## 1963 DEDICATION

MISS GENEVIEVE G. DOOLEY, REGISTRAR AT LAWRENCE INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY, since Lawrence Tech's founding, will retire in June of 1963.

Miss Dooley had been the secretary of the late Russell E. Lawrence, founder of the college in 1932, for 14 years prior to joining the staff. Lawrence Tech's enrollment has grown from less than 300 in 1932 to an excess of 3300 in 1963.

In the words of Dean E.O. Graefe, "It can truly be said that Lawrence Institute of Technology could not have prospered and progressed the way it did without the help, loyalty, and endless hard work contributed by Miss Dooley. For without her courage, confidence, and guidance there might not be a Lawrence Tech in existence today."

To Miss Dooley, whose presence in the Registrar's Office will long be remembered, the 1963 Staff dedicates the 1963 L-Book.

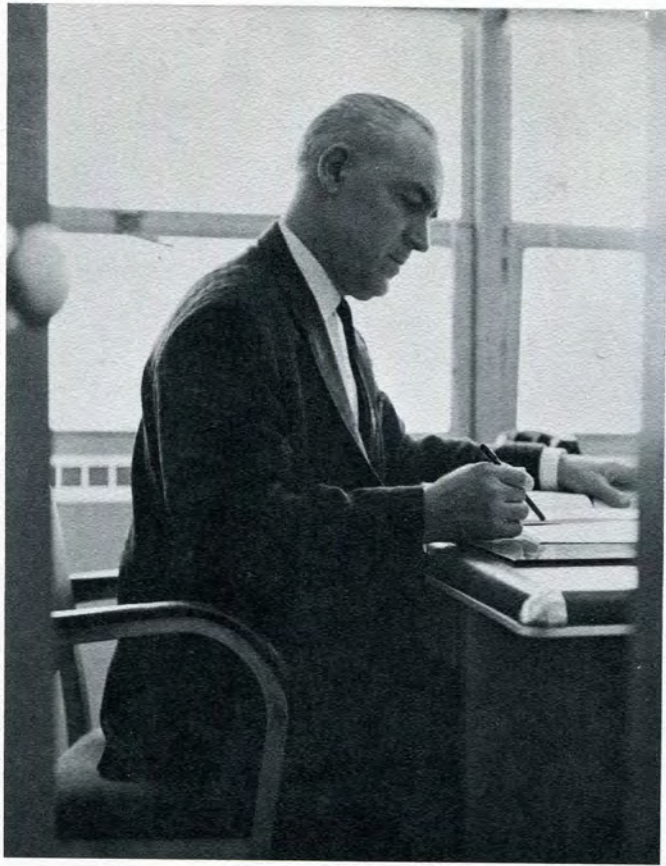

The function of the engineering drawing department is to provide instruction and projects in the science of graphics. Without having drawing experience, an engineering student will have difficulty expressing to himself and to others engineering projects.

## Computer

How long would it take you to perform 5 multiplications and divisions involving 10 digit numbers? A long time! Well, once the Burroughs E 102 is set up, and properly programmed, it can perform those 5 multiplication and division problems in only one second with extreme accuracy. Furthermore, it can add or subtract numbers in  $1/20$  of a second. The advantage then of a computer is to perform complex problems fast and accurately. There is a catch, however, which is that the machine must be told what to do. This is the role of the programmer, or in this case, the student. At L.I.T. a student is taught how to convert a problem into computer 'language', and how to operate the machine in order to arrive at the right answer to his problem.

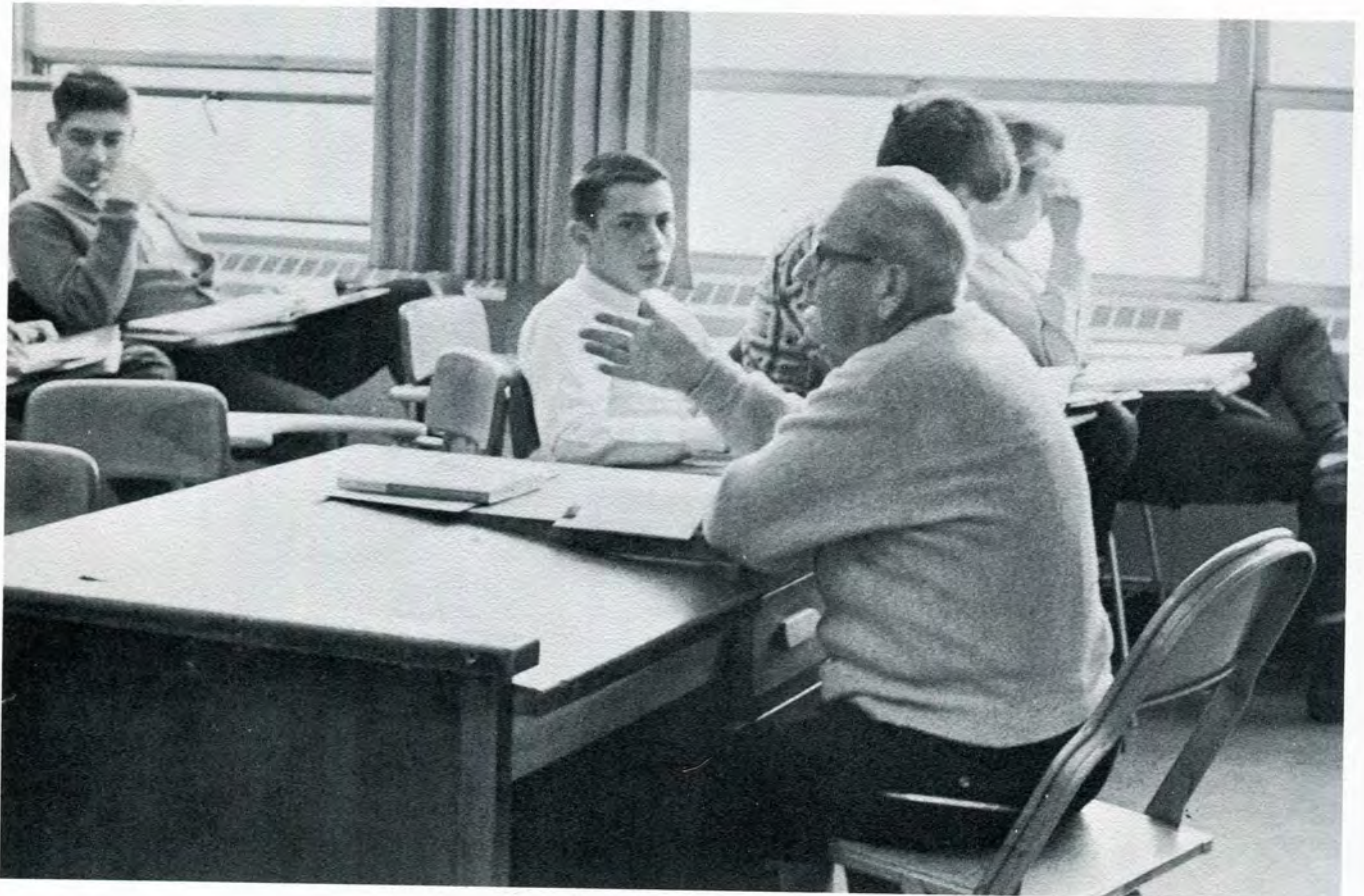

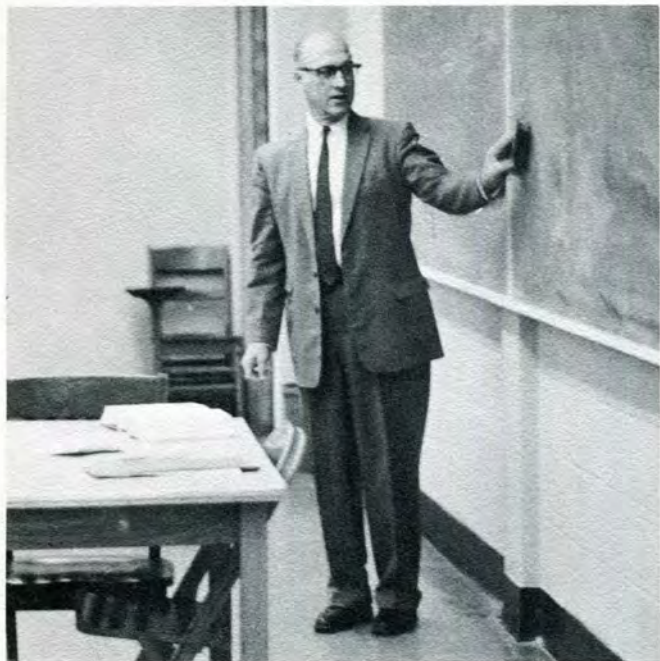

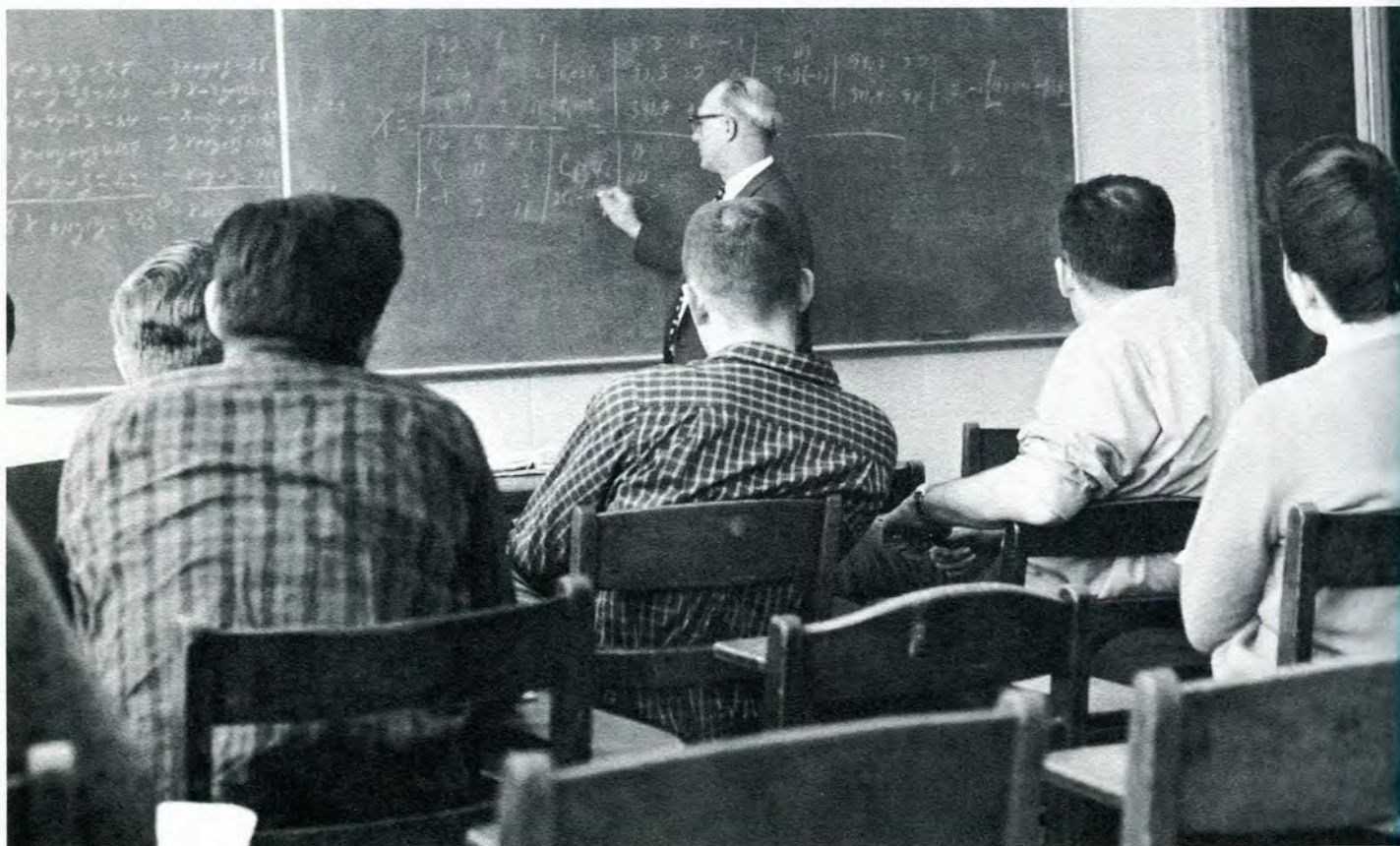

## *Chemistry*

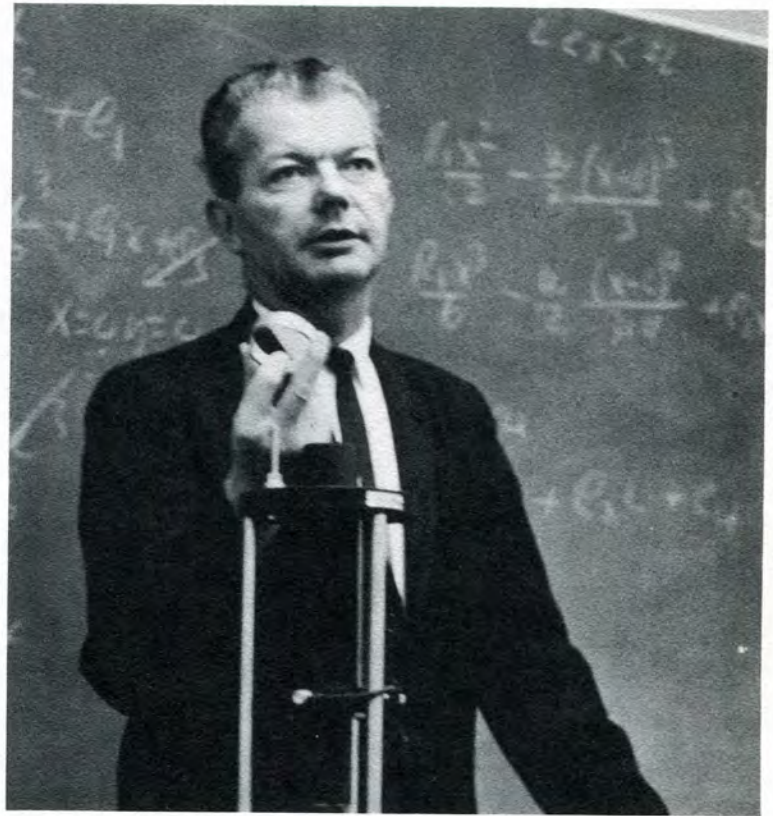

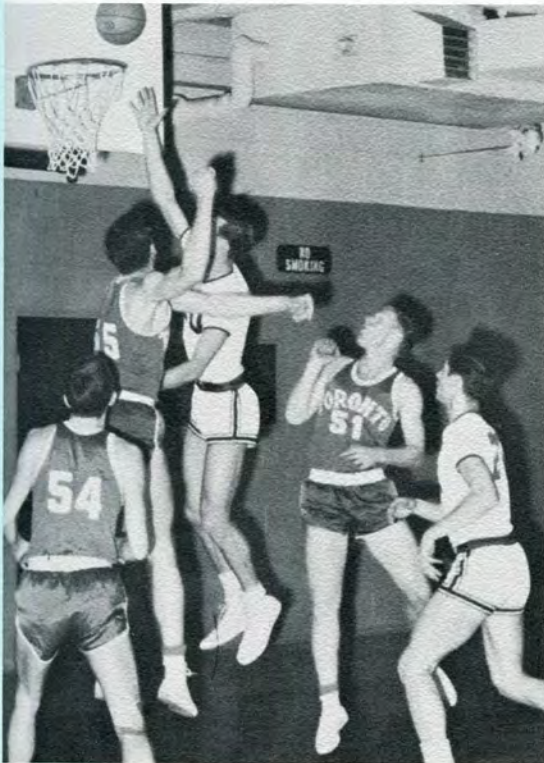

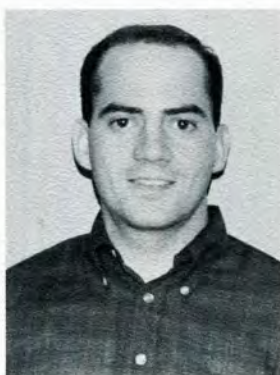
To be eligible for the award, each student

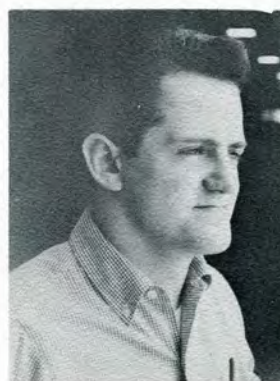

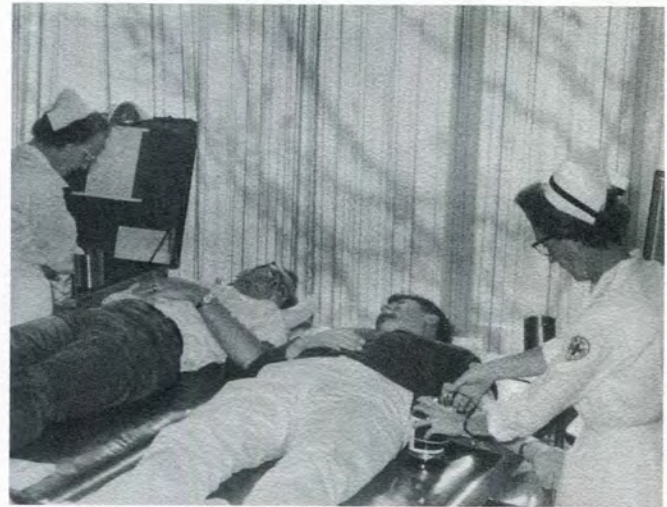

The highlight of the dance was the highly praised music of the Les Elgart orchestra. It was without a doubt the finest music ever heard at a Lawrence Tech dance.

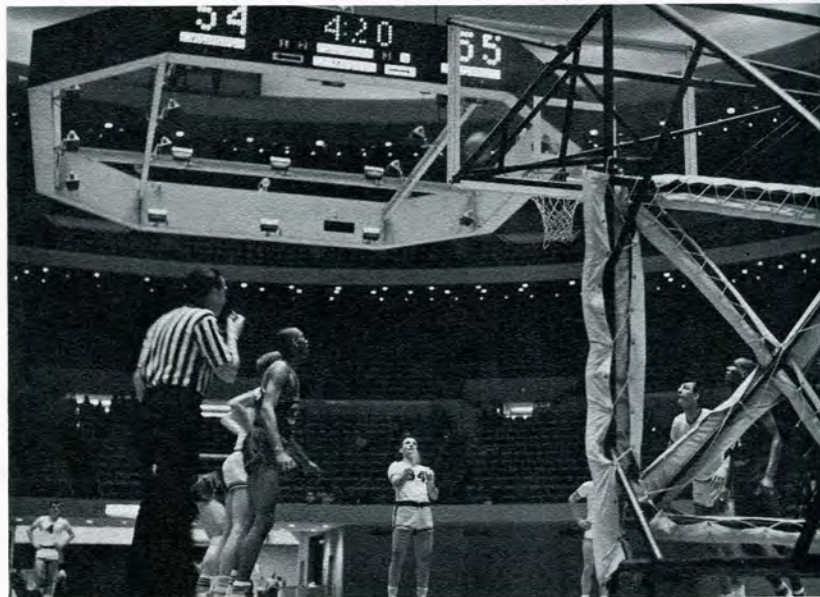

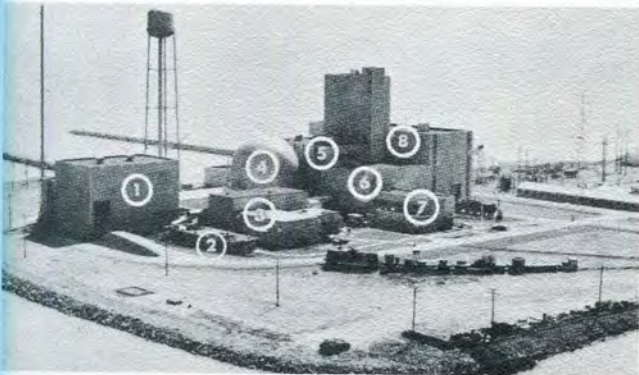

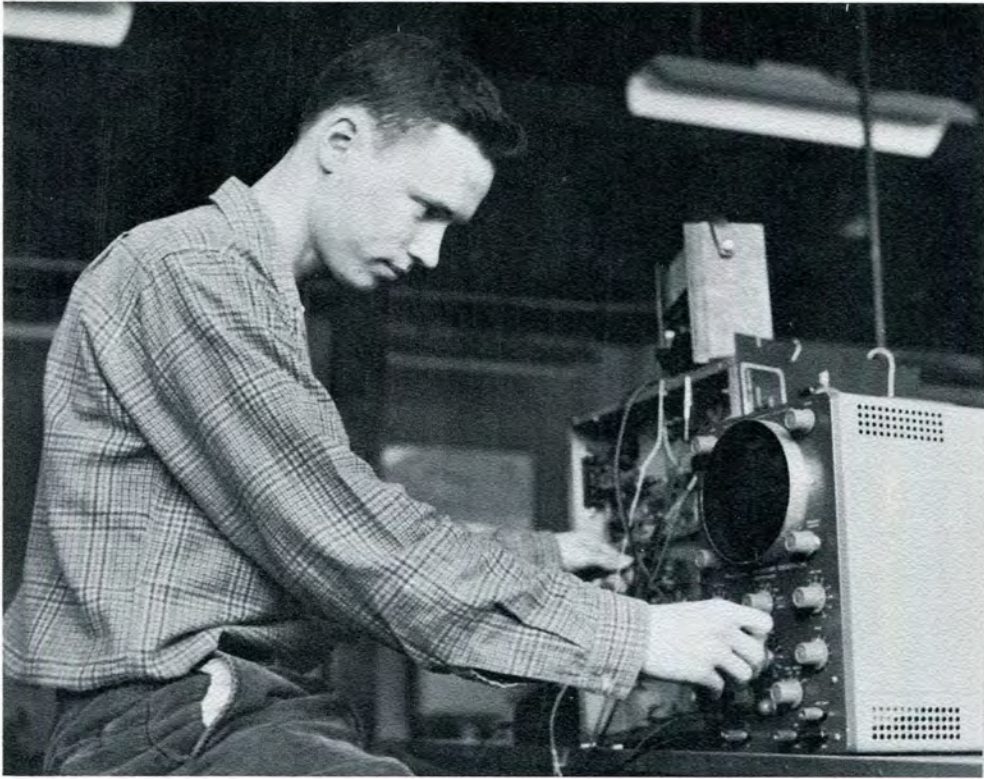

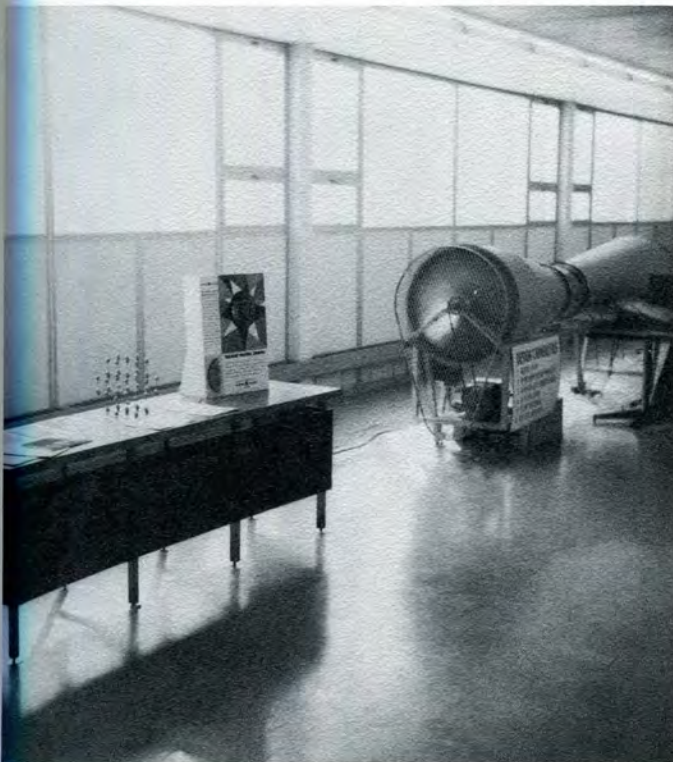

The Phi Kappa Upsilon Fraternity's purpose is to promote scholastic, social, and moral achievement, and to create cultural, educational, and fraternal advantages for the brothers. At the suggestion of the late brother Russel E. Lawrence, a body of one hundred thirty men, representing fifteen colleges and thirty-four industrial firms, held a meeting at the Whittier Hotel. That night, (Aug. 15, 1932), Phi Kappa Upsilon was born. With the formation of day school in 1939, Delta Chapter came into existence. In 1933 Beta Chapter was formed at the Chrysler Institute of Engineering, and in 1937 a Chapter was organized at the Great Lakes College. A similar Chapter, Gamma, was started at the University of Michigan prior to World War II. Unfortunately however, the war, coupled with the closing of Great Lakes College, thwarted the expansion of the fraternity. Phi Kappa Upsilon's motto has a ritualistic significance only and the Greek name of the Fraternity -- Phi Kappa Upsilon -- is often used interchangeably. In order to pledge the fraternity, a student must have at least a C average, must be acceptable to the membership, and must have a genuine desire to join in fellowship with others of his kind. The biggest functions are the New Years Eve Party, and 1,000 dollar raffle, sponsored by Phi Kappa Upsilon.
