
OPEN HOUSE

Open House — "a house hospitality open to all friends who may wish to visit it or enjoy its entertainment."


To Explore — "to traverse or range over for the purpose of discovery, to look into closely, to investigate into, to search out.


Two usually unrelated subjects which came together to form one of the best displays which Lawrence Tech has ever arranged, "Exploring the Next Two-Hundred Years", the 1976 open house. A time when friends, family, and neighbors could come into a hospitable campus and explore the work that the students collected from all fields, and from each class, freshmen through senior. A time when everyone was looking behind at all the greatness which had been a part of building this country, L.I.T. took these feats and said that we are able to go farther, into the next two centuries.

Starting out in the Administration Building there was, as to be expected, an automobile. However, this was not a part of the engineering exhibit, instead, the marketing project for the School of Business and Industrial Management. From here, one was able to stroll down through the halls of this building as well as the Engineering wing, examining the exhibits of the Engineering fields, — Construction, Electrical and Mechanical. Exhibits ranging from autos to sound to hovercraft.




















Moving over to the architecture building, one was overwhelmed by the variety of work which was presented. Basic Design I was presented as was Arch Design 8. Everything from drawings and renderings to models. Watercolors as well as structural models were exhibited. Presentations ranged from Howard Etter's and Harvey Ferarro's demonstrations in watercolor and color pencil to Charles Moore, who spoke on the theme of "Collisions".

Wandering over to the Science Building, most of the schools which are contained in the School of Arts and Science were represented with an especially good review from the Departments of Chemistry, Mathematic (computer science) and Physics. As one came through the door, there was a rubber tube which extended as far as the eye could see, with coaxing from the pictures of Dean Margosian and Prof. Zimmersman, the third floor soon came into view. Once there, demos were the name of the game with a well-organized sequence of experiments to dazzle the eye, stun the ear and burn \$50.00 bills. Upon the second floor were the hair-raising experiments of the Physics Department as well as experiments in optics and magnetism. Back on the main floor, the computer center opened it's doors and there were things for everyone to do. You could land a Mars lander, play Tic-Tac-Toe or even get fixed up with Phyllis Diller or Groucho Marx in the dating game (all by computer, of course).







Seeing as an open house is supposed to be hospitable, there were three main hospitality centers serving sustenance (cookies and donuts) and drink, (coffee and punch) in each of the three buildings. L.C.F. (Lawrence Christian Fellowship) was set up in the lobby outside the cafeteria. A.I.A. (American Institute of Architects) was in the foyer of the Architecture Building, and were selling bumper stickers as well. The Ski Club turned conference rooms C & D into a theater and showed slides of their ski and canoe trips as well as serving coffee and donuts.

Of course, no event is without its problems, and "Exploring the Next Two-Hundred Years" was no exception. Despite the fact that the date had been moved back over a month, good old Mother Nature could not let us down. The annual Open House snow fell, which has come as long as I can remember and will probably continue to come to each one in the future, even if Open House is held in July.




BLOOD BANK
















SIGHT, SOUND & SUSTENANCE




GUEST SPEAKERS

ROAD RALLY


The Ski Club's Annual Autumn Road Rally was a great success. One hundred and thirty-two cars participated but only eighty managed to finish the course.







Ten people per team, eight teams per division, two divisions per league, and two leagues. That figures to at least 320 people participating in 1976 spring softball at Lawrence Tech.





















SOCCER







VOLLEYBALL





FRIDAY MIDNIGHT MADNESS LEAGUE






At the end of the league season in April, a banquet is held and awards are given for the top teams, most improved bowlers, best bowlers, last place, and just about everything in between.

TENNIS


Lawrence Institute of Technology Tennis Team defended its title in the N.A.I.A. tennis tournament in Grand Rapids, Michigan, May 7 and 8.

The team elected Arthur Morgenstern as player-coach of the 1976-77 Season.

Lawrence's Tennis Team opened the fifth season at Southfield Civic Center Courts on April 6 against Sienna Heights college, in a pre-season home match. The 1977 tennis season opened April 20. We encountered the following schools: Wayne State, Hillsdale, Oakland University, Ferris State, and Oakland Community College.





GOLF

GROUPS & ORGANIZATIONS




Student Government does not consist solely of an elected officiary, but is comprised of representatives from LIT's various student organizations. It provides the students of LIT with activities and services of interest to all.

The Publications Committee puts out a weekly newspaper, to which students may submit an article free of charge, and a yearbook. The Social Committee sponsors films and dinners, and this year sponsored the first school-wide Christmas Dinner-Dance. The Curriculum Committee, which attempts to resolve academic problems, was reorganized this year; and the annual Open House, Blood Bank, and Election were held by their respective committes.

Aside from these usual activities and services, Student Government made other contributions to the promotion of on-campus activities. This year, with Pres. Dr. Buell's permission, and with the aid of Mr. Egger and the Construction Survey class, an outdoor rink was built. Student Government and IFC co-sponsored the Second Annual Snow Sculpture Contest; and a new foosball table was purchased for the student lounge. In the library, a storage area on the lower floor was converted to a Design-Aid room by the newly reorganized Curriculum Committee.

OPEN HOUSE - A WEEKEND TO REMEMBER

Open House weekend is a time when Lawrence Tech shows the public what is has been doing in the past year. The prevailing atmosphere on campus is one of celebration because only those students who are proud enough of their work to donate time and energy appear.

The 1977 Open House Committee has dedicated itself to making this an even more spectacular showing than in the past. One route it has taken is the revival of an Open House award. Before, only one trophy was awarded, forcing architectural projects to be judged against engineering designs, computer games, chemistry demonstrations, etc. The problem of finding qualified and unbiased judges was almost insurmountable. WHAT IS THE LAWRENCE CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP?

It is a body of students who are realizing who God is and are responding positively to his claim on their lives of total obedience. These students are wrestling with what it means to be restored to a fulfilling relationship with God through the actions of Jesus Christ. The LCF has chosen to affiliate itself with Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship, a national organization which supplies resources otherwise unavailable in order to aid its three purposes: to give all students and faculty the opportunity to carefully consider and respond to Jesus Christ's claims; to help Christian students mature as followers of Christ through Bible study, prayer, and sharing with each other; and to aid students in understanding the purpose and work of missionaries and how students can fit into the total picture, at home or abroad. The organization is committee to basic biblical truth and has no official stand on tangential issues; the resulting diversity in backgrounds has proved to be a strength rather than a weakness.

The core of the LCF is the small group Bible study. There are also large group meetings for guest speakers, singing, business, or worship. There are social gatherings, too. However, the emphasis is on learning from the Bible together in the small groups; the approach is to observe what the passage is actually saying and to discuss how that can be carried out in the students' lives rather than seeking to prove preconceived ideas.

Why would someone want to be a part of the LCF? Here are a few reasons: to grow as a person, work with fellow students who share a bond far deeper than the fact that they are at the same school, learn skills and gain experience in Bible study and leading small groups that will be useful long after graduation, and to help others wrestle with the ultimate issues of human life.

While the two largest groups are from Iran and Nigeria, thre are really no geographic boundaries on the distribution of the students. Some of the countries represented include Canada, Brazil, Greece, Turkey, and Israel, as well as the less familiar Qatar, Antigua, and Jordania.

While there are foreign students in most of the different curricula offered at LIT, the most popular by far appears to be engineering, especially among those students from the Middle East. For example, Mr. de Hesselle says that the Construction Engineering classes seem most popular among those students from Iran. This would seem to be a sort of natural response to the relatively sudden influx of petro-dollars to that country, and the boom in construction it has helped to create. Up until recently, such countries as those in the Middle East, also had little need for a great number of people educated in engineering, and construction methods; now there is a shortage of such personnel, and the various countries are trying to fill the void, preferably with people from the country.



SOCIETY OF AUTOMOTIVE ENGINEERS

LIT's student chapter of the Society of Automotive Engineers is one of the largest and most active organizations on campus. Throughout the year, SAE sponsors various lectures and tours which acquaint the young engineer with automotive technology and industry. This year, SAE held a Bendix Brake Seminar, and visited Williams Research Laboratories, GM Truck and Coach Plant, and Detroit Diesel Plant. Also, SAE participated in the SAE Student Relations Fall Kick-Off Dinner, Open House, and the Spring SAE Convention.

Membership in the SAE student branch provides many opportunities for student involvement, and contact with other engineering students and professional people through parties, dinners, technical seminars, trips to research facilities and plant tours, conventions, and various other gatherings.
