

Hammond Returns To Coach Drama At Wagner

Mr. Ronald Hammond, after an absence of three years, returns to the campus as director of Dramatics. He has also been engaged recently to stage the latest play of Eddie Dowling, famous Broadway actor and producer.

During the past summer he directed "My Dear Children" at the Stony Creek Theater. This play starred Sinclair Lewis. Another of his successes during the summer was "Yes, My Darling Daughter."

Mr. Hammond started his dramatic career with such top flighters as John Gielud, Judith Anderson, Lawrence Olivier, Dorothy Gish and many others. His first appearance on the boards was at the age of 7.

He was graduated from St. Paul's College, London, England in 1918. He founded the Stony Creek School of the Theater at Stony Creek, Connecticut. His successful New York productions include "Bird in Hand," "The World We Make," "Family Portrait," and many others.

Mr. Hammond has been associated with the International School of the Theater, London, England and was a Member of Sir Barry Jackson's Birmingham Repertory Company and of Sir John Martin Harvey's London Company.

The committee hopes to make the pep rally a traditional affair on the Wagner campus.

Dave Sweet, Frosh Back, Is Slated To Start Game

The 1941 edition of the Wagner Green Wave opens its season today with the powerful Arnold College aggregation of New Haven, Connecticut.

The Kirchmyermen go into the tilt with a veteran team. With the exception of Dave Sweet, freshman sensation, the starting line-up is composed of varsity lettermen. Six of the players are seniors who are determined to make their last year of college football the best in the history of athletics on the Hill.

The Wagner squad showed plenty of fight and form in its first week of contact work, but the lack of cool weather may prove to have had a weakening effect on the condition of the players. Coach Kirchmyer said in an interview yesterday that "the terrific heat of the week has caused a slowing up of work in practice sessions, but we hope for the best when the team takes the field against Arnold."

Second String

When queried concerning the rest of the season, Coach Kirchmyer replied: "The first team is rounding out nicely, but the success of the season depends upon the second string men."

While the starting team will be replete with familiar faces, at least three freshmen will be in the thick of the fight before the final whistle blows in the first game.

Dave Sweet, who is shaping up as one of the hardest runners and blockers in Wagner history, has received the praise of Coach Kirchmyer. Frank Daly, former New York Military Academy center, has been made over into a running guard and is becoming very proficient at blocking. Jerome Papparelli, Wagner's new 215 pound tackle, also looks good and should get plenty of work during the season. Cliff Orlemann, another new man on the Wagner squad, is also doing well at tackle.

Starting Lineup

The starting team will have last year's captain, Mike Perfect, at center, with either Stan Rycyk or Frank Daly at the running guard, and Herman Fersch or Eric Grosse at the other guard position. Big Jim "Jumbo" LaHart has been moved to tackle. Either George Steponkus, last year's sensation, or Papparelli will be at the other tackle. The old steady, Connie Schroeder, who hasn't missed a game since entering college, will be at one end, and Ed Wholihan at the other. Ed is much stronger this

Team Condition

In answer to another question about the condition of the team, Coach Kirchmyer said, "The team, on the whole, is slightly heavier than last year's squad and much faster. The 1941 edition of the Green Wave shows more precision in the execution of its plays than last year's squad."

Kirchmyer feels that the reserves will prove the making of this year's club when they learn the plays and get used to the swinging type of play that he has used with some measure of success in the past.

When asked about the famous "T" formation, Coach Kirchmyer replied: "Watch Wagner use the famous "T" formation which has been a part of its attack for the past 15 years."
