SGA LOOKING FOR STUDENT INVOLVEMENT

This semester, the Student Government Association is focusing in on motivating Wagner students to get involved in school activities and to become more active student leaders.

For this purpose, the SGA and the Dean of Students'
Office jointly sponsored a "Student Leadership Conference," held on January 23 and 24. According to SGA Treasurer Wade Appelman, the

participants, who included the leaders student of organizations as well as SGA members, came up with a list of many of the needs and concerns of Wagner College After considering students. issues, ten subcommittees of the SGA were formed to deal with major areas of concern. These include a "Student Leadership Incentives and Recognition" committee chaired Appelman, in charge of finding

ways to motivate people to become student leaders, and a committee headed by 5GA President Rick Auletta, concerned with obtaining new outdoor recreational facilities. Some other areas covered by committees include the improvement of the school food service and resident life.

As part of the plan to encourage student leaders to become more active, SGA is planning an award banquet to be held at the end of the semester. The banquet will honor students who have been successful, motivated leaders this year. Treasurer Appelman explains the SGA's intention to make the ceremony "very prestigious, as prestigious as the Academic Awards Convocation, held at the end

of the year to honor students who have achieved academic excellence." The plans include a dinner, the formation of a nominating committee, and the presentation of awards to selected student leaders. Appelman feels that the ceremony is necessary so that "people will realize that they are getting some recognition."

The Student Leadership Conference was called in part to try to remedy the lack of student involvement on campus. Participants discussed some of the possible reasons for this problem. Appelman noted that among the reasons cited was "the lack of publicity for some of the smaller organizations as to

BREGENZ IN THE SUMMER

This year for the first time there are two new summer courses added for the Bregenz study program. Now it is possible for any student to travel to Europe and receive credit for the experience of a lifetime.

Courses offered include German conversation and culture, and also exploring nature in Europe. Departure date is May 30th and classes run June 2nd through July 10. The schedule is Monday through Thursday for two hours each day. There are no prerequisites needed and the courses can be applied to the Tier I and 2 distribution that Wagner College requires.

In conversing with Mrs. Perri, the new Bregenz director, I discovered many things. "Bregenz is a beautiful town on a big lake. The students get to live with Austrian families and experience a first hand chance to absorb the culture."

The program has a little something everyone. for Nursing majors who follow a very strict schedule during the school term have the opportunity to attend Bregenz in the summer. For music majors there are summer music festivals on the lake and the Vienna opera plays till June 30th. For everyone else there is the chance to travel. Germany, Switzerland, France and italy are only a train ride

away. "You can be there in hours and the railway system is clean, safe and on time," said Peri.

The cost of this excursion is \$1,060 for air fare, room and board plus the tuition for credit. It is also advised that students buy a Eurail pass for \$375 which enables them to ride the railroad endlessly for the summer. PROPOSED HVH PLANS ANNOUNCED

During the winter break, a meeting of the Campus Committee for the Wagner I Eger Housing Project was held to inform several faculty and alumni of the proposed plans under consideration.

The idea is to convert Harber View Hall into independent living apartments for 65 year old retired adults who are willing to pay an entrance fee equivalent to the value of their home, which would probably rage from \$150-250 thousand dollars.

The projected number of units is between 106 and 134; approximately eight to 14 per floor. Each apartment will consist of one or two bedroons and a "Built-in" kitchen. There

will be a central dining room that will provide two meals a day, a third will be optional.

The roof of Harbor View could be converted into a lounge area where occupants could meet or entertain.

Parking space would be available, and a nurses station would be placed on the ground floor.

During the meeting, several theorectical possibilities were discussed which dealt with integrating senior citizens into the Wagner College atmosphere.

At present, there are new developments on the negotiations between Wagner and the representatives from Eger.

when their meetings are. Students are scared to go to that initial meeting and get involved. Spreading it by word of mouth is often the best way to get people involved." At the conference, student leaders discussed the proper way to publicize events.

On Tuesday, February 18, three Student Government members will be attending the Board of Trustees meeting. They will be bringing the concerns of students to the board, serving as "the students direct voice to the Trustees." Appelman encourages students who want to have a voice as

to what will be discussed to make their views known to one of the representatives.

SGA is loading its guns this semester, actively fighting to "student defeat apathy." Appelman explains students should see SGA as "an organization that does care about student concerns and tries to help, but needs more help from students. He encouages interested students to attend SGA meetings, or to drop off a letter telling SGA about their ideas concerns. The next meeting will be held Tuesday, February 25, at 3:30 in Union 108.

the Sears-Roebuck Foundation, which is awarding these grants to privately-supported colleges and universities across the United States.

Wagner College is one of 956 private accredited two and four-year institutions sharing in the \$1,750,000 donated by the Sears Foundation for the 1985-86 academic year. Funds may be used as the colleges and universities deem necessary.

The Adolph Coors Company is taking applications for the 1986 Coors Veterans' Memorial Scholarship Fund. This fund provides more than \$500,000 to the sons and daughters of American veterans.

The company will award a minimum of 100 scholarships, with a maximum of \$5,000 each, to eligible students who have successfully completed their freshman year.

Eligibility requirements are as follows: Applicants must have completed one year of college at a fully accredited four-year institution in the U.S., must have a GPA of at least 2.75 on a 4.0 scale, and must be under 22 years of age

as of July 1, 1986. They must also be a dependent of a U.S. Veteran (either honorably discharged, killed in action, missing in action, or who died in the line of duty. No restrictions are placed as to when the service person was in the Armed Forces.

Applications will be available starting March 3, and can be obtained from local Coors distributors or participating veterans organiztions, by writing Coors Veterans Memorial Fund, P.O. Box 7529, Wheeling, IL 60090, or by calling toll-free to 1-800-49COORS.

The deadline for applications and all other included materials is July 1, 1986.

Attention: Students currently benefitting from the New York State Tuition Assistance (TAP), or who need TAP funding:

Your help is needed in a statewide effort to convince New York state legislators that a TAP increase is necessary. When TAP was first instituted in 1974, funding for students covered up to 60% of

tuition. However, due to inflation and increasing tuition costs, the maximum percentage of tuition covered has shrunk to 42%. The TAP grant has not been increased for 1985-86.

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Tuesday is an important day on the Wagner campus. On the 18th, our Board of Trustees hold their first meeting of 1986. During this meeting, the fifteen or so distinguished members of the Board discuss matters which concerns each of us in some way.

As usual, several students are invited to attend a segment of this meeting. These include the Student Government officers, the editor of The Wagnerian, and for the first time, the president of the Student Activities Board. The students are not involved with any policymaking, however, there is time set aside when the students get to tell the Board how the school looks from their side.

With this in mind, I shall now begin this official open letter to the Board of Trustees (because I'm not scheduled to talk):

To Dr. Siegart, President Frank, and Other Distinguished Trustees:

Recently, a selected few students gathered for the first ever Student Leaders Conference. During these two days, a lot of ideas were discussed, however, the administrators and students which were gathered also talked about problems within our community. This sounds like a typical session of complaining, but I feel that the foundation was set for what has the potential to become a major turnaround among the students at Wagner. For the first time in my four years at Wagner, I saw that people cared and really want to make an effort to change the way of life here. Proposals were made and goals were set, in essence, something concrete is being done to alleviate the burden of student apathy which has stuck out like a sore thumb in my tenure at Wagner. However, we would appreciate your help. The students who live on campus have decided that they want more to do in terms of recreation and culture. I hope that this will be remembered when the Board votes on the proposals which affect student life at our school, although this issue will probably be reinforced at the meeting. Thank you for your consideration.



This book takes place in during the French Revolution, thus driven to excess by its own triumph, had turned into a reign of terror. A Course For R.A.'s

So you want to be an R.A.... then you must have heard about the new R.A. course being offered in the Spring. For those of you who really want to be R.A.'s, or for those current R.A.'s who wish to retain their positions, it is very important, or should I say mandatory, that this class be on your schedule for the upcoming semester. You might have noticed it on the course listing. It is called "Residence Life Management" (Education 591), and it will be taught by none other than our Dean of Students, Dr. Richard DiRuzza. Prior to coming to Wagner, he taught the same course for six years at Penn State and it proved to be quite successful.


This is a course in everything you ever wanted to know about being an R.A. just perhaps, never thought to ask. Discussions will focus on fundamental duties as administrator and enforcer rules regulations, as well as the added task of counselor to your floor with on special problems and needs. You have to be tough, to be sure, but it is equally important that you learn to act as a resource, especially for the freshmen, to whom dorm life is often the most new and strange. The course will also deal with more specific issues, such as, that first floor meeting," roommate problems, and safety techniques, including first aid care.

Resident halls should provide the student with more than just four walls and a roof," said DiRuzza. "They should function as a training ground, supplementing education the student already receiving in classroom. If this is not the case, if the right type of educational environment is not being created within dorms, then there is little purpose for this. Students might as well live at home or in off-campus housing. Thus it is essential that the school have a well-trained R.A. staff to see to it that such an atmosphere is maintained.

Now, if all of this has failed to convince you of what a great course you have just signed up for, here is a little added incentive - "three credits and a real live grade!"




