TERRELL DILLON MOSELEY (1932-2016)

Terrell Dillon Moseley, son of Terrell Edwin Moseley and Ethelyn Dillon, was born 10 September 1932, in Lynchburg, Virginia. He graduated from E.C. Glass High School and received a Bachelor of Science from Virginia Tech and a Master of Science from the University of Illinois. He served in the United States Air Force and achieved the rank of Captain. He was president of the Terrell E. Moseley, Inc. Heating and Air Conditioning Company and served on the Virginia State Building Technical Review Board. He was also president of the Virginia Plumbing, Heating and Cooling Contractors. He was also a member of Centenary United Methodist Church, president of the District Methodist Christian Workers School and a district trustee. He was a member of the Greater Lynchburg Chamber of Commerce and on several boards in the community. He was a professional engineer and received Engineer of the Year Award from the local chapter of the Virginia Society of Professional Engineers.

Terrell Dillon Mosely, husband of Doris Duncan, died on 8 October 2016 in Lynchburg and is buried in Spring Hill Cemetery.
