PALLESKE WINS INTERNATIONAL OPERA CONTEST

Surpassing 220 contestants including 11 authors, 9 poets, 8 musicians, 15 conservatory directors, and 20 other 'professors, Professor Theodore E. Palleske, Wagner alumnus and instructor of languages, was awarded first prize in an international translation contest conducted by the Richard Wagner Society.

Entries came from 35 states and 10 foreign countries. First prize consists of \$150 and a probable position as official translator of operas for the Wagner Society, an appointment that would place the Wagner professor in a key position in the history of opera in America.

Unknown to the campus family, Prof. Palleske began the work on the translation of a scene from the second act of "Siegfried" in October, submitted the 30 pages of manuscript to the judges shortly before the contest closed on December 31. Judges were Melchoir, Ernst Lert of the Curtis Institute of Music; H. L. Mencken, literary critic; Fritz Reiner, director of the Philadelphia Symphony; Edwin Richards, professor of Columbia: Leopold Stokowski, and Lawrence Tibbett.

SPRING REGISTRATION HITS A NEW HIGH AS TWENTY-EIGHT NEW STUDENTS ENTER

Wagner's spring semester registration record jumped to new heights with a final entrance figure of 28 new students. This number is ten more than in previous years.

The addition of these 28 new students brings Wagner's registration up to approximately 230 men and women in the day school.

Frosh and Soph Classes Above Average Students

Dr. Marion Bartlett, head of the psychology department, has announced the results of the examinations given to the students entering in the 1936 and 1937 freshmen classes.

The average score was in the 68th percentile. This means that on the basis of 32,000 entering college students in the entire country, the Wagner score in ability to do college work is 18 per cent above the average. The records are made from the results of 185 colleges in the country that use the "Thurstone Psychological Examination" for entering Freshmen.

Men and Women Complete Season With Victories

Triumphs in Last Three Games Gave Men Six Wins; Women Win Six and Lose Three

Closing their current season in a blaze of glory by winning the last three scheduled games, the Wagner boys' basketball team, in their final game, decisively trounced Webb Naval in the auditorium to the tune of 37 to 27. It was the second win over Webb this year and brought the total number of victories up to 6, while the defeats remained double that number, or 12.

Two Triumphs

In its final victory surge, comparable to that of last year when the squad ended the schedule with two straight triumphs, the boys' beat Mt. Airy and Susquehanna, beside Webb. A rarity in Wagner basketball history occurred in the game with Susquehanna when the two teams engaged in a thrill-packed overtime game. At the end of the regulation game the score was 27 all. In the extra 5-minute period Wagner flashed a point-a-minute offense that completely swept the Crusaders off their feet, running up 9 counters and holding their opponents scoreless. Mt. Airy, as usual was handily defeated 36-24, as revealed by the fact that the entire squad of ten men participated, whereas only 7 men ordinarily were used by Coach Herb Sutter.

The one consolation that Wagner rooters can glean from the completed schedule is that Wagner had a team with a come-back. Many times out of the running, the team continued to fight. After auspiciously starting the season off with a pair of wins, the squad went into reverse and sustained 9 successive set-backs, undoubtedly some sort of a record. Then Arnold was beaten 28-22 and the boys went on to take 3 of their remaining 6 games.

Gott Stars

Much of the success of this year's inexperienced team must go to Captain Lew Gott who was the only starting regular this year, from last year's team, beside Hec Quintana. Other regulars this season were Johnnie Klc, Carl Sheie, Les Trautmann, and Mario Moccia. Second stringers were Lu Kirsch, Bob Burton. Carl Peterson, and Gerry Dietrich.

Girls Win Six

With an excellent record of six wins and but three defeats, the Wagner co-eds tackle the Brooklyn College co-eds this afternoon in Wagner's final game of the season. With Captain Grunow and tiny Margie Rieb leading the way, as they did in previous games, a victory is assured. Flo and Margie are the team's leading scorers this year, and they have received excellent cooperation from Dottie Heins and Louise Morris, the other forwards, as well as from the three pillars of defense: Anna Kane, Hope Juhl, and Elaine Comeforo.
