ELIZABETH CONRAD HARRISON (1836-1907)

Elizabeth Conrad HARRISON, daughter of Burr William HARRISON and Sarah POWELL, was born 3 February 1836 in Leesburg, Virginia. [Silas Emmett Lucas, *The Powell Family of Virginia and the South* (Vidalia, GA: Georgia Genealogical Reprints, 1969), p. 325.] She attended the Virginia Female Institute in Staunton, Virginia, ca. 1851-1853. - "...your devoted sister, C.C.H..." This would be Catherine Cornelia HARRISON (1840-1876). [Lucas, Powell Family, loc.cit.]
 - "...A.H..." This would be another sister, Alice HARRISON (1838-1870). [Ibid.]
- "...[signature] Wm. E. HARRISON, Esq..." This is most probably William Elzey HARRISON (1833-1878), brother of Elizabeth C. HARRISON. [Ibid.]
- "...To my d[ea]r pupil [28 June 1853]...R. H. PHILLIPS..." Richard H. PHILLIPS was a teacher and principal at the Virginia Female Institute. [1860 Census, Augusta County, VA, National Archives and Records Service, M-653, Roll 133, p. 798, Household 364, Family 407.]
- "...[28 June 1853] To my d[ea]r pupil, What shall I say on the eve of your departure from us to engage in the scenes of busy life?" [Harrison, "Autograph Album," <u>loc.cit.</u>] This would seemingly confirm a graduation date of ca. 1853.
