

Wagner Receives \$1 Million Grant For Solar Energy System

Governor Pops In To Turn Our Heat Up

On Wed. Sept. 6, it was announced that Wagner has received a grant of nearly \$1 million from the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority, for the purpose of installing a solar energy system to supply heat and hot water to the science building and communications center.

Gov. Hugh L. Carey made the announcement a top of the science building. When asked why the announcement was made there, Carey replied, "from here you can see where the solar energy demonstration project will be."

When the solar energy demonstration project is completed, it will be the tenth largest in the northeast according to Gov. Carey.

He also stressed the importance of solar energy in reducing fuel costs.

According to Dr. Thomas Henkel, project director and a Wagner professor of physics, the development of the solar energy project has been in the planning process for about two and a half years.

The proposal involved a consortium of representatives from the N.Y. State Energy Research and Development Authority, the Carrier Corporation, of Owens, Illinois, and the architectural firm of Schuman, Liechtenstein and Claman and the college.

When the proposal was first presented to Wash. D.C. and N.Y. State, it asked Wash. for \$1.5 million

and \$½ million from the state. These sums were asked due to the fact that the proposal contained funding for a solar energy system as well as an energy conservation method. The proposal was rejected by Wash. and the state was noncommittal.

Although Wash. continued to reject the proposal, N.Y. State decided to fund the entire project with an allocation of \$943,730.

Architect Albert Efron, stated that the primary work has been completed, and the actual drawings are going into production, when asked what is the next step.

According to Dr. Henkel, a land survey will be made to test the nature of the soil.

In Nov. the indoor mechanical

work will be done and the outdoor work will be done in April. By late winter the platform, on which the solar collectors will be placed, should be finished.

In April the solar collectors will be placed on the platform. Various energy conservation methods, such as outting in storm windows and installing a thermostat that will keep the temperature at the proper level..

The solar energy system works on the basis of water circulation. The water is heated by sunlight. Then it goes over to the science building and circulates through the heating system and heats the building complex. During the summer the water is circulated through the air con-

ditioning equipment, which will be power by the solar heated water and cool the building. If, for example, it is a cloudy day, there is not enough solar energy, then the building complex will be boosted by a back up system which consists of boilers.

The water after being used goes back into storage. The collectors are drained at night which helps to save heat.

It is estimated that the solar energy system will save close to \$1 million in fuel costs over a 13 year period.

The project which is expected to be completed by next July, should become a major factor in the effort to educate the public on the uses of solar energy.

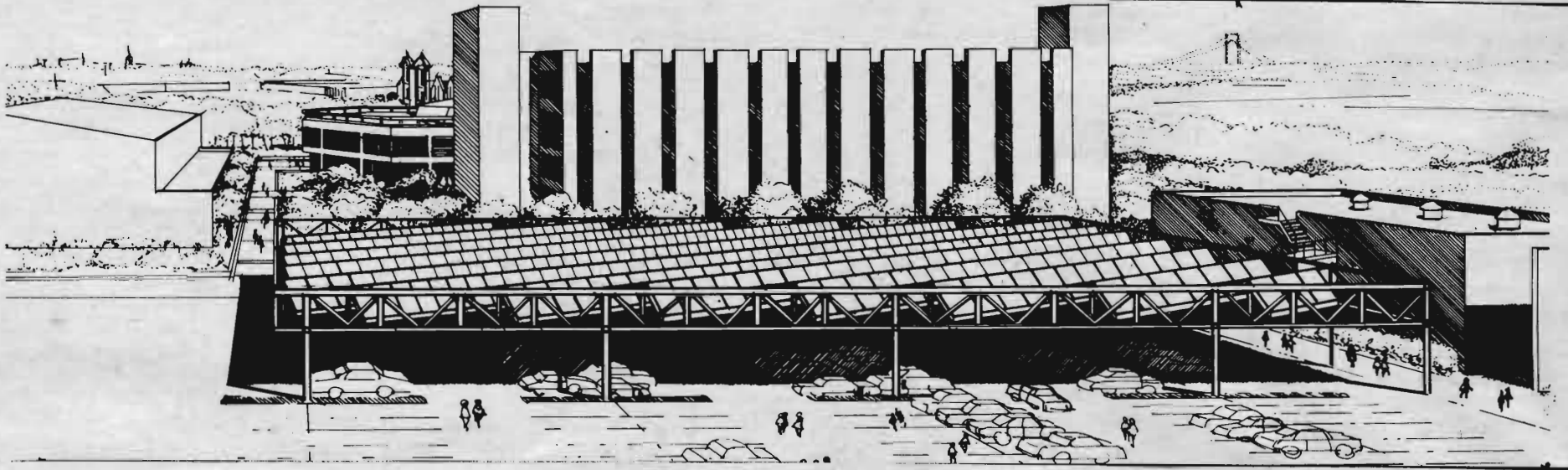
The success in obtaining the large grant to retrofit the science complex to solar energy was due in part to the location of the college. That is the accessibility of the project in the N.Y. City area for anyone to see the installation or inspect it.

When asked how he felt about receiving the grant, Dr. Henkel replied, "I feel good, you can't help but feel good after two an 1/2 years of work."

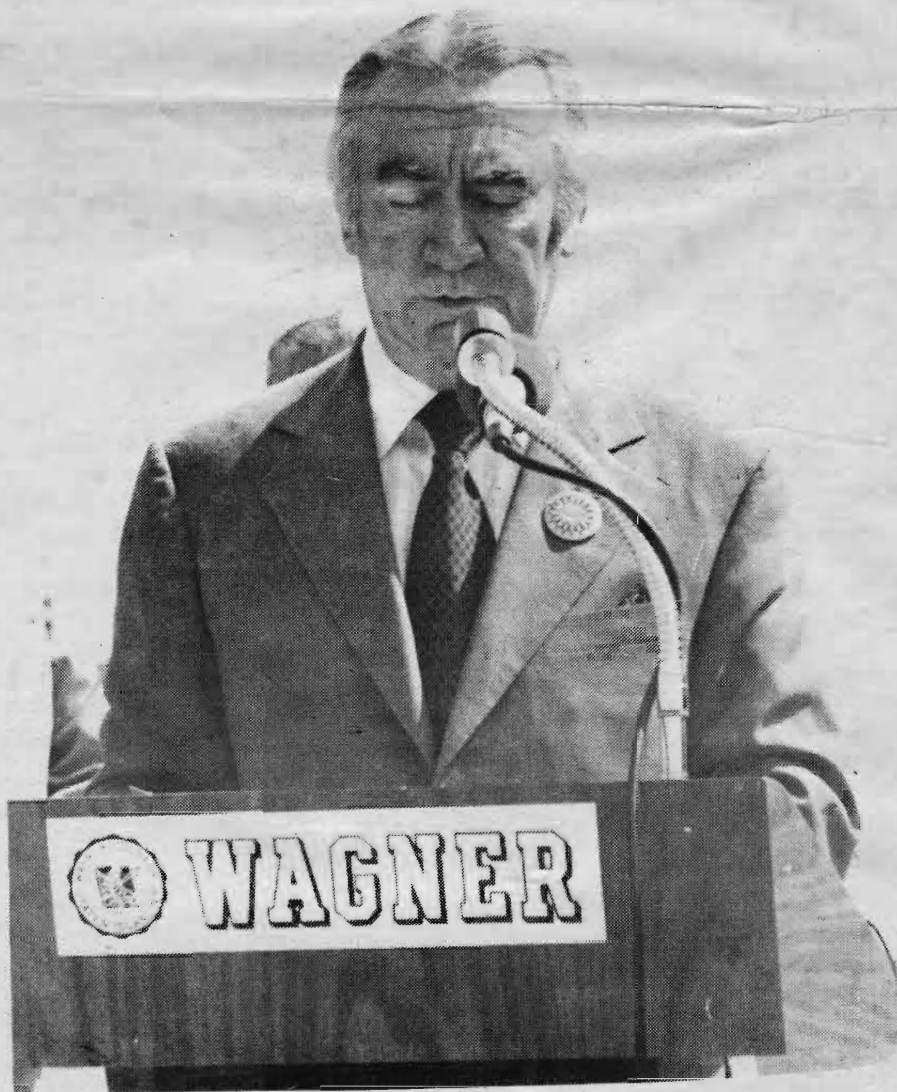

Mr. Wagner, who is Audio Visual Director at Wagner also is the

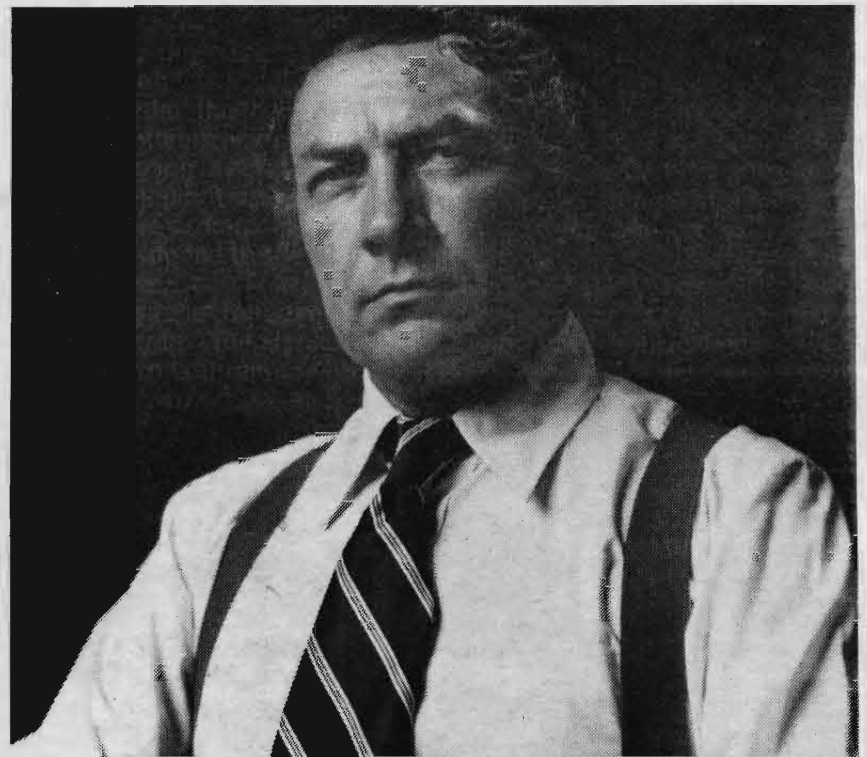
managing director of the Chi-Rho Company.

Hoop Coach Named Athletic Director

Wagner's head basketball coach P.J. Carlesimo was named Athletic Director, just a week before classes began, by President John Satterfield, filling the void created when Larry Geraciotti resigned this summer.

Carlesimo will also remain as basketball coach.

Satterfield said that he made the appointment upon the recommendation of many Wagner officials including Egon O. Wendel, Wagner's Vice President of Academic Affairs.

Before coming to Wagner, Carlesimo was athletic director and head basketball coach at New Hampshire College.

This previous experience was mentioned by Wendel while commenting on the appointment. "As previous AD-Basketball Coach at New Hampshire College, Mr. Carlesimo is well qualified to assume the added responsibilities of Athletic Director with his position of head Basketball Coach.

For the last two years at Wagner, Carlesimo has built Wagner's division I basketball team to a position of respectability.

The development of the basketball team was a major reason why Carlesimo was able to take the additional job of AD.

"Two years ago I didn't even think about it" said Carlesimo adding "Even if the AD Position had been available, it wouldn't have been



feasible. I didn't know enough about Wagner from an organizational standpoint and getting the basketball program off the ground was going to take all my time."

"Now however I have an idea of how things work at Wagner."

Carlesimo didn't expect any major changes from Geraciotti's regime.

"We have a growing, young

athletic department, with a staff of outstanding coaches," said Carlesimo.

"I look forward to working with them to continue the progress begun by Larry Geraciotti. I am excited by this fine opportunity and I am grateful to Wagner College for their confidence in me."

A native of Scranton, Pa., Carlesimo attended Fordham University where he lettered eight times in four sports.

After graduation, he stayed at Fordham and at the age of 22 became the youngest major college assistant coach in the United States.

He also served as the coach of the San Marino national team in 1972 where he compiled a record of 19-6, and defeated the Canadian and Sedish Olympic teams.

At New Hampshire College, Carlesimo directed a program that brought the Penmen to division II status.

"Playing at the Meadowlands is new for both teams," said Russo, "It takes away any home field advantage for us."

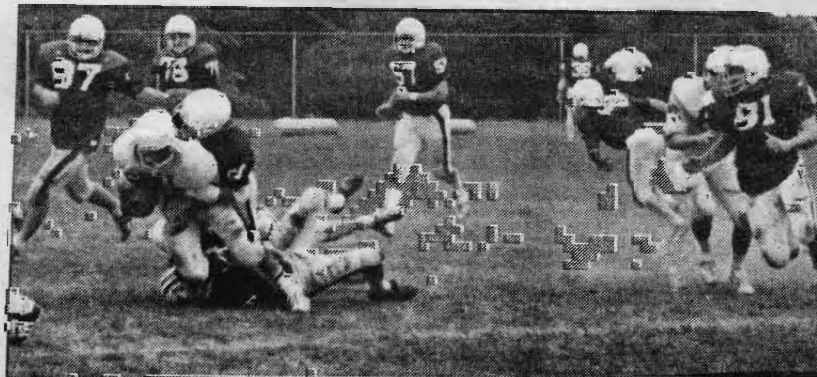
What the Seahawks hope for though is to have a pro-Wagner crowd at the game to give the Meadowlands a friendly atmosphere.

"We should have a good Wagner crowd," Russo said, "There will be busses leaving from Wagner, and we already have sold a number of season tickets, especially through the Touchdown club."

Russo said the seahawks are not a proven team yet and that "people may want to see how we play before there is a rush on ticket sales."

The Seahawks have a new look this season with new coaches teaching a new system.

Russo believes in a passing based offense. He wants to use many different offences to open the game up, doing among other things is making a more exciting game for the fans.

"The quarterback position is still up in the air," said Russo. "Frank Morgiello, Paul Edwards, and Tony Carchietta all have fine throwing arms and have adapted well to our offense. A position like quarterback must be seen in game situations and we have not been able to play against another team yet."

Whoever the quarterback will be, he will have a fine target to throw at in three year veteran tight end Herb Lindsley. Besides being an exceptional receiver, Lindsley is also one of the teams punters.

To offset the passing game, Kevin Murrell will often get to carry the ball. Also, a three year veteran, Murrell is said, by Russo, to be "the more advanced runner on the team, though we do have alot of young talent."

On the defense, Russo said the front eleven are "set and strong."

Anchored by Tony Taranto, Jim Nix, Tony Santo, and Bob Wing the secondary could be the outstanding part of the team.

Frank Dennis and Phil Thies have also looked good this year and should do well in the tackle spots.

Linebackers Ralph Aquino and Joe Wainwright and Middle Guard Gus Lindine should give Wagners "5-2 Oklahoma" defense a good season.

Looking at the first game, Russo said, "we really have no idea what Montclair State has, though we know they have an awful lot of good kids. We will see them in a preseason game though so we can see what we'll be up against."

We're all confident as we go into the season," said Russo. "We have around 75 kids on the team, and only have four kids hurt. We are still aiming at a winning season."
