## Jim (as in Classified) Smith

I don't usually step out of the editor's role in this paper, nor out of the editorial "we," but this isn't an editorial endorsement, it's a personal one -- and one that means a great deal to me.

I've shared an office with the Student Government for some months now and I've gotten to know the officers pretty well. I knew Jim Smith before this fall vaguely -- mostly I knew him as a good photographer and was sorry his duties as Social Chairman kept him from working on my staff. Watching his work on College Council, however, has made me realize that I had been selfish -- there may not be many good photographers around, but there are fewer competent council workers.

Jim's one of those dedicated types -- he spends time that he doesn't really have working on the things he cares about. And he has a larger capacity for caring than most people. It doesn't bother many people to hear a complaint about some area of college life, but it bothers Jim and what's more, he does something about it. It's easy to be the type of officer who just sits in his office, but I don't think Jim is capable of just sitting when something needs to be done.

His record as a Social Chairman speaks for itself -- the events the Board has sponsored on a budget that would have made most people throw up their hands in despair, have been phenomenal. The deal with Warner Brothers for loss-less movies proved Jim's skill as a businessman beyond a doubt.

Maybe a great Social Chairman does not a great President make, but Jim has additional qualities that should prove him to be effective as College Council chief executive. For one thing, he's organized -- a fact which never ceases to amaze me. And he works well with people, he's got a kind of unimposing charm that is seldom seen here at Wagner. People will work for Jim Smith -- if they'll work for anybody because to listen to him is to believe him. It's more than personal honesty, a rare enough quality, it's a kind of intense sincerity that inspires confidence.

And Jim is a member of that vanishing breed, the nice guy. I couldn't tell you the number of times he's rescued the Wag from one of its daily disasters. He also has a sense of humor -- too many people forget how important laughter is in this world, Jim can't forget that and for that reason should survive his term in office only slightly battle scarred.

Sure, he looks more like somebody's mother than a president -- but don't let that crooked grin and those big blue eyes fool you -- he'll make a damn good College Council President. If, of course, you choose to take my word for it, as editor and as a friend of Jim's. It shouldn't matter to me one way or the other, since I'm leaving, but it does. Somehow, when I evaluate all that I have put in the Wag this year, I feel this will be among the most significant.

## Vote, Don't Complain

We have already stated our preference for Student Government President, we hope the entire student body will state theirs by voting. It does matter who is elected if that person was not elected by a significant portion of the student body. Whenever there are complaints about how the Student Government is being run -- and there are plenty of those every year -- it is really laughable. How can students complain when they didn't even get out and vote? It's hard to believe that year after year people still run for these offices, the students don't even show that they care that the Student Government exists. It doesn't provide much incentive to do a good job in office if you've been elected by less than a tenth of the student population. If nothing gets done at Wagner -- which isn't true at all -- it's because for all the Student Government knows the student don't want anything done.

## Kiss Me I'm Italian

Must admit, we were hesitant at the beginning of this year -- we weren't sure how well an all-Greek S. G. would function. Well, we were pleasantly surprised at the results. Mike Provissiero has done a better job in office than any of his recent predecessors. He has re-worked the Constitution, gotten some profitable undertakings underway (such as Board of Social and Cultural Affairs deals, which ultimately go through Mike for money) and most importantly turned the College Council into a communications organ to the whole campus. A pleasant side-effect of Mike's term in office is that the Student Government Office is not a gathering-place for the ideological misfits of the campus. People keep complaining that he's never there -- actually the truth is, he's never there to goof off. When he's there he works and he doesn't spend the rest of his time sitting around talking and getting cigarette ashes on the carpet which has been a favorite pastime of Presidents in the past. Sure, there have been times when the S. G. Dear Editor:

The "Committee for a Meaningful Student Vote" has had a bill submitted in the New York State Legislature which, if passed, will enable each student to vote in the election district encompassing his, or her, college residence. This legislation is being sponsored by Assemblyman Arthur J. Cooperman and Senator Jack Bronston and, in addition, twenty-one other legislators have affixed their names to the bill as co-sponsors.

This bill must become law to enable students to achieve the political power to elect legislators in all areas of the state, next fall who will be responsive to our needs and will take steps to prevent arbitrary actions against our interests. The alternative is to perpetuate the political authority of those legislators who gave us the Albany Mall and are neglecting the needs of our education.

Write your state assemblyman and senator and demand that the "Cooperman-Bronston" bill be passed into law. We demand our full constitutional right to vote where we choose to declare our residence, not where we are told that we must officially reside and vote. The present restrictions on where we can vote are not applicable to anyone but students. They are discriminatory. They are unconstitutional. They must be removed. # AN INTERVIEW WITH DUDLEY DICKINSON

What's your main purpose in running?

It's to try and bring reality to Wagner College.

What do you mean by reality?

Everybody knows what reality is but nobody seems willing to do it. Do you think you can benefit the students?

Definitely.

How?

It's never going to get done if the students don't work -- one person can't go in as president and do the whole job. If the students want anything done at all. Let's say I was a born servant. I was born in order to do things for people. And every job I get that's what I'm doing -- being a servant of the people of whoever is asking me to do something. They have to want something to do something. They have to want something done before something can be done.

How would you try to get the apathetic student to come out and do something?

That's not up to me -- they have to do it. If they want to live their life without being told what to do and where to go and where not to go and when not to do something and when to do something, they've got to live it the way they want. If they don't they'll continue to be what they are. This is our school. We are the people and this is the way we want and that's the way it's going to stay. If you don't like it, do something about it. You could; start by voting.

Do you feel you represent a certain portion of the students?

No, I'm just like everybody.

Why don't you think you'll be elected?

Because I don't have a platform. I don't have anything I'm going to do. I can't say this is what I'm going to do, and this is what I'm going to do and also

If Dr. Davidson asked you to take a walk around campus with him and point out what was wrong, what would you tell him?

I would take him to various people and let him watch them. Since this is hypothetical, if it was possible to let him watch the average college student being bored out of his mind trying to figure out something to do with his life. I would tell him to let them live the way they want to live. There's a point here that doesn't make any sense. Wagner College students should have no "responsibility" -- do they? Only to themselves, they have. [Long pause.] I don't think I would probably walk around the campus with Dr. Davidson. I don't think anything you told him would work.

Did you work with the Administration?

No, but I can work with people. Instead of saying I was a student I would go up to the administration and say I'm a person, a human being. If you treat people like people they will probably treat you the same way.

RESUME BY JERRY LAZZARA

It is unimportant to me to review the past at Wagner, but it is important to explain the policies and expectations of the 1972 and 1973 Student Government and the relationship with students.

As always, the student government must be aware of the problems facing the student body in the upcoming year and must work to alleviate these problems; not through a policy of dictation but through a policy of direction.

There has to be a total re-examination and introspection on the role of the student government and the student body. The new objective of a truly representative government is not to assume the role of a catalyst for the students but to assume the role of an intermediate between students and their problems. The government has to discover the frustrations of the students and attempt to formulate a program by which the entire student body may become involved in overcoming these obstacles.

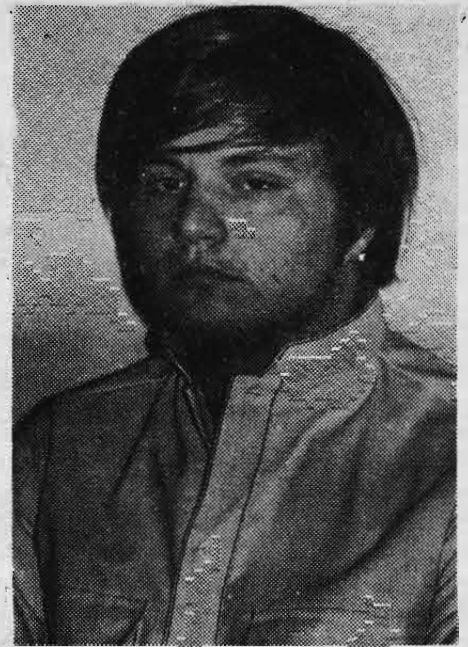

# AN INTERVIEW WITH JERRY LAZZARA

A paramount problem is the college not offering enough student employment. Here is a basic problem which the 1972-1973 student government has to attack in a positive manner with the entire student body being able to become involved. This involvement would curtail those students being employed for a just wage and those students not employed by purchasing the corporation products.

We are entering a new realm in student affairs where effective communications of all levels of the college community is imperative. By instituting a Campus Community Affairs Board (C. C. A. B.) composed of four students elected by the legislative branch of the Student Government, four faculty members elected by the faculty council, four administrators appointed by the Dean of the College, and four employees employed by the college. This board will have the responsibility of preparing an in depth report to be presented to the Board of Trustees at each Trustee meeting. This report should contain the achievements, problems, suggestions to alleviate these problems, and an analysis of the current situation on all levels of the college community.

Another plan to institute effective communications is a bi-monthly college community meeting. At each meeting, it will be the responsibility of the Student Government to inform the participants in detail the developments pertaining to the entire college community.

These two proposals will better equip the college community to understand each factions problems and needs and open the doorway to a unified college community.

Before there can be a unified college community, there must be a unified student body consisting of individuals who realize the inadequacies of the present conditions at Wagner and have the courage to work for a reasonable settlement. This can be attained through the student body or a majority of the student body voluntarily forming a student union which would have the task of collectively bargaining with the

administration for a reasonable settlement. This union would be independent of the student government and would be in the position to better meet the needs and grievances of the student body.

The establishment of the Campus Community Affairs Board, corporation under the control of the student government and a student union will better prepare Wagner College and the community for a more productive and inspiring year.

# INTERVIEW WITH JERRY LAZZARA

What is your main purpose in running?

In running it is not so much me as my platform. I feel with this platform we can get things accomplished here that have never been accomplished before not only for the good of the students but for the good of the college community as a whole. If I feel we're right for a new phase in a college situation. We cannot think of the student body as a separate faction but we have to think of everyone now only the administration, faculty and students, but the workers as an important phase of the college as a college community, we are all here together to gain from the experience.

Do you think you can benefit the students?

I think with my platform I'm not running so much for me. The platform is instituted will bring about change in the college.

Does your platform represent a certain portion of the students? Or the entire campus?

Well, it's working for the entire campus. I think that everyone will benefit. Not just students because I feel we are going into a new era where the college community is the most important and just students.

I would rather see the student government be disbanded and institute a college government. The first step would be CCAB

(Campus Community Affairs Board) which is actually a college government where everyone would hand in a report to the Board of Trustees when all factions would be represented. Employees are an integral part of the campus on Wagner College.

What do you know about the 4-1-4?

I'm a representative from faculty council. When Mr. Welby gave the report to the council, 4-1-4 I think was good, my sister has it at Clark University and it's really working well for them up there. It's an exciting program, especially the four week interim course. It offers you courses that you wouldn't expect to take during the year with heavy concentration during that one period. It's easier to learn from such a system. I'm in favor of the 4-1-4.

Are you on the College Council or have you taken part in any student activities this year?

Yes, last summer I was standing member of the Constitutional Committee with Billy Kourbage and Tony Mancini who wrote the new constitution that has been presented to the college council. It's a shame that it hasn't been accepted by the Council yet, because I'd like to have it instituted by next fall. I think it has some very good things in it.

What do you think of the new constitution?

Well, as one of the writers, I'm for it all the way. I hope it excites the students to come out and take an active interest in the government. The one thing that we wanted to do and which I wanted to do, is get the groups in the new constitution. I supposed this at first. What I mean is why don't we split up the legislative branch, have the Senate made up of groups like Black Concern, International Relations Club, small but important groups. Have the college council the way it's regularly set up now, with dorm student and commuter students.

This way the students can have a better feel of it. These groups are probably the people that do the most around here and for so long they haven't been heard. I'm very strong for the court system because I wrote that myself. It's very controversial and the administration is highly unfavorable toward it. Basically it's patterned after our own American court system. Whether or not our own American court's justice is good or not is a matter of personal opinion. I think it will be a step in the right direction if we institute it here.

The composition of the college court shall consist of: 1. five students elected by the student body, 2. two faculty members elected by the faculty members, 3. two personnel deans appointed by the Dean of the

College.

Section four, the Jury will consist of five students who are elected by the legislative branch, 2. two faculty members elected by the faculty 3. two deans appointed by the Dean of the College. Who will the judge be at a trial? Will all of the judges sit or will just one?

No, only one judge will sit at a trial. The student judges will be elected by the students, the faculty judges by the faculty, and dean judge will be appointed by the Dean of the College. Under the new constitution the judges will only be the mediators of the director of the court. They would rule on certain evidence, they would have no part in prosecuting and/or a decision of guilty or innocent.

How much work do you plan on putting into the office?

I'm willing to spend a lot of time, if you want to have a better college; you have to get up and get out and do things. The only way you're gonna do things is through hard work and I'm not afraid of hard work if it's gonna benefit the community as a whole. I would put in all my spare time, it's going to take a lot of time to get these things across because of new ideas and new ideas are always the hardest to institute. For instance, these's going to be a lot of hard work on the unionization, it's gonna take a lot to get the radio station together, to get the CCAB together. If we can get these things together and get them passed, all the hard work of that year will be worth it.

Do you know about the apathy on campus; what do you propose to do about it? You know how the students react, how do you think the students will respond to certain new innovations?

The student government can't get the students to get out, the students are gonna have to have issues that are exciting enough to bring them out. I think with this platform that I'm running in will bring the students out. Most of the things about the platform, it doesn't take all of the students to institute it. You can have a great majority or even a small minority of students to do these things and they will get passed and they will work. But as far as apathy goes, how do you combat it, there's really no way. It has to be an individual effort, you have to have the courage inside of you to get up and get out. You know it's gonna be hard work but you have the courage and the dedication to want to get these things done. And I think that the program Pete Gatti and I have, a sound basic program such as ours will make the students want to get out. One of the main things that I feel is that the student government can no longer be a catalyst for student movement. This is what I think has been killing it in the past. What is has to be is not a catalyst but a

mediator, an intermediate between the students and their problems, this is what I hope to do in the next year.

On the platform the establishment of a weekenders club--would you care to explain this?

This is an idea by Chuch Bond who's now working with Dean Brolin to help those students who stay on campus during the weekend to find something to try to attract them. You know that in the past students have said that there aren't any activities on the weekend, so why in the hell should I stay here, I might as well just go home. The only ones who really stay are the ones that are trapped who live 500 miles away and these students are just a minority and haven't been heard. They should be heard now. This weekenders club will be to try and get discount bus tickets for trips or tours in the city. You have NYC right across the way, the greatest city in the world with so much happening and yet on the weekends people just constantly sit here and they won't go into the city and use the resources it has to offer. So what we're gonna try to do is hopefully give them the opportunity to use these resources.

The creation of an FM-Stereo station--tell us what you've done?

I've been working with Bill Wells, I have my third class FCC license and Bill Wells has his first class license. He's gonna be the engineer and I'm taking care of the administrative problems right now. We've talked with Henry Heil about what would be needed for the FM station. The FCC only allows a certain number of stations to broadcast in an area and it is filled in NY. What we are trying to do is time share with a station. By time sharing what we mean is if they have their broadcasting from 8am to 3pm, as soon as they go off the air, we can go on from that time to whenever we want to close down. We are now writing letters to other stations in the area asking if they would allow us to time share. The first problem with the FM station would be to get FCC approval and license to operate. As far as the dollar aspects go, it is going to cost \$30,000 for the first year because we will have to buy new equipment. We are trying to get a grant or a loan to raise the money because the college just doesn't have it. Supposedly twice before, in '62 and '66 they tried to get an FM station and the Board of Trustees was behind that. So we see no reason why the Board of Trustees won't be behind us now which will help us a great deal, but the first obstacle is we have to overcome the FCC.

I was reading the the NY Times book review about the University of Iowa and the way their President set up a corporation by the student government to make money for the student government. This is so they could pay students, absorb more money and bring better activities to the students.

What type of corporation? What types of business?

For instance, we would sell cigarettes. The money we made from this we would use to pay students working for us. We would like to open up the coffee house as a business and operate it to get money in and turn back profits to the students. Profits would go to such things as a game room and things to entertain the students. Of course, we're going to have to start out small, but we have to start somewhere, sometime.

Do you think you can do it?

I think we can do it. I think for such a long time why student haven't been involved with the student government or with the college itself is because the student government has made platforms or plans where every student cannot become involved in, only a few could. This is what we're gonna try and stop this year. We want to follow the new format for a truly representative government. Let's find the problem and find the way to get everybody involved. I feel this corporation will do it, it will be those people who work for the corporation can get involved by buying our products and helping us earn more money for them so we can pour back more to the students. The most important on my platform is that there are a lot of students here who want to work and who have to work to stay in school. But there is no place to go because the college won't open up more student employment. I think it's about time the student government did something about this because it's supposed to be representing the students and if it doesn't try to solve this problem, I can't see how it can call itself a representative government.

What do you plan to do about the SAGA food?

First of all I think SAGA food is disgusting. I have never tasted worse food in my life. We had SAGA at the University of Iowa and the food was ten times better than here. There is really excuse for it. What we hope to do with this is for next term is to break apart room and board. If the student doesn't want to eat in SAGA, he doesn't have to eat in SAGA. We're going to go so far as to get a court order. I don't know, but I think that's an infringement on my rights and I don't like it and I know a lot of other people who don't like SAGA. If the administration gives us trouble with this, which I'm planning they will, then we're prepared to go to court if necessary to get this because

we're not gonna stand for it. If we don't get it from the administration, then we're gonna ask the students who don't want to eat SAGA to only pay one half of your room and board and see what SAGA does then. Also we're trying to set up a student union to collectively bargain with the administration as one of my platforms. Now there's a point where we can collectively bargain against SAGA. If this works out then we can end this atrocity down there. Because we don't have to eat the shit down there and take this anymore, if you don't give us what we want, then we can do this, this, and that just like a regular labor union. It's time the students stood up for their rights, we have a certain number of rights, we're individuals, we're human beings. We have to adjust to the times and the times are the 1970's a new decade, and in this decade, we're gonna see a lot of new changes of which one will be the unionization of students in colleges across the country.

What do you think of the Security System?

I think that now that it's back under the control of Mr. McNamara, it will shape up. When it was under Mr. DeMaria's control, the security guards weren't doing their job. All these car thefts and a number of things, instead of wasting money on a fence that a three year old could walk through and that only goes half way, manpower should be used effectively in Tiers and the West lot, then you'd stop a lot of car thievery.

Personally, why do you think you're qualified?

I don't think the term why am I qualified is appropriate. I think that I am qualified for not so much what I have done in the past because the past is not important anymore, it's over and done with. I'm qualified because of the platform that we have. We're running mostly on our platform because if the student want the platform we think they'll vote for us because we're the ones who can effectively institute it the best since we are who wrote it and know what to do with it. I think we have a damn good platform it is not me personally, but the platform who is qualified. It's solid, it's basic and will alleviate a lot of student grievances. If the student becomes involved in it, a lot of students have come up to me and said it's really a radical platform. But is it radical to eat a decent meal, is that radical? To get a better education, is that radical? To want more students employed, to get more students involved, is that radical? Was the unionization of labor unions radical? Then neither is student unionization, it's just a method by which students can get their rights. Everybody who hears "student rights" thinks it's radical, but rights are a basic thing which everyone would have. If you are not gonna fight for them then you're not gonna get them.

## AN INTERVIEW WITH JOHN ROCHE

What's your main purpose for running?

Because I'm very displeased with the way things are run around here for the students. I don't think the students get enough out of the school up here. I think a lot more socially can be done for them. There isn't anything available to them, we're sitting right in the heart of NYC. As far as Wagner and the students are concerned, there is nothing socially.

Do you think you can benefit the students?

I would like to that's why I'm running. Between knowing a few people and having the urge to win and be good at something all the time, I could give it a good run.

Do you know anything about the 4-1-4 program?

I know a little bit about it, but I haven't gotten into all that deeply, but from what I've heard, I like it. I've spoken to a few people in the 4-1-4 and the one part they said was pretty lousy, but for other people who took it said it was an independent opening in the middle of the year. If you need some money you could work or do some independent study. Or that point it's good. If they're gonna require you to take a certain field it won't serve any

Have you ever been involved in the student government before?

No, nothing up here.

Have you ever worked with the administration?

I'm the student rep in the business department. It involves bringing the bitches of the students out.

Have you done anything for the students thus far as a whole?

Not as a whole for any of the students.

Do you know anything about the new constitution that's before the Collegy Council now?

No, I've taken a look at the old constitution, but I haven't had a chance to look at the new one.

Do you know the campus is apathetic?

Yes, that I know because I see it in the business department.

What do you think you can do to overcome the apathy?

My two basics are the idea to get the people to stay up here on the weekend. It's becoming a suitcase campus. I was here in '65 (in service for four years) and there was a lot going on, everybody had a good time, there were no little cliques here and there. We had things that benefited the entire student body; it wasn't like a fraternity having a dance and only their friends come. I would like to get the whole school involved, to get a couple of concerts up here, groups of importance. Personally, why do you think you're qualified?

The little bit of experience that I've had in the past with setting to do things, I've always tried to succeed and I'm successful at it. While I was in the service I didn't hassle around, I just went out and tried to do the best I could. I've always had this urge to win and go at things. This is the main reason that I just want to go out and do it, and I feel I can do it. It's just a matter of pride.

How do you feel about Saga food?

I can't stand it, I think it's sickening. We've been looking into the Hawks Nest being run by the students. We think that could be done successfully and cut the prices too ('we' refers to his constituents in the campaign). Soemthing should be

stipulated in the contract that if the food gets lousy, we have the option to cut short on the contract, something where we're protected.

The other night you mentioned your purpose was to give the veterans more support on campus; please explain this further.

No, you misunderstood me; it's that we have no say at all that's my scheme. We don't have anybpdy on the College Council, we're totally unheard politically [Michael Provisiero says "That's nobody's fault about the College Council."] Well, see this I didn't know. We have nobody in the government; I guess our group is kind of apathetic. It's not that I'm trying to take over the place with veterans.

If you were to take a walk with Pres. Davidson and he asked you to point out things that you would improve around the college, what would you suggest?

First, we'd walk to the parking lot, quite a few cars have been stolen and vandalized. Why can't we have more security coverage? I don't think our security is worth a damn. I'd like a fence or something put around Tiers to keep the people out. Then I would take him downstairs and make him eat.

## AN INTERVIEW WITH JIM SMITH

What is your main purpose in running?

I feel like I've sat on my ass long enough at Wagner and I feel like I want to start doing stuff. I did a lot on the Board of Social and Cultural Affairs but not what I wanted to do. I really think I could serve the students. I think I proved myself pretty well on the Board. I think I have a lot of good ideas on how to work in the system. We have more now to work with than we ever had before. For years kids have been asking for student representation on committees; now they have it. It's a shame because now that they have it they don't use it. I think if we use what we have we could get a lot further than we have this year.

Do you think you could benefit students?

I wouldn't be running if I didn't think I could.

How would you benefit them?

Well, I think the one thing I have over everyone else is experience. The one thing some people don't seem to like too much is the rapport I have with the administration. I think it's important.

Do you feel you represent a certain portion of the students?

I don't represent any one group.

What do you know about the 4-1-4?

What I know about the 4-1-4 is that there are no credits involved. I'm not sure exactly how it would relate if you wanted to go onto graduate work, but it sounds like a very good idea, that one month's study. There are so many possibilities.

What else are you on except the Board of Social and Cultural Affairs?

I'm also on the faculty committee and the Board of Trustees Committee. The Extension Resources Committees, trying to find educational resources outside of Wagner, is very important to me.

What have you done for the students thus far?

I did all I could have with the budget I had for the Board. All I really had time to do was work on the Board, because it takes so much time. One of the most important things I have established is this rapport that will really pay off. I think the administration has a certain amount of rapport with me because I respect them. To be able to work with the administration is a good thing. You can work with them, but you don't always have to agree with them; I sometimes don't.

Why do you want to run?

I feel like I really want to get into the student body. I want to do things for them. It sounds corny, but like I was putting on the posters -- get rid of the apathy if I can.

What do you propose to do about the apathy?

I really don't feel there is anything we can do about the students who are already here because they're apathetic and they'll keep on that way. I feel the only way to destroy it is to nip it in the bud. That is, to catch the freshmen when they get in. Get them involved in student government right away and they won't have a chance to have apathy growing in them. Most freshmen come in and are kind of dazed with everything going on that they want to work with but they are kind of scared about it. So if we make it easier for them to get into student government and we show them how easy it really is, maybe we'll have more kids right from the start. After two or three years, well, we should have a very sufficient student body.

What do you know about the new constitution?

I'm in favor of the first three articles and the fourth article up until certain things, I'm quite familiar with it.

Why?

It's mainly a matter of semantics in some cases. But for the number of justices for the legislative court they have nine justices but I think they don't need that many.

Let's take the composition of the court first. You have more students than faculty and administration -- why?

But it's a student court. I'll grant you we may need a change in the college by-laws. One of the other things I don't particularly care for is their changing the personnel deans into prosecutors. That's more or less taking sides in pitting the deans against the students.

But at least you got a Jury by trial. The way the court works now is that you're guilty and have to prove yourself innocent?

But the point is that the deans are prosecuting the students and the deans aren't here for that. In most cases, the difference can be settled in offices without having to get to the court.

But with the new court we have a trial by jury?

We have more than two courts

now. We have the MRA, Traffic court, Freshman court. But they aren't the College Court.

So you don't like the court section?

But articles one, two and three I like. A change has to be made to make it a little more like the American system. I will grant you that it does seem a little ridiculous to walk in there guilty. To defend yourself on their grounds. I think it's much better to try and have somebody prove you guilty.

What do you think about Saga?

I was on the dining hall committee this year which kind of flopped. I'm sorry to say the reason is because of the student members. The faculty and administration members always attended, but student members never came out. I'm definitely in favor of having a one year contract which states that if the food does not improve we can drop Saga and pick up somebody else. Maybe if they cut out the monthly special and just tried to improve the food over the lengthy period of time this would help.

What do you mean by student advisement in your platform?

During the registration period, having kids who are majors in the individual departments having advisement with students coming into their major would be a good idea. This way they could advise students which teachers are good, which teachers to avoid, what courses to take and which ones to avoid. Faculty advisement just tells you what courses to take but don't tell you anything about the professors.

What about bi-monthly dialogue between students, Dr. Dieckman, and Dean Maher?

This was mentioned last year in the campaign but never came through. One of the biggest criticisms in student governments of the past has been a lack of communication with the student body. If you have a coffee hour down in the cafeteria once every two months with student representatives and the student body it will let the student body know what the student government is doing.

One freshman on all faculty and Board of Trustees committees?

As of now or even in the new constitution, freshmen can't be on College Council. So this is the organization to get them involved in. This way it gives the freshmen some kind of background so they can come into College Council in their sophomore year.

What about renting refrigerators to dorm students?

George checked this out. It's a rental agency that charges \$30 or \$40 to rent a 3 cu. ft. refrigerator for a year. The student government could handle all the paper work so we could provide it to the students at cost without any profit.

Is everyone running on your ticket a fraternity or sorority member?

Barbara Weltz isn't -- she's running for social chairman.

Personally, why do you think you're qualified?

Last year I didn't plan on getting into the student government. I got into quite by chance but I'm really glad I did. Last year I was a typical Wagner apathetic student. I really didn't care about anything. I did get involved and that's the point. I'm really glad I did change. I really feel funny sitting back and not doing anything. On that attitude alone I could really help.

Let's say you and Dr. Davidson went for a walk and he asked you to tell him what you would do if you were in his place. What would you tell him?

One could be the co-ed dorm. I'm totally in favor of that; you do have options to it. You have to consider both views, kids who want it and don't want it. Just so long as you have the option to stay in a non-co-ed dorm. Another thing would be the mud on campus. The biggest thing you can do to prevent mud would be to plant grass. Which is the thing they haven't done. The conditions of the buildings -- North Hall needs to be renovated because it's falling apart, plus the writing on all the walls. The one thing I really don't like is seeing posters all over. It's really a shame to walk around campus and see these posters plastered all year round even in the union on all the walls. It subtracts from the beauty of the buildings.

What do you think of security?

You have to admit it did improve this year because the number of car thefts has dropped. The number of thefts from cars has also dropped. There's really no way you could avoid it unless you had one guard in each Tier and over in

West lot. The only thing possible is to increase the security system which would mean increasing tuition.

## AN INTERVIEW WITH GEORGE BOYER

What is your main purpose in running?

I think it's mainly to continue our line with the administration and the students, to be an intermediary with them.

Do you think you can benefit the students?

I think the experience I have gained being treasurer this year, working with various parts of the student government, will benefit both students and administration.

Do you feel you represent a certain portion of students?

I feel I represent a certain portion but I try to be open-minded enough to represent everyone.

What portion would you represent?

More or less the middle type student, neither right nor left wing.

What do you know about the 4-1-4?

We got the reading days back after students complained to the administration.

We worked with the administration and we respect each other. We can talk to each other. We may disagree a lot but that's good, and being able to talk is a big beginning. They used to be afraid to talk with the student government.

What do you know about the new constitution?

I think the constitution could help bring new students into the student government. I look specifically to the part of the legislative body that represents groups. For the first time students that are on the Council will represent some group of

people. They can go back and report what's happening in the student government. Right now the way the Council is set up they are elected but they don't know who they represent. Right now the main complication is getting it through the administration. What do you know about the apathy on campus? What do you plan on doing about it?

We are going to try to aim at the freshman. I think you could try with sophomores, juniors, and seniors and it wouldn't be successful. You can get a large change in program with the freshman by reinstituting the orientation program which was eliminated this year. We didn't do anything to play it up this past year. I think by trying to get the freshmen on various types of committees and getting them interested right from the start, hopefully they'll learn and get interested in the student government.

What do you think of Saga?

I know the school's getting up a committee to look into other food services. Compare the financial aspect and food quality and the service they are getting to ours. I heard a lot about the Moran corporation at SICC and it was positive, but I don't have anything definite.

If you were to walk around campus with Dr. Davidson and point and point things out to him, where would you take him? What would you tell him?

Being a dorm student, I think we would start there—I would look to the atmosphere in the dorms. It's a little different this year, but more or less the same, a very casual attitude toward everything. Some kids just don't care, I think he could deal with the academic issues, more social things at school or a combination of the two. But generally to get the students out of the dorms and into things. As for the physical plant I think the school has plans for a Cultural Arts building, but no money. I believe that's the next building they want. I would say something about the co-ed dorm if the do-ed dorm could be imagined so that all students got basically what they want, because some students don't want do-ed dorms.

Personally, why do you think you're qualified?

In my freshman year I started working with the MRA, through that I became interested in the Student Government and joined the College Council in my sophomore year and am treasurer this year.

I think through working with different people and seeing how they react to different things, different philosophies, they each have, I think I gained a certain way of talking with people but don't always agree, but at least

listen to each other—with students and administration.

What do you think of concerts?

Jim and I tried to arrange the budget for next year so we could have maybe two main groups and maybe more here for concerts.

What do you think of security?

I think the parking lots are bad, that's where we need the most security. I know the Ad Hoc Committee talks about fencing in Tiers, putting in gates and showing your I. D. to get in. But Demaria said the time aspect would anger the students. He could be right, I think during peak hours, but if they arranged it from 10 pm to 6 am and had students show I. D.'s in and out then because that is a high risk time, it would work. The security in the dorms doesn't hassle you, they stay in the background.

Summing up: I will try to make an honest Student Government we will try as hard as we can. I think we will have all types of views and try to represent everybody, if possible.

#### STATEMENT ON COMMUTORS

#### AN INTERVIEW WITH PETE GATTI



PETE GATTI--We haven't had unity

What's your purpose for running?

The main purpose is to give an effective voice to commuters and dorm students. The basic problem is that we haven't had a unity, we haven't had effective communication between dorm and commuter students. I think that I, knowing something about the commuters, might be able to do something. I'd try to lend a communicative hand between two bodies of students.

Do you think you can benefit the students?

I can try, it would be my ultimate aim.

Do you feel you represent a certain portion of the students?

I would like to think that I would try to represent everybody. Sometimes we've had emphasis on an particular group instead of a small group which takes control of everything but a large representation where everybody tries to become involved, I think the problems in the past have been that students feel they can't get any change in the student government. What I would try to do is to represent everybody and show them that they have a possible hand in it. That's part of the platform that we try to have everybody involved in the student government, anybody can come in and voice their problems. In doing so, maybe we won't get the indifference that we've had in the past.

What do you feel about the 4-1-4 program?

I think it's a good idea, it gives kids a chance to advance if they want to move out a little earlier. This way they're not stuck to just the summer program, this way they can take one course in January and get out earlier. I'm for it. I think it's a good idea.

What have you done for the students thus far?

I try to come to the Wagnerian last year to bring out and show with my camera, that have been up here, working out assignments that way, to show some of the problems with the administration.

Have you ever worked with the administration before?

No, I haven't worked with them on a formal sense, I've talked with them informally after student government meetings. I've been on the college council since the end of last semester. The question of the unlimited cut policy should have been voted in in a referendum to go back to the old unlimited cut policy. There has been some discrepancy defining what the unlimited cut policy is.

What to you know about the new constitution that's before the college council?

I'm not too familiar with it. I knew there was one problem with changing the courts. Basically the change in the court system and a committee set up instead of a president and vice president. To be quite honest about it, I really haven't had a chance to review it.

Do you know about the apathy on Campus? What do you expect to do to get the students out to support your platform?

I felt that apathy was present on campus 'cause people felt they could not initiate change. I think if students felt they had an effective voice, communication between the leaders in the student government, an effective bargaining position, an effective unity of strength then I don't think students would be quite as apathetic. We're trying to have everybody involved in our platform. The idea of unionization in our platform was to have the students have their own voice independent of the student government where they themselves voice what they want. Whether they be commuters, dorm students, fraternities, sororities or particular departments, each could have an ideal effective voice. I think that would result in lessening the apathy up here. What do you think about SAGA?

I agree with Jerry Lazzara regarding paying for room and board separately. In your platform

you have the establishment of an on-campus infirmary, would you explain that?

The on-campus infirmary would be set aside mainly for dorm students. By talking with people in the dorms, I feel there has been a general lack of medical care, there have been cases where people have been vomiting blood and were told to wait until morning. Basically what we need is an infirmary where proper medical supplies would be set up. I think Women's Residence would be an ideal place. If we wait for something to happen, then it's too late.

What do you mean by incorporating the student government?

Basically by incorporating the student government, we would be able to take the profits raised through various methods by selling cigarettes, etc. and would be giving back what the students have put into it which has not been the case in the past. We can set up jobs for people who want to work. It's a beginning, we can stem the apathy on campus because we'd be getting involved and be getting money for it. That's the best initiative for individual participation.

About a bi-monthly college community meeting, what do you propose to do?

Have an agenda set and properly post it around the school, letting the students know what we'll discuss and trying to get an idea of how the students feel. If there was something of relative importance, the students could come down and rap with us to let us know what's happening. The problem of a lack of communication and by talking with us is what is generally needed.

Personally, why do you think you're qualified?

I think I'm qualified because I feel I know a certain percentage of the dorm and commuter students. I do know some of the problems involved. I personally feel I could make a change, I feel I could present as an effective voice for the students in getting together the ideas which we have in our platform. If students are generally in agreement with our ideas in the platform, I feel I can do my best to initiate those ideas.

How do you feel about concerts up here?

I think we can initiate it with our weekenders clubs. It brings out people on weekends and gets them together. We do have to watch the promoters involved, we've had trouble with that last year. Generally, concerts are a good thing, but if we don't investigate the promoters, not to do so would hurt the student body.

## STUDY URBAN LABOR-MANAGEMENT RELATIONS

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Next Fall Pace College in New York City again will offer its M.B.A. program in labor-management relations - first graduate program of its kind to be given in the metropolitan New York area.

The program will be conducted by the College with the support of the Edward Corsi Labor-Management Relations Institute. Special features include the following:

- instruction by prominent labor-management practitioners from government, labor, and management
