Charles C. Moore

RUTHERFORDTON — Charles C. Moore, 80, former sheriff of Rutherford County and one-time mayor of Forest City, died at his home in Rutherfordton Friday morning at 6 o'clock after an extended illness.

Mr. Moore was Rutherford County's 37th sheriff. He was long a leader in the civic, business and religious life of Forest City and the county. He was born July 18, 1873, in Rutherford County, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Moore. He was educated in the common schools of the county and at Belwood Academy in Cleveland County. After finishing there he taught school for a time, and when 21 years of age he engaged in the retail mercantile business in Forest City, where he spent practically all of his time in either the wholesale or retail business until he was first elected sheriff of Rutherford County in 1932.

He took office as sheriff in December, 1932 and served two years. After leaving that position he was secretary-treasurer of the Rutherfordton Building and Loan Association, serving in that capacity four years.

In 1938 Mr. Moore was again elected sheriff and served as such until December, 1946. Prior to 1932, Mr. Moore served about 30 years as Sunday school superintendent and a member of the board of stewards of First Methodist Church of Forest City. After moving to Rutherfordton, he was active in

the Methodist Church there.

Mr. Moore served as mayor of Forest City from 1911 to 1913. He also served one term as alderman for the town of Forest City and was re-elected to succeed himself, but because of pressure of business he did not accept the second term.

Mr. Moore served as a deputy sheriff under Sheriff C. Ed Tanner, and was also tax collector both for the town of Forest City and for Rutherford County. He served several years as a member of the Forest City Board of Education. He was tax supervisor for Rutherford County in 1929.

Mr. Moore was married to Miss Florence Bridges, a daughter of the late Prof. B. H. Bridges, former superintendent of public instruction for Rutherford County and a citizen of note. She survives, along with three sons and three daughters. They are Mrs. Frank Dorsey of Forest City, Mrs. Ed Washburn of Shelby and Mrs. Frank McCracken of Sanford, C. L. Moore and Burl Moore of Forest City and Walsh Moore of Rutherfordton. Also surviving are a brother, George Moore of Forest City, and a sister, Mrs. Ida McDonald of Forest City.

Funeral services will be held at 3 p.m. today at First Methodist Church at Rutherfordton. The Rev. Harry S. Williams will be in charge, assisted by the Rev. D. M. Nifong, former pastor. Burial will be in Cool Springs Cemetery in Forest City.

Josiah Smith, the banker, in 1808 when he was seventy-seven years old, wrote as follows: and from a paper put in my hands by General Benjamin Smith, of Cape Fear, N.C., it is there said that two brothers of the name of Smith, came from Exeter, in England, to New England, and were among its first settlers.

"Now Sabina, 5th child and third daughter of second Sandgrave, Thomas Smith, and Sarah Blake, married (in 1716) Thomas Smith, the planter, son of one of the two brothers who emigrated from Exeter, England, to Massachusetts, one of whom went to Nevis, West Indies, and his son to Charleston, South Carolina. This Thomas went by the nickname of 'Long Tom'. He was a man of most estimable character, universally loved and respected, and was a wealthy merchant."

"In 'Wymann's Generations of Charlestown, Massachusetts' there is noted the record of a deed of trust from Thomas Smith of St. James Parish, Berkeley County, Carolina, to his uncle William Smith, of Boston, Massachusetts, of all his right and title in the estate of his grandfather Thomas Smith and his grandmother Sarah, dated 1715.

"Now Thomas and Sabina Smith had two children: 1. Benjamin Smith. Married Ann Lawton. 2. Thomas Smith. Married Sarah Moore.

"This Sarah Moore was a descendant of Roger Moore, the famous Irish Catholic of 1641. He descended from a very ancient Irish family, The Marquise of Drogheda.

"Roger Moore's son James came from Kendall, in Westmoreland. He married Ann, daughter of Sir John Geomans, created Sandgrave and appointed Governor, Dec. 28, 1671. Sir John was eldest son of Robert Geomans of Bristol, England, who was executed in 1649 for political crimes. The son Sir John was, as a recompence, made a baronet by Charles II.

"He emigrated to Barbadoes and thence removed to Charleston. He built a fine residence called 'Geomans' Hall,' which later was bought by Thomas Smith and became the residence of the direct male line. Sir John Geomans became dissatisfied with the position of Governor of the Carolina Colony, to which he had been appointed in 1671, resigned it and returned to Barbadoes. He left a son, who inherited his title and property. In 1700, James Moore, Sr., got himself appointed governor by the Colonial Council, but died shortly after."

Essie Moore Hawkins to Dr. Ray Gobles of Newberry, S.C.
My father Joseph Moore said that he knew very little of his family, but he was the son of Daniel Moore, whose father, Robert Moore (born 1756 died 1831), who is said to have come from Fairfield County, settled about Cannon Creek & is there buried.

His wife was named Hannah & she is buried at Prosperity cemetery (Wallace thinks she was a Carmichael but I rather think she was first married to a Carmichael before marrying our Robert Moore & was buried beside her first husband.)

Grandfather Daniel Moore is said to have had seven brothers: Samuel Moore's grandfather was one; James was another, (father of Clara, Tom & Col?) They lived in Lexington
