## New Afterhours Lounge Opens

After many delays the Cellar (After Hours) Lounge is open in the old coat room off the Alumni Dining Hall in the New Administration Building.

The lounge was officially opened Tuesday night, November 27. It will be open from 1:30 a.m. to 7:30 a.m. Sunday through Thursday nights and 2:30 a.m. to 7:30 a.m. Friday and Saturday nights.

The M.R.A. and the A.W.S. along with the Office of the Dean of Students have decided on the following rules for the lounge:

a. liquor is prohibited unless special permission is received from the presidents of the

M.R.A. and the A.W.S. along with the Dean of Students.

b. No meetings or social events will be allowed without the permission of the above-mentioned people.

c. Sleeping is prohibited in the lounge.

d. The college will not be responsible for theft or damage to personal property.

e. Misuse of the facility will result in the discontinuation of the lounge.

f. The facility is open for use by Wagner College students, faculty and administration, and each of the above may have two guests, who must be accompanied at all times.

g. ID cards must be presented upon request.

The lounge area will be patrolled regularly by the college's security force, to ensure safety for the users of the lounge and for the building and its contents.

It is believed that the lounge

will be a valuable addition to the life of the college community and will help alleviate some of the problems of social interaction on campus.

## THE ROAD RALLY

TKE (Tau Kappa Epsilon) fraternity will sponsor Wagner College's first Road Rally this coming Sunday, December 2. A road rally is not a race, because the departure of the automobiles is staggered - cars will be departing from the West parking lot every three to five minutes, and the drivers will have a regulated course to follow.

Final registration is at 11:30 a.m. Sunday morning in the Wagner Union lobby. All drivers will receive a set of approximately 110 pieces of instruction, indicating the speeds they must maintain, the routes they must follow, the checkpoints they must pass, etc. The first prize for the rally will be \$25, the second will be \$15 and third will be \$10. The winning car is the one whose time in completing the course comes closest to that of the Rally Master, who has driven the course multiple times already

and computed the time necessary to follow the designated route.

TKE cautions all entrants against making use of any specialized equipment. This is not permitted, and can cause the entrant to be disqualified from the rally. They also suggest that all entrants have at least half a tank of gasoline, best purchased Saturday during the day, because of the recently-adopted policy of gas stations closing on Saturday evenings and Sundays all day.

They also wish to make all entrants aware of the fact that the rally is not to be run as a "race," and all participants must observe regular traffic laws, and will be required to sign a waiver before the rally indicating that they will not hold the college or TKE responsible in the event of any mishap.

Entrance fee, payable upon registration, is \$4.00.

## WAGNER TO STAY OPEN

For some time many reports have been circulating around the campus about the possibility of Wagner College closing for several weeks during the winter months. These reports were based on the widespread fear of a shortage of the fuel necessary to keep the college buildings properly heated.

Mr. William Maher, Director of Business and Financial Affairs, informs the Wagnerian that Wagner is not now considering either closing for several weeks, or extending the Christmas vacation. Mr. Russ Schwall, head of the college's maintenance system, attended a meeting on Monday of this week, in Albany, at which Mr. Edwald Nyquist, the New York State Commissioner of Education, discussed the heating crisis with

representatives of the colleges and universities throughout New York State. However Mr. Maher states that the meeting's purpose was to examine possible means of the institutions saving fuel during the winter, not to consider the question of closing.

When Mr. Schwall returns to the campus he will be meeting with various college personnel about methods of saving energy during the present crisis. Mr. Maher emphasizes that the only possible way a conservation program can be carried out to any degree of success is with the complete cooperation of the entire campus community. Further details, commentary and program ideas will be forthcoming.

## STUDENT GOVERNMENT REFERENDUM

At a recent meeting of the College Council an amendment to the Wagner College Student Government Constitution was passed. This amendment would increase the number of student representatives on the College Council. The amendment reads as follows:

The commuting population shall have one representative for every 100 students. An additional representative shall be added if the excess population exceeds 50.

Each residence hall shall have one representative for every 100 students. An additional representative shall be added if the excess population exceeds 50.

Residence halls with a population of less than 100 shall have one representative.

This amendment shall supercede the basis for representation as stated in Article II, Section 1A of the Wagner College Student Government Constitution.

This amendment will become effective if it is ratified by a simple majority of students voting in an official referendum. Ballot boxes will be set up in the dining hall and the Hawk's Nest. It is your responsibility as a member of the campus community to be aware of the actions of your Student Government, and to vote in this referendum. Indicate your vote simply by marking your ballot "yes" or "no."
