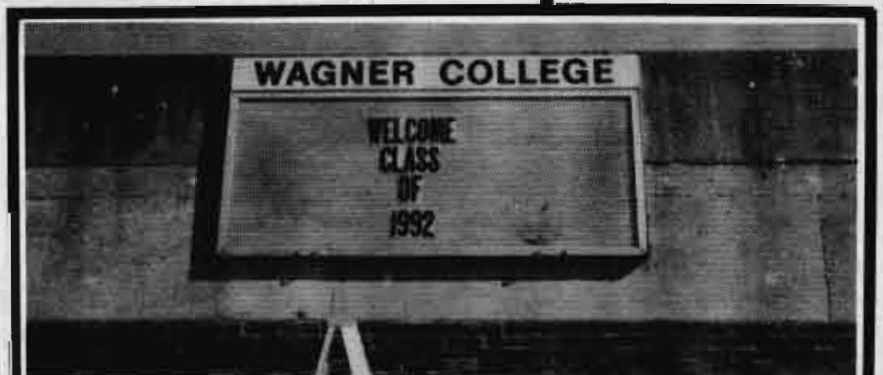

A NEW FACE FOR A CHANGING PLACE

As another year begins at Wagner College, the emphasis is on positive change and startling improvement. Holding the reigns is a man new to the Wagner College Community, but soon to be a well heard of as well as thought of addition.

Beginning July 1, 1988, Dr. Norman R. Smith became the 17th President of Wagner College as well as a strong force pushing Wagner to its illustrious position as a notable private college. Impressively backed by his experience as a previous college Vice-President and Dean of Students along with a tenure at Harvard, President Smith's credentials as well as abilities shine through the vast improvements he has already brought to the Wagner Campus.

Probably the most visible changes President Smith's presence has brought to the campus lie in the numerous changes to the Residence Halls. He believes that a pleasing environment and enjoyable living conditions are a prime factor in positive student reactions toward the college. President Smith also stresses his hopes that the obvious physical changes in residential living will be the beginning of a brighter outlook for Wagner College.

As apparent in his own philosophy, President Smith feels that, "People will take care of something worth taking care of." He also holds great faith that students will accept responsibility of keeping the Residence Halls at their newly achieved best so future enhancement rather than repairs can be made. Success will depend on the willingness to move forward and respecting what has been established.

Respect for conditions in residence as well as in common campus surroundings is stressed by President

Smith. He holds strong to the desire of preventing a select few individuals bent on trouble from ruining things for everyone. He states that "those inclined to live so that vandalism and destruction must be a part of their lives will not be permitted to remain in the dorms." No reservations are held toward the elimination of the handful who will make conditions unbearable for others. "Those who enjoy living decently won't mind the strictness because it will yield the best results." And, even though he does not intend to make the way easy for those who insist on doing harm, President Smith invests strongly in the personal belief that students will take care of things and puts forth a plea to students stating: "Please prove me right!"

One of President Smith's goals for the next four to five years is to see a broader mix of students from a variety of areas, as variety in student population results in a richer college experience. And, through campus improvements, positive reaction to Wagner will no doubt increase, boosting enrollment and overall morale. President Smith also plans on establishing a greater endowment for the college, lessening the dependency on tuition for the financial burden facing it.

In short, by holding the position of Wagner College President, President Smith has and will continue to establish a structure for growth, but everyone must be involved to make it work. This means controlling negative attitudes and emphasizing constructive thinking to become the quality type of college that President Smith feels Wagner has the potential to be.

DAKA is a national food service corporation. The corporation is 15 years old and the letters stand for Dining And Kitchen Administration. Chip Kennedy is the Food Service Director, Joe Basini is the Food Service Manager and the Catering Coordinator is Lisa Hrozenchik.

The Hawk's Nest will be open Monday through Friday with breakfast being served from 8:00 until 11:00 AM and lunch from 11:00 until 4:00 PM. Whole pizza pies and hot and cold heroes are available for take out and delivery 4:00-11:00 PM by calling x119.

DAKA is also bringing back the convenience store which will be opened Monday through Friday from 3:00 until 11:00 PM, and on Saturday and Sunday from 2:00 until 8:00 PM. The convenience store will provide snacks, soda, dairy products, toilet articles and houseware supplies.

The Dining Service is planning some exciting specials in both the Hawk's Nest and Cafeteria.

"Theme Nights", boredom breakers and steak nights are planned for the Cafe, and in the Nest, something special will be planned for the World Series, Monday Night Football and other special events sponsored by SGA and SAB.

All board plan students will receive a meal ticket from the Dining Service which is to be attached to their Wagner ID. This ticket must be presented at all meals upon entering the Cafeteria while the clerical staff will continue to sign in at all meals.

DAKA is also offering a Discount Meal Plan for all students not on the regular meal plan. Each ticket costs \$34.75 and is good for 30 Breakfasts or 15 Lunches or 10 Dinners; this is available in the Dining Service Office.

The Dining Service welcomes all comments and suggestions and is looking forward to meeting with the Food Committee on a regular basis to resolve any issues that arise. DAKA is also looking forward to a successful year for everyone

STUDENT SERVICES ON CAMPUS

HEALTH SERVICES

The Health Services Office functions as a screening, diagnostic and treatment center for emergency cases and short-term illnesses. Because the college does not maintain an infirmary, prolonged care must be continued in a hospital. In these cases the student must be in the care of his/her choice of doctor or the college physician. Students harboring a communicable disease may not remain in the residence halls. They are evaluated in the Health Services Office, and arrangements for their care are made in consultation with their parents or guardians.

Accidents and Injuries: Accidents and injuries that occur on campus must be reported immediately to the Health Services Office, which will then notify the Department of Public Safety. This is essential to safeguard students' insurance provisions.

Health Insurance: The college has mandated that all full-time students carry an accident and health insurance policy provided by the college.

The college assumes no responsibility for expenses incurred for treatment by other than our authorized college physicians when students are seen in the Health Services Office.

Meals for the Infirm: Meals will be delivered to bed-ridden students upon written authorization from the nurse or staff member on duty.

Medical Emergencies: After office hours, resident students are advised to report immediately to the resident assistant on duty who will direct them to medical assistance.

The emergency treatment permit, issued to all students, must be signed by the student or his/her guardian and filed in the Health Services Office. In the event of a surgical emergency, every effort will be made to consult the student's legal guardian in advance of the treatment.

Medical Excuse Notes: Medical excuse notes will be issued to students who warrant them after they have been examined by the physician or nurse. Students must report to the Health Services Office at the onset of their illness.

Students returning to the campus after an extended illness must submit a doctor's note to Health Services.

PUBLIC SAFETY

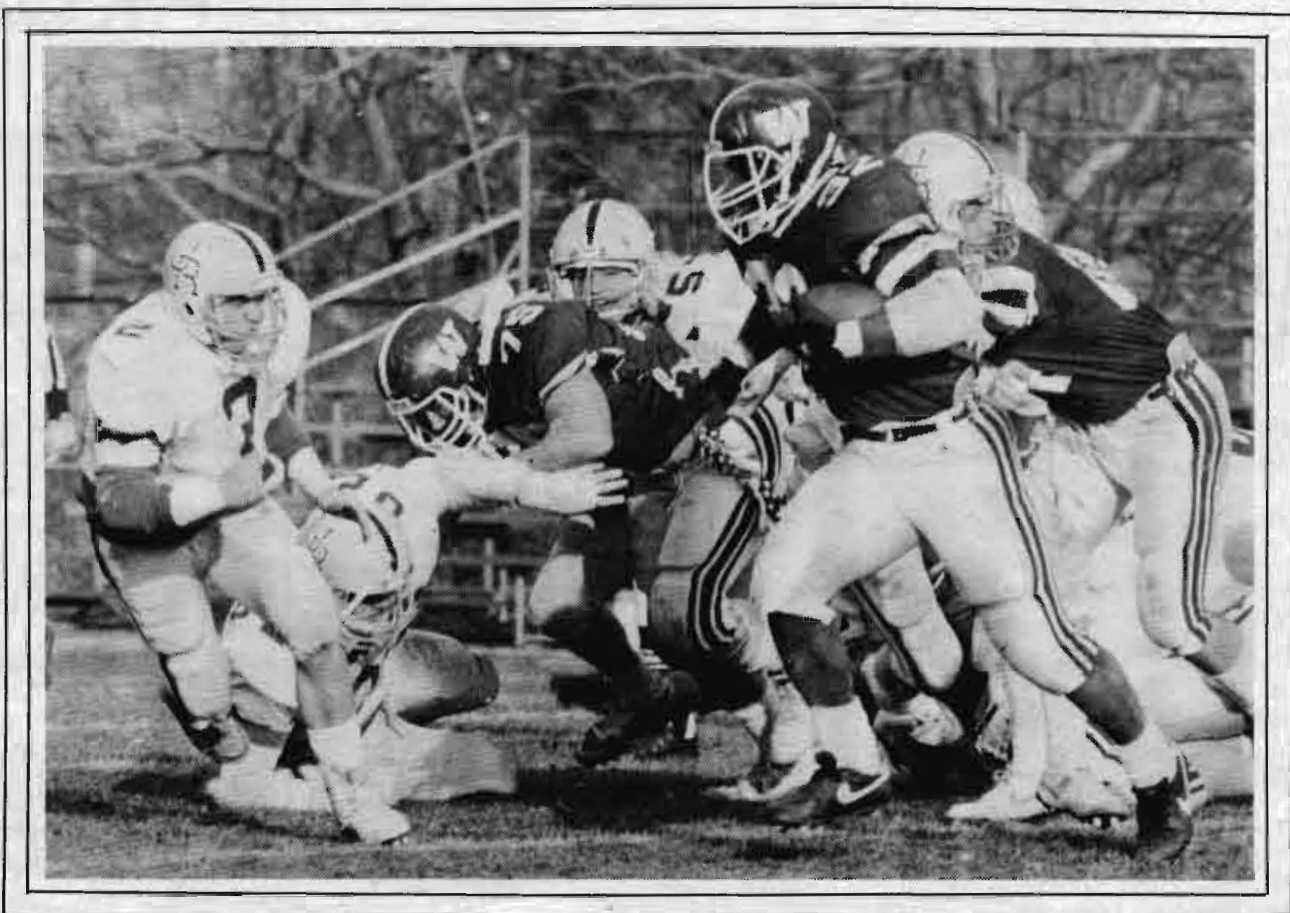
The Seahawks won more games than any other college football team in the last season, with an astounding 13-1 record including 8 on the road victories. Tackling teams like Rochester and Fordham, Wagner stormed to its first national title, becoming the 1987 NCAA Division III Championship Team.

The Seahawks kickoff a rugged six-game home schedule with a September 10 opener against 1987 playoff team Ferrum College. Rivals Hofstra and US Merchant Marine cap the dual sets of back to back home games due to rage on Fischer Field this season.

SEAHAWKS

UP IN SMOKE

Many changes have taken place over the last few months which have had a large effect on Wagner College. Many are plainly visible while others may be unconsciously overlooked. One pressing issue which must be observed pertains to the Clean Indoor Air Act and its effects on the smoking population of Wagner.

In accordance with Part 25 to Chapter 1, Title 10 of the Official Compilation of Codes, Rules and Regulations of the State of New York, certain rules have been adopted regarding smoking. What all this means to you is that the places in which smoking is permitted are becoming fewer and regulations and strong consequences for those violating them are becoming greater. By choosing to ignore posted warnings of smoking prohibited areas, an individual will be breaking college as well as state laws, and no doubt the fines for doing so will visibly reflect the enormity of the offense.

To be completely specific, smoking is prohibited throughout all Wagner College facilities except in designated smoking areas identified by "smoking permitted" signs. No one can assume the individual freedom of "lighting up" in any enclosed work area occupied by more than one person, unless the area is occupied exclusively

by smokers. Smoking is also prohibited in auditoriums, classrooms, conference rooms, meeting rooms, elevators, hallways, restrooms, medical facilities, and rooms or areas containing equipment used by students or employees in common.

The bottom line is that the remaining areas where you are permitted to smoke (few as they are) are limited to your private homes, cars, select designated areas, and the great outdoors. Which, of course, leaves you with approximately three choices:

a. Seek out those few legal spots and relax with a cigarette.

b. Kick the habit (a score of information and help plans are available in the nurse's office).

c. Ignore college and state laws and go on smoking as usual (although bear in mind that New York State attaches an annoying 50 dollar fine per offense for individuals found smoking in wrong places along with similar unpleasant penalties imposed by college officials).

As a final word to the wise at Wagner: Watch where you smoke; because they'll be watching you!
