

## SUMMER ACTIVITY IN STUDENT ASSOC

At the Student Body meeting of June 8, over which the new by elected officers presided, two main points were brought up. Brad Smith presented to the hody a petition to the faculty in the form of a motion concerning credits for prescribed courses. It was stated that some prescribed courses require six hours, and in order to fulfill this the student must finish eight hours. This tends to slow up the present accelerated program and the petition requested the faculty to make revisions which would alleviate this condition. Due to complications which might arise, it was decided to present the petition to the faculty and let them make comments and suggest action which they deem wise to alleviate the condition.

The 2nd point was a discussion of the recommendations made by the Executive Council for the revision of the Student Association Constitution. Regarding the first recommendation the point was brought up that the student who was in school for only two months would have to pay the full 5.00, Student Assoc, fee while those who were in school for only one month would receive all the benefits without paying any fee. It was suggested, therefore, that every student pay a fee of 1.25 for every month in school, A final vote will be taken at the next regular Student Body Meeting.

### OPINIONS ON NEW PROGRAM .

Dr. Dunham, with the cooperation of the faculty, put out a questionaire to be answered by the students. An honest and personal opinion was desired, therefore it was to be answered

according to the honor system and not to be signed. The answers were on the whole favorable, but not to the point of "apple polishing."

A few significant remarks were as follows: "Not much homework on weekends and no tests on Monday." "Being lectured at for hours at one time in a required subject, is asking too much. " "Easter and summer vacations are too close together." "Makes it possible for a student to become interested in his work. "Gives a student to improve his weak subjects. "Jonderful for science." "I'm for the continuance of it (the new system) completely. "Any professor that keeps his classes in all day ought to be shot."

Despite the last statement the returns showed a desire for only minor changes, many which have already been made. There was a general desire to return to the old system after the war.
