameline hoped for the team to execute and be prepared mentally which indeed they did. He explains that "after today we will enjoy this win and get ready for for Robert Morris our opening conference game and that will be a war."
