Southern Presbyterian Leaders, by Henry Alexander White, A.M., Ph.D., D.D., L.L.D., published in 1911, page 65; The young minister, Hugh McAden, born of Scots from Ireland in Pa., educated at Nassau Hall (later known as Princeton College) licensed to preach in 1755 & at once sent as an evangelist by New Castle Presbytery, to the country south of the Potomac, started upon his journey on June 16 1755, horseback. (Then follows detailed trip) He later settled near the Red House Church in the valley of the Dan River where he died in 1781. In March 1770 a petition was sent to the Synod of New York & Philadelphia for a presbytery in the Carolinas & it was granted in May, so Hugh McAden & others were set apart as Orange Presbytery, which met at Hawfields Church.

### Ancient Burwell Clan Closely Identified With Early Virginia History

This article, written by Mrs. L. L. Duggar, was contributed to this department as an answer to Query 417, from E. D. B., which was published on this page October 19, 1930. It deals with the ancient Burwell clan and contains a lot of valuable information of interest to many Georgians and families throughout the South.

The Burwell family has given Virginia some of her most eminent statesmen and dignitaries. Lewis Burwell, second son of the emigrant, whose will was probated in 1710, leaves to his godson, William Burwell, 65 pounds worth of plate "that hath his mother's coat-of-arms."

"In those days in England it was an offense to bear arms without authority. To this end the Herald's College sent an emissary to the colony to furnish letters to those who could show proof of their right to bear arms. These letters were looked on as cherished possessions."

Extract of the will of Lewis Burwell proved February 19, 1710, in York County: Children of Lewis and Abigail (Smith) Burwell: Jane; Joanna, born 1675, died October 7, 1727, married November 28, 1693, William Bassett; Elizabeth, died 1734, married Benjamin Harrison, of Berkley, Charles City County, Virginia, attorney general, treasurer and speaker of the House of Burgesses, who died April 10, 1710; Nathaniel, born 1690, called "oldest son" on his tomb, died 1721, married Elizabeth, daughter of Robert (King) Carter. She later married Dr. George Nicholds; Lewis, born 1682, died 1696; daughter, died 1691; Lucy, died December 16, 1716, married December 1, 1704, Edmund Berkley, member of the Council, Martha, married Henry Armistead, son of John and Judith Armistead; James, born 1690, died October 6, 1718, married Mary Armistead.

#### Second Marriage

By his second wife, Martha (daughter of John Lear and widow of William Cole), Colonel Lewis Burwell had: Lewis, who married Frances Thacker (their son, Thacker, married Mary Armistead); Carter, of "The Grove," James City County, Virginia, which he built in 1751, married 1737 Lucy, daughter of Hon. John Grymes, of Brandon, in Middlesex County. Their son, Colonel Nathaniel Burwell, was born April 15, 1750. Carter died six years later and provided in his will that during his son's minority his estate should maintain five poor children at school.

Having inherited a large estate in Frederick (now Clarke) County, he resided there, and erected Carter Hall about 1792, which he named for his father and grandfather, "King" Carter, of Corotoman. Due to his interest in the development of his county, Colonel Burwell built and developed vineyards, tan-yards and other industries. He gave the land upon which the old chapel stands "to be used forever as a place of public worship and burying ground."

Colonel Nathaniel Burwell died at Carter's Hall March 29, 1814, and was buried at the old chapel. He had married (1) Susannah

Grymes, (2) Lucy, widow of Colonel George W. Baylor, and daughter of Mann Page. Robert Burwell, of Isle of Wight County, was the third son of Colonel Nathaniel and Elizabeth Carter Burwell; a member of the House of Burgesses and of the Council. He married (1) in 1742 Sarah, daughter of Thomas Nelson, of Yorktown and sister of President Nelson, of the Virginia Council. He married (2) Miss Braxton, and died in 1777. Honorable Robert Burwell had a daughter, Elizabeth, who married William Nelson, president of the council, and was the mother of Thomas Nelson, signer of the Declaration of Independence.

#### James Ninth Child

James Burwell, ninth child of Major Lewis and Abigail Smith Burwell, was born 1690 and died in 1718. He married Mary Armistead and left a will, probated September 15, 1718, at Yorktown, in which he names his wife, Mary; daughter, Lucy; son, Nathaniel Bacon Burwell, and sisters, Mrs. Hannah Bassett, Mrs. Elizabeth Harrison and Mrs. Martha Armistead, and several others. He made his brothers, Lewis and Nathaniel, and brother-in-law, William Bassett, executors.

In 1790 Nathaniel Bacon Burwell, Jr. and Elizabeth, his wife, sold Carter's Creek, of 1,800 acres, on which he and his late father, James Burwell, lived, to John Tayloe Arbin, of King and Queen County. Elizabeth, wife of Nathaniel Bacon Burwell, Jr., was a daughter of John Smith and brother of Dr. Augustine Smith, of Richmond County.

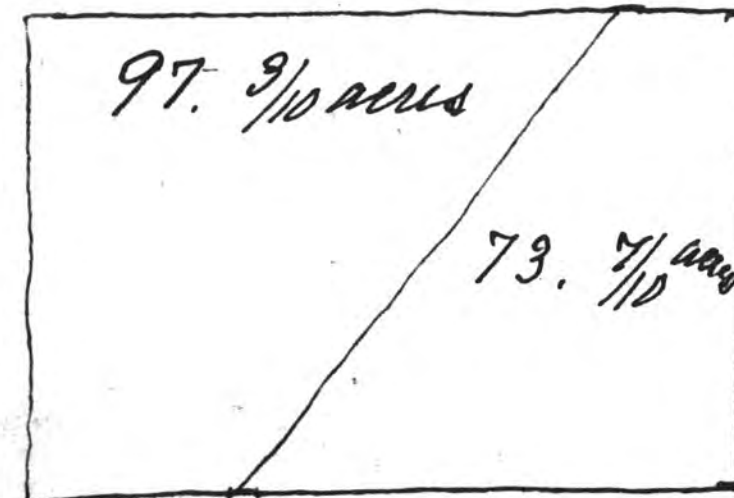
