Gillespie & Perry Covenheavent in Jan. 1836 while Wm. Simpson as Clerk of Court in said Wayne Co. Ky.--refer to Smith for more about this.

Book 33 page 104: Feb. 22 1836, John H. Swink of Washington Co. Miss. (as the attorney of Anna K. Smith of Wayne Co. Kentucky) lets Isaac Holman of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 107 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres on the north bank of the South Fork of Rokey Creek next Amos Sharpe, Thomas M. Sharpe & a branch, for \$400.00, witnessed & proved by W. F. Cowan in Feb. 1834. (John McCreary let said Andrews have this Feb. 15 1806--see book E page 263).

(This is part of the Grant to Jacob Thomas deceased, who devised it to the said James Thomas.

N.C., have 143 1/2 acres on the bank of Little Dutchmans Creek next Hugh Hall, Slater Green, Eneas Campbell, Jonathan Cash & Jeremiah Gaither, for 71 pounds, 12 shillings & 6 pence, witnessed by Henry Clagett & William J. Summers & proved by the latter in May 1816.

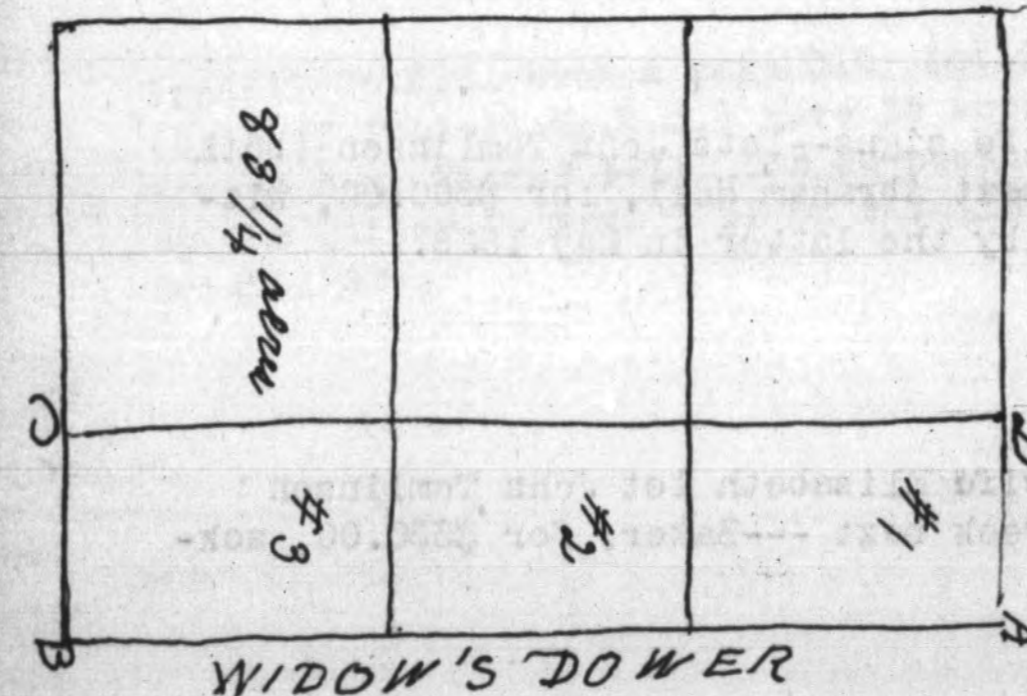

Book 30 page 152; May 17 1828, William Tomlinson & wife Elizabeth let John Tomlinson (all of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 83 acres on Dutchmans Creek next ---Baker, for \$330.00, acknowledged in May 1828.

Book 22 page 236 or 336 (numbered twice): Nov. 24 1806, The State grants (#2379 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to ^{George} Glass & John Thomas, 308 acres on the waters of Crane Creek, beginning on the corner of Simon Moyer & going with his line south 87 degrees & 50 minutes west 9 chains to the corner of Peter Brown, north 38 chains & 50 links to a black Jack on the corner of Francis Lock, north with it 87 degrees & 30 minutes east 7 chains to his corner, then with the line of Simon Moyer to the beginning. (It was entered on Aug. 9 1802). (Nathaniel Alexander is now Governor)

HENRY TOMLINSON OF CONNECTICUT

McCall-Tidwell And Allied Families (by Ettie Tidwell McCall) page 271: "HENRY TOMLINSON¹, the son of George Tomlinson and his wife Maria Hyde (whose marriage appears in the Parish Register of St. Peters Church of St. Wurberg, Derbyshire, England, in 1600), was baptized there 1606. He came to America with his wife Alice; two sons and four daughters. He first came to New Haven, Connecticut, then Milford in 1652. He removed to Stratford in the autumn of 1656, and April 1, 1657, he purchased of Joshua Atwater, a house and lot, and several pieces of land and settled there. He was one of the most active business men in Stratford, and known as such in the Colony. He was not a military man. Was a farmer, buying, selling and cultivating lands. In 1671 he and others by permission of General Court, purchased a large tract of land from the Indians of Weanutinock, New Milford. Was Freeman 1669, and occupied positions of trust and prominence in the early days. (The old Family Bible printed 1559, which Henry Tomlinson brought with him to this country, has been preserved by a descendant in Michigan, and the Coat of Arms, in a painting of the family, has been preserved by descendants of Governor Gideon Tomlinson of Connecticut).

His wife born in 1608, died in 1698. He died in Stratford, May 16, 1681. Children:

Pendleton coat of arms: Gules, an inescutcheon argent, between four escallops (or shells) or. Crest: a chapeau gules, turned up ermine, a demi-dragon, wings expanded, or, holding an escallop (or shell) argent. Motto: Maneo Qualis Manebam. (Page 224, Vol. IV Some Prominent Virginia Families, by Louise Pechet du Bellet). In a portion of Salfordborough, in Lancashire Co., England, three miles from Manchester, is the town of Pendleton. The above coat of arms swings over the door of an inn & the manor house is some distance off where four generations of the Pendleton family lived & died****

In 1674, two sons of Henry Pendleton & wife Elizabeth came to Virginia--Philip, a young teacher & Nathaniel, a minister of the Church of England (he soon died without issue).

"FRANCIS STILES OF CONNECTICUT. (Elizabeth Stiles³ and Phebe Stiles³) There arrived in the ship "Christian" of London on June 16, 1636, at Boston, four brothers, Francis Stiles, John Stiles, Henry Stiles and Thomas Stiles. They were the sons of Thomas and Marie Stiles (Stiles) of Milbrooke, England, and were baptized in the Parish Church there according to certified records.

"MR." FRANCIS STILES¹, the third son of the Milbrooke family, was baptized in St. Michael's Church, Milbrooke, Bedfordshire, England, August 1. 1602, and for some time previous to his coming to America had been a master carpenter and citizen of London. He came over as Manager of the Sir Richard Saltensall enterprise and after the abandonment of this enterprise soon after his arrival he purchased some thousand acres of land from Sir Richard Saltensall at Windsor, Connecticut, and together with the 500 acres he had received by allotment from the Town, he held quite a large amount of real estate. But he resold part of this to Saltensall and in September, 1647, was residing at Saybrook. He was given the title of "Mr.", which was in those days no unmeaning phrase, but an index of social position.

Items, which have come down in court records, show him to be a man of great business ability; a quick and passionate nature, stout in affirming his rights and consequently frequently, figuring in law suits. He was admitted a Freeman at Windsor, September 10, 1640, and was on the Jury of the Particular Court of October 14, 1642. (Connecticut Colonial Record 76). He made a visit to England in 1637. In addition to his many law-suits, he was complained in March, 1654, to the Court "for peppering Naanepaquowwe, an Indian of Stratford, in his body with Swam shot, upon a Sabbath Day." He removed to Stratford about 1660."

Scruggs on the same day.

Book 32 page 365; July 18 1833, John Tomlinson Sr.--no wife signs--lets Abraham Allen (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 157 acres (which had been granted to the State to Elizabeth Adams & had belonged to Benjamin Howard beginning on the original corner & going west 42 chains & 40 links to a pine, north 9 chains & 85 links to a pine, west 32 chains & 85 links to a pine, north 25 chains to a post oak bush, east 20 chains to a post oak, south 8 chains to a stone, east 54 chains 95 links to a pine, south 17 chains 13 links to the beginning, for \$562.40, witnessed by William Allen William Sheek & proved by the latter in 1835.

Baptist Encyclopedia (Wm. Cathcart) page 1142: Rev. David Thomas, A.M., born Aug. 16 1732 at London Tract, Pa., educated at Hopewell, N.J. under the famous Isaac Eaton, received degree from Rhode Island College (now Brown University), ordained to the ministry when about 18 years of age, went with John Gano & James Miller as a missionary from the Philadelphia Baptist Association to Va. in 1751. He formed the Broad Run Church in Fauquier Co. Va. during a preaching tour, becoming its pastor in 1752, attracted immense crowds by his preaching--people traveled from 50 to 100 miles to hear him. Went to Culpeper Co. in 1763 to preach but was prevented by a mob, was more successful in Orange Co.--this being the first preaching of Baptists in the section, he was dragged from the pulpit & treated brutally but continued preaching in northern Va. where he formed many churches. During the Revolution, gave his influence in favor of the colonies. Was highly esteemed by Thomas Jefferson & Patrick Henry. Removed to Berkely Co., ministered to Mill Creek Church for about 8 years, removed to Kentucky in 1796, settled in Mason Co., had charge of Washington Church, but shortly located in Jessamine Co. where he united with East Hickman Church. Died about 1801.

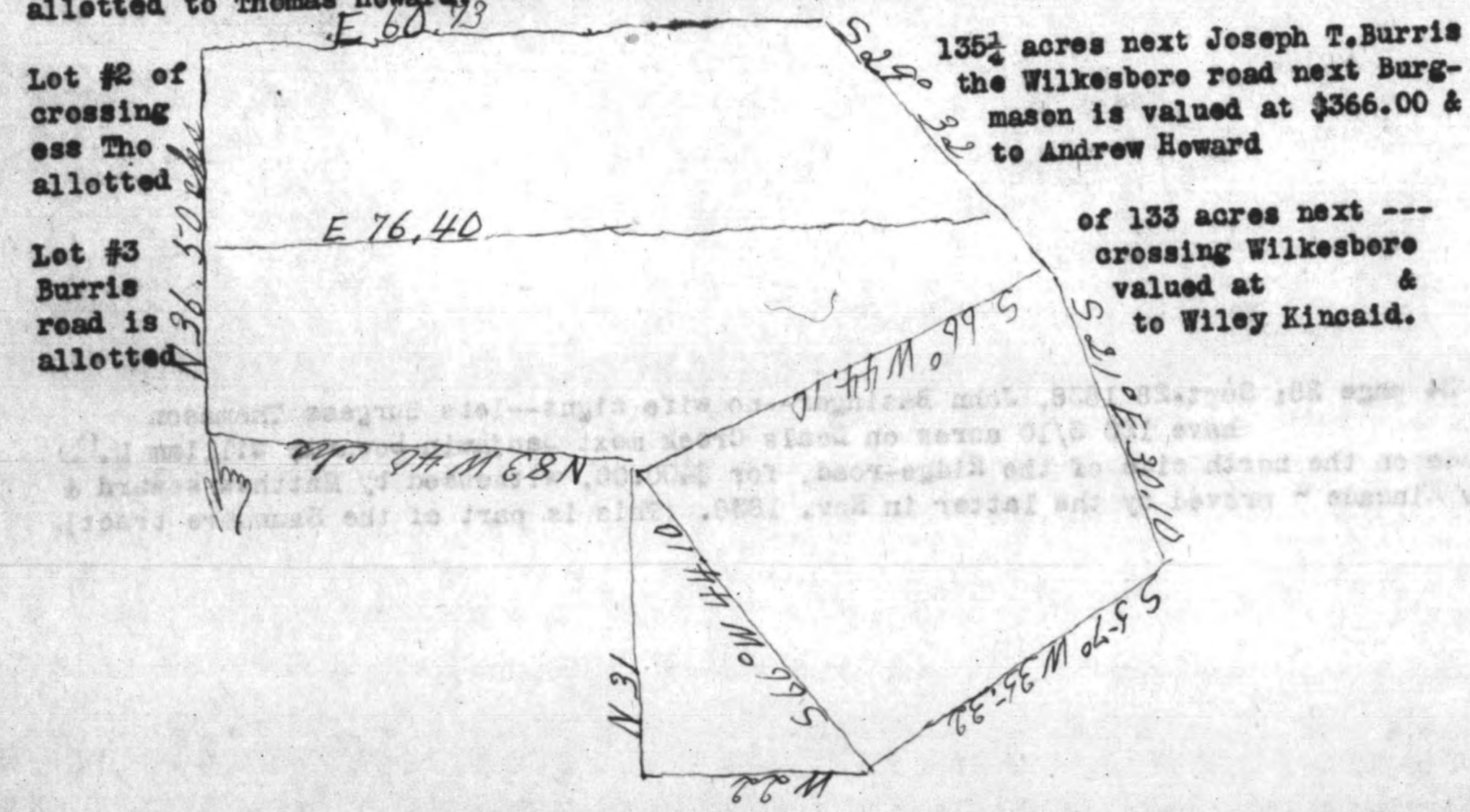
