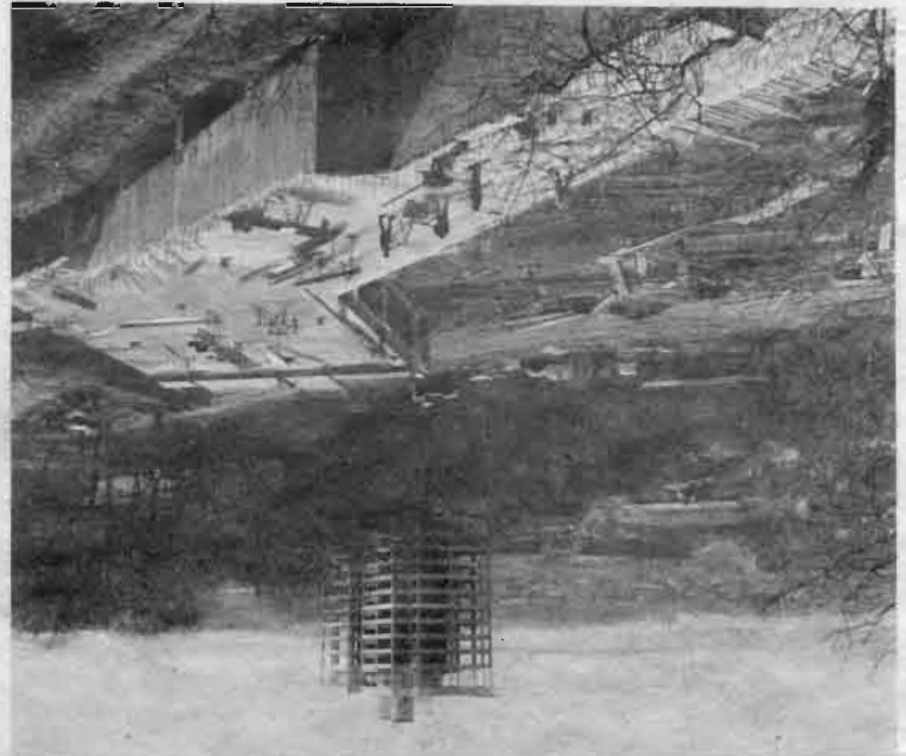
FORMAT FOR DISASTER

As many of you are aware, Wagner's Theatre Department has been holding a series of closed meetings in order to discuss a previously unknown and presumably controversial issue.

Baffling both students and faculty members, rumors of reconstructing the theatre and cutting back theatre scholarships have plagued the campus.

However, the outcome of these meetings was revealed Tuesday, and to the astonishment of all, the Theatre Department announced that

theatre majors would no longer be eligible for leading roles in any Wagner College Theatre productions.

Lowell Matson, Department Chairman, is reported to have said that theatre majors receive training in their classes, designed especially for them, but that Wagner's theatre productions provide the only opportunity for non-theatre majors to become involved in collegiate dramatic arts.

The department has wasted no time in promoting its latest decision, and rehearsals have already begun for a yet to be re-

vealed musical scheduled for mid-May. Although all names are presently being withheld, it has been revealed that a junior computer major has been cast in the leading role, while supporting roles have been taken by a freshman business major, a junior psychology major, and a senior IDS major. In addition to all speaking parts, there is also a twenty-five member chorus comprised entirely of non-theatre majors.

SUMMER COURSES TO CHALLENGE STUDENTS

March 30--Yesterday the college released the 1984 Summer Course Listing. Courses will be much more varied this summer than in the past. Among other revisions, Wagner will now be offering Existential Water-Ballet, Self and Sobriety, Nursing Intervention in Acute Silliness, and Advanced Interplanetary Travel, with corresponding lab to five of Jupiter's moons.

Existential Water-Ballet is an interdepartmental course offered jointly by the Philosophy and Speech and Theatre Departments. The course will be held in the Arthur Kill daily; dance instructors will don scuba suits and choreograph routines, while Wagner's Philosophers will inform students that they don't really exist, and also that they look pretty absurd.

DEAR MAGGIE:

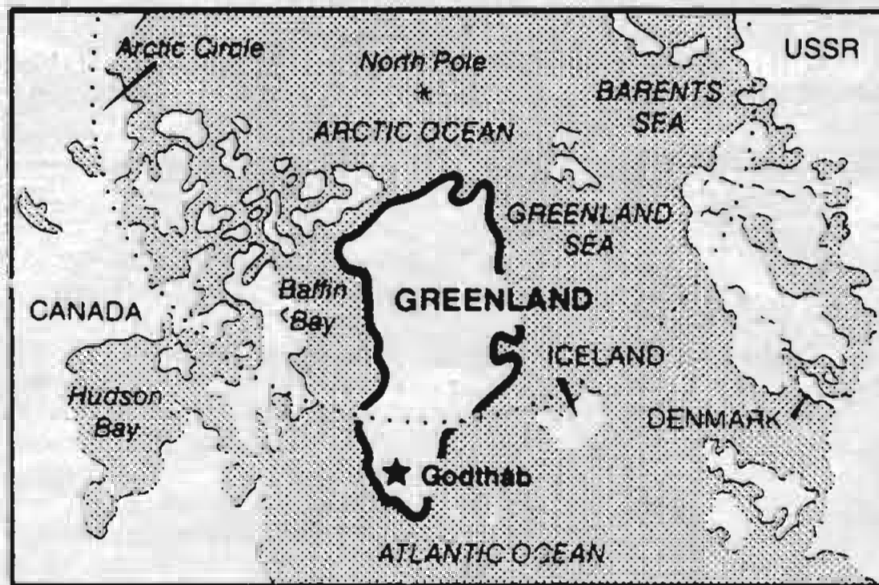

Wagner students will be in for a change next fall when TJ McDermott's implements its radical new board policy.

Three separate meal plans have been devised, each with a corresponding cumulative index cut-off. What this means is that the type of food you eat next fall will be a direct reflection of your academic standing.

A spokesman for McDermott

explained the decision: "We've always been interested in providing quality dining at Wagner, but the bottom line is why cast pearls before swine?" Our research indicates that those students with outstanding records have more sophisticated tastes, as well as better table manners."

Not only will the type of food vary, but so will the conditions under which it is consumed. Each meal plan will be segregated into different areas in

order to facilitate serving arrangements and provide suitable ambiance.

Among the amenities available to the studios will be a wine cellar, a stringed quartet, which will perform during lunch and dinner, and waiters for all tables.

For the middle group dining will remain pretty much the same as it is presently. In the case of these students in the lower range, they will be provided with a sack lunch and dining hall privileges on

alternate days.

This arrangement has been with the enthusiastic approval of board, faculty and administrators alike. As one commented: "The new board policy will be a tremendous incentive for students to achieve, particularly those whose academic habits are sloppy. In a surprise move, the college administration recently announced that this spring the football field will be cultivated as a vegetable and flower garden.

This decision was apparently precipitated by a contract between the college's Garden Club and "America the Beautiful," an organization which makes seeds available to groups who will use them for charitable purposes.

Unfortunately, the fine print in the agreement stipulated that in order to avoid a \$100,000 penalty, the college is obligated to plant all of the seeds provided, and, as it turns out, this quantity is sufficient to cover an area the size of the football field. In fact, there are rumours afloat that the actual amount of seeds far exceeds the space available in the football field and

that the next bit of turf the college has its eye on is the baseball field.

When asked to respond to the concern that this action might seriously impede the fall athletic programs, Garden Club coordinator Dr. Norberg Leesebert replied "Tough darts."

He went on to say that while the opening of the football season will have to be postponed until after the harvest, if the players can wear gardeners' spikes strapped to their shoes, the soil can be aerated while they play. There may be other practical gains as well. "Maybe we can teach the team to pull weeds too," Leesebert added.

Friends and fans of Ralph Azzara (lead guitarist for the rock group "Buster" and more recently "Image") will have an opportunity to see and hear another side of this talented performer. Mr. Azzara will perform his senior music recital on Renaissance lute and classical guitar, on Sunday, April 8, at 7:30 p.m. The concert will be held in the Gatehouse Lounge of Harbor View Hall and will feature music from the 16th through 20th centuries.

The program will get underway with the lute music of Vincenzo Capirola, an Italian nobleman from Brescia. The "Capirola Lute Book", as it is often called, contains not only music of this composer, but also of such notable contemporaries as Obrecht and Fevin. Two selections entitled "Recercar" and "La Vilanella" will be performed.

The recital will continue with music of "Merry Olde England" featuring pieces with such titles as



"The English Huntsuppe" and "Packingtones Pound".

Luis Milan (another nobleman who preferred to be addressed as "El Maestro") will be the featured Spanish composer. Milan did not compose for lute, but rather a similar instrument known as a "vihuela". The vihuela was shaped like

a guitar but tuned like a lute.

The next portion of the concert will feature the music of France. An "Alman" an "A Basse Dance", two popular dance forms of the Renaissance, will be performed. Pierre Attaignant has been chosen to represent this country.

Mr. Azzara will be joined by Edward Brown (Wagner's guitar/lute instructor) in two stunning lute duets entitled "Le Rosignol" and "The Sharp Pavan".

Mr. Azzara will change over to the Spanish classical guitar for the second half of Sunday's recital. Two compositions by "Matteo Carcassi" entitled "Andantino" (a major) and "Allegro" (a minor) will display the virtuosity that this great 19th century Classical composer must have maintained. "Study in b minor" by Fernando Sor (a contemporary of Carcassi, yet a more romantic writer) will follow.

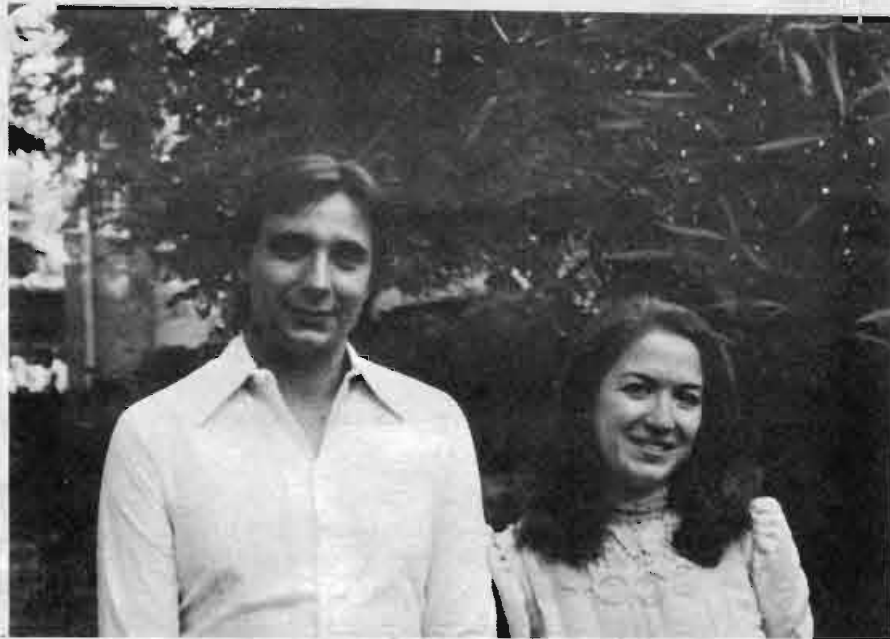
Another burst of virtuosity will be heard in two works by famed Brazilian guitarist Heitor Villa Lobos entitled "Prelude #1" and "Elude #1"; the latter is said to be inspired by the waterfalls of the Amazon River.

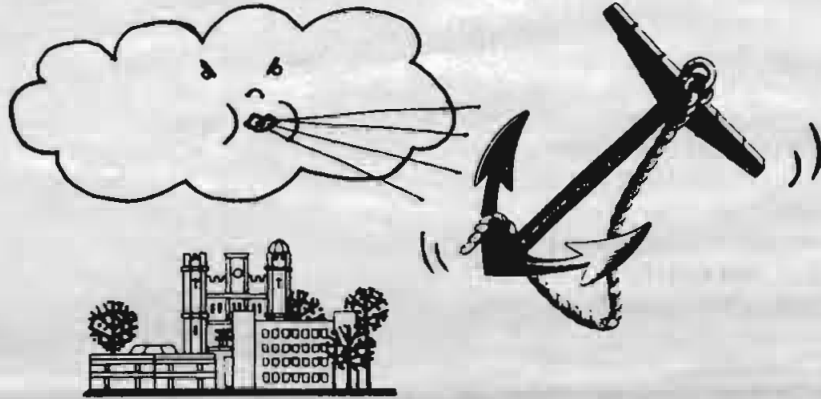
Anchors Away-y-y-y!

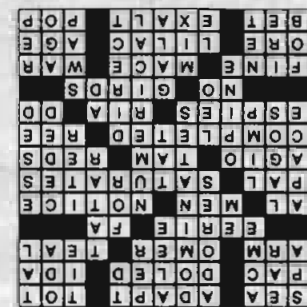

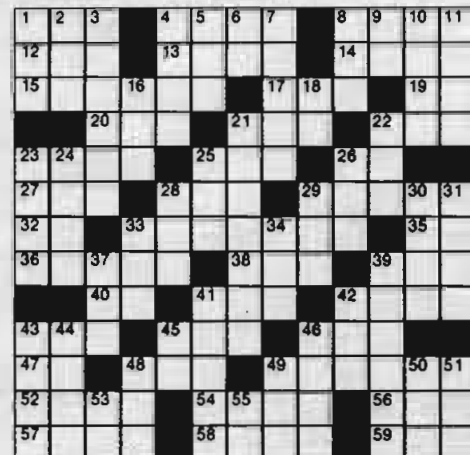

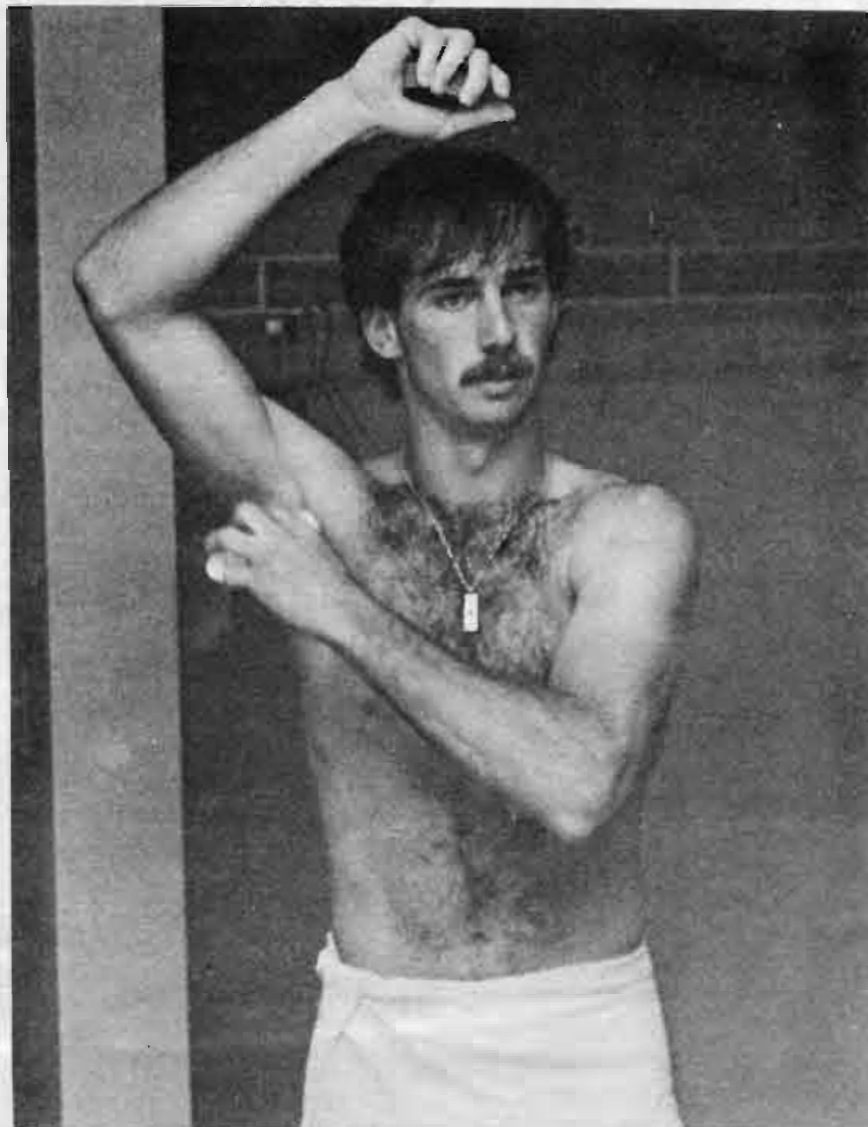
