To be quite frank, in the beginning I was a fast and true Ike fan. I was convinced that a change was necessary; that the old and tried Democratic party, grown corrupt during its long tenure, should make room for a young, vigorous, strict, and definitely non-corrupt Republican party. Also, I thought that Eisenhower knew so much more about foreign policy and how it should be carried on, especially in Europe; for about Asia he did not know much.

carried on, especially in Europe; for about Asia he did not know much.

Now, the Republican party is split into a young progressive group in which Dewey is prominent, and an older conservative group, of which Taft is the head. Eisenhower was the candidate of the progressive group. In order to get all the votes he could, he made a pact with Taft, and seems to have adopted all of Taft's ideas for domestic policy. ideas for domestic policy. That seems to argue that Taft would realseems to argue that Taft would really be taking over Eisenhower, especially in the domestic policy issues. This would mean cutting down on such projects as the TVA, the Missouri Valley dams, financial and other help given to the farmers, being a good deal stricter with labor, and possibly cutting down on foreign aid. Now, whether all this cutting and possibly cutting down on foreign aid. Now, whether all this cutting down would not be too high a price to pay for a balanced budget and less corruption in the government, is questionable. It was all these considerations that slowly made me consider Stevenson, rather than Eisenhower, as a candidate.

Stevenson has experience as a politician, and has shown that he can clean out corruption effective—ly. He does not seem to have behind

ly. He does not seem to have behind him a group of people who dictate to him what to do and what to say.

to him what to do and what to say.

As to policies, he follows those of the New Deal and Fair Deal; that is, a continuation of Federal spending on such projects as the Missouri Valley dams, which will benefit millions of people in a dozen states. Favorable to labor rather than management, favorable to the farmers in short, Stevenson seems to be following the policies set by the Democratic party ever since Rossevelt came in. came in.

came in.

Stevenson's theory of co-existence with Russia and containment, seems to me to be far less dangerous than Eisenhower's of pushing back Russia from where she already is. And in foreign policy, I am for whatever is least conducive to a war. Stevenson wants to continue to help the countries of the world to stave off communism and get on their feet where they can help themselves.

Taken all in all, under an Eisenhower-Taft regime, I have the impression of sternness, shrinkage, possibly greater economy, but cutting down where it hurts a lot of people, especially farmers and la-

people, especially farmers and la-borers. With Stevenson, I have the feeling that there is a greater con-sideration for the people and the world at large.
